The number of confirmed screwworm cases in Sterling County jumped to 17 during the last week. This is the highest number in years for the county since the eradication program started in 1962. The statewide total has also advanced to new highs. Since cases during the last week in the county were confirmed on the I.W. Terry ranch south of town, the Claude Collins Jr. ranch in the southwest part of the county, and Billy Ralph Bynum ranch on the divide; there were multiple cases on the King Terry Ranch on the divide with two cases, and the Douthitt ranch off the Big Spring road where David Drennan sent in six confirmed cases. There was one non-screwworm sample sent in by William and J.Q. Foster five miles southeast of town.

There are reports every day from local ranchers about increasing worm cases in all types of livestock. Producers are checking their stock and mailing in the samples for identification for which they are to be commended. Even though it may not be possible to stamp out the current outbreak, it is important that samples be sent in for identification. The sterile fly treatment will be maintained on the basis of confirmed cases or samples. In this way, perhaps the program officials will be able to prevent a recurrence of the outbreak.

Eighty dogs and cats were given the rabies shots last Friday afternoon during the clinic. This is about the usual number of pets brought in for the shots. In addition, Dr. W.B. Grene of the Animal Health Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, took blood samples from eleven rural dogs to be used in the VEE monitoring program. The samples will be screened at a laboratory for the presence of any sleeping sickness virus. It is a virus found in the screening, it will be further tested to determine if it is VEE or one of the other types of sleeping sickness. Owners of the dogs will not receive notice of the outcome of the testing; it will be used only to determine the presence of the virus in the blood of the dogs.

According to Dr. Grene, the Animal Health Service is setting up other means of monitoring for the presence of the virus. Hamsters are being placed at military bases in the monitoring zone. The hamster is particularly susceptible to the VEE. These animals are being placed at the bases in open cages where mosquitos can bite them. If the mosquitos are carrying the virus, it will show up in the hamsters very quickly. The blood sampling technique will be continued throughout the summer months with a number of rural dogs being sampled every thirty days or thereabouts. However, the next time, samples will be taken in the premises; since the dogs were being brought in for the rabies shots, this means was used this time.

Some Hail Damage

An inch of rain, coupled with high winds and some hail hit the Sterling City area about midnight Wednesday. Hail up to golf ball size, damaged some roofs, broke out a few windows, tore leaves from trees and shrubs, and even broke out some car headlights.

Rainfall was heavier to the north and east of town in the county, and started earlier. A windstorm and even tornado alert was out for Tom Green and Coke counties to the southeast and north of Sterling. Not everyone in town had hail damage other than to trees and shrubs. The good of the moisture (for the ranges) outweighed the damage done.

Rainfall was somewhat in a scattered pattern over West Texas. All areas that got rain were in need of moisture.

Nearly \$7 Million in Oil - Gas Production Here in 1971

Sale of Sterling County oil and gas production accounted for \$6,814,608 of the county's economic output for 1971, according to a study by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

In producing 1,718,825 barrels of crude oil and 5 billion cu. feet of natural gas, the county ranked 120 in Texas. Value of its crude oil was \$6,050,264; natural gas value was \$764,344.

The county is among 190 Texas counties with oil and gas production value topping \$100,000, although 211 counties produce oil and gas.

Sterling County oil and gas wells made a significant contribution to Texas' share of the nation's energy needs last year, but growing demand is sapping reserves in Texas faster than they can be replaced, Robert A. Buschman, Association president said. As fewer new fields are discovered, due to less drilling, the continuing strong economy and tax base of many Texas counties may now depend on updating Texas oil conservation laws to encourage wider use of new recovery technology, he said.

The Association study showed that Sterling County farmers, ranchers, and other royalty owners received \$851,826 as their share of production.

The county's wells generated \$278,312 in crude oil production taxes for state government and \$57,326 in state taxes on natural gas. Oil and gas producers spent \$1,547,010 in drilling 11 wells in the county last year, \$1,220,842 of which was lost in drilling 7 dry holes.

Texas Employment Commission figures showed 16 oil and gas industry employees in the county last year, with an annual payroll of \$54,856.

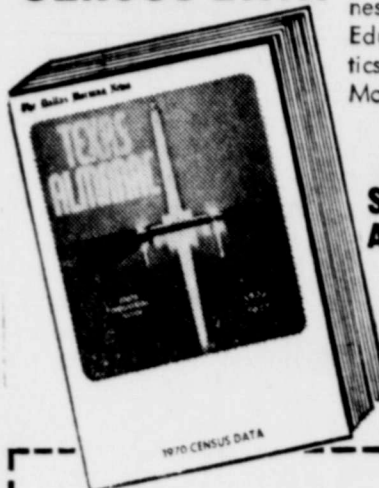
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Do You Want To Go To An Astrodome Game in July? Lions Sponsoring Trip to Astrodome

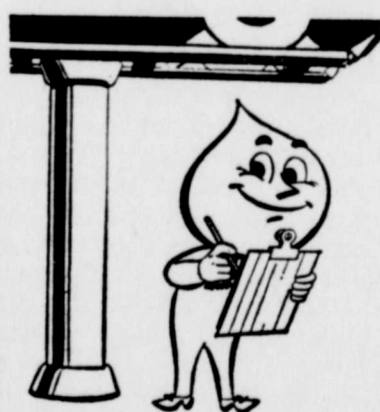

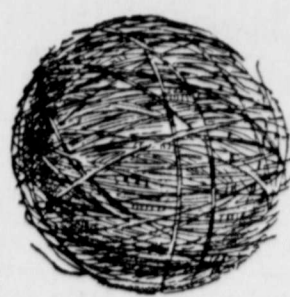
The Border Patrol is the
mobile, uniformed enforce-
ment branch of the Immigra-
tion and Naturalization Ser-
vice. Its principle purpose is to
prevent the smuggling and
illegal entry of aliens into the
United States. The border
patrolmen, called Immigration
Patrol Inspectors, work along
international boundaries, al-
though their duties are not
necessarily confined to these
areas. They work in jeeps,
cars, on foot, in boats and
even in airplanes. Officers in-
vestigate violations of the im-
migration laws and frequently
make arrests. They are often
required to work irregular
hours, under all weather con-
ditions. These duties demand
mental alertness as well as
exceptional physical vigor and
stamina.

is \$7,639 a year (Grade GS-7).

PROFILE OF A COLD VICTIM

What are your chances of catching cold? According to a booklet on the subject, they're especially good if you're female, live in a large city in the western or north-eastern part of the U.S., and are the mother of a child under 6 years of age. Young children are the greatest cold-spreaders. Your chances are further enhanced if you're going through a period of stress and strain. "Contentment preserves one even from catching a cold," the great philosopher, Nietzsche once said.

The booklet, which discusses the common cold, is distributed by Winthrop Laboratories, the makers of Neo-Synephrine nose drops and nasal spray that are widely used in the U.S. and abroad.

Keeping up one's resistance helps to avoid the common cold, according to the publication, which advises getting sufficient fresh air and exercise, well-balanced meals, and as much sleep as possible in a well-ventilated bedroom. In cold weather areas, an extra hour a night is recommended.

Early stages of the common cold are the most contagious. Every sneeze fills the air with thousands of virus-laden droplets. To help

prevent spreading a cold to the rest of the family, to friends and to co-workers, everyone should have his own glass, cup, silverware and towels. Hands should be washed thoroughly and often, preferably with a liquid antibacterial skin cleanser. phisoHex is the one that is used in most U.S. hospitals to help prevent spread of infections. Particularly during the cold season, it is wise to keep a handwashing preparation in the kitchen, as well as in the bathroom.

Your chances of catching a cold will be reduced if pre-



cautions are taken. However, the Winthrop booklet also states that it is not completely possible to avoid a cold. Just breathing the air that someone with a cold has merely talked into offers the possibility of infecting a healthy person.



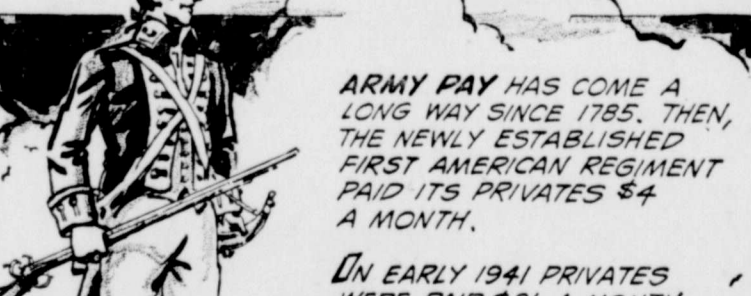

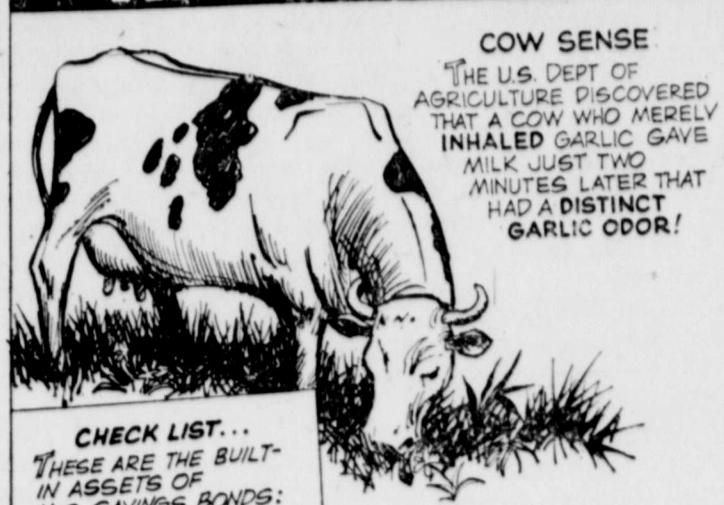

SCOUTS GIVE TRASH THE SACK
Three billion dollars! That's the estimated annual bill Americans are paying for public collection and disposal of garbage and solid waste—the third most expensive community service in the land. . . which is exceeded only by spending for highways and schools.

Concerned citizens, of course, can make significant contributions to cleaning up this national mess. As in Watertown, N. Y., where the initiative of the Environmental Systems Division of St. Regis Paper Company and a local Boy Scout Council is currently leading the way.

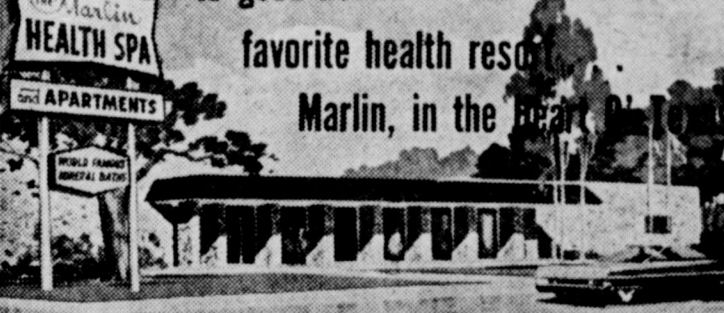


sions have even been made to tow away abandoned automobiles.

Social Security Tips

"Processing time can be cut in half if people are prepared when the time comes to apply for social security benefits," says J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

Being prepared is not as difficult as many people believe. Remember to take along your social security card or the card of the person on whose record you are filing. For a widow, this would be the social security card of her late husband. This may sound hard to believe, but many people do come in to file their application and leave their number at home.

The third thing that is needed in all claims is evidence of the worker's last year's earnings and an estimate of this year's earnings. Your W-2 Form or tax return for last year will give the information for last year. Be sure to bring these with you.

The next most important document to take with you is your birth certificate, if available. Proof of age is needed to qualify for nearly all social security benefits. If your birth was recorded when you were born or if you were baptized before age five, you will need one of these documents. If you don't have a copy, make arrangements now to get one. Mr. Talbot advises.

If your birth was not recorded and you were not baptized before age five, there are other documents you can use. In most cases, the earlier the record was made the better it is for helping to establish your date of birth.
