Movie to be filmed in Colorado City

For a month beginning about October 29, Colorado City will become "Crowder City," the name of a fictional town in a feature movie to be filmed in part here.

Ben Miller, associate producer and production manager, said Tuesday that the old Baker Hotel will serve as the focal point in the filming of the Alfred Hitchcock-style movie.

"The Baker Hotel was about the scariest hotel we could

find," said Miller. The Baker Hotel in Mineral Wells will be used for interior scenes which will be shot before the cast and film crew arrives in Colorado City on October 29.

Miller explains that movie, entitled "Shadows on the Wall," is a non-union picture, with a "fairly low" budget of \$2.5 million.

The film will star Gary Morrison, who most recently starred in "Vice Squad" on television and Wilford Brimley who has a long list of credits to his name including "Country" with Jess-

ica Lange and "The Natural" with Robert Redford.

"Even though the film will have a low budget, we expect it to have a high quality and real expensive look about it," said Miller who has been in the movie industry for 20 years.

Lazy E Productions of Santa Fe, N.M. will be producing the film with Pat Poole as director and Ed Gaylord as executive director.

Miller said there will be a cast of 34 actors and a crew of about 20 in Colorado City for the filming.

He said Colorado City was chosen after the director, who enjoys photographing old theaters, stopped here to take a photo of the Palace Theater and discovered the decaying Baker Hotel next to it.

Miller says the suspense film should be "G" rated and suitable viewing for the entire family.

The story revolves around a murder which happened in 1939 and isn't solved until 1985. The 1939 portion of the film will be filmed in Mineral Wells and the 1985 portion in Colorado City.

Miller describes the story somewhat like a soap opera—"it gets pretty involved."

Other possible filming sites in the Colorado City area will be the county cemetery, the Spade Ranch, the Palace Theater and Bowers Z Bar B Western Wear Store.

"The story is written with economy and efficiency in mind," said Miller, noting that the release date is "up in the air" at this time.

"A couple of major studios are

Floyd Lee Ritchey was sworn into office as a member of the Colorado Independent School District board of directors Monday night.

Ritchey, a farmer, was administered the oath of office by Geneva Findley, business manager.

Ritchey fills the spot vacated by the resignation of S. L. (Mac) Morris.

In other business Monday, the board gave Supt. Charlie Useton permission to advertise for bids for a telephone system for the schools.

Useton said \$44,000 is budgeted for the project. He explained that the school district is currently leasing equipment from AT&T for \$500 a month.

Useton told board members he has contacted several phone companies and anticipates the price of a new system to be between \$16,000-18,000. Bids will be opened at the November 11 meeting.

Kelli Jean Lancaster was hired as a migrant teacher and Sharon Elizabeth Hoover as a first grade teacher. Miss Lancaster has a bachelor of science degree from Southwest Texas State University with a major in elementary education and minor in English. She taught second grade one year in Pampa. Mrs. Hoover has a bachelor of science degree from the University of Oklahoma with a major in elementary education. She taught two years in Bridgecreek, Okla. and worked one year as an

Commissioners award bids

The Mitchell County Commissioners' Court Monday agreed to purchase a new teletype for the sheriff's department from RCA for \$3,395.

Commissioners agreed on the RCA bid after it was determined that it was the lowest bid that met bid specifications.

In other business, the court approved the purchase of a new crew cab pickup truck for the

county extension service for \$14,369 from Joe Weaver Chevrolet and for a pickup truck for precinct three from Anderson Motor Co. for \$10,200.

Quality Glass and Mirror of Big Spring was awarded the bid for storm windows and replacement of damaged windows for \$11,750. The county has already

Cities receive tax rebates

State Comptroller Bob Bullock has sent checks totaling \$19,520.74 to Colorado City and Westbrook as their share of the local sales tax.

There are 1,010 cities in Texas that levy the one-percent city tax.

Colorado City's check was \$16,404.65, up slightly from \$14,354.32 for the same period last year. The 1985 payments to date total \$213,996.59, up 8.53 percent from the 1984 payments to date of \$197,183.03.

Westbrook's check for \$3,116.09 compares to \$1,051.63 for the same period last year. Westbrook's 1985 payments to date total \$19,301.13, up 73.75 percent from the 1984 payments to date of \$11,108.59.

Loraine did not receive a check this period nor for the same period last year. Loraine's 1985 payments to date total \$3,666.14, down 22.79 percent from the 1984 payments to date of \$4,748.

October checks represent tax-

es collected on sales made in August and reported to the comptroller by September 20.

Houston's check was the largest—\$9.1 million—bringing total payments in 1985 to \$123.4 million, up 4 percent over 1984. Dallas received \$6.9 million for a total of \$91.2 million in total payments for this year, an increase of 13 percent.

San Antonio's payment of \$3.5 million increased that

Girls begin district play Saturday

Colorado High School's varsity volleyball team begins district 7-AAA play this Saturday night with the first of two matches against the Crane Golden Cranes.

Colorado City and Crane were scheduled to play their first match this past Tuesday here at "The Pit"—according to the Wolves schedule. Crane, however, had the first of the two out of three series scheduled differently.

"Our schedule said one thing and theirs said another," said CHS volleyball coach Cindy McMillin. "So it was either go to their place or compromise. So we'll be playing here Saturday beginning with the freshmen at 5:30."

A junior varsity match follows at 6:30 p.m. then the varsity contest at 7:30 p.m. The change in schedule also caused the cancellation of a match against Seminole that was scheduled for Saturday.

The Wolves and Cranes are the only 7-AAA members who compete in volleyball and are both assured of playoff spots. The second match between the two squads will be Tuesday at Crane.

In other news the defending bi-district champion Wolves raised their record to 13-2 with a third place finish at last weekend's Irion County tournament.

Colorado City opened the tournament with a 15-3, 15-4 first round victory over Water Valley's junior varsity. Shana Biggs was high point with 11 service points.

In the second round, the Pack went three games before falling to Water Valley's varsity 15-11, 7-15, 15-10. The loss was only the second of the year in 15 matches for Colorado City. The first loss was also to Water Valley and came in Colorado City's own Lone Wolf tournament back in September.

"It was a much better match," said coach McMillin. "The girls all played well. Water Valley is a strong team, probably the strongest team we've faced this year. We played a good match against them. I wish we could play them more."

The Wolves rebounded from the loss to beat the Miles Bulldogs 15-4, 15-10 for third place. Diane Gregory and Jody Huff both had six service points against Miles.

In the loss to Water Valley, Sherry Fite, Holly Tarter and Denise Jackson had 10, six and eight service points respectively.

The junior varsity volleyball team also competed at the tournament and held a 15-6, 15-5 victory over Miles junior varsity along with a 17-15, 16-14 loss to Irion County's varsity and a 15-8, 15-5 loss to Water Valley's junior varsity.

Bulldogs face tough opponents in Roscoe

Through the first five games of the 1985 football season, the Loraine Bulldogs averaged 8.8 points per ballgame and the result was a 1-4 record. Last Friday in week six, the Black and Gold exploded for 39 points and the result was a 39-12 victory in a district 7-A opener against Roby.

"I thought the offense had been jelling the last few weeks and now I feel it's jelled," said coach Sandy McSpadden, whose Bulldogs now face state ranked

Roscoe. The victory was the second in a row over the Lions.

"That hasn't happened in 20 years," said McSpadden. "It was a great, great win for the kids. They thought they had something to prove. They told me they were going to get 35 points for the fans and the did."

"They (Roby) gave us the breaks that we've been giving teams," McSpadden said the key to the

offense's revival was Roby's keying on speedy running back Billy Mayes.

"We ran a multiple offense. They made a mistake trying to stop Billy. All it did was turn quarterbacks Joe Vasquez and Edward Garza loose along with Duane Linam and Ector Castro. And they still weren't able to stop Billy."

"Even when you lose it's because of all runners, not just one. They started moving the ball

pretty good on us in the fourth quarter. I don't feel our youngsters are out of shape, it's just that we have so many going both ways."

"Our linemen Phillip Sanders, Armando Castro, David Sanchez, Ben Esquivel and Ricky Bailey played a hard game and I can see why they were feeling the strain late in the ball game."

McSpadden also mentioned the "outstanding" play of Michael DeLoera, a cornerback and

offensive end. With one district victory behind them, the Bulldogs now face the heart of their schedule when they play Roscoe tomorrow and co-preseason favorite Forsan next week.

"Our schedule is not exactly a coaches delight. It's the same old Roscoe. They might be a little weaker."

"They've got tradition behind them. It's a tough thing to fight. They've had it and we're trying to get some."

"They've lost a lot of size, but they're still disciplined and quick. Troy Kennedy (coach) and his staff have been together

seven years and do an excellent job of dissecting the other teams."

Last week the Plowboys beat Sands 39-0 and their only loss has been to top ranked AA Hamlin.

"Denman (quarterback Matt) is in his last year. He's been the quarterback four years and they've been to the playoffs in three of those years."

Said McSpadden of using Garza and Vasquez as co-quarterbacks, "I don't like to, but I'll use which ever one is playing good at the time."

Wolves preparing for Crane

The Colorado City Wolves broke a three game losing streak last Friday night and it couldn't have happened at a better time as the 20-0 victory over old rival Coahoma gave the Pack a 3-3 record—more importantly a 1-0 district 7-AAA mark.

In the game, the Wolves came out with a strong first half performance to go with their usual strong second half showing. It resulted in a not-unusual-for-this-season halftime lead and ended with their first shut-out.

"The preparation was the same," said head CHS coach Tom Ramsey. "We went into it like all the others."

The Wolves suffered no fumbles in the contest and quarterback Mike Ligon wasn't intercepted until his very last pass.

"Both sides were really hitting," said Ramsey. "You could tell it was a rivalry. We just lasted longer than they did."

"It was 6-0 going into the fourth quarter. Both offenses had not mounted much."

In the fourth quarter, Ligon and All-West Texas running back Sam Rivera broke loose for big gains—with Rivera breaking away for 19 and 49 yard scores.

"We suffered no serious injuries," said Ramsey. "Just a lot of hard physical contact."

Middle linebacker Albert Rivera had the most physical contact with 19 tackles. Edward Melendez added 11 and Raymond Martinez and Stu Howell contacted for 10.

For the year, Albert Rivera leads the Pack with 84 tackles. Martinez, Melendez and Danny Salazar have 46, 42 and 38 tackles respectively.

"Coahoma puts a lot of emphasis on Colorado city," said Ramsey. "They'd rather beat us than anybody else, but Coahoma is still just one (rival)."

If the Wolves keep it up, they won't be able to call it a rivalry much longer. Coahoma has beaten Colorado City just once in the last ten years.

Tomorrow's opponent, Ozona, hasn't beaten Colorado City since Ramsey's first year in 1979. The Lions are 1-3 with a lone victory over class AA Eldorado—a good AA team. On paper it would appear that Wolves are in for a breather before hosting Ballinger and Sonora and traveling to Crane.

"We don't look ahead this year," said Ramsey. "You get beat when you look ahead. We've got to play well. Ozona's not a world beater. They had not given up much points until last week, (a 50 plus blowout by Ballinger)."

Their defense is playing better than last year. We can't afford to look down the road."

"They're not as big as they used to be. They're very similar to us in size. They have a few big ones and we have a few big ones. They've also got a few 140 pounders playing like we do. They do have a little speed and throw the ball better—and much more."

"They had Ballinger 0-0 mid-

way through the second quarter. They've been in all the games. We're going into hostile territory but we'll be ready for 'ol Ozona. Traditionally we play well on the road."

"Wide receiver Harvey Fierro is who they go to on the big play."

In other district action last week, Crane whalloped Sonora. The Broncos had three punt snaps over the punters head and fumbled five times—including fumbles on their own 18, 30 and 32 yard lines.

Wylie Dakan, (ankle injury), still won't be ready this week.

Late in the fourth quarter against Coahoma, the Wolves used a two-back set instead of just S. Rivera in the backfield.

"We're going to make people prepare for both of them," said Ramsey.

Said Ramsey of the Wolves kicking game. "Our punting is there, our kicking off is average, but our field goal and extra point kicking could be described as terrible. I guess we just pressured up."

Kickoff at Ozona is at 8 p.m.
