Without awakening the Stokelys, McCurley stopped and put the fire out, then told City Marshal Jewel Bowling he should check it again.

Bowling went to the house and raised the papers from under the tree.

Then at about 4:30 a.m. as he completed his night of duty and was going to his home, Bowling drove by the scene again. He saw no sign of fire.

Some 15 minutes later, the Stokelys were awakened by the fire.

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## Tigers Host Panhandle Friday After Losing to Shamrock 6-0

Panhandle's Panthers come to McLean Friday night to meet the Tigers in their first home game of the season.

Action is scheduled to begin at 8 p.m. at Duncan Field.

In last Friday night's season-opener, Coach Fred Hedgecock's Tigers battled the Shamrock Irishmen to a standstill through 3½ periods of play, before the hosts were able to push across a score for a 6-0 victory.

McLean itself had mustered a serious threat or two earlier in the evening, penetrating to as deep as the Shamrock six-yard line before being stopped.

The Irishmen's lone touchdown came with 7:40 remaining in the game, with a pair of their break-away runners—Louis Davis and Rodney Vaughn—toting the ball 63 yards on seven carries.

Shamrock had taken possession on its 37 after a McLean punt. Davis slipped to the 41 and Vaughn to the 44. Then Davis picked his way through the defenders to McLean's 42, and next to the 33.

Vaughn picked up a first down on the Tiger 31, and Davis zipped down to the five before being nailed. On the next play he found the opening on the right side and finished the drive.

The attempted conversion was no good, but the Irish had their margin of victory.

McLean staged its most serious threat early in the game.

After the opening kickoff had left the Tigers on their own 22, the locals showed the Irishmen they were deadly serious about this game.

Eddy Windom, who has been shifted from end to halfback,

ripped off 10 yards the very first time McLean got the ball.

Quarterback Johnny Fuller cocked his arm back and threw to Windom for 30 yards to the Shamrock 38, bringing the Tiger fans to their feet.

Fullback Dickie Crockett grabbed three more yards and a fumble netted another pair. But the drive stalled on the 32.

Shamrock was able to get nowhere, and yielded possession to the Tigers four plays later on the Irish 40.

Freshman Halfback Steve Fuller sped to the 35 and Crockett picked up a first down on the Shamrock 26. On the next try the fullback charged to the 22, but Windom was stopped on the 24.

Johnny Fuller made it to the 20 and a five-yard offside penalty against Shamrock set the Tigers

up with a first down on the 15. Crockett gained three to the 12. A pair of passes missed their targets—Doyle McCurley and Steve Fuller—and another offside penalty against the Irishmen moved the line of scrimmage to the seven.

On fourth down, Crockett was able to pick up but one yard and the hosts took possession.

Windom intercepted a Shamrock pass midway of the second quarter to start another McLean drive. The Irishmen were on the Tiger 30 when the interception occurred.

Windom, despite leg injuries, galloped to the Shamrock 38 before being hauled down.

Steve Fuller, Windom and Crockett teamed up to push their way to the 11, but a wayward pass was intercepted in the end zone by a Shamrock defender, stopping the drive with 20 seconds remaining in the half.

Coach Hedgecock said he was pleased with the Tigers' efforts at Shamrock, but pointed out that the team made "a lot of mistakes." These were being corrected in workouts this week.

## September Begins In Same Pattern —It's Hot, Dry

Dry and hot weather continues in McLean, even though fall is fast approaching.

Daytime temperatures during the past week stayed mostly in the mid and high 90's, but did drop to cooler levels each night.

No rain has been recorded since Aug. 30 when the city received .24 inch. This brought to 1.39 inches the amount of rainfall here in August.

The same month in 1963 saw 3.81 inches of moisture.

To date in 1964, McLean has received 13.29 inches, compared to 12.80 by Sept. 10 in 1963.

The high temperature reading the past week was 97 degrees, registered on Thursday and again on Friday. The low was 66 on Saturday.

## Boys Hold Narrow Edge in Enrollment

reage, equal to 11.11 per cent of the 1965 allotment. (Payment in 1964 was at 20 per cent for all acres diverted to conserving use.)

6. A producer can qualify for loans and certificates even though he exceeds his acreage allotment by not more than 50 per cent on any farm in which he has an interest, if he stores the wheat from the excess acreage under bond and carries out conserving acre use requirements of the program. (This provision was not included in the 1964 program.)

The sign-up period for the 1965 wheat program is from Aug. 24 through Oct. 2. The program sign-up can be done anytime during that period at the county ASCS office in Pampa.

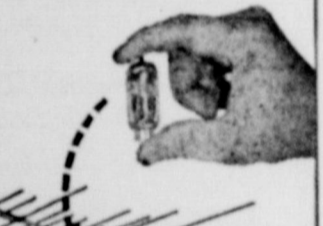

**ORDINANCE NO. 118**

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO  
 THE SALE OR THE OFFERING  
 FOR SALE OF CERTAIN IM-  
 PORTED MEATS, PROVIDING  
 FOR THE LABELING THEREOF  
 AND FOR THE ENFORCEMENT  
 OF THE ACT, MAKING CERTAIN  
 ACTS UNLAWFUL AND PRE-  
 SCRIBING PENALTIES FOR VIOLA-  
 TIONS THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE  
 CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY  
 OF McLEAN, TEXAS:  
 I.

That every retailer who sells  
 or offers for sale in the City of  
 McLean, Texas, through a meat  
 market, store or otherwise, any  
 meats, either canned, frozen or  
 cured, which are the products of  
 any country foreign to the United  
 States, shall clearly label such  
 meat as "imported," naming the  
 country of its origin, which label-  
 ing shall be in lettering not less  
 than one-half inch in height. As  
 used in this ordinance: (a) The  
 word "retailer" shall mean a per-  
 son regularly engaged in the busi-  
 ness of selling meat, canned, fro-  
 zen or cured, at retail to the trade  
 and public as such, and selling  
 only to the user or consumer and  
 not for resale; (b) the word  
 "meat" means the dressed flesh  
 of cattle, swine, horses, sheep or  
 goats but shall not include fish  
 or products of fish.

II.  
 It shall be the duty of the  
 health officer of the City of Mc-  
 Lean, Texas, to aid in the enforce-  
 ment of the provisions of this ordi-  
 nance. The health officer or his  
 duly authorized agents shall have  
 free access at all reasonable hours  
 to every retail establishment which  
 sells or offers to sell meat to the  
 public and may enter any vehicle  
 being used to transport any such  
 meat for the purpose of inspecting  
 the products therein, and to secure  
 samples or specimens of such meat  
 or products.

III.  
 In addition to other remedies  
 provided by this ordinance the  
 health officer is authorized to  
 apply to the district court, and  
 such court shall have jurisdiction  
 upon a hearing and for cause  
 shown to grant a temporary or  
 permanent injunction restraining  
 any person from violating this  
 ordinance.

IV.  
 Any person who shall fail to  
 comply with the provisions of this  
 ordinance shall be deemed guilty  
 of a misdemeanor, and upon con-  
 viction shall be punished by a fine  
 not exceeding Two Hundred and  
 No/100 (\$200.00) Dollars.

V.  
 This ordinance shall take effect  
 and be in force from and after  
 ten (10) days after the date of
