MILLERAND WILL NOT QUIT PLACE

PARIS, June 10.—President Millerand, in a message sent to the French parliament today, refused to resign his office.

PARIS, June 10.—The French Senate today by a vote of 154 to 144, overthrew the "ministry of message" of Frederic Francois. The ministry was constituted Sunday for expressing his refusal to resign office.

PARIS, June 10.—The Francois-Marsa temporary ministry was defeated in the Chamber of Deputies by a vote of 329 to 214 today on the adoption of a motion offered by majority leader Herriot not to open a discussion with the government which is not in conformity with the sentiment of the country.

The action is considered as being equivalent to forcing President Millerand out of office.

TWO SPEAKINGS HERE FOR THE DAY

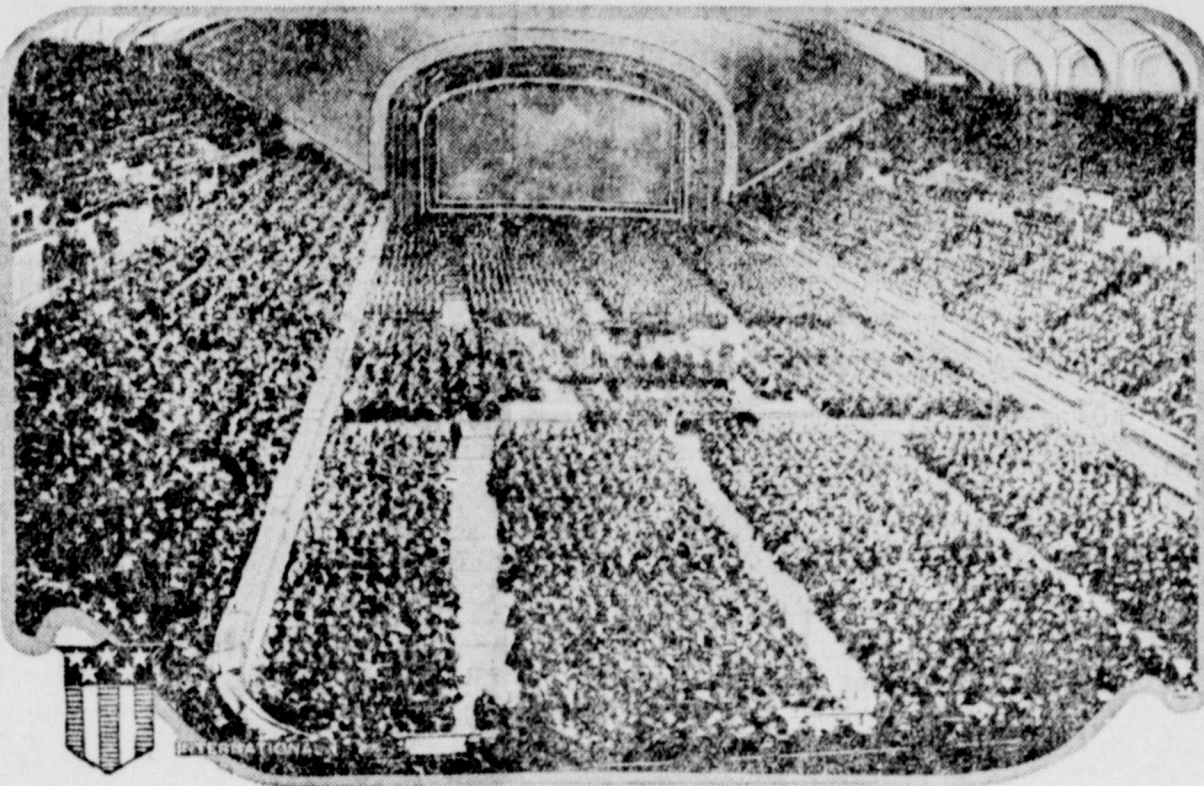

Mr. Coolidge does not feel that an extra session of congress was made necessary by the failure of the Senate to pass the deficiency appropriation bill.

REPORTS WEB WORMS DESTROYING COTTON

Albert Halfman was in the city from his farm eight miles South of Ballinger Tuesday. He reported that the farmers in his community had overcome all danger from crop destruction by the grasshoppers, but stated that a new pest in the form of the web worm was playing havoc with some of the cotton fields. "They have ruined about twenty acres for me," said Mr. Halfman, "and if it does not come a shower of rain, or something else to stop them I am afraid they will clean up my crop."

Mr. Halfman stated that he used his chickens on one side of his cotton field and poison on the other in controlling the hoppers. He stated that the web worms are working in the fields of his neighbors also. "It is my third planting," said Mr. Halfman, "and I hate to lose it this time." He stated that the cold weather got his first cotton planted. Heavy rain made replanting necessary the second time, and the third planting was doing fine until the worms struck it.

CUBA TAKES MOST OF OUR EXPORTED EGGS

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, June 10.—Cuba was the biggest export market for the United States eggs in April this year, taking a total of 1,217,755 dozen or 642,755 dozen more than the next largest outside consumer, Argentina in South America, according to reports of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics released thru the co-operative state-federal market news service. Mexico held rank of third in April, the report states, total exports from this country to the Southern Republic amounting to 504,028 dozen eggs. On the North greatest exports went to Canada which country took 33,933 dozen. Bermuda was shipped 7,530 dozen and New Foundland and Labrador 768 dozen, the report states.

CONCHO COUNTY WANTS 500 HANDS

Sheriff Bob Miller, of Concho county, was over from Paint Rock Tuesday, and stated that his county needed 500 farm hands and wanted them right now. The farmers are paying \$1.50 per day and board for cotton choppers, said the Concho county sheriff, "and if we can get our cotton chopped we will make the biggest crop in the history of the county."

Mr. Miller stated that the hoppers were not as bad as they had been and it was now believed that they would be controlled, and no serious damage result. The Concho county sheriff had just returned from Del Rio, where he went to get farm hands. He stated that he brought back twenty Mexicans and white men.

An Associated Press report from Fort Worth states that the United States Farm Labor Bureau is receiving calls from all over the state for harvest hands and hands to carry on other farm work.

The late spring, and several weeks of wet weather, delayed farming activities, and when the rush on the farm did come it called for planting, plowing, and grain harvesting all at the same time, and farmers put in an S. O. S. call for help.

The wages being paid for farm labor this spring are better than usual. 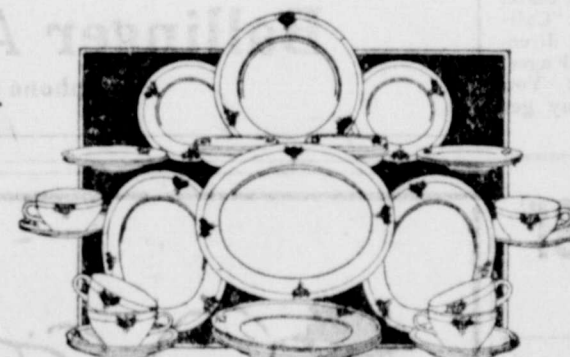

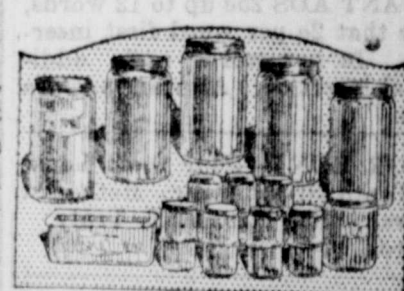

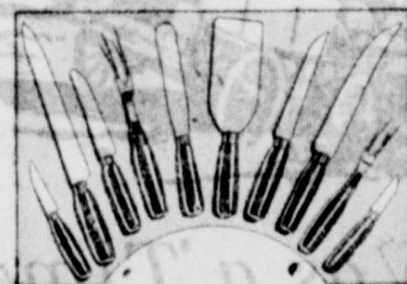

GRASSHOPPERS ARE BEING HELD BACK

While there are a few localities which have perhaps lost a small per cent of their cotton on account of the grasshoppers, reports from different sections of the county indicate that the pests are being controlled and very little damage has resulted.

Different means of destroying the pests have been resorted to, and thru a campaign of co-operation—all farmers doing their part where the pests have been the most numerous, the hoppers have been held back out of the fields, and it is not believed now that any serious damage will result.

In some sections of the county, and especially where most of the land is in cultivation, the hoppers have not been numerous enough to cause any alarm, and the farmers have not been forced to get into the campaign of extermination. Taking the county as a whole, prospects for a good cotton crop are very promising, and a few showers through the remainder of the summer will do the work. MATE OF WINDJAMMER PUTS IN A STIRRING YEAR

(By Associated Press)
SEATTLE, Wash., June 10.—Mutiny on the high seas, typhoons, and Chinese pirates were

among the experiences which the last year allotted Fred N. Troup, first officer of the five-masted schooner Tseng Tai which, flying the flag of the Chinese republic, has been docked here loading lumber.

Troup, whose home is at Puyallup, Washington, near Seattle, signed last summer as first officer on the American schooner Levi W. Ostrander. When her name was changed to Tseng Tai and Chinese took over the vessel, Troup became master. On a voyage from Shanghai to Foochow the schooner ran into a typhoon, which sent her fleeing for safety under bare masts.

On a second voyage to Foochow, the schooner touched at the port of Quantow. While it was lying at anchor Chinese bandits appeared.

"Then Danish chief mate and I were the only white men aboard," recalled Troup. "Each of us had an automatic. I fired 22 times. Some fell; I couldn't count how many. My Chinese crew of 28 were caught in their quarters and three were slain. We managed to get in a motor boat and escape." Later they regained their ship, which the pirates had deserted after removing everything portable.

The Tseng Tai was refitted and held under the admiralty courts while salvage claims were contested. Under a new ownership Troup went to Puget Sound with her, as first officer. On the way the crew mutinied, but the trouble was quelled and the men responsible for it put in irons to be

delivered to the police at Vancouver, B. C.

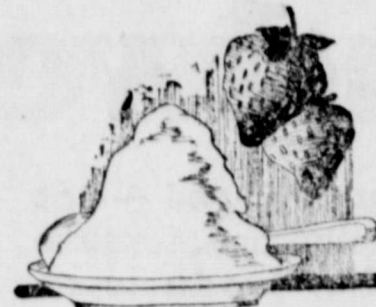
AUTO THEFT CASE SENDS MAN TO PEN
