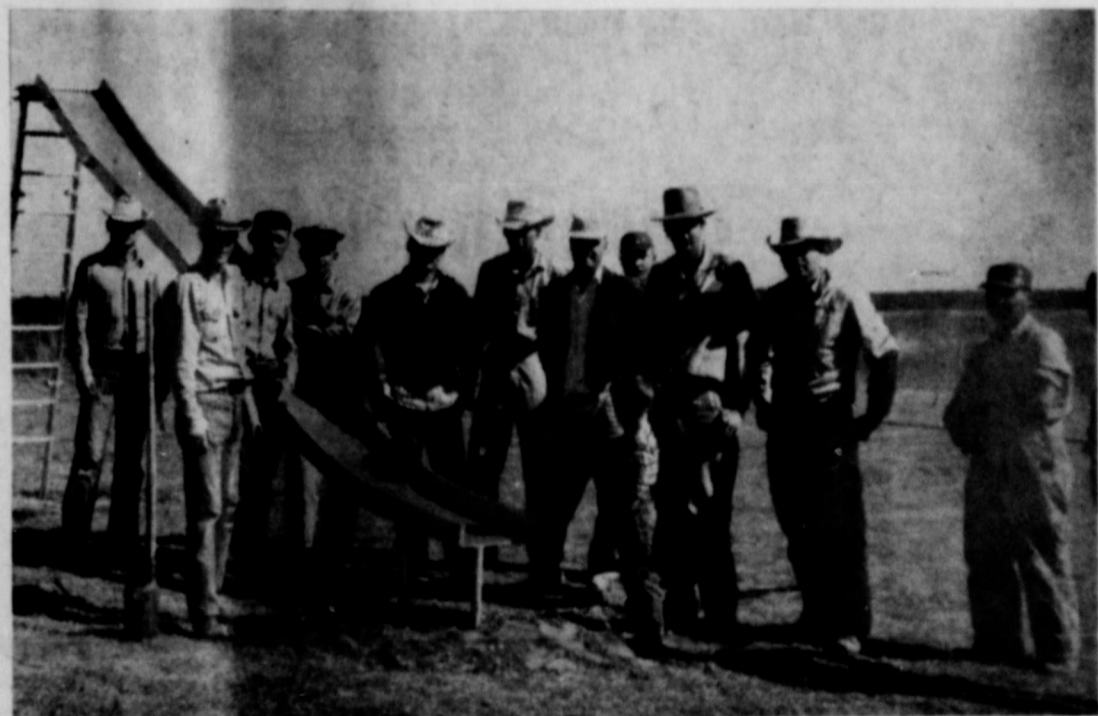
Randolph attended County Court in Littlefield this week. There were 58 cases scheduled to come before the Court this session.

Blue Skies, All Of Them Clear

Clear blue skies, warm sunshine and dry breezes would be just what each farmer in the area would like to see from now until the completion of harvest. That is what we had Wednesday, but the previous few days not only dampened feed and cotton crops, but the farmers spirits as well.

Rainfall amounts over the South

Plains varied from one inch to five inches for the past three day period. Approximately four inches of rain was received in the Earth and Springlake communities.

Local grainmen were of the opinion that the rainy weather had not damaged the grain crop to any appreciable extent so far. While the grain may become discolored, this is not expected to affect the

market and loan value. Grain crops are reported to be standing up well and it is hoped there will be no high winds until the harvest can be completed. However light winds would aid the drying process and help to eliminate the danger of the grain sprouting.

Most ginners felt that cotton had received some damage from the rain, although with continued

dry weather and a hoped for late freeze, it was expected there would be a great deal of good quality cotton. It was pointed out that the full amount of damage as to the grade and etc., could not be determined as yet, but with good weather from here on, it was believed that the extent of damage would not be too great.

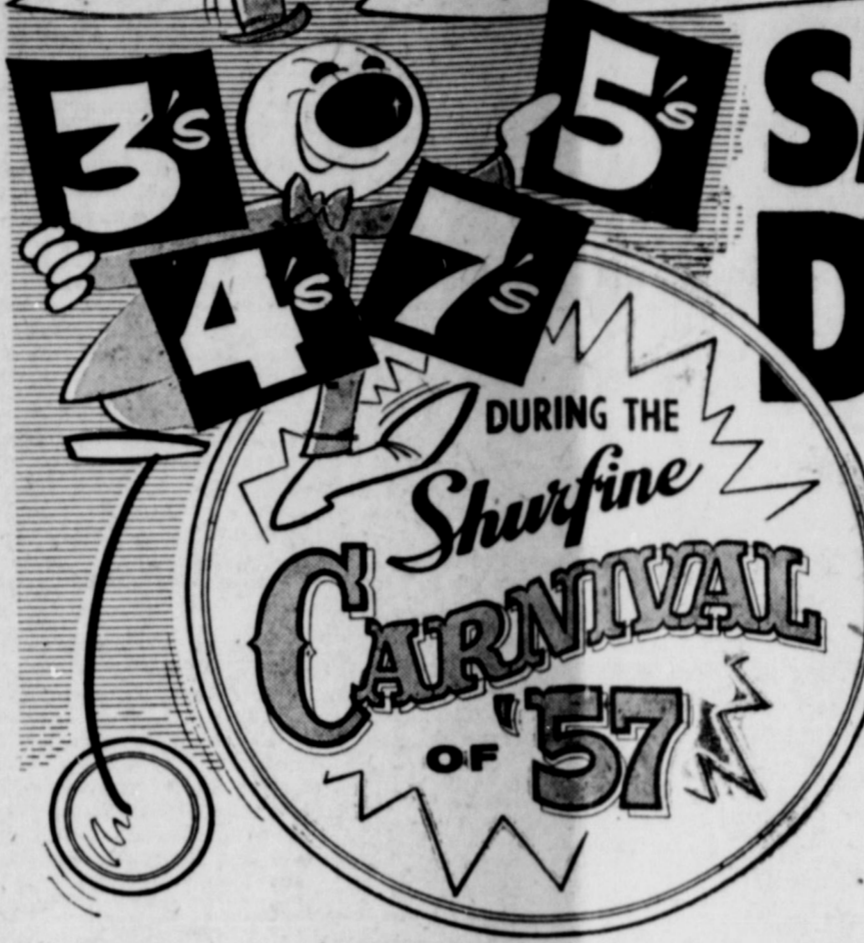

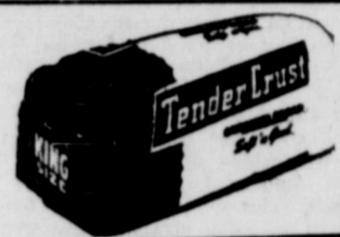

Springlake Loses First District Game Of Season

The Springlake Wolverines dropped their first district 3-A football game Friday night on their home field to the Sudan Hornets 34 to 7. The Wolverines put up a valiant battle, but a combination of the flu bug, fumbles and Sudan quarterback Dan Wood was more than the boys could handle. Several of coach Hahn's players, including Keith Leonhart and Joe Neal Ellis, were unable to suit out because of the flu, and several others who did play were not in top condition because of the dreaded bug. It was a slim and weakened team that took the field for Springlake Friday night, but the boys never gave up, though some were physically out on their feet.

Dan Wood of Sudan did some mighty fancy quarterbacking as he scored three touchdowns himself and set up others with his baffling ball handling. He constantly kept the Wolverines confused with the roll out option play, tantalizing the opposition by holding out the ball till the last minute, then either keeping or pitching out to his trailing teammate. Wood ran 50, 53 and 1 yards for his scores. He also scored three extra points by plunges for the Hornets.

The Wolverines were plagued again by fumbles, losing the ball six times. However, the home team outgained their rivals on the ground 264 yards to 236. Springlake was able to move the ball fairly easy, but was a victim of bad "breaks" that would break down a concerted march.

Sudan opened the game by receiving the kickoff, but fumbled after making one first down. Springlake recovered and immediately began a nice march from their own 38. They plunged through the middle of line, racking up three first downs and driving clear down to the Sudan 28 yard line. At that point a penalty stopped the Wolverines and the drive bogged down as Sudan took over on downs. The Hornets ran three plays which netted 21 yards to mid-field, and then Wood rolled out to his left and went 50 yards for the first goal of the night. He also plunged for the point.

On the second play after receiving the kickoff Springlake fumbled

and Sudan recovered on the 50. They drove down to Springlake's 6 yard line as the first quarter ended, and drove over for their second score on the third play of the second period. Wood going over from the one yard line, Springlake fumbled the kickoff, but managed to recover on its own one yard line. The Wolverines worked the ball to their 24, but at that point Sudan intercepted a pass on Springlake's 25. However, on the first play the Hornets fumbled again and Springlake recovered on their own 42 they tried another pass and again Sudan intercepted, this time on the Wolverine's 43. From this point the Hornets drove for another score in six plays.

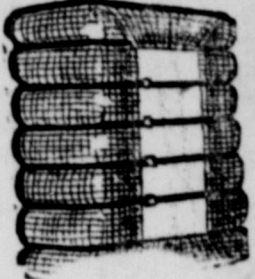
Things looked better for the Wolverines in the third quarter as they received the second half opening kickoff on their 23 and marched 77 yards in eight plays for their only touchdown. The drive was helped by a "roughing the kicker" penalty against Sudan as Springlake was held for downs. That gave the Wolverines new life on their 40. Then Richard Moore got loose on a beautiful 58 yard run over left tackle and was finally brought down from behind on Sudan's 2 yard line. It took Springlake three plays to score from that point, with Gene Stephens going over from the one. Moore plunged for the extra point.

Stephens made a fine "on sides" kick off and Springlake recovered at mid-field. But, on the first play, Sudan recovered another fumble, and on the Hornet's first play from scrimmage Dan Wood ran another 50 yards for a score. Sudan recovered another Springlake fumble later in the third quarter on Springlake's 26 yard line and the Hornets scored again in three plays as the Wolverines showed signs of tiring because of the flu and cold bugs that had plagued them. In the final quarter Sudan played mostly reserves and Springlake controlled the ball for the most part, but was unable to score. In the last half, after their third period touchdown, the Springlake boys were showing the affects of playing without their regulars and playing while still weak from illness. Guard Tom Messer was injured in the third quarter and was taken to the Amherst hospital. It was a neck and head injury, but at last report it was not known how long he would be out of action.

Springlake travels to Silverton tomorrow, Friday night, to battle the class B stalwarts. It is not known just how strong Silverton may be, but they have about a fifty-fifty win and lost record this year. This will be a non-district game beginning at 8 p.m. at Silverton. It is hoped our boys will be at top strength physically and that no other boys will come down with flu this week. Let's all go to Silverton Friday and show our boys we still are with them every inch of the way. Let's not be "front runners," that is, let's not support the team just as they are winning, but let us support our boys, win, lose or draw. In that way it will help teach the boys the importance of trying and doing their best regardless of the score. It isn't who wins that counts the most, but how we play the game.

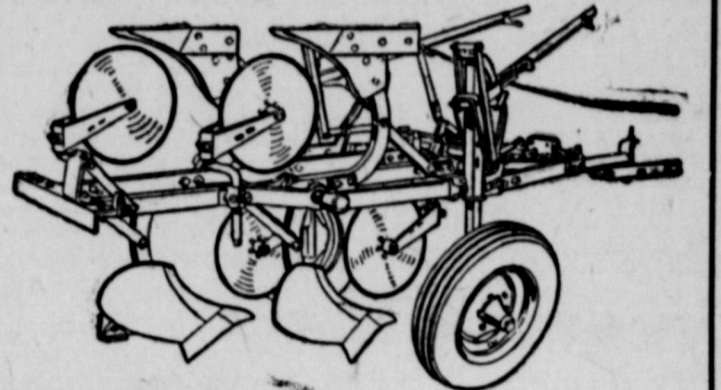

national acreage allotment of 17,391,304 acres for the 1958 crop of upland cotton were proclaimed October 11, 1957, by Secretary Ezra Taft Benson.

In accordance with Section 302 of the Agricultural Act of 1956, the national acreage allotment for 1958 is the same as for the 1956 crop (as was the case also for the 1957 crop.) and the national marketing quota has been set at the number of bales required to provide an acreage allotment of this size.

The Secretary also announced that a referendum on upland cotton quotas will be held on December 10, 1957. At least two-thirds of the upland cotton farmers voting

A LETTER FROM MR. AND MRS. DAVID ESTES
A letter from Mr. and Mrs. David Estes was received this month by the Pete Mimms family. Mr. and Mrs. Estes taught school two years in Lazbuddie and we think bits of the letter would be of interest to their friends here. They are

teaching school on Kwajalein, one of the islands in the Marshall group.

"We are happy here and are very happy in our new situation. Everything is much better than we expected and there is more to do than you can imagine. We already have a collection of shells. Although Kwajalein would only stretch from your house to the corner by Shirleys house (two miles) if it were straightened out, it is a very challenging place, it is all made of coral which is the dead bodies of thousands and millions of tiny coral polyps. We are only 20 feet from the ocean at high tide. Our house catches the breeze just right but we keep everything in the hot lockers that will rust, mildew or corrode. We even get rust on our clothes and the floor. We live in a duplex, made of concrete block with large rooms. Our living room is about 20'x20' and it has sliding doors opening out onto a lanai (porch) which is 10'x20'. Everything is furnished but it costs \$90.00 per month. We are learning to skin and to sail a lightening (18' sailboat). We have a bomb crater out on the reef behind the house (big enough to put your house in) and it is always full of beautiful tropical fish when the tide goes out. We also see many beautiful fish when we go swimming in the lagoon. We can't eat them because too many of them are poison. They eat certain kinds of coral growth which may or may not be poison, depending upon the season. We also have "killer clams" which sometimes get to weigh up to six or eight hundred pounds, but most only weigh three hundred pounds. This lagoon is the only place in the world where they grow. Our school buildings are very poor and we have limited supplies, compared to Lazbuddie. Our working hours are shorter though (because of the heat.) School is out at 3 p.m. and there is no bus to drive. We do not have the energy to do as much as we did there. Almost everybody is in bed by 10 p.m. unless there is a party or something."

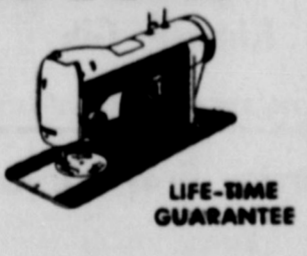
