Leesa helps in the eye clinic

Cindy, Clint and Leesa Patterson, of Farwell, got the experience of a lifetime when they went on a Medical Mission to Kaituma, Guyana, in South America.

Kaituma is located in the "heart" of the rainforest and is somewhat close to the coast.

How many of us can say we've been to the rainforest?

Scott Zapalac (Gary Patterson's brother-in-law) is the coordinator for these medical missions called "Immeasurably More" and arranged for Cindy, Clint and Leesa to go and help out in Kaituma.

Patty, Zapalac's wife, has been on 19 medical missions and this was her 5th mission in Kaituma. So this is how Cindy and her kids got involved. This is the second medical mission that Clint has been on.

Approximately 26 people went to Kaituma for this mission. Among these 26 were 2 dentists, 3 doctors and a pharmacist. The Pattersons' trip started June 17 and came to a halt June 25. They left out of the Miami airport and landed in Georgetown (the capitol of Guyana) and from there they boarded "bush" planes that took them into Kaituma.

She also stated that when they flew over the rainforest it looked like "broccoli bunches."

Can you imagine all those trees?

Well, broccoli bunches weren't the only thing in store for the Pattersons. When they arrived in Kaituma, Cindy said she felt as if she had stepped back in time. Kaituma is very primitive. The only electricity was in the Harris House where they stayed for the duration of the mission.

The Harris House from description was a hotel-like establishment with a disco-tech on the first floor (with a disco-ball, black lights and everything) and living quarters on the very top floor where the Pattersons stayed. Cindy said it was a living room and 5 or 6 bedrooms.

Cindy joked about it and described it as "pretty much a family trip."

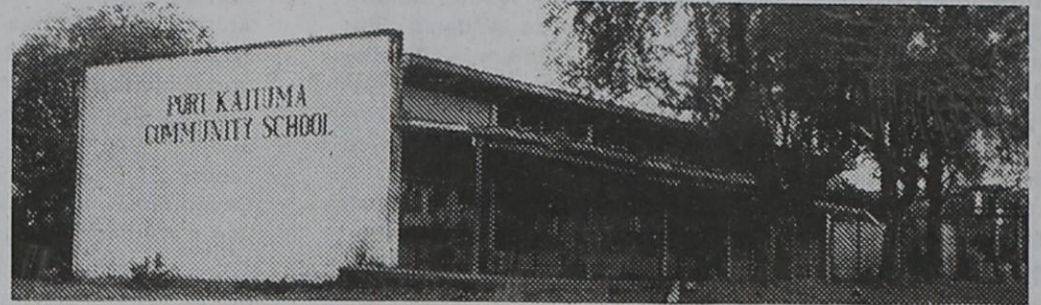
But fun and games weren't involved in this trip. No way. The Pattersons' day started out at 5-6 in the morning and they were exhausted and ready to "hit the hay" by 10 that night.

The trip consisted of 5 basic parts -- dentistry, medical, optometry, Bible study, and VBS.

The clinic was held at the Port Kaituma community school which was built sometime during the 50's when Guyana was still a British colony. During those times Cindy said the school was a "premier school" but that time had taken its toll. The reason for the toll-taking bit is that Guyana is no longer a British colony and they don't have that funding coming in any more to support the school.

She also said the school officials were gracious and moved kids out from a certain section so that the medical teams could go in and work.

The school itself consisted of primary, intermediate and secondary students. The dormitories were also still in use considering the fact that most of the students whose families lived farther into the jungle stayed there until the school year was out.

The school had no electricity so the team took along generators and flashlights to meet their needs.

Cindy worked in optometry while she was there and she got to be an expert in using the focometer (an instrument used in taking an accurate reading of a persons eyes in order to give them prescription glasses).

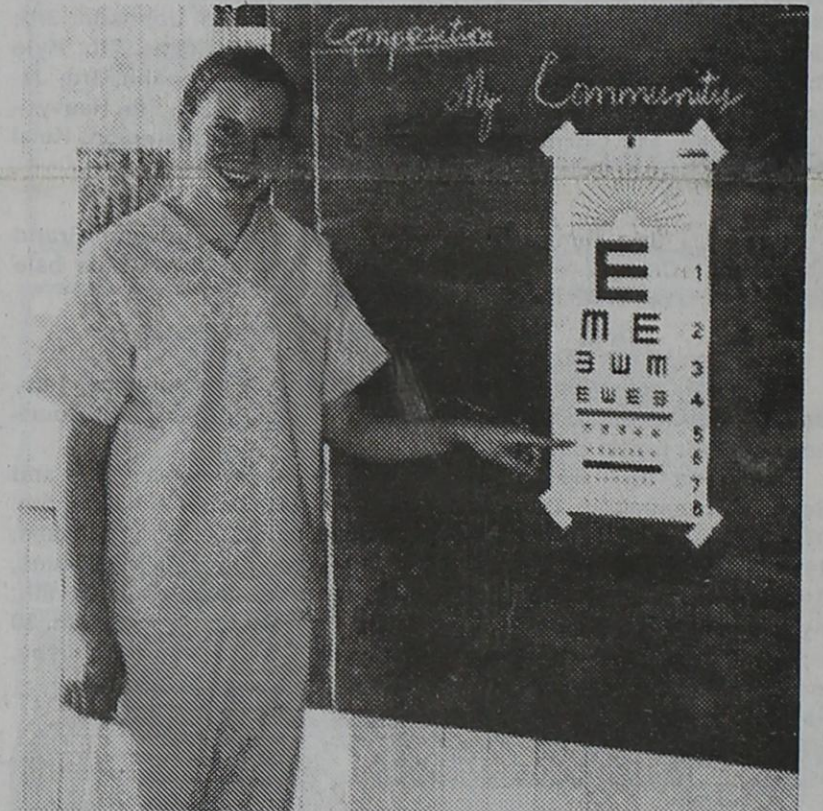
The lenses and frames for the glasses were bought with donation money that Mr. and Mrs. Zapalac of Austin contributed.

Clint worked in the dentistry area of the clinic and by the end of the week he was giving injections and pulling teeth (with doctor supervision of course). Cindy said, "he had a crash course in dentistry."

Leesa got to work with VBS. She sang songs, colored, told Bible stories, and played games with the kids there. The children were enchanted with the coloring from what Cindy said and with good reason. What is a normal childhood activity for us here is a very rare treat for the kids in Kaituma.

School was still in session in Kaituma so they would do VBS during the different breaks and would take in different

Leesa shows the eye chart she used

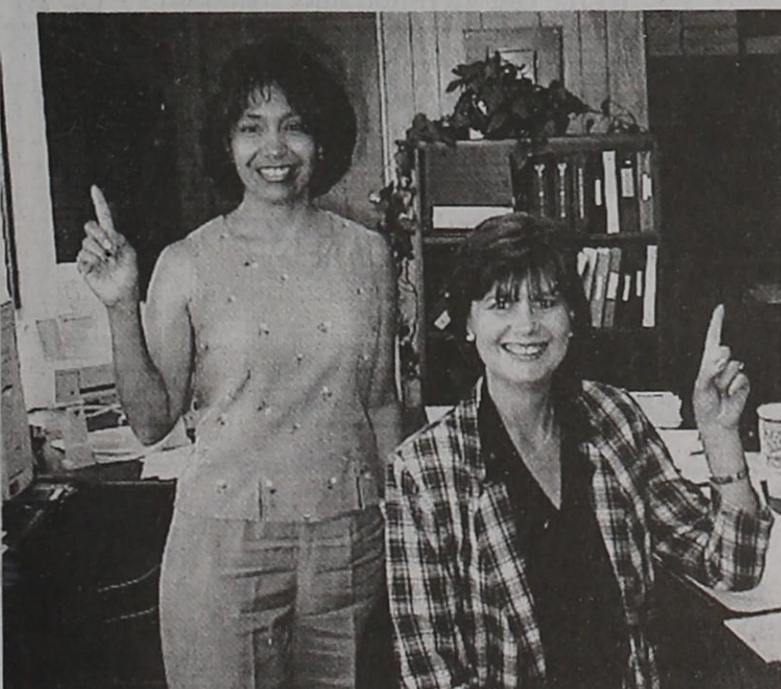
Countdown continues: Only one more week to go!

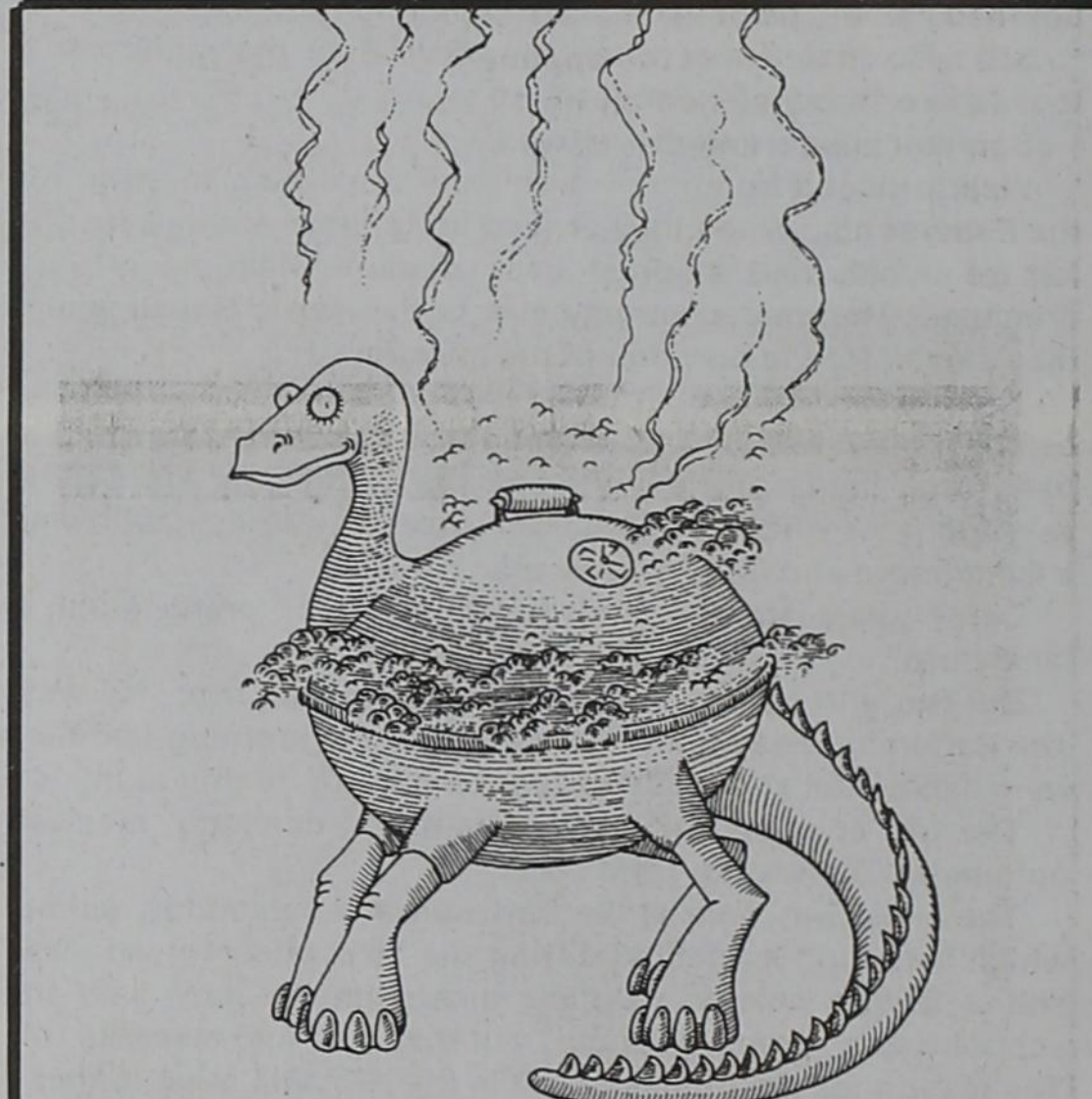

Wolverines, Steers scrimmage

The Farwell Steers and Texico Wolverines held their annual first scrimmage on Saturday, and both teams battled equally.

The Wolverines open regular season play by hosting Clayton today (Friday) at 7 p.m. mt. New Head Coach Mike Prokop issued a special plea to Texico school district folks: "Our kids have worked really hard the past weeks to prepare for the season. Please come out and show your support."

While New Mexico teams only have one scrimmage, Texas teams are allowed two. So the Steers will scrimmage against Wheeler at Claude at 5 p.m. on Aug. 24.

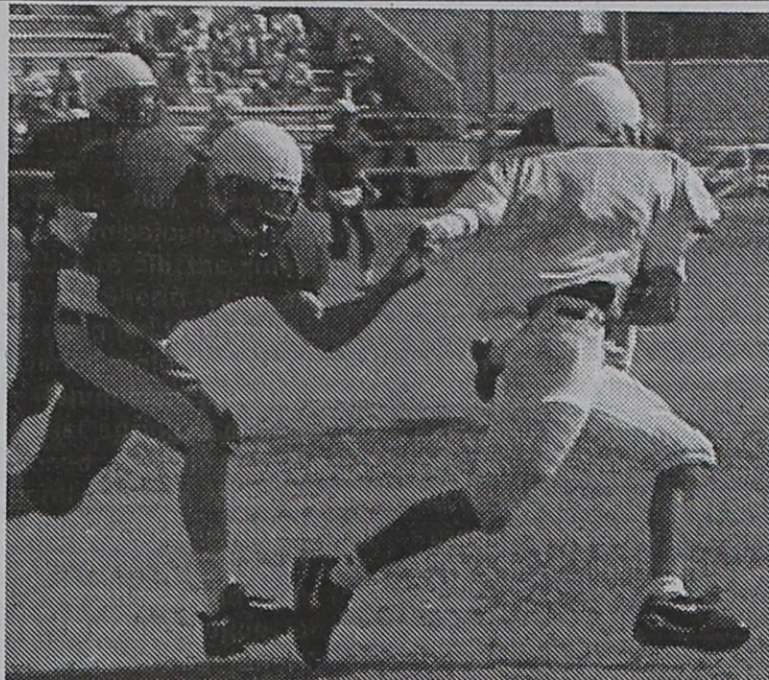

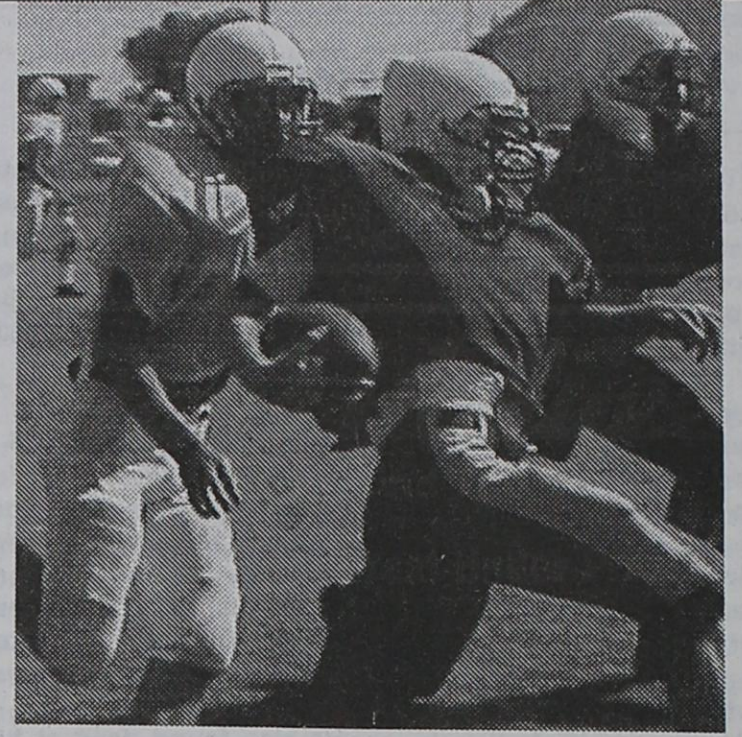
After this portion of the scrimmage ended, the teams then each took 10 snaps at the opponent's 10 yard line.

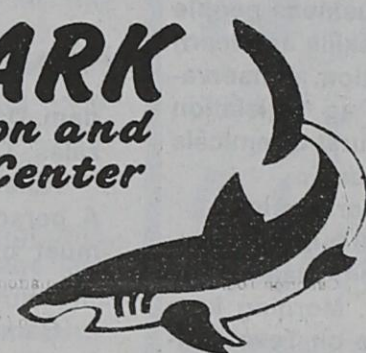

West Texas agriculture producers and agribusiness people can update their chemical use and application skills and learn more about state and federal regulation, irrigation, conservation tillage and the future of agriculture and ag legislation Aug. 30 at the 48th annual West Texas Agricultural Chemicals Conference in the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center.

Registration begins at 7 a.m. and costs \$70 per person. The morning conference session runs from 8 a.m. to noon, and will include presentations on conservation tillage, laws and regulations, and the future of agriculture. Morning keynote speakers are: Rep. Larry Combest, Update on Texas Agriculture; and William Lapp, ConAgra, Inc., Mega-Trends in Food and Agriculture: Changes and Challenges in Coming Years. More than 500 producers, chemical dealers and agribusiness people are expected to attend.

Participants can earn up to 5 1/4 continuing education units (CEUs). The conference is sponsored by the West Texas Agricultural Chemicals Institute.

The afternoon general session begins at 1:15 p.m. and will have presentations on the federal Food Quality Protection Act and irrigation scheduling.

Concurrent educational sessions on weed control and herbicides; peanut, corn and cotton insect control and peanut and cotton diseases will be presented by Extension specialists, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station scientists and Texas Tech University and industry representatives following the afternoon general session.

The weed control session will focus on control programs, new herbicides, weed identification and symptoms of herbicide damage. Topics in the insect session are peanut insect control, managing cotton insects, and an overview of corn insects. The plant disease session will key on peanut diseases, cotton seeding diseases and a cotton disease workshop.

Concurrent afternoon sessions will begin at 3:15 p.m. and wrap up around 4:55 p.m. Closing remarks, CEU-CCA certificates and session evaluations will be the order of business after the concurrent educational afternoon sessions conclude.

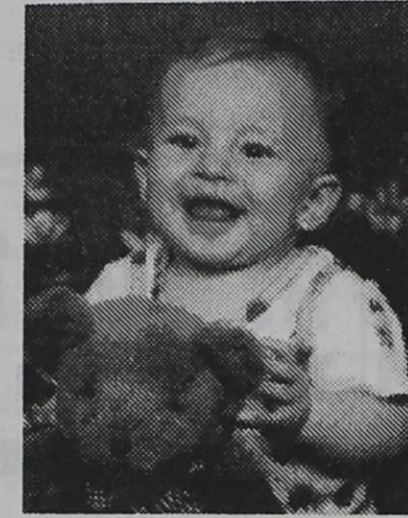
And you'd think the bugs to be a problem... but they weren't.

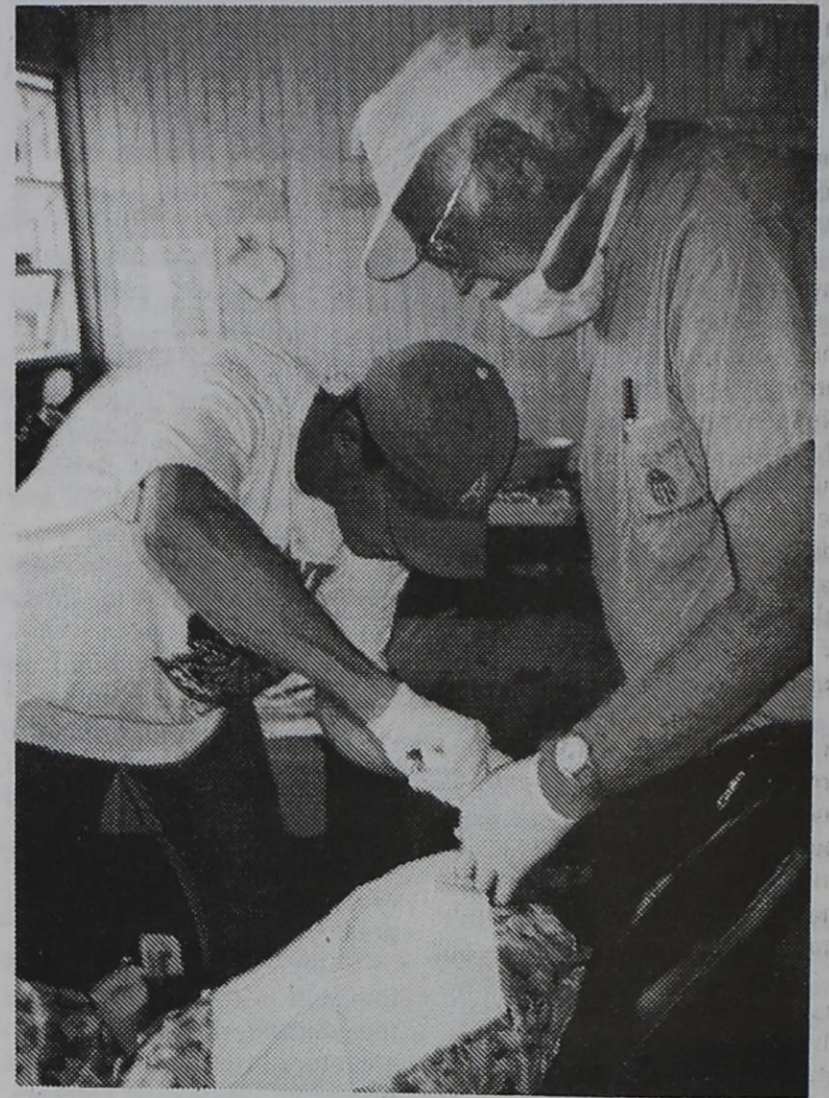

The New Mexico Environment Department (NMED) has scheduled a public hearing to consider the approval of the New Mexico Water Quality Act ground water discharge plan DP-1290 as submitted by Mr. Wayne Martin, Owner of Martin Grain Dairy. The public hearing will be held on Tuesday, October 3, 2000, beginning at 6:00 p.m. at the Texico Community Center located at 215 Griffin, Texico, New Mexico.

DP-1290, Martin Grain Dairy, permit application proposes the discharge of 40,000 gallons per day of dairy parlor wash water. The wastewater will be discharged to a clay-lined retention lagoon and then land applied to 150 acres of irrigated cropland using center pivot irrigation. The wastewater proposed to be discharged will contain elevated concentrations of ammonia, organic nitrogen, chloride, and total dissolved solids. The facility is located approximately 1.4 miles west of Texico in Sections 20 and 21, T2N, R37E, Curry County. Ground water below the site is at a depth of 375 feet and has a total dissolved solids concentration of approximately 290 milligrams per liter.

All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity at the public hearing to submit relevant evidence, data, views or arguments orally or in writing, and to examine persons who testify at the hearing. Any person who wishes to present technical evidence at the hearing shall, no later than ten (10) calendar days prior to the hearing, file a Statement of Intent to Present Evidence with the Hearing Clerk, Tammy Gonzales, NMED, Harold Runnels Building, 4th Floor, Room N-4071, P.O. Box 26110, Santa Fe, NM, 87502. Persons filing a Statement of Intent shall also serve a copy on the Department and the applicant. The Statement of Intent shall include: the name of the person filing the statement; whether the person supports or opposes the proposed discharge plan application; the name of each witness; an estimate of the length of the direct testimony of each witness; a list of exhibits, if any, to be offered into evidence at the hearing; and a summary or outline of the anticipated direct testimony of each witness. Any person may present a general non-technical statement in support or in opposition to the proposed discharge plan approval at any time before or at the hearing.

The hearing will be conducted pursuant to the Water Quality Control Commission public hearing regulations 20 NMAC 6.2.3110 and Permit Procedures Environment Department 20 NMAC 1.4. A copy of these rules may be obtained by contacting the Ground Water Quality Bureau at (505) 827-2900. The Secretary of NMED will approve, conditionally approve, or disapprove the discharge plan based on the administrative record for the discharge plan application, including the applicable information provided during the public hearing.

NMED will make an audio recording of the hearing. Unless otherwise requested, a written transcript of the hearing will not be made. If a transcript is requested, the requester will bear the full cost of preparation.

Teresa learns about baseball

Mike recently asked me to pen a few words about the sport of Baseball...especially Little League Baseball. He thought it might be interesting reading on what I had learned about this aspect of "America's Favorite Sport."

First of all, baseball is undoubtedly a sport that is addictive for the players, the coaches and the spectators.

There is something about the smell of the leather of a finely seasoned ball glove that brings the scents of summer into their full aroma. This aroma can be especially shocking if you happen to be the mother that unzips the ball and bat bag to discover the wadded up pair of baseball socks that were taken off after the last game of the last season and left to petrify.

The Little League division of baseball is something to be proud of for everyone involved in the league. It is a teaching and learning league that emphasizes the skills of the game, the strategy and most of all: sportsmanship.

The sportsmanship lessons begin in the T-Ball division of Little League where there may be 22 kids on a team, but they all get to play. They all get to bat and no score is ever kept.

I realize that some parents inevitably keep score and will tell their child that their team really won the game. This one-upmanship was completely dismantled by a charming five-year old last season when he told his father, "No Dad, we all won."

The Minor League is where the skills lessons come into play. Some leagues have the kids hit against a pitching machine then a pitcher. Others have a rotation of pitchers for each team that the batters must face. Others even have the coaches pitch to them. Whatever the circumstances each league chooses, the batters learn how to hit off of just about anything. It's pretty cool when you see a seven-year old Little League veteran lean into a pitch from the older, wiser nine year old pitcher that can already throw a mean curve ball.

Perhaps my favorite parts of watching and coaching a Little League game are the moments during warm-up and immediately following the end of each game.

During warm-ups, our sons and daughters take the field with all the courage they can muster and show their stuff. They kick the dirt to get just the right footing. They scan their area and know all the weeds, wildflowers and rock formations. This is important in cases of extreme boredom when no plays come their way for long periods of time and for those moments when their attention just cannot be held any longer. They've just got to look at the stuff on the ground. I've also seen many a good handstand perfected by some good outfielders and even a few shortstops.

Then the game is ready to begin and these children

become fierce professionals. Shouting "hey batter-batter" and slapping their gloves, they dare the batter to hit them one.

I also love the end of the game when the teams line up to slap hands and tell each other "good game." My son's team made a point to take a knee and say a prayer of thanks to the Lord for the game and the players. It was great when the other team would kneel down with them too.

Then came the after game analysis by each of the players. You have to learn the lingo to understand and must realize that no one ever gets to finish a sentence:

"Oh man! Wasn't that a cool..."

"Yea, KO'd and spinning to the..."

"And then ZOOM, plowing in and slapped off..."

"Hit the deck and almost spiked..."

After taking home about three extra kids and hearing the blow by blow details of the game we'd just watched, I sometimes wondered if I had seen the same 12 to 10 ballgame.

The Major league and Pony league in Little League are the ultimate destinations for the players. This is where all the skills, tactics and love of the game are sealed for life. The uniforms are the greatest and most fields even have a scoreboard. More sunflower seeds are consumed by this age group of players than in any other divisions. This is probably true of the spectators as well, because the play in these divisions is usually nail-biting close and action packed. This is real baseball with all the rules, moves and magic.

The coaches that volunteer their time are to be commended for their efforts and patience. These are the people that truly love baseball as much as the players...if not a little more. Most of them played ball as a kid and want only to bring that life changing and challenging experience to the kids on their teams.

It is also true that many of the coaches never played ball a time in their life, but want to help out the kids and stepped forward to volunteer.

The willing, sturdy souls that step forward to umpire the games are to be commended as well.

These men and women endure fast balls, wild pitches, line drive slammers, running kids and sadly, but often, heckling parents and spectators. They have to have very thick skins.

I know one man that, while umpiring a game several years ago was being verbally attacked by a mother that thought he was deaf, dumb and blind to every pitch and call.

He stopped the game, approached the backstop and pointed to her and said, "If you think you can do a better job, here is your chance."

He then had her pulled from the stands and brought the umpire protective gear to her and said "Good Luck."

He sat in the stands and watched as she proceeded to call the rest of the game. She was heckled and challenged by every pitch and call.

She came to him after the game was over and said that she never knew how hard it was to umpire and to watch the entire game and to concentrate on each pitch with all the noise behind and around the plate. She's never hollered at another umpire since.

Most baseball seasons are over and football and fall soccer are just around the corner. But baseball fever is just subsided for a few months. Die hard players keep their gloves oiled, bats hanging and their lucky caps within reach at all times. Die hard fans and Little League parents are also at the ready for the next season with well oiled lawn chairs or stadium seats, blankets (yes, even in June!) and several economy size bags of sunflower seeds packed next to the economy size bag of bubble gum.

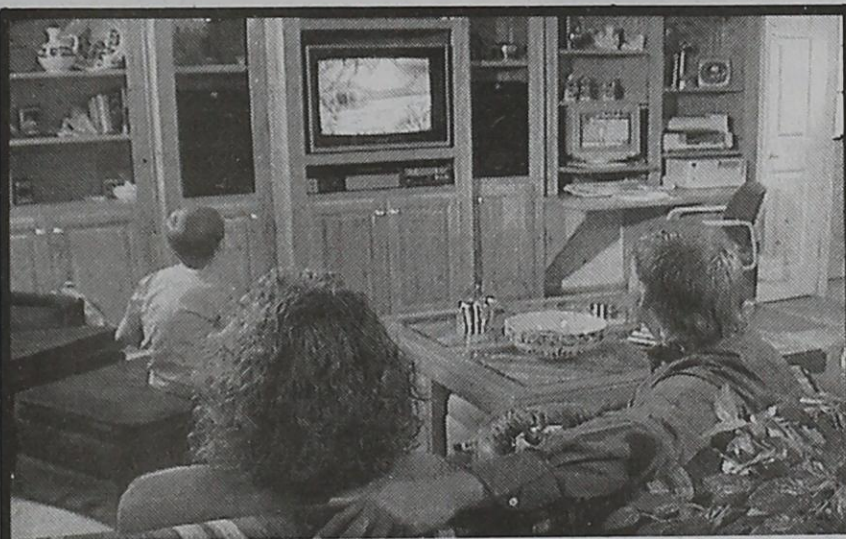

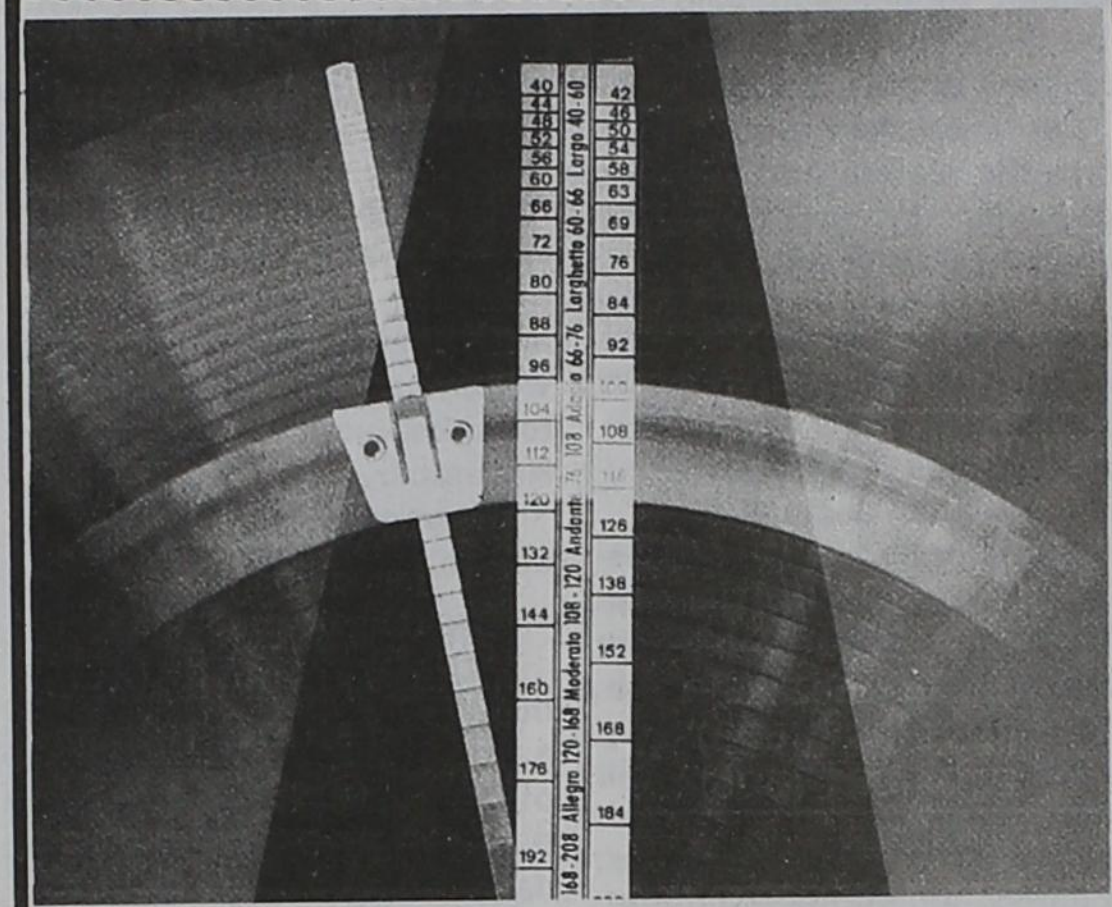



Texico council considers hiring a city fire department chief

Councilman Jeff Queener suggested at Tuesday's Texico city council meeting that the position of fire chief become a paid one.

Currently, Lewis Cooper is chief of the volunteer fire department. The council is considering hiring a fire chief -- and wants the community's views before taking action.

Councilman Doug Scioli gave the pro's and con's:

The pro's:

-- It could reduce homeowners' insurance rates from \$100 to \$200 a year. The exact amount would be up to the insurance company the homeowner has. But having a paid fire chief would lower the class ratings.

-- The amount of paperwork needed, the keeping up with state regulations, requires a lot more work.

The con's:
-- Scioli estimated that a paid chief would roughly be paid about \$15,000 a year.

He said the city probably

would pay about half this total, while the other half would come from ambulance revenues.

Mayor Marie Christian urged residents to give their views on this to the city's elected officials before action is taken.

In other business, the council:

-- Bought a new lawn mower for the cemetery.

-- Said new bids will need to be taken for the KKR Park sprinkler system since the original plans have been revised.

-- Approved an aesthetic review permit for Debbie Latiser who is replacing her mobile home at 305 Ave. D with a new one that is 14 feet longer.

-- Heard councilman Oran Jay Autrey say that new air conditioning filters are needed at the community center.

-- Heard Autrey report on trees being trimmed along College, Stret. One homeowner had his fence nailed to a tree, and a portion of that fence is now down, it was said.

A question arose over whether that fence portion and the tree is on city right of way, and the council believes it is.

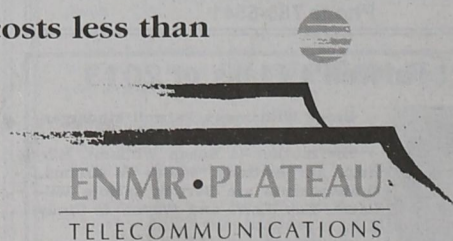
