## BILLY SUNDAY HITS NEW YORK SUNDAY

NEW YORK, Jan. 13.—The Billy Sunday Cocktail is being mixed here today and will be served at a thousand different places in New York tomorrow.

This cocktail is made of seasoned Sunday trail hitters. There'll be a thousand of them from Philadelphia, and others from elsewhere. Most of the Philadelphians will be of 7 year vintage and bottled in unbroken religious bonds.

The idea is to serve this cocktail to New York tomorrow and several others of the same kind later, to when the public's appetite for the big religious feast when Billy cuts loose here April 1. The Billy Sunday cocktail is made like this:

Take one made-over, old-line churchman, mix him thoroughly with two plain trail hitters, (lawyers, burglars and ex-saloonkeepers preferred); add one bible class expert, bring them to a boil and serve red hot to the sinners.

The "invasion" will take the form of community and church meetings. It will be under the direction of the Rev. George G. Dowie, leader of the Philadelphia bible classes. In his words:

"The idea is to give New Yorkers an idea of the tremendousness of this proposition. They needn't be afraid of who's coming. Whether you are a \$25,000 a year man or a \$500 man, we'll suit your needs."

One of the big attractions will be Al Saunders of Scranton, Pa., a trail hitter as fiery of hair, mustache and manner as the booze he used to consume. It is said that John D. Rockefeller, Jr., wept the first time he heard Saunders tell his story.

This is the first step the Sunday campaigners will take in their plans to develop atmosphere for the evangelist's coming.

## PROMINENT WINTERS PHYSICIAN DEAD

Dr. J. L. Allred is no more. This good man passed away at his home in Winters Saturday morning at nine o'clock after remaining at the point of death for about ten days.

Dr. Allred died from the effects of blood poison caused from a burn he sustained some time ago. He was dressing himself near a hot stove and accidentally stuck his arm against a hot stovepipe, and blood poison resulted from the burn.

Deceased has long been a leader in business life of Winters. He was president of the Winters State Bank, and had been instrumental in the development of the north-end of the county. He is well known among the medical profession of this section of the state as well as having a wide acquaintance among all classes of people. His death, although expected, caused regret and sorrow throughout the entire county, and Winters will suffer the loss of one of her best citizens and a man who has done much for suffering men, women and children.

Arrangements had not been perfected for the funeral up to noon Saturday, but it was announced in Ballinger that the funeral would be held some time Sunday afternoon and interment made in the Winters cemetery.

## BABIES WANTED FOR BALLINGER HOME

"We want two little children, a boy and a girl, for a Ballinger home," said Dr. W. A. Nichols, of the Texas Children's Home Society, who was here this week in the interest of his work. The society is doing a good work in Texas, and during the year just closed 182 orphan children were given good homes through the efforts of Dr. Nichols and Mrs. I. Z. T. Morris, superintendent of the home.

"It is our work to bring the homeless child and the childless home together," said Dr. Morris in telling of the great work of taking care of orphan children.

Dr. Nichols stated that he had an application from a good home in Ballinger—a christian home, where the foster parents are able and anxious to get a little boy and girl to raise. He has listed the application and will try to supply the happiness that comes from the children for this home. Dr. Nichols stated that there were many good homes throughout the country that wanted children, and it was his work to bring the home and child together. "We find the children, take them and keep them awhile in the home at Fort Worth, and find out what we can about them and place them where we think they will receive the best treatment and proper care," said the man in this good work, "and it is very seldom that we have to go back and take up a child."

Those having children they wish to give away because they are not able to raise and educate them, or for any other reason, and those wishing to adopt children or those wishing to contribute cash to help carry on this good work, should communicate with Dr. Nichols at Abilene, or Mrs. I. Z. T. Morris, at Fort Worth.

The home of Mrs. J. H. Kipp was damaged to the extent of about one hundred dollars Saturday morning when the roof of the building caught fire supposedly from a spark falling from the flue. The fire originated some distance from the flue but it is thought that the wind whipped the spark under the shingles and started the blaze which was gaining good headway when the fire company arrived on the scene.

The property was covered by insurance, The Ballinger Insurance Agency carrying a policy on the house.

GEORGETOWN, Jan. 13.—Harry McBride, a cousin, and Jesse McLaren, the dead man's son, were indicted today by the grand jury for murder of Frank McLaren, a wealthy farmer near Taylor, Tex., on the night of Nov. 27th. McLaren's divorced wife Carrie, and Jim Pollard, a negro farm hand, were exonerated of any complicity in the crime.

McLaren was found dead under his auto which had plunged off a bridge and burned. Later developments caused the arrest of the man's wife from whom he had been divorced, and also the arrest of McLaren's son and McBride and the negro.

## WILL FILL DEMOCRAT VACANCIES TUESDAY

(Brownwood Bulletin)

John A. Weeks of Ballinger, is disqualified to serve as committee man from the Twenty-sixth Senatorial district, it was learned in Brownwood today. Mr. Weeks at present is a member of the state board of pharmacy, and for that reason can not act in the capacity of representative from this district on the state Democratic executive committee.

A number of friends of the Ballinger man were active towards securing his appointment to the place recently vacated by Judge E. B. Hendricks, who was appointed by Governor Ferguson as assistant attorney general in charge of criminal affairs. The news that Mr. Weeks is disqualified on account of the position he now holds is disappointing to those who had been working in his behalf. It had been believed that he could fill both places.

Mr. Weeks, it is understood, will not resign from the board of pharmacy to accept the appointment of the state committee. In fact, he hesitated about allowing his name to go before the committee, declaring that there are other men more able to fill the place as committeeman from this district.

Now that the Ballinger drug-gist is out of the running, it is believed a Brownwood man will be named to fill Judge Hendricks' former place on the committee.

The state executive committee meets in Austin Tuesday to name the committeeman from this district and a successor to Colonel Paul Waples, deceased.

## ON THE PRICE OF BLANK NEWS PAPER

Another advance in the cost of paper used by newspapers has just been announced. The total increase over last year's price amounts to 75 per cent and more. Already some of the weaker news papers have been forced suspend and a general reorganization of the publication business is going on. It is the greatest crisis the newspapers of the country have

ever faced.

Incidentally, the additional cost of paper alone to The Star—to say nothing of the higher cost of other materials—amounts to about \$55,000 a month, as compared with last year.—Kansas City Star.

The Ledger's blank paper supply is not costing quite \$55,000 more per month than it cost at this time last year, but it is costing more than twice what we were paying for it last January, and a shipment billed to us this week cost more than we have ever paid before. 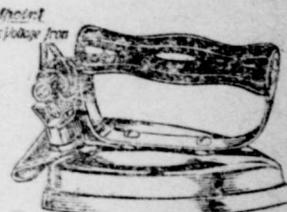

### SPANELL'S FATHER

#### VISITS HIM IN JAIL

According to the San Angelo Standard it was a touching scene that took place there in the county jail yesterday afternoon, when the aged father of Harry J. Spannell visited his son, and when the two men met for the first time in many months, under such extremely unusual and trying circumstances, both wept like children.

The father thrust his arms around the son's neck, the son put his arms around the neck of his father, and for several minutes they held each other in a fond embrace that is born only of love. In this position they stood like two statues of marble for several minutes before either of them could speak. Then came the words from the trembling voice of the aged father, "My son, my son."

Harry J. Spannell, already moved to tears, with his stronger voice—a voice that has in the past won him the plaudits of the multitudes—called out "Father, my dear father," but his voice was modulated and did not have the rymth and melody of yore, and could not give the enunciation like it used to.

For the first time in four years Joseph Spannell of Hazelton, Pa., saw his son Harry J. Spannell, Wednesday afternoon. The meeting was in a cell in the Tom Green county jail here where the son is waiting trial in connection with the killing of Major M. C. Butler, United States army officer, in Alpine, on July 20, 1916.

The elder man arrived on the Orient and was met at the station by Pat Conway. He secured a room at the Melton Hotel on East Harris street and spent much of the afternoon in talking with his son. Thursday morning he walked about the city although he never ventured far from the court lawn, where he conversed frequently with Conway, custodian of the grounds.

Joseph Spannell is 71 years of age although his figure is not bent with age. He is but little more than 5 feet 5 inches in height, and walks with a spry step. For 21 years Spannell has been a harness maker in the employ of the Lehigh Coal Company at Hazelton. He stated this morning that he employer told him to come back whenever he was

ready and that his position would be open to him.

Harry Spannell's mother is dead and he has no brothers and sisters at Hazelton. The last time father and son met was in Waco in 1912, when Harry Spannell was instructor in music in Baylor university.

Mrs. M. C. Butler, wife of the officer who was shot to death in Alpine, is due to arrive in San Friday, accompanied by her brother, R. B. C. Howell. Reservations have been made for the visitors at the Lanham hotel.

Rooms have also been secured for Col. Jules E. Muchert and Maj. C. O. Elliott, both of the Fourth Texas Infantry, stationed at Marfa, Texas. The officers expect to arrive Sunday afternoon.

Judge Walter Gillis of Del Rio, and W. Van Sickle of Alpine, who have been employed to assist W. A. Wright of this city in the prosecution of Spannell, will reach San Angelo either Friday evening on the Orient, or on Saturday. Witnesses in the case will probably begin arriving Sunday, as the case is set for Monday morning at 10 o'clock.

Lud Williams of Waco, of counsel for Spannell, is already here, spending the week-end on the ranch of his brother, Lee Williams, near Christoval. Judge L. A. Dale of El Paso, leading counsel for the defense, is due to arrive Friday. Anderson and Upton are the local attorneys for the defense.

Interest in the coming trial has begun to be evidenced on the streets and it is expected that the district court room will be overflowed with spectators throughout the coming week.

### A Once Legal Fiction.

In the legal calendar the 24th of October is worthy of notice, as on that day, in 1852, two individuals, though personally known to no one and enjoying an extensive reputation among lawyers, ceased to exist in England. These persons were John Doe and Richard Roe, and no two persons were more frequently referred to in legal documents, in every process of ejectment, instead of the real parties to the suit being named, John Doe, plaintiff, sued Richard Roe, defendant. Their names were also inserted in criminal proceedings. This fiction was introduced into English legal practice in the time of Edward III, in consequence, it was said, of a provision in Magna Charta which required the production of witnesses before every criminal trial, and henceforth John Doe and Richard Roe were inserted as the names of the alleged witness, a custom which was carried across the Atlantic to this country. Indianapolis News.

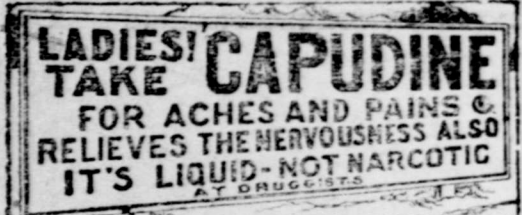
