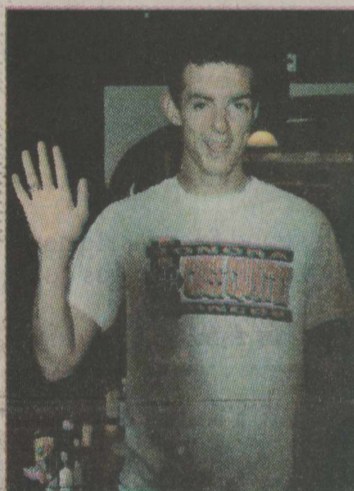

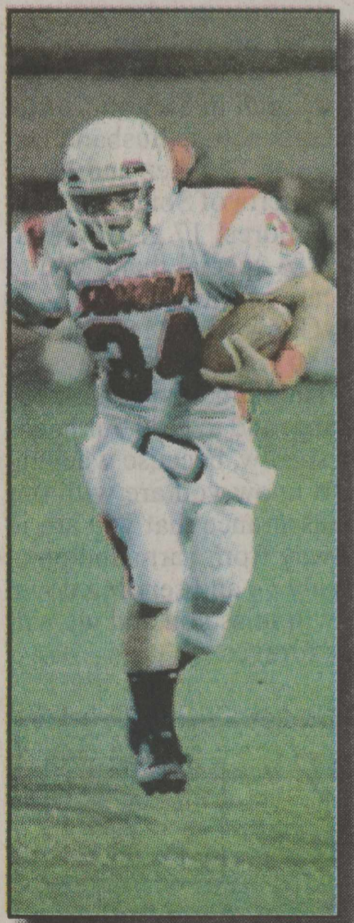

Hudspeth Memorial Hospital Receives Award of Excellence

Lillian M. Hudspeth Memorial Hospital was awarded the 2009 Rural Hospital Information Technology (IT) Award of Excellence from the Texas Organization of Rural and Community Hospitals Foundation. The award was presented at the Health Information Technology Conference held in

Austin on October 20th. The award is the first for the Foundation.

The award is presented to a hospital who demonstrates continual dedication to health information technology integration and advancement through successful health record system adoption. The

Sutton County Hospital District has attained Stage 6 of 7 stages of the Electronic Health Record Adoption Model. The Adoption model defines the level of adoption of electronic health records and is a benchmark established for all US hospitals. Only 1% of the hospitals in the nation have reached Stage 6. "This distinction is indeed a commendable accomplishment", said Quang Ngo President/CEO of the TORCH Foundation.

"I am pleased with this award and thank the entire hospital staff and physicians for their dedication to achieving this goal", said Keith Butler, CEO. The district began the conversation in September 2006 with completion in mid year 2007. The entire hospital is integrated into the electronic health records system. The hospital is prepared for Stage 7 however the tertiary hospitals have not fully implemented a system.

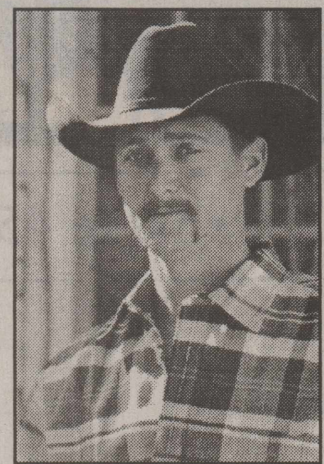

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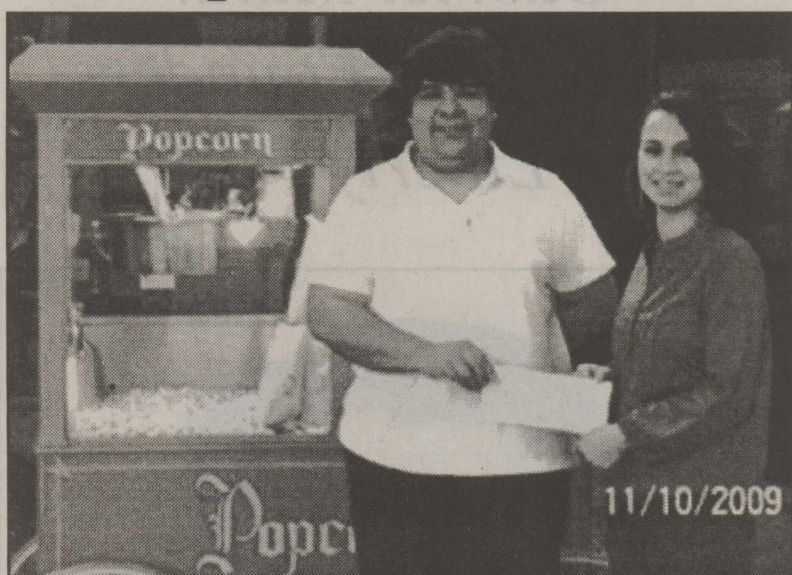

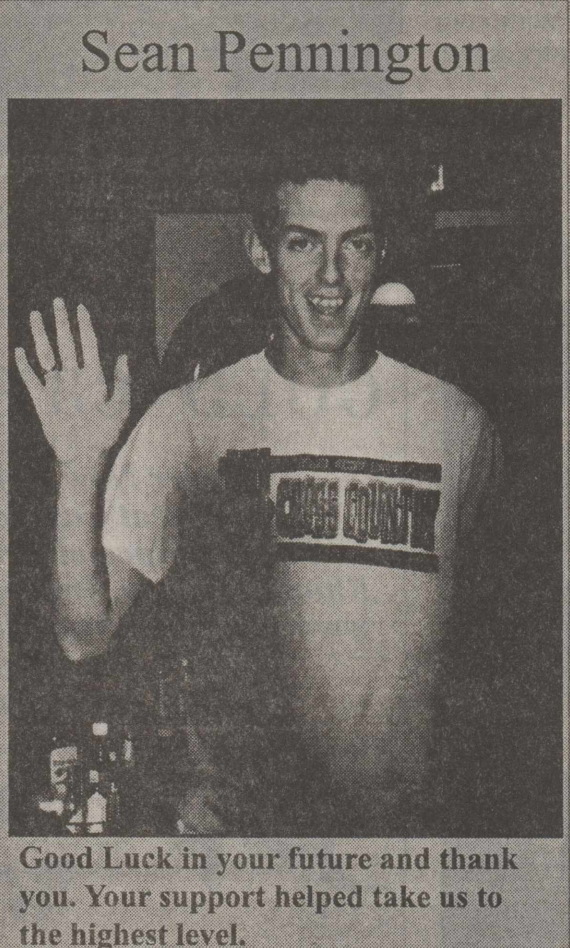
Cross Country – Not just a sport

Cross Country running enthusiasts are fierce competitors because their passion is a grueling test of individualism as well as a testament to their team spirit. 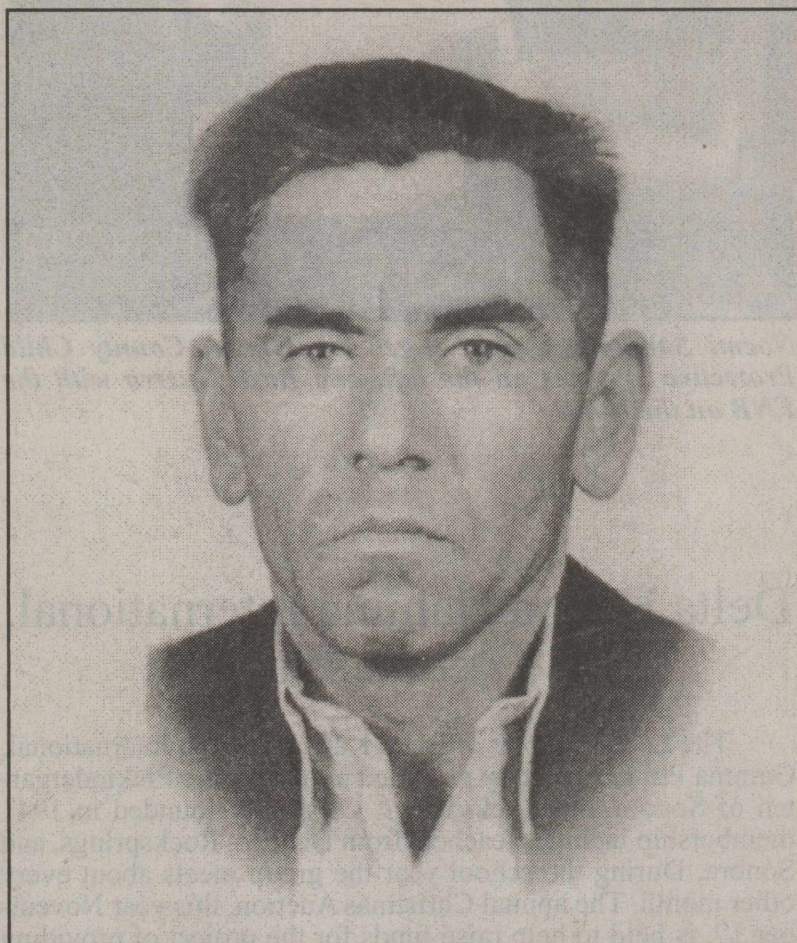

Gabriel H. Mata, Sr. was one of the founders of Liberty Park, "La Placita". The property was donated by the city of Sonora to the Hispanic community.

Liberty Park was built around 1945. A committee was formed, and Gabriel H. Mata, Sr. was elected president, Tomas Zapata was elected treasurer and Pablo Favela was elected secretary. Many long hours and hard work were put into the construction of the park.

Benefit From Properly Prepared Poultry

It's reaching that time of year again, the cooking season! Family get togethers, holidays, and celebrations are just around the corner. As these special events approach, and you begin planning your events, be sure to keep food safety in mind. A popular food choice for this time of year is poultry and poultry products. "Poultry is a nutritious economical choice and very versatile in the ways you can cook with it."

According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention, it is estimated that 1 in 4 Americans will get a foodborne illness each year. You can protect your family by following certain food safety measures when handling or preparing poultry and poultry products.

It is not always easy to tell when a food product is safe to eat. Most bacteria cannot be seen, smelled or tasted. To ensure your poultry is safe to eat, consumers should be careful when handling raw products at all times. Follow these safety tips when preparing your poultry.

Grocery Shopping: "Food safety begins at the store." Do not buy products that have been bruised or damaged in any way. If purchasing frozen

food, make sure you have enough storage space in your freezer and the product is frozen solid. Refrigerated food should be cold to the touch. Keep raw foods separate from ready to eat foods in the cart as well as in bags.

In the Kitchen: One of the most effective ways to prevent bacteria from spreading is by practicing good personal hygiene. Be sure to wash your hands before preparing food and after using the bathroom, changing diapers, or handling any raw foods. Keep your kitchen clean. Be sure to wash cutting boards, utensils and counter tops with hot soapy water. "A common sanitizing solution you can use is 1 teaspoon bleach to one quart of water."

Cooking and Serving: Whole poultry and poultry parts should be cooked to a minimum internal temperature of 165 degrees F. Place the thermometer in the thickest part of the meat away from bone. Be sure to check the temperature of the meat before serving it to make sure it reached its proper temperature of 165 degrees F. The only way to ensure your food is properly cooked is to use a calibrated food thermometer.

When serving food, be sure to use only clean utensils and dishes. Heat only what you will be serving and refrigerate everything else. Do not let food sit out more than 2 hours.

Leftovers: Divide all cooked foods into shallow containers and refrigerate or freeze within two hours of cooking. Throw away any food left out at room temperature for more than two hours. Use leftovers with in 3-4 days then discard or freeze. When using frozen leftovers; use within 2 to 6 months for best quality. Re-heat all leftovers to a minimum internal temperature of 165° F before eating.

Conaway Calls President Obama's Decision to Prosecute 9/11 Mastermind in Courts "Unconscionable"

WASHINGTON, DC – U.S. Rep. K. Michael Conaway, a member of both the House Armed Services Committee and the Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence, today made the following comments regarding the Obama Administration's decision to prosecute Khalid Sheikh Mohammed, mastermind of the September 11th attacks, and five other Guantanamo detainees in a federal court in New York City located just blocks away from the location where the World Trade Center towers that were destroyed.

"The Obama Administration's decision to prosecute these terrorists on American soil in the U.S. court system sends the message that the President sees the atrocities of 9/11 as a crime and not an act of war. Make no mistake—the perpetrators of the deadly attacks, which took the lives of over 3,000 Americans, are, in fact, not common criminals but rather terrorists who violated the laws of war. As a result, they should be tried through the military commissions process, which was specifically designed to deal with such horrendous acts.

"Placing political considerations and the interests of liberal advocacy groups ahead of the safety and security of the American public is unconscionable. I urge President Obama to resist complacency and to cease continued courses of action that attempt to create a pre-9/11 mentality. I urge Speaker Pelosi and other Democratic Leaders to work with House Republicans to pass legislation that would halt such actions."

Congressman Conaway is a cosponsor of H.R. 2294, the Keep Terrorists Out of America Act. The legislation, if enacted, would stop the transfer or release of terrorists held at Guantanamo Bay prison into the United States. Further, the legislation clearly states that governors and state legislators must pre-approve the transfer or release of any terrorist detainee into their respected states.

DPS Warns Parents: Mexican Cartels and Gangs Recruiting in Texas Schools

The Texas Department of Public Safety is warning parents across the state to be aware of efforts by Mexican cartels and transnational gangs to recruit Texas youth in our schools and communities. These violent organizations are luring teens with the prospect of cars, money and notoriety, promising them if they get caught, they will receive a minimal sentence.

The Mexican cartels constantly seek new ways to smuggle drugs and humans into Texas, and are now using state based gangs and our youth to support their operations on both sides of the border.

For example, Laredo natives Gabriel Cardona and Rosalio Reta were recruited in their teens to be hit men for the Zetas. The Zetas, composed primarily of former Mexican military commandos, originally served as the enforcement arm of the Gulf Cartel, but have since become their own cartel. El Paso teens have been recruited to smuggle drugs across the border, many with the packs taped to their bodies.

While such recruitment is growing across Texas, juveniles along the Texas-Mexico border are particularly susceptible. In 2008, young people from the counties along the Texas-Mexico border accounted for just 9 percent of the population in Texas, but 18 percent of the felony drug charges and gang-related arrests.

"As these dangerous organizations seek to co-opt our children to support their criminal operations, it is more important than ever that parents be aware of these risks, talk to their children and pay attention to any signs that they may have become involved in illegal activities," said Steven C. McCraw, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

To protect our communities and our children from these powerful and ruthless criminal organizations, local, state and federal law enforcement agencies and the District Attorneys in Texas border counties are working together to detect, disrupt and deter Mexican cartel-related crime along the Texas-Mexico border.

It was a statistic that my eyes looked on a few years back. Had my gaze been a drill bit, a hole would have burned through the headline.

Subsequently, the stat has grown, its contemplation causing misty eyes. Thoughts scrambled, there is a yearning for "time out" to "sort out" significance in a wobbling world.

On Veterans Day eve, the mournful stat saddened again: On average, 1,800 US military veterans die each day. The figure, at the top of my mind's numbers, won't go away....

Most of them, understandably, are WWII veterans, from the era of George Beverly Shea. Maybe you heard the comment on his 100th birthday. America's beloved gospel singer said he's been "long on the ladder."

Veterans commonly request to have "Taps" played at their memorial services.

This seems ever so "doable," doesn't it? The tune's span is seconds--not minutes--requiring just 24 notes. Now, this shocker: There aren't enough bugler volunteers to provide live renditions. For more than 70% of the services last year at Dallas-Fort Worth National Cemetery, electronic recordings sufficed....

Thoughts closest to my soul suggest the need to extend national calls for buglers--and potential buglers. The piercing imperatives should be pleas to institutions, organizations and individuals. Surely, in a country known for its volunteerism, this can come to pass.

In the process, the lives of American servicemen and women will be honored in the most dignified manner possible.

There's already a national organization dedicated to the project: Bugles Across America (buglesacrossamerica.org). The cause is a cockle-warm-er....

Most passive among us will quickly sound negative warnings.

They will point to the difficulty of hitting every note, and that there are no "do-overs."

Prevailing, though, can be encouragers who believe that volunteers will emerge, benefiting both those who blow the horns and those who hear them....

It is more a matter of the heart than of the horn.

Like the lives being honored, horn-blowers must be committed to giving their best effort.

If there are sometimes mangled notes, let them but remind that we all fall short....

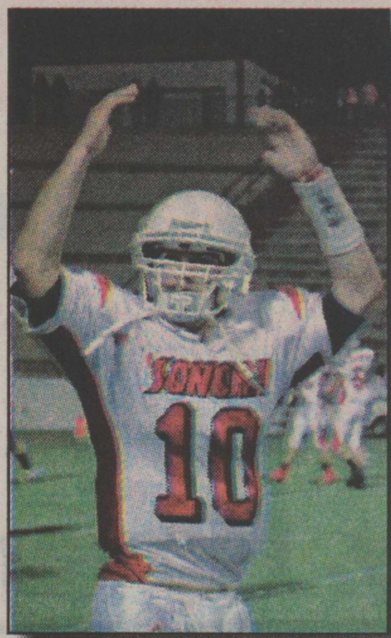
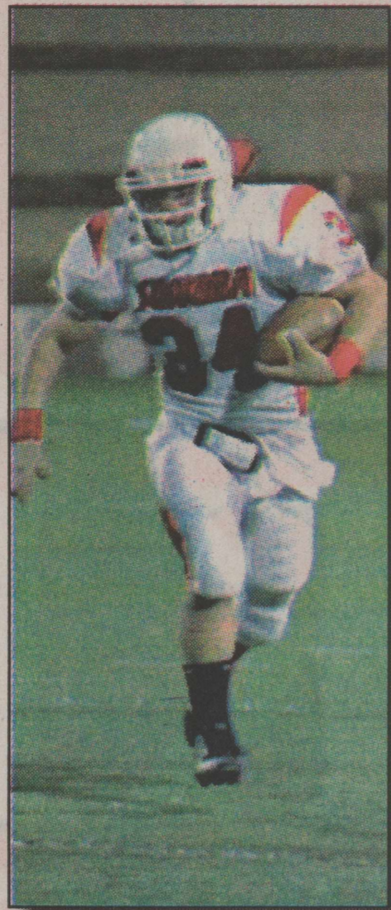

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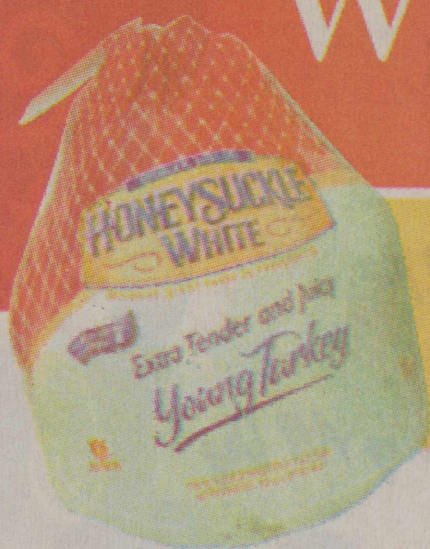


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
