Rivercrest Rebels Scalp HG Warriors

In their first opportunity to compete against someone besides themselves, the Rivercrest Rebels lopsidedly defeated Honey Grove, 4-0 in a scrimmage Friday night, August 29. The Rebels totally controlled the scrimmage enabling them to nearly double Honey Grove's total yard gained.

The Rebels, led by their quarterback, James Strickland, scored on their first possession on a 70 yard drive. On this drive the Rebs moved the ball consistently down field gaining 4 first downs, and Paul Fraleigh carried the ball across the goal line from the 5 to put the Rebs on top, 1-0.

Until the Rebel offense could score again, the defense held Honey Grove to only 2 yards rushing in three possessions, but did allow the Warrior's quarterback to complete 2 passes for 23 yards. Honey Grove, however, turned the ball over to the Rebs on downs and the Rebels wasted no time in scoring again. Beginning on the Honey Grove 37, they marched down to the line where Billy Fraleigh went in for the score. Neither team scored again before the half and the score stood 2-0 in favor of Rivercrest.

The second half proved to be a rematch of the first as Billy Fraleigh recovered a Warrior fumble to set the Rebs moving on their opponent's 45. Six plays later after an 18 yard run by Jerry Merchant, Paul Fraleigh scored again this time from the 14 to give the Rebels a 3-0

lead.

The Rebel defense took no time in getting the ball back. Allowing Honey Grove only four plays on their next possession. Rebel defensive guard, Jimmy Smith, sacked the Warrior quarterback on fourth down for a loss of ten yards. The Rebel offense took over on their own 35 galloped down field, Jerry Merchant, who rushed for a total of 136 yards led the attack as during the scrimmage, he rushed for 49 yards on two carries. One the next play Paul Fraleigh gained 5 yards, but Strickland was caught behind the line of scrimmage on the next two plays putting the Rebels back on the 14. With 4th down and 9 yards to go the offense did not give up as Strickland connected with tight end Brian Harville to give the Rebs a first down on the 4 yard line. Paul Fraleigh again scored from the four giving the Rebs a 4-0 lead.

This score remained the same, but Honey Grove did threaten to score. Beginning on their own 30, the Warriors got three consecutive first downs to put them on the Rebel 14. The Rebs' defense tightened up and held the Warriors for 5 yards on the next two plays. Then Bradley Moore, Rivercrest safety, intercepted a pass on the goal line to end Honey Grove's drive.

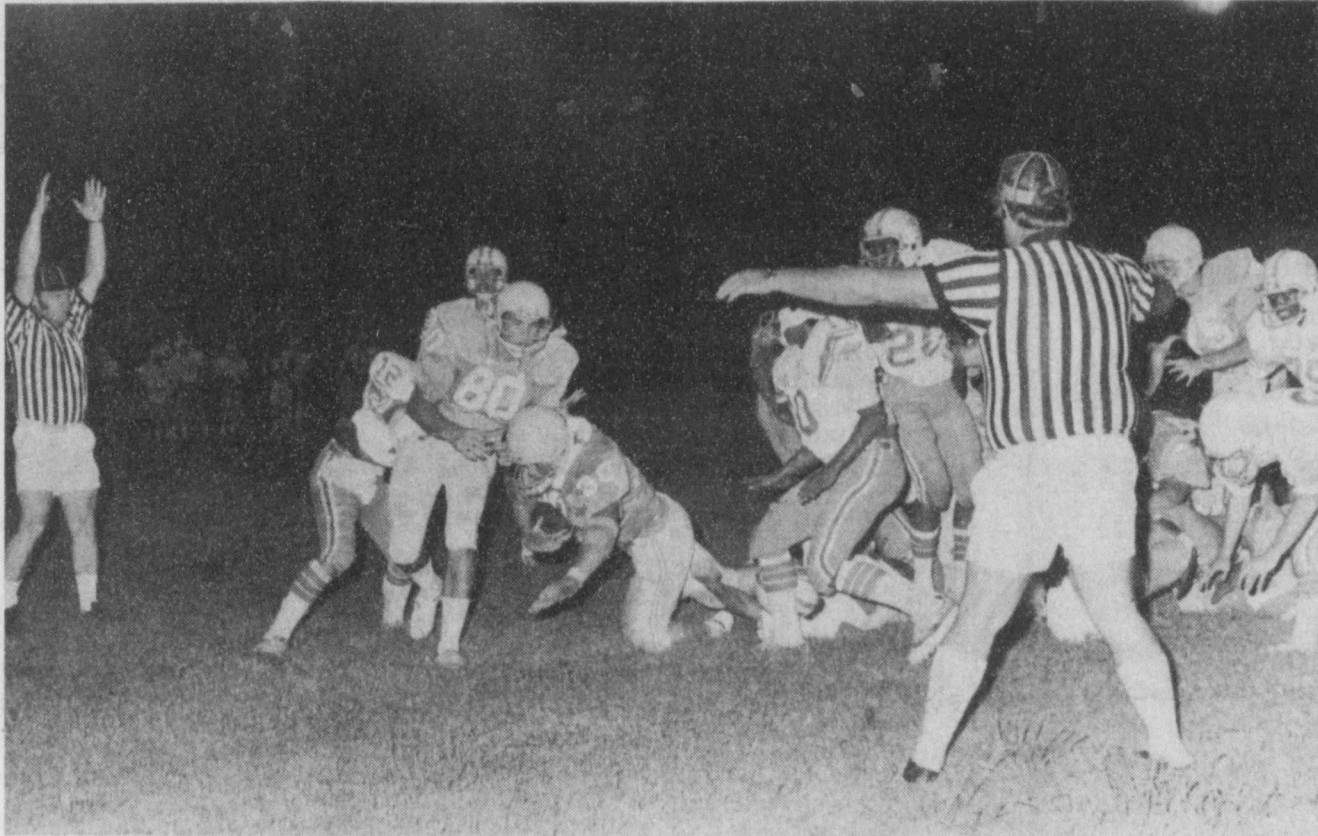
Rivercrest's Junior Varsity also scrimmaged Friday night and they took a 3-0 win over Honey Grove.

The Rebels have a short week in which to prepare for their first regular game. Coach Milfred Groves thinks

that with a little more work the Rebels can have an outstanding season. "How well we do next week depends on how the boys respond to the scrimmage and how hard this work next week. I am pleased with our efforts tonight, and I think our offense and defense have improved since last week," stated Groves.

The Rebels will put their skills to the test Friday night September 5 at 8:00 when they meet the Spring Hill Panthers at Rebel Stadium.

Debbie Nail, the only new teacher at Talco will be teaching Title I Reading. Debbie graduated from North Texas State

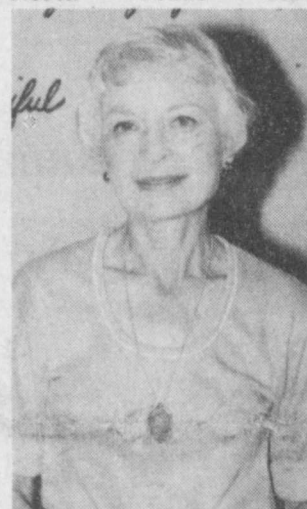
University in Denton with a B.S. Degree in Elementary and Kindergarten Education. She was recently married to Richard Nail and they reside in Cookeville.

Emergency Loans Available

Emergency Loans for farmers and ranchers are available through the local county office of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA). Frank B. Stroud, FmHA County Supervisor, said today. He asked that those who need farm credit, as a result of drought and extreme heat, make their needs known at the Farmers Home Administration office at 312 North Walnut Street, Clarksville Texas. Applications for assistance in the disaster stricken county will be accepted by FmHA until May 28, 1981, for physical and production losses.

FmHA loans covering actual Physical and production losses may be used to replace installations, equipment, or buildings, (including homes) lost through the disaster. Funds may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock, or to meet interest and depreciation payments on current real estate and chattel debts. Other loans, beyond actual losses, can be made for annual operating expenses or to make major adjustments on a farming or ranching operation. "Frank Stroud said

Loans covering actual losses are made at an interest rate of five percent and are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasible consistent with the applicants reasonable ability to pay. Loans beyond actual losses have various maturities, depending upon the purpose of the loan. The interest rate for short-term loans for farm operating purposes is thirteen and one-half percent. Longterm loans are being made at an in-

terest rate of twelve and one-half percent and thirteen and one-half percent.

To be eligible for an Emergency Loan, and applicant must have suffered losses from the disaster and be unable to get credit from other sources. Emergency Loans can be used to help the farmer restore damaged farm operations and additional loans based upon the emergency designation can be used to reorganize the farm for greater efficiency and better production.

VFW Has Feast

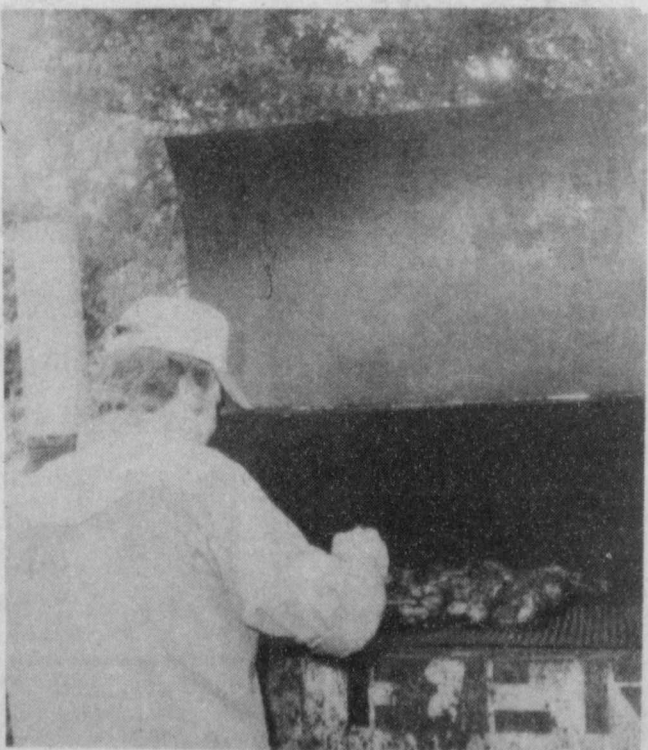

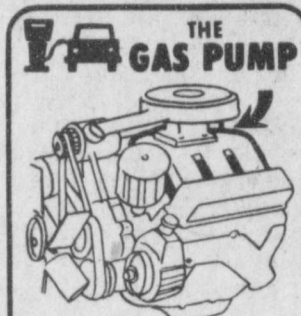

Colleges And Universities Sent Checks

AUSTIN, Tex.--State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$17.7 million to 17 Texas colleges and universities from what will probably be the last distribution of the state's 10 cent ad valorem tax.

The money comes from taxes collected under the state's 10 cent per \$100 levy on property taxes since September 1, 1979 and will go to the schools' building funds.

Under the state's new property tax code, ad valorem taxes are now assessed at .0001 percent of

appraised value.

The \$17 million distribution is part of more than \$47.3 million in ad valorem taxes collected and distributed to Texas schools this year, Bullock said.

Income from ad valorem taxes billed to taxpayers this fall will be at the new rate and income is expected to be significantly less, he said.

Schools receiving funds include:

Angelo State, \$778,577; East Texas State University, \$389,288; Sam Houston State University, \$1.6 million; Midwestern State University, \$270,732; Pan American University, \$1.7 million; Stephen F. Austin, \$1.6 million; Southwest Texas State University, \$2.4 million; and Lamar University, \$964,374.

Also, Sul Ross University, \$61,932; Texas A & I University, \$222,956; Texas Southern University, \$1.7 million; Texas Tech University, \$674,177; Texas Womens University,

\$364,515; UT at Arlington, \$2.2 million; University of Houston, \$1.2 million; West Texas State University, \$217,647; and North Texas State University, \$1 million.

The Clinic will be conducted at the Bogata City Hall, Bogata, Tx.

The next clinic will be held September 11, 1980.

Clinic hours will be from 2:00-4:00 p.m.. Future clinic dates will be announced.

The Health Department emphasizes that this clinic is available to all children, preschool and school age, beginning at two (2) months of age. Immunizations to be offered include Mumps, Measles, Rubella, oral polio, Diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis (DPT) and Tetanus-diphtheria (Td). All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunizations record if it is available.

The Tetanus-diphtheria (Td) vaccine is also available to adults.

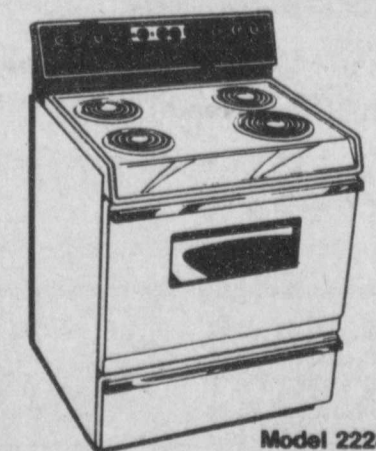

SHERBET RIBBON ANGEL

Powdered sugar

Bake and cool cake mix as directed on package. Freeze cake in pan. Remove frozen cake from pan; split to make 4 layers. (To split, mark side of cake with wooden picks; cut with long, serrated knife.) 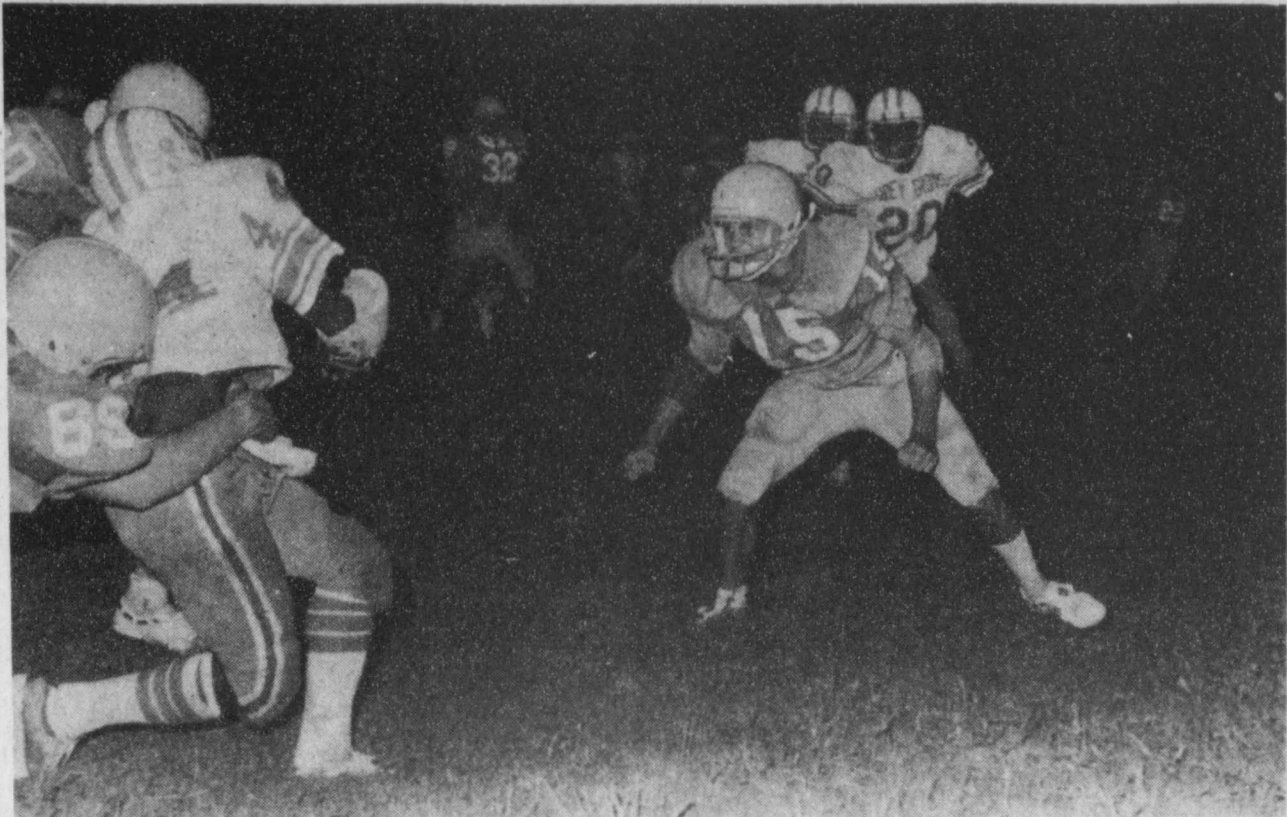

Winter Pastures Vital This Year

drouth, most producers must try to develop winter pastures to ease feed bills," contends Don Dorsett, a forage specialist with the Texas Agriculture Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Keys to successful winter pastures of wheat, oats, rye or ryegrass in September so that livestock will have grazing in both fall and winter.

"Early planting is essential if pastures are to provide grazing before Christmas," says Dorsett. "Winter pastures make their best growth during optimum temperatures and plenty of sunlight in the fall months. Once cold weather hits, winter pastures make only limited growth."

As far as fertility is concerned, the specialist recommend at least 70 to 80 pounds of actual nitrogen and 40 to 50 pounds of actual phosphorus per acre at planting and a topdressing of 50 pounds of actual nitrogen in late February. He points out that adequately fertilizing winter pastures can be money well spent.

"An acre of winter pasture can produce three tons of high protein, highly digestible forage under a good fertility program," Dorsett points out. "Since each ton of pasture equals a ton of 18-20 percent protein cubes, that's \$400 to \$500 in feed value."

"Disco Foot"

Slippery dance floors, bizarre footwear such as stiletto heels and platform shoes, and a simple lack of preparation were described as the three major causes of "disco foot." Disco dancers are advised to wear shoes which provide good support and balance, to exercise common sense on slick floors, and to perform warmup exercises before dancing for an extended period of time.

Garden

HIBISCUS — A FLOWERING SHRUB FOR INDOORS

Hibiscus, a large flowering shrub, originated in China and is a member of the Malvaceae family. Many plants are called "hibiscus", but only the rosa-sinensis can be grown successfully indoors. Grows up to six feet tall with huge flowers, in shades of red, either single or double flowers, measuring up to five inches in diameter. The stamens and stigma jut out from the flowers. The flowers bloom only one day, but on a well cared for, mature plant they bloom so abundantly that it will continually bear flowers.

Hibiscus require adequate room for the root system. Plant in a mixture of well fertilized loam, peat and sand. The soil should be kept moist and have good drainage. Too much water can cause the leaves to drop. They prefer a high humidity and a sunny location.

Any abrupt changes in the lo-



cation of the plant, neglecting the plant for several days or even new growth at the leaf node can cause leaves to loosen and turn yellow.

The hibiscus is also suitable as an outdoor shrub. The plant is so attractive that it can be potted in a large container and placed on the terrace or balcony.

Hearing Set On Alcohol Fuels Regulation

A public hearing will be held on the U.S. Department of Agriculture's proposed regulations implementing provisions of Title II of the Energy Security Act which authorized biomass energy and alcohol fuels loans and loan guarantees, Deputy Agriculture Secretary James H. Williams announced.

The proposed regulations will determine how the Farmers Home Administration, the credit agency of the Agriculture Department, will carry out certain parts of the Act, which was signed into law by President Carter on June 30, 1980.

The hearing will be held in Lubbock, Texas, on August 29, 1980, at the Holiday Inn, 6624 Avenue H. Two other hearings will be held prior to that date in Georgia and Iowa. In order to gain the widest possible public participation, the hearing will run from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m.; from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m.; and from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m.

The Energy Security Act authorized \$600 million for the Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Program of loans and loan guarantees to alcohol fuels and other biomass energy projects over the next two years (FY 1981-1982). USDA funds will be used to assist energy projects which use agricultural or forestry products or residue. USDA has responsibility for projects up to 15 million gallons of capacity.

The proposed regulations appeared in the Federal Register on Tuesday, August 5.

hearings should contact the Office of Public Participation, Room 118A, Department of Agriculture, Washington, DC 20250, telephone 202-447-2113.

USDA will also participate in similar hearings to be held in the near future by the Department of Energy concerning DOE regulations for financial assistance to biomass energy projects.

SBA Makes Ag Disaster Declaration

One hundred seventy-eight Texas counties are now eligible for disaster recovery assistance because of drought and other extreme weather conditions, the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) announced today.

"SBA disaster recovery loans are available to agricultural producers in the affected counties who have suffered crop and livestock losses," said SBA Regional Administrator Mercurio Martinez, Jr. "The loans are low-interest and may compensate losses not already covered by insurance or other disaster or deficiency payments."

The administrative limit restricts business disaster loans to the actual amount of the damage or loss, up to a maximum of \$500,000. Larger loans may be considered in some cases and must be approved by the regional SBA office. The interest rate on the loan is either five percent or eight and 1/4 percent, depending on whether SBA determines that the producer could receive credit elsewhere from commercial or non-federal sources. Martinez noted that it is not necessary for a producer to be turned down by a bank before applying for SBA assistance. Loan maturity is based on individual needs and repayment ability and has a maximum of 30 years.

The following formula is used in computing the amount of eligible loss on crops: Acres planted X established normal yield X percentage of loss X market price = recovery equals Eligible loss. Up to 50 percent of the eligible loan amount may be used to pay outstanding obligations such

as accounts payable, notes payable and operating expenses including reasonable living expenses. At least 50 percent of the loan must be held for planting and operating expenses in the new crop year.

The filing deadline for physical disaster loans is February 12, 1981. Economic injury disaster loan applications must be filed by May 12, 1981.

"SBA has two disaster branch offices ready to provide information and process loan requests," said Martinez. "Producers should note which office will be handling their applications and be sure to return their forms to the appropriate office."

Bowie, Delta, Franklin, Lamar, Red River and Titus Counties will be serviced at 5555 North Lamar, Austin, Texas 78751.

Martinez said that loan applications and information on the SBA program will be available also in each county ASCS office. Telephone inquiries on particular disaster conditions named for each county may be made at (512) 458-1851 in Austin.

Another program available is the combination individual lesson in piano and group theory class weekly at a cost of \$145, which includes all materials. Russell will teach an adult piano class in the PJC piano laboratory on Tuesdays from 7:30 to 9 p.m. beginning September 2. Fee for the eight weeks of lessons will be \$45, but music will be purchased as used, Russell said.

Fees for the courses should be paid in advance, and reservations must be made by calling Russell or the continuing education office at PJC, (214) 785-7661, ext. 142 or 145.

The college's non-credit preparatory music program was initiated last year, and a total of 33 piano students and 15 voice students participated. The instructors have master's degrees in music from East Texas State University.

TDCA To Launch Fall Campaign

The Texas Department of Community Affairs (TDCA) announced today that it will launch a major campaign this fall promoting a partnership between business and government to create employment opportunities in over 100 Texas counties.

The campaign is part of a new collaborative effort known as the Private Sector Initiative Program created by Title VII of the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA).

"Since 80 percent of all jobs lie in the private sector," TDCA executive director Sid Wieser noted in making the announcement, "business support is crucial in helping solve employment problems."

Using the theme "Workin' Partnership: CETA's Enterprising Idea for Texas Employers," the TDCA campaign will encourage business and industry to hire and train eligible workers.

"The goal of the program," Wieser said, "is to bring unemployed and underemployed into the mainstream of the work force. Equipping workers with marketable skills will allow them mobility in the private job market and the chance to become self-sufficient." "This can mean less reliance on government support systems, which in turn benefits all tax-paying residents of Texas," Wieser continued.

The partnership is also designed to be responsive to business needs in training and jobs programs, according to Bud Harris, director of TDCA Manpower Services Division.

If a CETA employee qualifies under certain guidelines, Harris explained, the employer can be reimbursed up to fifty percent of the workers wages for training cost. In addition, if the employee qualifies under one of seven specially targeted groups, such as Viet Nam veterans of the handicapped, the business could qualify for additional tax credits.

"We want to make businesses aware of the local nature of this program," Harris said. He explained that the federal funds are locally administered in the 100-plus counties under TDCA sponsorship. The counties are divided into 15 geographic areas, each with a local entity to administer funds.

"This allows more efficient use of the monies," he said, "since a local body has good knowledge of its areas needs."

"Moreover, private business has a lot to do with the use of these funds," he continued. "A state Private Industry Council, composed in the majority of business people, creates the major link between government and business. And each area has its own Private Industry Task Force to represent the business community."

"This is one of the few times," Harris added, "that business can have a direct say in how a federal program is run which affects them."

"What makes this program really viable," Harris said, "is that workers are trained according to local business standards for real work situations in the market place. The ultimate goal is

long-term unsubsidized employment in the competitive job market."

"This is one program that is not just a stop-gap measure," Harris stated. "It is a real opportunity to prepare a great many people, from the school dropout to the displaced homemaker, to be permanent, taxpaying members of the working community."

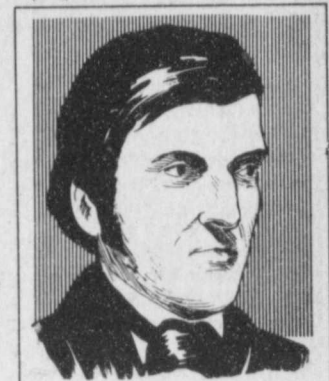
"Our sponsorship, one of several in the state, covers counties and towns with populations of less than 100,000," Harris concluded. "There are hundreds of businesses in these areas, ranging from small retail operations to large manufacturers. We hope to express the programs benefits for as many as we can."

The "Workin' Partnership" campaign kicks off in September with print and film materials to reach local employers and business leaders, and community-wide public service announcements. The campaign highlights companies already involved in the private sector program,

employees who are being trained or have advanced through the program and local sponsors representing several areas of the state.

CETA's private sector initiative program as recieved widespread support from well-known business organizations, including the National Alliance of Business, the National Newspaper Association and the American Society for Personnel Administration.

Pick Quality Ears Of Corn on The Cob

Corn on the cob is an American summer favorite.

When buying corn on the cob, look for ears that are well covered with bright, plump kernels. The husks should be fresh and green.

The silk ends should be free from decay or worm injury and the stems should not be discolored or dried.

Avoid ears with undeveloped kernels as well as very large overmature kernels. Also avoid kernels with depressed areas on the outer surface.

When you bring corn home from the store, place it in the refrigerator without delay and then cook and eat it as soon as possible.

If corn is held too long, or at too high a temperature, the sugar in the kernels starts to turn to starch.

Don't pour bacon drippings down the drain as this will eventually clog it. Pour them into a coffee can with a plastic cover and when full, refrigerate or freeze to harden the fat, and discard with the garbage.

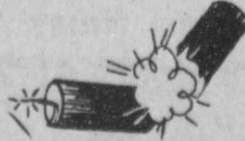

Practice Eye Safety At Home

Your home can be hazardous to your eyes, warns the Texas Society to prevent Blindness.

"Forty-two percent of all eye injuries occur around the home," says Clymer L. Wright Jr., president of the Texas Society. "Almost a million Americans today suffer from eye injuries that occurred while they engaged in ordinary, every day activities like mowing a lawn, or playing racquet or even cleaning the kitchen stove."

"Eye injury is, next to cataracts, the most common cause of visual impairment in the United States. People must train themselves to remember that no matter what they are doing their eyes are always at stake. While accidents themselves can't always be prevented, 90 percent of the resulting injuries can be if proper precautions are taken."

The Texas Society to Prevent Blindness lists these precautions in a new pamphlet "Eye Safety Is No Accident". It is filled with tips on how to avoid common eye hazards.

Ammonia, lye and other harsh chemicals found in household cleansers and garden sprays are particularly damaging to the eye, resulting in injury, burns, and even blindness, the pamphlet points out. Read package labels and instructions thoroughly before using such products. Many give specific directions, and ignoring them can result in accidents. Use special caution with pressurized spray cans. Be sure the spray nozzle is directed away from you. Spray cans make tempting toys, so be sure they stay well out of reach of children.

Wood chips, rocks, metal pieces and other particles thrown off by home maintenance tools like drills, welding equipment, and chain saws can also cause serious eye damage. Lawnmowers, frequently a cause of eye injuries, can hurl a stone into your eye or some unsuspecting bystander's. Keep young children away when you're mowing. For safety's sake, be sure that all tools and machinery are kept in good repair.

"The best protection against any eye hazard is safety eyewear," Wright stressed. In expensive goggles are usually obtainable in hardware stores or from suppliers of safety equipment can be worn with or without regular glasses.

HELPFUL IDEAS FOR SUCCESSFUL RETIREMENT

A recent study found that reducing Medicaid allocations for prescription medicines can lead to increased hospitalization and related costs, especially for elderly and disabled Medicaid recipients.

In 1976, the Louisiana Medicaid Program attempted to curtail Medicaid expenditures by disallowing coverage of certain medicines from the program. The goal was a 15.68 percent reduction in total Medicaid costs for a savings of \$5.6 million.

According to the study, Medicaid prescription drug payments were reduced by \$4.1 million—but total spending for the period increased by \$15.1 million, due primarily to the large number of Medicaid patients who were hospitalized.

Hospitalization days more than doubled for the elderly covered by the Old Age Assistance Program, and the handicapped covered by the Aid to the Dis-

A similar study was conducted in Texas for the same time period—six months preceding the Medicaid change and the same interval in 1977. Texas retained an open drug formulary and made no major program revisions in any service areas.

Drug expenditures in Louisiana decreased in 1977 by 11.4 percent while in Texas they increased moderately by 3.1 percent. Total health care expenditures in Texas increased moderately by \$4.08 per person while Louisiana's escalated five times that figure or \$23.69 per person.

The Texas study bore out Louisiana's original finding—that savings achieved by restriction of certain drugs is far outweighed by the increased cost and use of other services.

BEYOND THE "AMEN"!
August 17, 1980

Background Scripture:
Nehemiah 1 through 6, 8 through 9.
Devotional Reading:
Psalms 122.

There are usually two wrong ways to regard prayer. One is to expect too little of prayer, the other is to expect too much. To be sure, from God's side there are no limits to prayer. But from our side, there are definite limits which we may impose. One of these limits is the practice of asking God to do it all without our help.

In a sense, this may sound like a contradiction of what we have been saying these past few weeks, that Israel suffered because the nation did not trust fully enough in God. But God's constant reminder through his prophets that his people should depend upon him was not intended to mean "I'll do it all." God does answer prayer, but one of the greatest effects of prayer always is the changes it brings about in the one who does the praying.

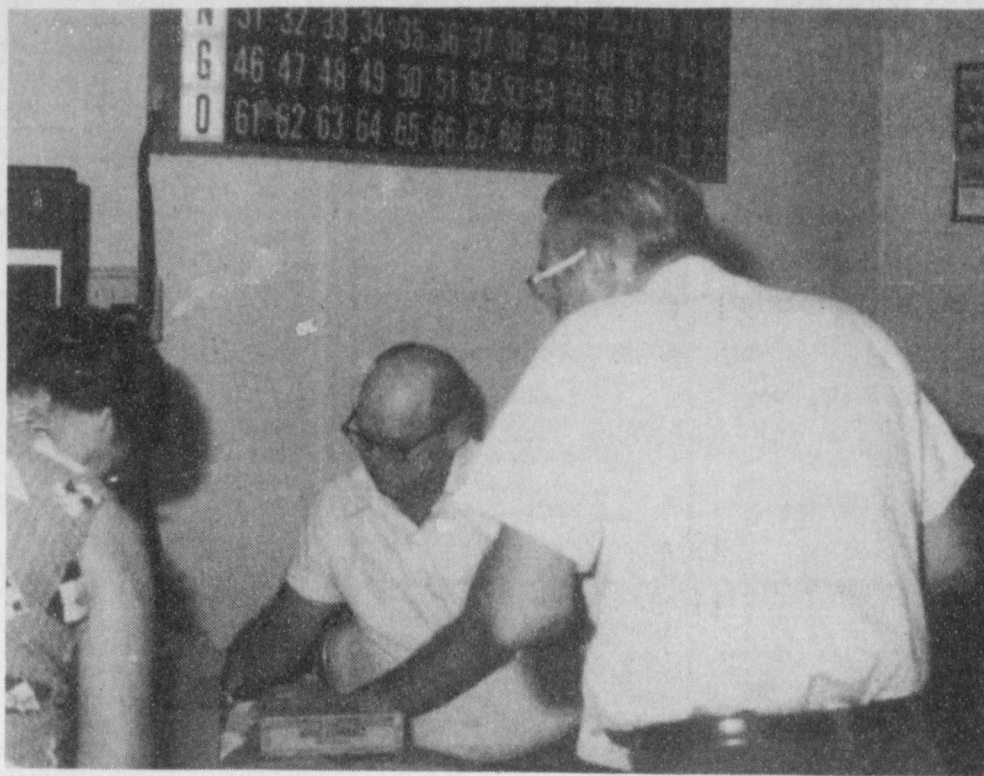
Fasting and Praying
So, there are two basic elements to prayer: the communication that takes place before the "Amen" is pronounced and the changes in thought and deed that follow after it. We see this

demonstrated so well in the story of Nehemiah. Learning that the survivors in Jerusalem were in "great trouble and shame," Nehemiah was deeply moved: "When I heard these words I sat down and wept, and mourned for days; and I continued fasting and praying before the God of heaven" (Nehemiah 1:4). This man who held a high position to the Persian King poured out his concern for Jerusalem and its people and we find his eloquent prayer at the very beginning of the book that bears his name (1:5-11).

But there was to be more than fasting and praying, and something would need to be done beyond saying "Amen." For his prayers not only communicated his concern to God and expressed his trust in God's power to meet this need, they also did something to Nehemiah, so that in time he became part of the answer to his own prayer, getting the king to permit him to return to Jerusalem and take charge of the reconstruction.

"Let Us Rise Up and Build!"
It was this same kind of attitude that enabled Nehemiah to successfully rebuild the walls of Jerusalem. With his challenge ringing in their ears, the people in Jerusalem when they had finished praying, said: "Let us rise up and build," and Nehemiah tells us that "they strengthened their hands for the good work." (2:17,18). Later, he reports: "So we built the wall...for the people had a mind to work" (3:6). And when confronted by jealous enemies who wanted to interfere with their work, Nehemiah and his people met this challenge in the same way: "And we prayed to our God, and set a guard as a protection against them day and night" (3:9).

And they were successful because they knew what went both before and after the "Amen" of prayer.

These two day workshops are specifically designed for tax practitioners who work extensively with farmers and ranchers.

Topics to be covered in the general workshops are: What's new-including the windfall profits tax; Divorce and separation, child support, alimony and property settlements; Capital gains and losses; Repossessions Oil, gas, and coal; Filing and processing; Corporations; Partnerships.

For the first time this year 8 Advanced programs will be offered stressing tax preparation for businesses. Topics to be discussed in the Advanced workshops are: What's new-including the windfall profits tax; 351

transfers; Dividends, Calculating earnings and profits account; The subchapter Selection; Fringe benefits; Pensions and profit sharing; Corporate liquidations; Liquidations (continued); Questions and answers.

These are popular Extension programs. Last year the 2,995 people that participated in this state-wide series reported filling over 637,000 tax returns.
