Cousin Of Mrs. Jesse Paulk Appointed U. S. Counselor to Singapore, Malaya

An unusual success story, both for a mother and her son, aunt and cousin of Mrs. Jesse Paulk, of Morton, was revealed this week by Mrs. Paulk.

The cousin, Thayer White, after a progressive advance from a Master of Arts degree at Georgetown University, teaching of economics, and several state department jobs, has been named Counselor of the United States of America to Singapore, Malaya.

His success has also led to an exciting later-years adventure for his widowed mother who will accompany him and his wife to Singapore for a two year stay.

The mother, Mrs. Paulk's aunt, Mrs. F. A. White, is the widow of Dr. Frank A. White who moved to Childress in 1927 and practiced there until his death. With her home, all her friends, her church work, and most of her interests in Childress, she faced a tough decision when her son and his wife asked her to accompany them on

what will amount to some what of a world tour.

But the exciting chance to visit so many foreign lands and to do the traveling that most folks dream about but never quite get around to, plus the chance to be with her family, caused her to answer, "yes."

The son finished high school at Sulphur Springs, received his bachelor degree from Southwestern University at Georgetown and then earned his MA degree. After four years of teaching at the university he went to the State Department and was promoted acting assistant chief of the division of Commerce. Later he was made assistant chief of northeast Asian affairs. Still later appointments took him to China, Japan and the World Conference at Ance, France and Turkey, England.

From Washington the trio will travel to New York and in February will leave for Europe. He'll be a delegate to the World Conference in Geneva, Switzerland. They'll go to Italy, then India and then to the Embassy at Singapore where they'll make their home for the next two years.

And no doubt, when they return to the USA, to Texas, and to Morton for a visit with the Paulks, they will have many an interesting experience to tell about.

AN EDITORIAL...

STAND UP AND BE COUNTED

Now's the time to stand up and be counted!

During the month of February, the Texas Safety Association and the Texas Department of Public Safety are urging adherence to a courteous driving pledge. "The Code of the Road," and by the end of the month they hope to have the cooperation of every registered driver in Texas.

In agreeing to the pledge, a driver promises to live up to seven basic rules of driving courtesy.

Courteous driving programs are not new, but the idea of measuring the success of such programs is. It was started in Midland, Michigan, last October when the National Safety Council and the Inter-Industry Highway Safety Committee cooperated with the Midland Traffic Safety Commission and the American Association of University Women in conducting a pilot Operation Safety program along these lines. In the month-long effort 10,000 drivers — virtually 100 per cent of the Midland Area's registered drivers — cooperated by signing "Code of the Road" pledges. During February numerous communities throughout the nation are conducting similar Operation Safety programs using Midland's record as their goal.

In Texas, the Texas Safety Association and Department of Public Safety are not asking motorists to sign written pledges, but Mr. R. E. Rooper of Houston, Chief Safety Engineer, Humble Oil & Refining Company and President of the Texas Safety Association, Inc., and Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Department of Public Safety have issued a joint appeal for each driver in the state to make a "Pact" with himself agreeing to adhere to the basic rules of driving courtesy.

But let us not forget that it's not the pacts themselves, that are important. It's the thinking behind the agreements that counts. Each agreement represents a driver who is convinced that courtesy on the road is a must and who believes it so strongly that he pledges himself to live up to the rules of courtesy at all times.

The objective of the program is to get 100 per cent of our drivers thinking this way. That would follow naturally if every driver realized two important facts. The first is that the line between discourtesy and traffic law violation is a thin one, and it is often difficult to tell when it is crossed. The second is that there is a very definite relationship between traffic law violations and traffic accidents. Just how definite this is can be

shown statistically. In 1953, 62 per cent of drivers in fatal accidents were violating a traffic law at the time of the accident.

Realizing that his own safety and the safety of all he meets in traffic depends to a great extent on his courteous conduct, no driver should have any difficulty in living up to his pledge of courteous driving.

The seven basic courtesies include: Sharing the road; allowing ample passing clearance; yielding the right of way; giving signals; dimming headlights; respecting all traffic laws and adjusting driving to the traffic and weather conditions.

Coming Picture Provocative and Entertaining

"MAN CRAZY" is both highly provocative and entertaining. It isn't that the screen presents a film which highlights a controversial social problem, and when such a movie does so highly successfully, the event is noteworthy. "Man Crazy" which opens Tuesday at the Rose Theatre is a searching story of youth today.

Both as a provocative and entertaining drama, it is worthy of your attendance. The movie which introduces several new screen stars is a graphic documentation of what happens to three heretofore unknown teenagers when they yield to temptation and steal a small fortune. They flee to Hollywood where they live in a world fabricated of dreams. Eventually they learn Shame, Shock, Terror and tragedy and each must pay dearly for her mistake.

"Man Crazy" is based on a real-life happening. The drama is intelligently presented by good taste. Three lovely new leading ladies, Christine Miller, Irene Anders and Coleen White portray the three girls naturally and sensitively. The documentary drama rings true as a slice of life.

Also starred in "Man Crazy" are Neville Brand and John Brown. Mr. Brand plays an ex-football star who falls in love with one of the girls but involves himself in more than he bargained for when he learns of the trio's felony. Mr. Brown is the gentleman whose money is stolen.

Featured players in the "Man Crazy" cast are Bill Lundmark, Joe Turkel and Jack Larson, excellent in their smaller roles.

David Cates, Loy Kern Win 4-H Cotton Yield Contest

Thirty-three 4-H boys and girls entered the county cotton contest. Of this number 18 have completed records to date. There were 12 completing in the irrigated division and 6 in the dry land. Following is the name of the 4-Her turning in a record, variety, acres, yield per acre, and price per pound of lint received, all in the irrigated division:

David Cates placed first in the irrigated division based on 5 acres. His yield was 1014 pounds of lint per acre. He had actually 4.48 acres of cotton. The land he chose for his cotton demonstration had been in perennial pasture and some alfalfa.

Lee Benham placed second in the irrigated division with 939 pounds lint per acre. He used 16-20-4 fertilizer to try to increase his yields. The total cost of fertilizer was \$32.82. Lee claims the fertilizer did help his production. He did not estimate how much, because check plot when harvested was not accurately harvested.

Douglas Zuber placed 3rd. He used cotton burs and the total cost was \$60.00. Douglas produced 856 pounds of lint per acre.

Loy Kern was first in dry land cotton production this year in

Cochran Co. He was first in 1953 in the county also. Loy's success can be attributed to selection of his land as well as variety, too. You cannot overlook the fact that Loy's Dad is behind him in all his efforts. His dry land production yield exceeded some of the irrigated boys in the contest.

My compliments to W. B. Snodgrass and Gary Coffman for their outstanding cotton yields on dry land production.

936 Persons Pay Poll Tax In County

A total of 936 poll taxes were paid in Cochran County for the year 1955.

With exemptions, the number of qualified voters will exceed 1,000 but will fall considerably short of the total for recent years.

With no organizations taking an active interest in poll taxes this year the result was felt with a one fourth drop over the last "off-election" year.

In recent years the poll tax total has been: 1952, 2006 (all-time record); 1953, 1266; 1954, 1562.

Meanwhile the sale of license plates continued briskly. Motorists have until midnight March 31 to purchase their plates and then they are liable to a fine if they have not purchased and posted their new plates.

Cotton Ginners Keeping Step With Modern Equipment

Texas cotton ginners today are operating plants designed and equipped to give cotton producers the best possible grades. But fifteen years ago, says E. H. Bush, extension cotton gin specialist, 25 percent of the state's cotton was docked by buyers because of rough preparation. In the past few years, he adds, this figure has dropped to less than half of one percent for all cotton ginned in Texas.

Bush believes the widespread interest among ginners in the Seven-Step Cotton Improvement Program is a big factor in this record. One of the seven steps in the program covers harvesting and ginning practices. Ginners during this same time, points out the specialist, have faced new problems brought on by the rapid spread of machine harvesting and regulations to control the pink bollworm.

These problems have been met by the installation of additional seed cotton cleaning and conditioning equipment and through educational training meetings for gin operators and employees. During the past year Bush used 93.7-Step and Ginners meetings in presenting his information aimed at further improving the ginning job and cutting costs. He made recommendations to individual ginners for machinery improvements totaling almost a half million dollars.

It has been estimated that work done by the extension cotton gin specialists amounts to an additional three million dollars each year for Texas cotton farmers.

The 1740 cotton gins in Texas have an estimated value of \$147,445,000 and a modern plant equipped to gin cotton under almost any condition may represent an investment of close to \$250,000.

This forward progress, says Bush, is just another example of what teamwork, plus research and education can do when fully utilized by those concerned with common problems.

Introduces Bill To Separate Dems, Republicans

AUSTIN—A bill to separate the Republicans from the Democrats in Texas primary elections was introduced in the Senate Monday.

Senator Kilmer Corbin of Lubbock submitted to the Texas Senate a bill requiring declaration of party affiliation at the time of poll tax purchase, receipt of exemption certification or party registration certification. This would be a prerequisite to voting in any primary election of a political party. Senator Corbin stated "This bill requiring a vote to declare de-

Gin Donate 5 Bales To CROP Program

Cochran County may exceed the 1954 donation of cotton to CROP. It was announced here this week as Carroll M. Jones, District Director of the program, from Muleshoe, prepared to wind up the drive.

A total of five bales have been secured in this county, mainly through Mr. Jones' tireless efforts. That equals last year's donation from this county. But one more bale has been promised.

The bales, all contributed by ginners, were received from the Country Club Gin, the Alamo Cotton Gin, the Cochran County Gin, the Morton Cooperative Gin and Willingham's Gin.

The tri-county area of Cochran, Bailey-Farmer counties contributed enough cotton bales, remnants and money to purchase cotton, to account for 52 bales for the Christian Rural Overseas Program.

Report from... YOUR COUNTY AGENT

Homer E. Thompson

Two 4-H Club boys of Cochran County attended the District 4-H Tractor Maintenance School at Texas Tech, Lubbock, Texas, Jan. 5 and 6, 1955. Homer E. Thompson, County Agent, attended the school on tractor maintenance and farm implements. The two 4-H boys attending were Jerry Marks and Jerry Bryant.

The Stanolind Oil Co. of Tulsa, Okla., and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service jointly sponsor this program annually. Three leaders of each county in the 21 county district are invited to attend annually. About 35 attended.

The Stanolind Oil Co. pays most of the expense for lodging and travel to this school. Ed Wickhurst is the company's representative in public relations and engineering, too. He is most capable and helps conduct the school.

Willie Ulich, Extension Engineer, assists Ed in the school. They do an outstanding job. This school is just technical enough to train boys in leadership and to care for and maintain farm machinery and equipment. The boys do take part in the work and learn how to put on demonstrations. There is an ultimate in all trades, but the boys really learn their machinery and upkeep. This leadership training is not over when the school ends. These boys bring back with them the knowledge and how to impart this information to other club boys and leaders in the county. County tractor schools will be conducted in the spring for all boys interested in 4-H Tractor Maintenance, advised County Agent Homer Thompson.

Continuing Series On How To File Your 1955 Income Tax Return

HOW TO CLAIM YOUR EXEMPTIONS

You are allowed a deduction of \$600.00 for each exemption for which you qualify.

For You: You, as the taxpayer, are always entitled to at least one exemption. If at the end of your taxable year, you were blind or were 65 or over, you get two exemptions. If you were both blind and 65 or over, you get three exemptions.

For Your Wife: You get an exemption for your wife (or husband) if you are, or she is, filing a joint return. If you file a separate return, you may claim her exemption only if she had no income and did not receive more than half her support from another taxpayer. Otherwise, your wife's exemptions are like your own—one if she was neither blind nor 65; two if she was either blind or 65 or over; three if she was both blind and 65 or over. In case of death, if wife or husband died during 1954, the number of his or her exemptions is determined as of the date of death.

Exemptions for Children: You are entitled to one exemption for each child, including a step-child or legally adopted child, if during the taxable year that child: 1. Received more than one-half his or her support from you (or from your husband or wife if a joint return), and 2. Had not attained the age of 19 or was a student (if the child is 19 or over and not a student he must have received less than \$600 gross income), and 3. Did not file a joint return with her husband (or his wife), and 4. Was either a citizen or resident of the United States or a resident of Canada, Mexico, the Republic of Panama or the Canal Zone. For the exemption in the case of children who are residents of the Republic of the Philippines and were born to, or were legally adopted by, servicemen in the Philippine Islands before July 5, 1946, consult your Internal Revenue Service office.

Student Defined: The law defines a student as an individual who, during each of five calendar months of the year, was a full-time student at an educational institution or was pursuing a full-time course of on-farm training under the supervision of an accredited agent of an educational institution or of a State or political subdivision of a State, primary and secondary schools, preparatory schools, normal schools, colleges, universities, technical and mechanical schools are among those considered to be educational institutions. However, correspondence schools and on-the-job training are excluded. Attending night school while working daytime is considered "part-time attendance" and will not qualify the child as a student.

Amounts received as scholarships for study at an educational institution need not be taken into account in determining whether a child who qualifies under the above definition of a "student" received more than one-half of his or her support from you.

Exemptions for Dependents Other than Your Children: You are entitled to one exemption for each other dependent who meets all the following requirements for the year: 1. Received less than \$600 gross income, and 2. Received more than one-half of his or her support from you (or from husband or wife if this is a joint return), and 3. Did not file a joint return with her husband (or his wife), and 4. Was either a citizen or resident of the United States or a resident of Canada, Mexico, the Republic of Panama or the Canal Zone, and 5. (a) Was related to you (or to husband or wife if this is a joint return) in one of the following ways: Mother, Father, Grandmother, Grandfather, Brother, Sister, Grandson, Granddaughter, Step-brother, Stepsister, Stepmother, Stepfather, Mother-in-law, Father-in-law, Son-in-law, Daughter-in-law; The following if related by blood: Uncle, Aunt, Nephew, Niece, or (b) An individual who: 1. During the taxpayer's taxable year, used the taxpayer's home as his principal place of abode

and was a member of the taxpayer's household, or

2. Is a descendant of a brother or sister of the taxpayer's parents and during the taxpayer's taxable year, received institutional care for a physical and mental deficiency but prior to such institutional care was a member of taxpayer's household.

"Brother" and "Sister" include brother or sister by the half-blood. A legally adopted child is considered a child by blood.

Exemptions for Individuals Supported by More Than One Taxpayer:

If several persons contributed toward the support of an individual during the taxable year, but none contributed over half of the support, they may designate one of their number to claim the exemption, if

(a) They as a group have provided over half of the support of the individual; and

(b) Each of them had contributed over half of the support, would have been able to claim the individual as a dependent; and

(c) The person claiming the exemption for the individual contributed over 10 percent of the support; and

(d) Each person described in (b) above (other than the person claiming the exemption) who contributed over 10 percent of the individual's support files a declaration that he will not claim the individual as a dependent for the year. Consult your Internal Revenue Service office for information regarding the filing of these declarations.

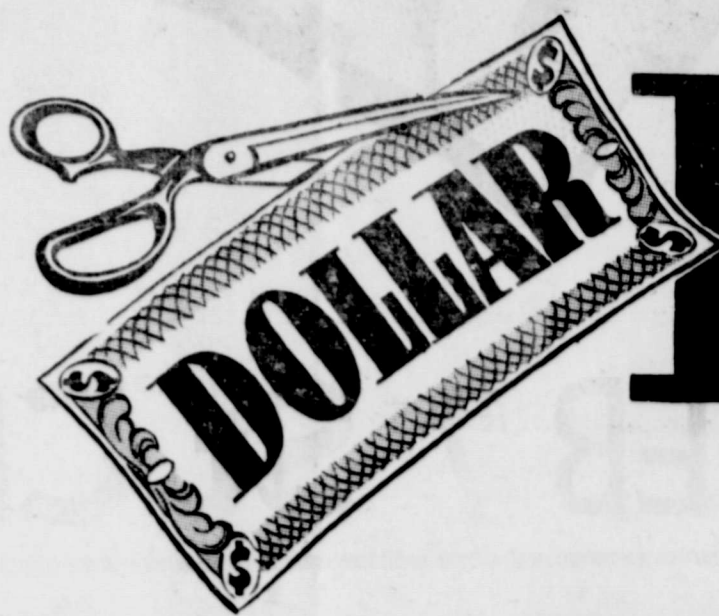
