Sammie Burton To Enter SFASC

Sammie E. Burton, a teacher at Rivercrest, has been awarded a stipend to attend the Summer Institute for Senior High School teachers of mathematics at Stephen F. Austin State College in Nacogdoches. This institute will run June 3 thru July 12, and is sponsored and financed by the National Science Foundation.

Burton, presently teaching mathematics at the senior level in Rivercrest High School, received his B. S. and M. Ed. degrees at the East Texas State University in Commerce.

This institute, in addition to offering two six (6) semester hours courses, Introduction to Modern Algebra and Analysis, and The Real Number System, will have a number of other attractions: Dr. Robert E. Greenwood, Professor of Mathematics at the University of Texas at Austin, will spend two days as guest lecturer at the institute. Dr. Goran Björck, Asst. Professor of Mathematics at the University of Stockholm, Sweden, will also spend two days as guest lecturer at the institute. Dr. Björck's visit is being sponsored by the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

The participants in the institute will visit the National Aeronautics and Space Administration Manned Spacecraft Center in Houston.

Teacher-Student TNS Symposium

Community Public Service Co. will sponsor a student and teacher from Rivercrest High School to the Eighth Texas Nuclear Science Symposium for High Schools at the University of Texas in Austin June 4-7.

Miss Susan Gage of Talco has been selected by school officials to attend the four-day meeting. She will be accompanied by Mrs. Bonnye Gage, Rivercrest High School teacher.

The symposium, held annually at the University, is sponsored by the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation and the University. Community Public Service Company and nine other electric power companies in Texas make up the foundation.

Some 500 outstanding science students and their teachers will attend the meeting in Austin. They will have the opportunity to hear scientists from the fields of both industry and education discuss nuclear physics and related topics. Two afternoons will be spent touring the science laboratories of the University. Included will be visits to the experiments being carried on in thermonuclear (fusion) research by scientists at the University for the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation.

"Community Public Service Company is interested in this research as a future source of generation of electricity," Jackson Cox, company director of public relations, said. "These experiments are aimed at eventual control of the nuclear reaction which takes place in the hydrogen bomb. When harnessed, the energy released in this nuclear reaction could be used for such peaceful purposes as power generation."

Rep. Craig Hosmer of California, ranking minority member of the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy of Congress, will speak at the symposium. There will be other noted speakers.

Chairman of this years symposium is Dr. Harold Hanson, chairman of the physics department at the University.

Runoff Slated In Titus County Sheriff's Race

A runoff will be necessary in the Titus County Sheriff's race following Saturday's first Democratic primary election. Contestants in the race for sheriff will be John W. Terrell and Jack Hicks.

Unofficial returns showed the following vote:

Sheriff: Terrell 1,926, Hicks 1,265, Talley 1,090, Redfearn 1,028.

State Representative: Slider 3,336, Scroggins 1,678, (Titus County) with Slider appearing the winner.

District Attorney: Flanagan 3,131, Taylor 2,070. (Titus County)

Assessor-Collector: Beck 2,663, Redfearn 2,478.

Commissioner, Precinct 3: Raney 609, Cook 244.

At Talco box Raney received 249 votes; Cook 181. At Argo, Raney 231 and Cook 30; at Sugar Hill, Raney 110; Cook 20.

Voting at Talco showed: governor's race, Preston Smith led the ticket with 129 votes. Other candidates received: Whittenburg 6, Carr 65, Hill 32, O'Daniel 33, Briscoe 24, Locke 18, Yarbrough 80.

For Lt Governor: Ben Barnes received 278 votes, Gladden 21, Smith 53.

James L. Slider polled 279 votes to Scroggins' 98 in the state representative race. Alford Flanagan had 297 votes to Taylor's 114 in the district attorney race.

For sheriff: Terrell received 190 votes, Talley 93, Hicks 66 and Redfearn 68.

For tax assessor-collector: Pat Beck received 227 votes to E. T. Redfearn's 130.

On the three propositions Talco voters were against all of them: liquor by the drink, one for and 95 against; pari-mutuel betting on horse racing, 111 for and 192 against, and milk controls, 76 for and 217 against.

In the governor's race in Titus County Don Yarbrough led the ticket with 1580 votes. Smith was second with 1422, Carr 704, Locke 412, Briscoe 348, O'Daniel 326, Hill 248, Hackworth 37.

For Lieut. Governor: Barnes 3619, Smith 654, Gladden 617.

Each of the three referendum questions was soundly defeated in Titus County voting.

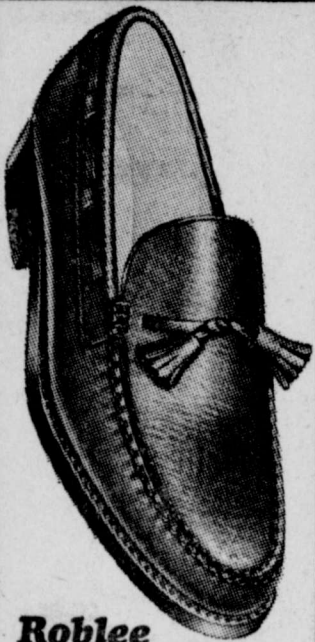
