Plans Complete For Craterville's 4th July Rodeo

Craterville Park, June 29th—All preparations for the big celebration and rodeo which will be staged here July 2-3-4 have been completed according to Frank Rush, Jr., director. Contests of cowboys broncho busting, calf roping, wild steer riding, bulldogging and other rare sports will be waged to a finish for large cash prizes while a large number of special stunts or exhibitions will be added to the contests and there will also be running races and jumping horses contests during the afternoons, a gorgeous display of fireworks will take the place of the running races at night and will be stopped in connection with the rodeo contests.

Among the special features both afternoon and night will be one that brings to a dramatic climax equine education. This feature is Raymond Ramsay and his great horse "White Cloud" and this horse along side the ordinary high school horse would have to be called a post graduate in order to convey a meaning of his superior education.

Geo. Moffett Speaks to Large Crowd Saturday

Advancing the theory that if more men could find profitable employment on the farm, unemployment would be reduced in other industries, Representative George Moffett of Chillicothe, candidate for State Senator from the 23rd Senatorial District, spoke before a large crowd in Burkburnett Saturday night.

Moffett's solution for this theory lay in finding more uses for farm products. He was author of a bill which would have provided Texas with a cotton research laboratory had not it met with the Governor's veto, and he was instrumental in having provisions made for four laboratories to search out new uses for farm products included in the 1938 Federal Farm Bill.

Moffett voiced dissatisfaction with the present old age assistance bill on the grounds that it did not represent what the people wanted.

"The first pension law was reasonably liberal," he stated, "but the second one screwed the lid down too tight. Soon after its passage, nearly 20,000 old people were dropped from the rolls because of its strictness, and other thousands, who are deserving, have never received assistance."

Another high point of Moffett's talk was his discussion of utilities. "They must submit to regulations," he declared, "and furnish their commodities at a fair and reasonable price."

Baby Member Of Rotary Club Classification Will Be "Pharmacist"

Geo. McClarty, owner of the Corner Drug Store, was introduced Tuesday at the Rotary club as a new member. Geo. comes to the club under the classification as "Pharmacist."

Al Lohoefer, local postmaster, had the program and gave a classification talk. He explained the working of the postal department. He stated that the postal system was founded by Benjamin Franklin, who was the first postmaster general. "The Federal government is the only business that has a monopoly on business and who has no competition. The department is divided into four main divisions, 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 4th with each division having several subdivisions, each in charge of an assistant postmaster general."

Mr. Lohoefer said, "Also there are the railway mail service which handles the transportation of the mail." He gave an account of the routine of a letter mailed at a street letter box until its final delivery at destination; he also explained the routine of an incoming letter to this office, and the manner and responsibility of handling of C. O. D., insured and registered mail. The four divisions of the local office, namely, general delivery, rural delivery, city delivery and box office was explained in detail by Mr. Lohoefer. He also stated that the postoffice department has other duties outside the handling of the mail. He told of the handling of the veterans bonus bonds, social security registration, and the unemployment census, all of which were handled through the local office.

Obediah Hooper Attends Reunion

Obediah Hooper, 94, Confederate veteran of the Civil War, is attending the 75th Reunion for veterans of that war, which is being held in Gettysburg, Pa.

Mr. Hooper is one of only seven Confederate survivors of the battle of Gettysburg. In that engagement, he served as a picket. He served through the entire war without an injury.

The pioneer came to Texas in 1876 when a flood washed away his mill in Alabama. He settled at Vernon, then at Henrietta. In 1907, when the Big Pasture opened, he settled in Randlett and still owns a farm there.

He makes his home in Burkburnett with a son, George Hooper, and several granddaughters.

According to F. R. Knauth, local commissioner, the county commissioners in session Monday approved the paving of the three mile stretch from the west pavement to Newtown.

This project was approved along with the approval of the 500-yard road from the Burkburnett road to the municipal airport.

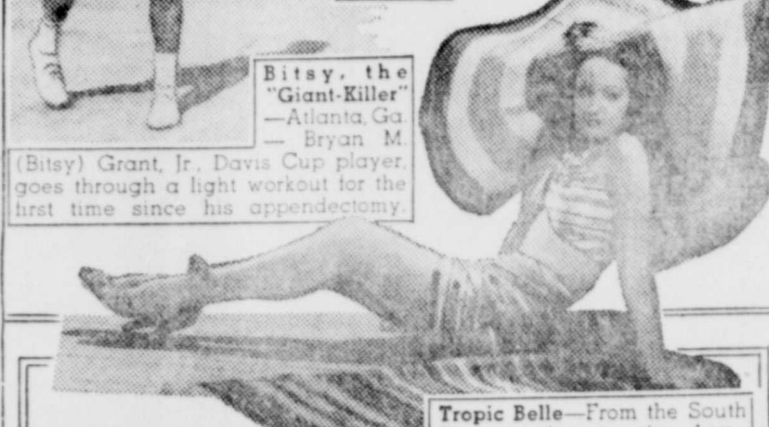

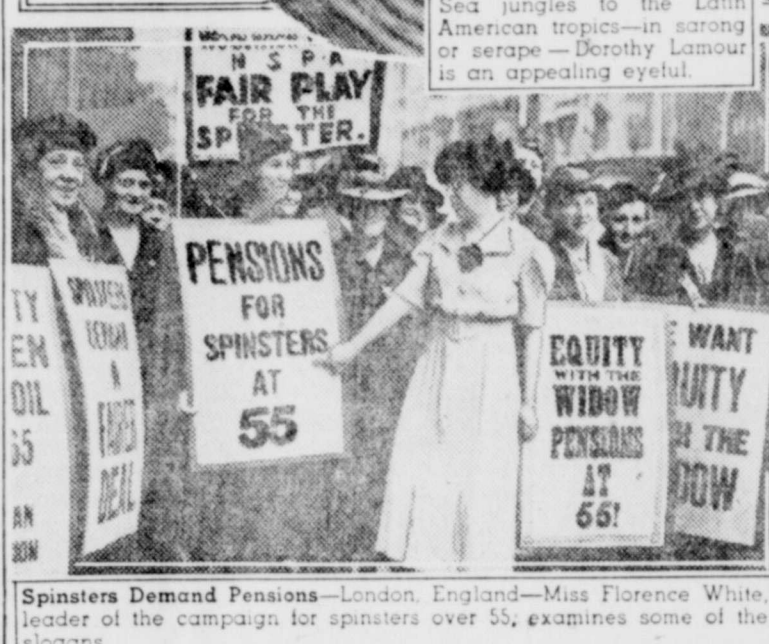

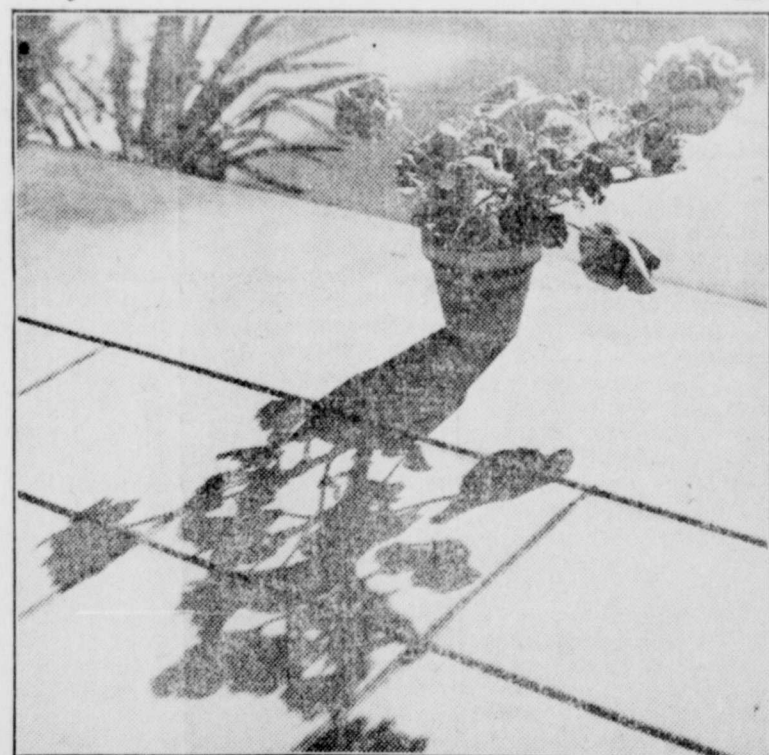

PATTERN PICTURES

Long shadows, with the sun as a ready-made spotlight—and the potted flower is twice as interesting. Don't overlook the pattern in the floor grooves.

PATTERNS make fascinating pictures, and they are all around you—shadow patterns, ornamental ironwork, window grilles, railings, wheels, stacks of lumber, piles of grain—every group of people in a formal arrangement.

Include a definite pattern in your pictures, and they will have an unusual, "different" quality.

When you go to the beach look for patterns in sand ripples and the shadows cast by beach grass. Climb a high bank or diving tower, and shoot down on your crowd when they are sunning themselves in a circle or formal arrangement like the spokes of a wheel which gives pattern interest to the picture.

Take pictures of scenes through things, such as ornamental ironwork. The outlines form patterns which make the scenes more interesting. Picture a tennis player through the net or racket—or let him hold the racket so that the sun casts an interesting criss-cross shadow pattern on his face.

Out in the country, try picturing scenes through wheels of farm equipment—for instance, "frame" a landscape through the tall wheel of a hay rake. The spokes and rim of the wheel give pattern interest. In town, picture shadow patterns on a brick sidewalk or street. The shadows give one kind of pattern interest, and the pattern of the paving adds another.

When a new house is going up—before the roof and weatherboarding are put on—there are pattern chances in the framing and roof timbers. Get inside, point the camera upward, and picture workmen on the roof. Look for pictures, too, in the steelwork of bridges and trestles, and in the criss-cross patterns of wires and cross-arms at the top of telephone poles.

It's fun to hunt patterns, and they add new interest to your pictures. Keep your eye open for them, and snap any that look good.

Answers to Charges

Statements made by him to the press, his answer follows:

"Marble Machines"
After taking office in the marble machines that were taking in thousands of dollars from children and families, removed from the county, and the crowd that was draining the public.

My opponent, in his announcement, attempts to be the champion of decency and attempts to place the blame for the detestable condition of the road houses and "honkey tonks" on our office, when as a matter of fact we have been the thorn in their sides for the past 18 months. He has been their defender, and the record speaks.

"Cites Records"
As a direct result of proceedings instituted by the County Attorney's office, 20 liquor and beer licenses have been cancelled or suspended. Let's keep the record straight!

107 times in the past year and a half one of the members of my opponent's law firm has appeared in Court to defend liquor law violators. Among these were operators of "honkey tonks," "blind tigers," and night clubs. In many instances the arrested

last time, and I am still fighting. The opening gun was fired when my opponent made his slanderous statements in announcing for office through the public press.

"Exposes Strategy"

Their strategy calls for their man to make an appeal on some vital moral issue in an attempt to get the votes of those of the right thinking people that they can confuse. They can depend on their own crowd. They have a perfect understanding. But they have picked the wrong man — and the smoke screen is too thin.

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parties were hardly in custody before my opponent came rushing to the court house with a bail in his hand. And the actions of these violators are directly responsible for the present demand for a "dry" county. That crowd has been the worst enemy that the "wet" element has had.

The same firm has defended over 250 drunks in cases in County Court alone since I have been in office. In fact they have a "corner" on the business.

"Identifies Opposition"
That same firm has obtained beer and wine permits for over 32 dealers including "Green Lantern," "Rainbow Gardens," and "Club Lido" night clubs. The last two are also known as "Johnny Clark's Place" and "Jack Hill's Place." The "Green Lantern" used to be the "Brown Derby" and has been run by such people as Mary O'Dare and Raymond Tilghman. And that firm of lawyers have defended each of those places in proceedings filed by our office for violation, cancellation, injunction and suspension.

My opponent, who has the "brass" to criticize me for the conduct of "honkey tonks," defended in public hearing the action of one "joint" where the proof showed that brawls were frequent occurrences, that liquor was sold to minors and drunk people, that indecent and immoral conduct was conducted in cars and on the premises surrounding

the place. And it was further shown, significantly, that several drunk drivers had been arrested after leaving the place.

"Change of Heart"
When my critical opponent was County Attorney (and at that time the office had more power than it now has) this county saw public gambling at its worst. No sooner had he stepped out of office than he was first to attempt to block our drive against slot machines in the case involving "Mint Vending" slot machines tried in the 89th District Court early in 1937.

Since when and what has caused him now to become the champion of decency? When the change of heart. Will he bite the hand that has been feeding him for the past 18 months?

Again I say his announcement would be clever were he not so well identified. And his record screams so loud that the voters cannot hear what he has to say.

"Promise Kept"
After the election of July, 1936, and while my opponent was still in office, the gambling continued uninterrupted, the marble machines stayed in, and were not moved out until the night of December 31, 1936, five months after the people had spoken. Will the people of this county set another mid-night on December 31, 1938, as the time for them to renege the county? I don't think so. We promised that they would go—we kept our promise—and they went!

"Worked Hard"
Over 700 misdemeanor violators (over 2 a day) have been sentenced in County Court along in cases prosecuted by my office, not to mention the thousands of cases presented in the Justice Courts where our office was available for prosecution. Over \$9,000.00 in fines have been paid in misdemeanor convictions. Costs in those cases amount to thousands paid into the county treasury. We have worked hard. The County Attorney has other duties and only two in the office to do them. He has the vital respon-

sibility of presenting juvenile and delinquency cases in District Court. Over 25 of them in 18 months. Our office is official adviser for all county officers and their deputies. Complicated legal questions arise requiring time and research to be answered comprehensively. We have written over 60 opinions on County legal matters. We appear in all contested criminal cases in Justice Courts, over 50 of them in 18 months. The County Attorney must represent the County in Tax suits, through which over \$50,000.00 have been collected for the County. He appears in Habeas Corpus hearings. The new Barber's License law has demanded some of our time. We have presented over 100 lunacy hearings. Highway and road right-of-way matters must be given attention. And we have done all of these things with proper deliberation and plenty of work.

"Obstacles"
In 1936 I was elected County Attorney with the added duties of the District Attorney in Wichita County. A mistake was found in the law before I took office and I was relieved of felony prosecutions including the drunken drivers that my opponent speaks of. Though "winged" of authority, I have used the remaining resources to carry on the fight. And I did what I said I would do—regardless of the most disheartening obstacles.

I was the first man to break the political ring that has controlled the prosecutor's offices in this county during the past 20 years. I have been in office only part of my first term. My critical opponent lived off of the public purse, according to his own statement, about 8 years, drawing

more than \$25,000.00 in pay. He has been in the private practice of the law a year and a half, but while County Attorney he maintained a private office on the 9th floor of the City National Bank Building in Wichita Falls. And he criticizes me for maintaining the office that I established in 1932 and have kept intact during the time I have been County Attorney. I do not intend to run for public office all of my life and keep that office to which I may return after my services as a public official are over.

"Answers Criticism"
I regret that I am forced to refer to personalities, and admit

that I have made mistakes. Who has not? But when misrepresentations are made concerning me and the discharge of my official duties, I must keep the record straight, in self defense, and in the interest of fair play. I am proud of our achievements. I give due credit to Temple Shell, my assistant, who has and will continue to work diligently in the discharge of the multitude of duties that our office carries. I thank the people for their confidence in me and will deeply appreciate that continued confidence in the future.

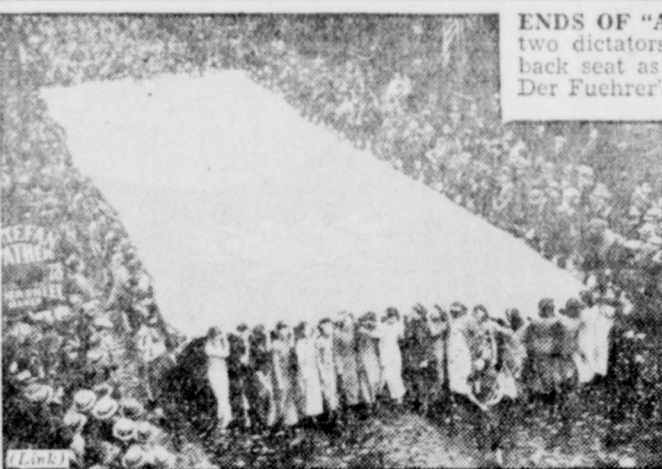

Donald Lindee, of the University of Louisiana, will have charge of the machine.

Hon. Harry Brown, Assistant Secretary of Agriculture, will be the speaker at the formal opening of the Short Course Wednesday morning with President T. O. Walton making the address of welcome. Group singing at this and other meetings will be led by Walter Jenkins, Rotary International Song Leader, who has twice before led the rural crowds at A. and M. College to great enjoyment in music.

Thursday, with Extension Vice Director Mildred Horton presiding, Mrs. Mattie Lloyd Wooten, Dean of Women, Texas State College for Women, will be the speaker of the morning general assembly. Thursday night, President Walton presents M. M. Harris, editor of the San Antonio Express to speak in the stadium on the People's Library Movement.

Friday, Congressman Richard Kleberg will be the speaker of the morning at the general assembly with Vice Director Jack Shelton presiding over the meeting. Friday night the crowds will be entertained in the stadium with a picture show.

Sectional meetings for farmers and ranchmen and rural homemakers will fill the hours after the general assembly until noon each day. Afternoons will be filled with meetings, tours and demonstrations for various groups.

Farmers and ranchmen who attend the Farmers' Short Course, will be offered a real agricultural program. Farmers, ranchmen, county judges, and county commissioners will headline the three day session with talks about their experiences in agriculture.

The morning session of Wednesday, July 13, will be devoted to a discussion of soil conservation. Members of commissioners' courts will be present to explain their system of terracing with county owned equipment, according to C. E. Bowles, co-operative marketing specialist of the Extension Service and chairman of the committee that arranged the program.

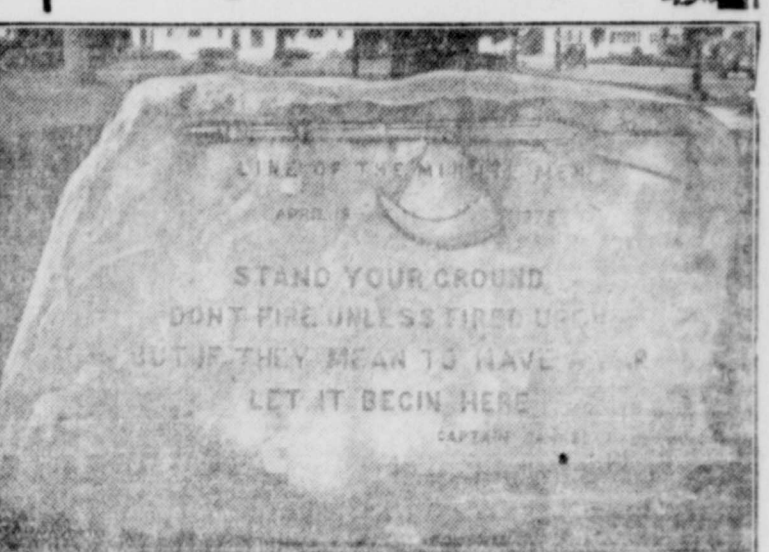
In 1937, 189 counties made county equipment available to farmers a nominal rental figure, and 373,000 acres of land were terraced by this method. M. R. Bentley, extension agricultural engineer, said.

Sectional meetings on various phases of livestock and crops will take up the afternoon of the first day of the Short Course.

Cotton will be the topic during the entire second day, July 14, Bowles said. Farmers will again take the front with reports of the success of one-variety cotton communities, while P. K. Norris, Washington, D. C., of the U. S. D. A. Bureau of Agricultural Economics, will discuss American cotton in foreign markets. Another speaker will be Burris

Telling the Vacation Story



Keep a full record of your vacation tour, including information pictures as well as scenic and "fun" pictures. Use the camera for reminders such as this—it's quicker than a notebook, and much better.

THIS is the season for vacation tours, and every such tour includes many pictures, both of your vacation group and of the scenes you visit.

These tour pictures should tell a complete story of your vacation trip. They should outline the route, show the type of road and country, overnight stops, the points of interest and historical spots you visited. Often some of these pictures are neglected, and in consequence the tour story seems incomplete.

One of the important points in making a tour record complete is to picture the historical markers, signs, place names, road markers, and similar "identification points" you pass. These pictures, placed in your vacation album in proper sequence with the other pictures, provide valuable information for the friends who see your album, and help keep your own memory fresh.

The camera is especially useful for preserving long historical inscriptions. It is much quicker than using a notebook, and pictures of unusual markers (such as the one above) are far superior to a mere notebook text.

On this year's vacation tour, try to keep a comprehensive picture story. Remember that if you miss a picture your record may not be complete. A half-made record is better than none, but a full one, that really tells the vacation story, provides for memories that are far richer and more satisfying.

Food will have its place on the program from both the production and the nutrition angles. On production are listed fruits, dairy

products and poultry, which will be a joint program with the men.

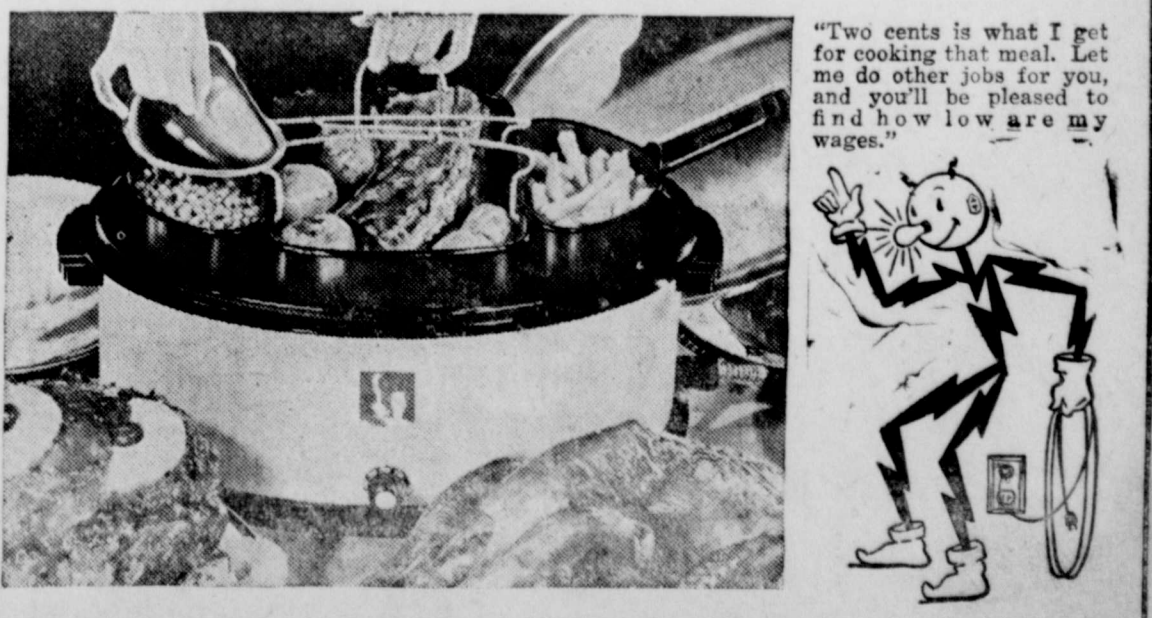

New Light Fuses Non-Tamperable

Fires caused by "doctoring" fuses—either by the familiar method of putting pennies behind them or by other means—are expected to be eliminated by a new kind of non-tamperable fuse which manufacturers have made available recently.

These new devices, known as fustats, are built in such a way that pennies will not fit behind them, and they cannot easily be bridged in any other way. Fire Chiefs and electrical inspectors have been enthusiastic about the new development because of the simple manner in which it ends the danger of fuse tampering.

"Electricity always has been the safest of all sources of power and light for the home," one electrical expert explained; "and the development of this new kind of fuse will make it almost perfect. As long as fuses are used properly, they will always blow

out and cut off the current as soon as a short circuit or any other kind of trouble takes place and thus prevent damage to the wiring or to expensive appliances. Fustats will provide sure protection that simply can't be misused."

State-Wide Fire Insurance Rate .. Cut On June 15

Statewide reductions in rate schedules on fire insurance which became effective June 15 were announced this week by Fire Insurance Commissioner Marvin Hall. The commissioner estimated they would average 10 per cent on most rates.

The ordered reductions included rates on dwellings, merchantile buildings, stocks of merchandise, farm property, garages, pub-

lic buildings and churches.

Reductions heretofore announced together with the new reduction will cut total payments by about \$4,000,000, he estimated. He pointed out that despite widespread construction the last two years, there has been no increase in the amount of insurance collected, indicating that the new construction was covered by the amount of the reductions.

In addition to the fire insurance reduction, a new rate schedule makes windstorm or tornado insurance on dwellings in the seacoast 10 per cent or more lower.

Fire insurance rates are based and the reductions were made possible by decrease in fire losses, Hall pointed out.

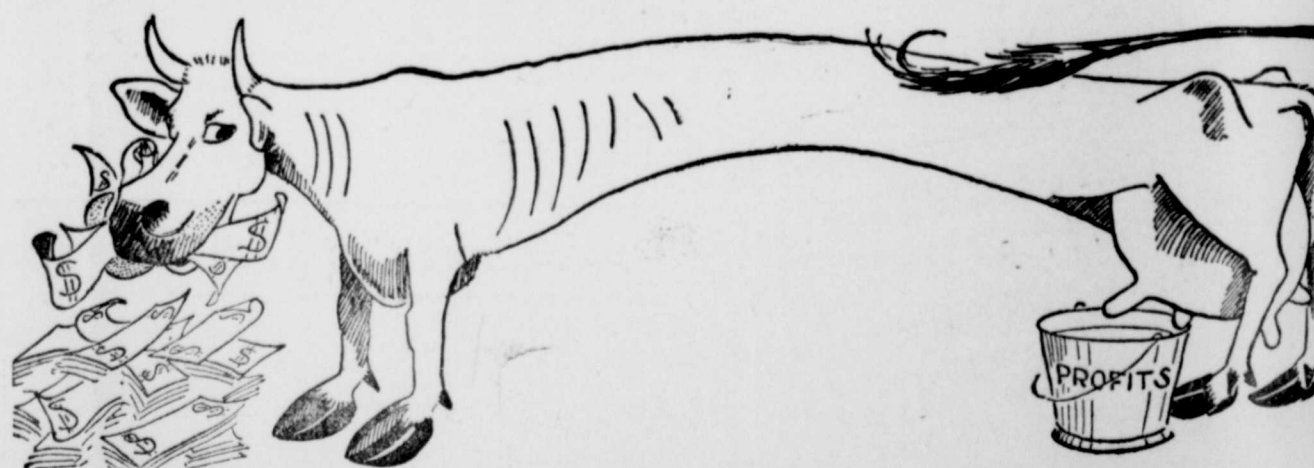

Caution Is Urged For 4th of July

Austin, Texas, June 28th — It would be a glorious Fourth of July if no accidents occurred to mar the joy of celebrating our one hundred and sixty-second anniversary of independence, declared Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. It is most unfortunate that a day of joy and celebration leaves in its wake one of sadness and sorrow in many homes.

It is not alone the wounds received from explosives that increase our death toll. Injuries from automobile accidents, and splinters, nails, and other penetrating wounds in which dirt may be carried into the skin, heighten the hazards of tetanus, or lockjaw as the disease is commonly called.

Tetanus is fatal in a large proportion of cases. Fortunately we have tetanus antitoxin as a means of preventing the disease. Antitoxin must be administered promptly following the accident.

Treatment after the disease develops is rarely successful. Preventive measures include: the avoidance of such wounds and proper medical treatment.

State Health Dept. Advises Precaution Against Typhoid

No matter how busy you are just now planning your vacation, looking up road maps, camping sites and equipment stored since last summer, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, advises all Texans to add one extra item to their list of things to be done before vacation starts.

The advice: "If you have not been vaccinated against typhoid fever within the last year or two, go to your family physician and have him give you the three 'shots' that will protect you against the disease. It takes several weeks for the protective treatment to establish itself thru the system, so it is an undue risk to wait until just before starting your vacation to attend to typhoid vaccination. Begin the treatment without further delay," Dr. Cox admonished.

"Typhoid fever is much less of a menace than it was a number of years ago. But it still is the cause of much unnecessary sickness. Typhoid fever is contracted through the mouth. You either eat or drink the germs. Typhoid

is transmittable through the use of water, milk or other foods that are contaminated by typhoid germs passed on by someone ill with the disease or someone who has had the disease.

"Vigilant protection of public and private water supplies from pollution, pasteurization of milk, protection of food supplies from contamination and such sanitary precautions have reduced greatly the incidence of typhoid fever in Texas.

"But there are certain other sources of danger that cannot be reached by public precautionary measures. Certain persons who have had typhoid fever continue to pass the germs that cause the disease long after they have recovered from the illness—these persons are called typhoid 'carriers.' When they are careless in their personal habits they are likely to leave typhoid germs on any food they touch. In recent years some of the more serious outbreaks of typhoid over the state have been due to careless carriers.

"There are other sources of typhoid: a stream or spring along the highway may be clear and sparkling but that is no guarantee the water is free from contamination. Milk may be a source of danger. If unsure of the safety of your milk or water supply, it is a good health practice to always boil them before using. The Texas State Department of Health can warn you against the sources of infection—but vaccination is the only sure way against contraction.

American Farm Exports Gain and Imports Failing

The United States is now exporting over 300 times as much corn and over 8,000 times as much wheat as it is importing, according to figures just received from Washington by W. E. Morgan, economist of the Extension Service of Texas A. and M. College.

In April alone corn exports were more than 20 million bushels. Imports of corn during the same month were 55,000 bushels. April wheat exports were above 8 million bushels while 1,000 bushels were imported. Wheat exports from July 1, 1937 to April 30, 1938, were in excess of 76 million bushels and imports during the same period were 696,000 bushels, Morgan said.

Only 529,000 bushels of corn were imported during the six month period prior to April 30, 1938, while almost 65 million bushels were exported. Corn exports for this period were higher than those for any year since 1923.

"We normally export and im-

port very little corn," Morgan pointed out, "for corn is usually exported in the form of pork. From July 1, 1937, to April 30, 1938, we exported more than 214 million pounds of pork, including lard. Imports during the same period were less than 56 million pounds.

"As hog production expands in this country after the effects of the two droughts, exports of pork can be expected to increase and imports to decrease."

The United States resumed its normal position as an exporter of wheat and increased exports of corn above normal because Argentine farmers had only half a crop.

Pay Increase Of \$5 Per Month For W. P. A. Workers

Half Million Laborers In Thirteen States Will Be Benefited

The Works Progress Administration ordered pay increase averaging about \$5 a month for all WPA workers in 13 States mainly in the South.

The WPA estimated that 500,000 of the lowest wage brackets would benefit.

Making the announcement, Administrator Harry L. Hopkins said:

"The new minimum wage rates created for these half-million workers receiving the lowest monthly security wages, while still inadequate in my judgment, give these people something nearer to an income which will assure a minimum standard of living."

The increase was ordered at the direction of President Roosevelt, the announcement said.

The States are North Carolina, South Carolina, Virginia, Kentucky, Florida, Arkansas, Tennessee, Mississippi, Texas and Oklahoma.

Hopkins said the new scale meant that no WPA worker would receive less than a dollar a day in any region.
