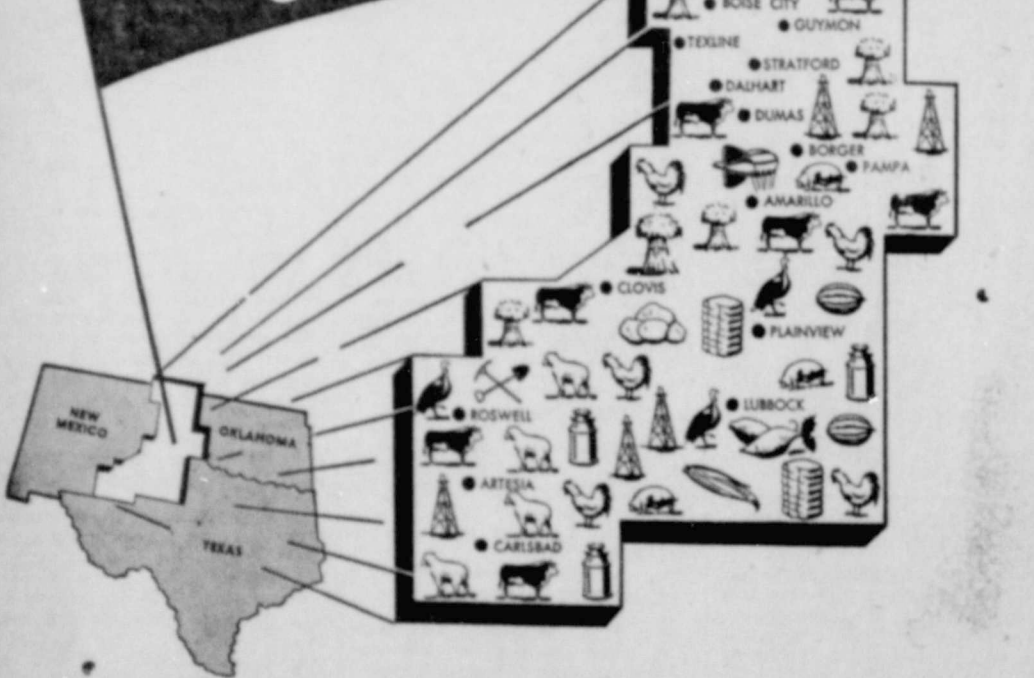

Moderately Thin Syrup for Canning

The rule of four to one -- at least four quarts of canned fruit for each pound of sugar used -- will be followed again this year by thrifty home canners interested in putting up the most fruit on limited sugar supplies, says Gwendolyn Jones, specialist in food preservation for the Texas A. and M. College Extension service, as reported by Edith L. Wilson, Floyd county Home Demonstration agent.

Figuring by the jar, the rule provides an average of 1/4 cup of sugar to each quart jar and makes a moderately thin syrup.

By using some light-colored corn syrup or mild-flavored honey, sugar may be stretched even farther. Proportions suggested are: two cups fruit juice or water to one cup sugar, or 2/3 cup sugar and 1/3 cup corn syrup, or 1/2 cup sugar and 1/2 cup honey. Boil the ingredients together five minutes and skim off any scum. Then the syrup is ready to combine with the fruit.

Allan Shivers Is People's Favorite

Senator Allan Shivers, in thanking the voters of Texas for the heavy lead they gave him in the



July primary to make him the favorite candidate for lieutenant governor, also warned citizens that attempts will be made by "scheming minority pressure groups" to defeat him in the August 24 runoff.

The Jefferson County legislator, lawyer and farmer, pointed with pride to the overwhelming support which he received in his present home county and in the county where he was reared to manhood, Shivers, a World War II combat war veteran (the only veteran in this race), polled approximately 75 per cent of the votes in Jefferson County, his present home, and was a 25 to 1 favorite over his runoff opponent in Tyler County, where he spent his youth. Senator Shivers led his runoff opponent by approximately 100,000 votes in Texas.

"I am deeply grateful for the confidence the people of Texas have shown in me and the progressive program for Texas which I advocate," Shivers said "I shall strive even harder to work for the welfare of Texas."

"Because I represent the masses of the people, there will be those in the runoff campaign who will conspire to defeat me," Shivers predicted. "I will not be swayed by these radical, minority groups--the C.I.O. newsmakers in particular. My opponent is welcome to the support which they are giving him. I will continue to fight for the right and welfare and progress of our people who make up the backbone of Texas."

SHERIFF HOWARD ASKS SUPPORT

Owing to the duties of my office and the short time left I regret that it is impossible for me to see all of the voters in the county before the run-off primary election on the 24th, hence I take this means of soliciting your support and influence, and in support of my claims for your consideration I wish to state:

Clothes, Garden Ideas for Women

(by Edith L. Wilson, Home Demonstration agent)

Longer skirts are characterizing new clothes. For after-dark-wear, hem lines are down at the mid-calf, according to stylist. But sleeves probably are the first indicator of the age of a dress, according to Mary Routh, clothing specialist for the A. and M. College Extension service. She says three types are especially good this season: The full bishop sleeve, the pushed-up sleeve, and the straight "bracelet" length. Rounded shoulders are one of the year's most significant fashions. Then there's a tendency toward smaller waistlines. And along with that the decorative belt is popular again. In fact, a belt that makes the costume is the season's most important accessory. You can choose one that's wide, narrow, straight, curved, glittering or plain. In a good many instances you'll find belts used to join a blouse and a skirt.

If your cedar trees are infested with bagworms they may be treated by spraying with three tablespoonsful of lead arsenate in one gallon of water. On small trees where spraying is not practical removing bags by hand is suggested. These may then be destroyed by burning.

Here are some fall garden tips: In August and September, plant only the vegetables that will stand heat. These are onion sets, mustard, turnips, green beans, Irish potatoes, squash, radish and cabbage. Leave space for later plantings of cool season vegetables such as spinach, beets, carrots, and lettuce.

Conservation District News

The arrival this week of terracing contractors as well as the use of county equipment has enabled several cooperators to construct their terrace systems. Construction work is now being done in the Allmon and McCoy Conservation groups. With the assistance of technicians of the Soil Conservation service a terrace system was laid out and construction completed on the W. B. Edwards farm operated by Wilson Edwards, both cooperators of the Allmon Conservation group. These terraces were constructed on the southwest part of the farm on land which Edwards cannot irrigate from his well. The system was planned as a measure to check erosion and get a better distribution of water as well as holding the water on the land as nearly where it falls as possible.

Terraces were completed this week on the John R. Shipley farm in the McCoy Conservation group. Shipley recently became a cooperator of the district. Construction of terraces was also completed on the L. A. Pate farm, a cooperator of the same group.

Alfred B. Clark of the Starkey Conservation group and D. D. Mahon of Lubbock became district cooperators this week. Their plan calls for the terracing of the one-half section of land located in the McCoy Conservation group. Construction of the terraces has started and should be completed this week.

C. H. Wise, who recently became a district cooperator, has planned a terrace system on his farm in the Fairview Conservation group. Wise with the assistance of technicians of the Soil Conservation service, has planned a system of terraces which is partly a syrup pan system. This syrup pan system is on the lower part of the farm which catches runoff water from adjoining land. This land which is more level than the other part of the farm will have terraces which will carry the excess water from one side of the farm to the other and back again. Alternate ends of the terraces will be open allowing excess water to overflow to the next terrace. Wise plans to seed the outlets with crested wheat and buffalo grass to check erosion. Lines for these terraces have been run and construction should start in a few days.

Floyd Moore, a cooperator of the South Lockney Conservation group, is preparing 60 acres of land for planting of improved pasture. Lines have been run for the irrigation system on this land.

John Belt, Jr., a cooperator of the Erick Conservation group and O. C. Bailey, a cooperator of the South Lockney Conservation group, have each made conservation plans with the district on land not included in their original agreement. This will enable them to receive assistance from the District when needed on these farms which are separate from their home farms.

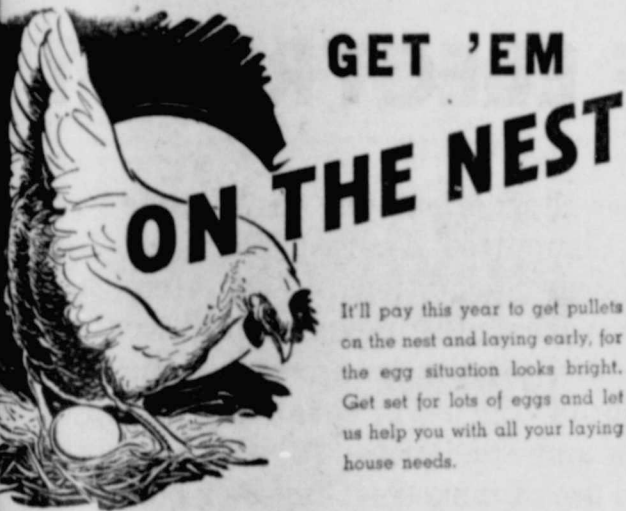

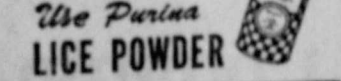

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; and providing for the proclamation of the election and the publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as 7-a and to read as follows: "Section 7-a. Subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and

direction, all net revenues remaining after payment of all refunds allowed by law and expenses of collecting derived from motor vehicle registration fees, and all taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, on motor fuels and lubricants used to propel motor vehicles over public roadways, shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way, constructing, maintaining, and policing roadways, and for the administration of such laws as may be prescribed by the legislature pertaining to the supervision of traffic and safety on such roads; and for the payment of the principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible prior to January 2, 1945, for payment out of the County and Road District Highway Fund under existing law; provided, however, that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; and, provided, however, that the net revenue derived by counties from motor vehicle registration fees shall never be less than the maximum amounts allowed to be retained by each County and the percentage allowed to be retained by each County under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945. Nothing contained herein shall be construed as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

Sec. 2 The foregoing Amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held in November, 1946, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way for and the constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way for and construction and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of

laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945;

and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose.

"Each voter shall strike out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting FOR or AGAINST said proposed amendment."

Sec. 3 The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

SUGGESTIONS TO HOME OWNERS AND OCCUPANTS ON PROPER USE OF ELECTRICITY

Fires that have their origin due to "Unsafe Practices And Abuse Committed Against Electricity" are caused by the following conditions: (1) defective, or faulty and inferior wiring; (2) inexperienced workmen posing as electricians; (3) the failure to use materials suitable for the job; (4) the use of cheap and unapproved electrical cords and appliances; (5) the tampering with fuses and the use of makeshift fuses or pennies as fuses; (6) the failure to keep electrical equipment in good order; (7) the habit of tampering with appliances or other electrical equipment, and (8) overloading.

Principles of Safe Practice

There are five (5) fundamental principles for the safe use of electricity in the home, when followed, will go far in eliminating shock and fire hazards. They are:

1. Use materials suitable for the job.
2. Keep electrical equipment in good order.
3. Do not tamper with appliances or other electrical equipment.
4. Avoid handling electrical cords and devices with wet hands.
5. Do not use electrical equipment adjacent to water or in damp places unless special precautions have been taken.

Watch These In Particular Now

Be Especially Careful in Using devices adjacent to water;

Prevent flexible cords from touching Radiators;

Use a Special Grounding Wire to Connect the frame of a Washing Machine to a Water Pipe;

Pay Special Attention to the Condition of Electrical Toys, particularly their cords.

GI Gets Added Benefits Under Insurance Law

Insurance benefits to veterans were materially extended when the President signed a liberalized GI insurance bill last Friday, Robert W. Sisson, Lubbock Veterans administration regional manager, said today.

Discussing the amendments to the National Service Life Insurance act which became law yesterday, Sisson said GI insurance benefits are now

in line with those of commercial insurance companies at a great saving to the veteran.

"As originally enacted, National Service Life Insurance was designed to meet the needs of men and women at war," Sisson explained. "The new amendments provide for liberalization to make it more attractive in peace time."

Principal changes in the amended act include:

1. Lump sum payments to beneficiaries if desired.
2. Total disability protection upon payment of slight additional premium.
3. Entitlement of all persons who served in the armed forces between October 8, 1940, and September 2, 1945, to apply for National Service policies or to increase the amount of policies already in force.
4. More endowment types of policies offered.

5. Removal of many restrictions in the naming of beneficiaries.

"Holders of about six million NSL policies now in force are eligible for the many new benefits provided by these amendments," Sisson pointed out.

"In addition, those veterans who formerly held some ten million policies that have lapsed may still be entitled to reinstate them and take advantage of the low cost protection provided for their families by GI insurance."

MORTGAGE CONTRACTS

Discussing financial security for farmers, Norman J. Wall, specialist in agricultural finance, writes in Land Policy Review:

"Of first importance to farmers with heavy burdens of debt will be the reduction of these obligations to manageable shape. Fortunately farmers during World War II generally have followed a sound policy of reducing their debts which is in sharp contrast with the increase of debts during World War I.

"Farm mortgage indebtedness increased from about 5 billion dollars at the beginning of 1915 to 8 1/2 billions in 1920. In a similar 5-year period during World War II farm mortgage debt decreased from 6 1/2 billion dollars to slightly more than 5 billions between 1940 and 1945. Short-term indebtedness, which more than doubled in the 4-year period of World War I, remained relatively stable during the comparable period of World War II. However, as compared with 1920, we are now in a period when forces for building up debt are still active."

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 49-b, creating a Veteran's Land Board and establishing a Veteran's Land Fund; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section I. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 49-b which shall read as follows:

"Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veteran's Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Legislature shall provide by law for the issuance by said Board of not to exceed Twenty-five million Dollars (\$25,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veteran's Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as shall be prescribed by law, provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum.

"In the sale of any such bonds a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various teacher retirement funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent Free School Funds; such bonds to be issued only as needed, in the opinion of the Veteran's Land Board under legislative authorization.

"The Veteran's Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in this State (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm, or corporation.

"All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of the Veteran's Land Fund.

"The lands of the Veteran's Land Fund shall be sold by the State to Texas Veterans of the present war or wars, commonly known as World War II, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and such rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as may be prescribed by law; provided, however, that any such lands remaining unsold after the expiration of eight years after the effective date of this Amendment may be sold to anyone as shall be prescribed by law.

"All moneys received and which have been received and which have not been used for repurchase of land as provided herein by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of lands and for interest on deferred payments shall be credited to the Veteran's Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II in like manner as shall be provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sales of the bonds, provided for herein, for a period of eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on the bonds herein provided for shall be set aside for that purpose. After eight (8) years

Everything has come with a rush lately. I helped Wilson fix up his office at Rails where he has begun the practice of medicine. The peas had to be canned. Diabetes Taking Toll Despite Modern Medicine

Diabetes, Texas—Despite the fact that modern medicine can do much to help the diabetic live out a normal span, nevertheless diabetes has taken the toll of several hundred lives during the past year, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Of the communicable diseases, typhoid fever, malaria, diphtheria and smallpox are annually decreasing in number, but diabetes is a tragic number of deaths each year, especially in the aged group, Dr. Cox said.

In recent years diabetes was considered a major health problem,

but it became accepted as such in direct ratio to the development of medical laboratory procedures, which made the disease more easily diagnosed.

Dr. Cox said that diabetes is generally recognized as a class disease. It seems to attack the white collar class of indoor men and women much more frequently than it does the outdoor person whose work is more vigorous and calls for more exercise. Whatever the actual cause of the disease may be, vocational and economic conditions are factors, since it seems a fact that those who do not indulge in luxurious living and whose occupation calls for manual labor are not frequently affected.

Dr. Cox stated that simple, wholesome diets, sufficient exercise and sleep are factors in the prevention of diabetes, and an annual physical examination, especially in middle aged persons, is important so that if the disease is present, competent treatment can be instituted while the disease is in its early stage.

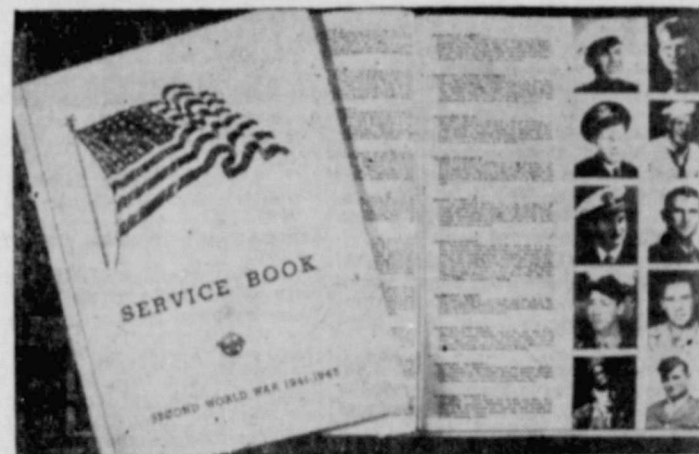

QUICK TEST FOR QUININE

In control of malaria, quinine from the Cinchona tree remains a standard medicine. Cinchona growing is now staging a comeback as a crop in several Latin-American nations and plant breeders and growers are interested in developing and growing trees whose bark supplies a high percentage of quinine. Seedling trees vary widely, and it would be a help in either breeding or planting to be able to know while a tree is young whether it can qualify as a heavy producer of quinine.

Working at the Federal Experiment Station in Puerto Rico, Arnaud J. Loustalot and Caleb Pagan have devised a test for quinine that takes only a fraction of the time needed for other tests, making it practical to test large groups of seedlings and to discard any with a low yield of quinine. The new test depends on use of the laboratory device known as the spectrophotometer and calls for only a 2-gram sample of bark instead of the 10 to 20 gram samples required in older tests. This makes practical the testing of young plants that would be killed by removal of the larger sample. The new test, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture, has proved almost as accurate as the older and slower test and can be used commercially in assaying the quinine content of Cinchona bark.
