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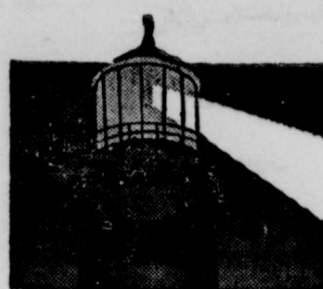
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On The BEAM

Voters of Texas will have before them on November 9, four amendments to the Texas State Constitution on which they are asked to vote yes or no. This week The News is running the ball on the ballot. Only the preamble is run but you will know and can determine from that the way you want to vote on it.

No. 3 on the ballot: PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO Article XVI, Section 62 of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto a new subsection authorizing all political subdivisions of Jefferson County, Texas, to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for all appointive officers and employees of all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation and publication.

Mr. Fisher suggested that people who have impairments that keep them from working should check with their social security office within four months from the date they had to stop working. This will help speed up any claim for benefits and mean a prompt payment of the first check. He stressed that under no circumstances should a disabled person wait more than 18 months before inquiring. "There is a six month waiting period before benefits can be paid. But back benefits can be paid for only 12 months. So, after 18 months, people will be losing money," Mr. Fisher said.

Kirk L. Taylor, President First State Bank, Loraine Dies In Dallas Tuesday



Kirk L. Taylor, president of the First State Bank of Loraine since 1949, died Tuesday about 3 p.m. in Baylor Hospital in Dallas of leukemia.

Mr. Taylor had been ill for several weeks and the past month had spent most of the time in the Dallas hospital.

Funeral services will be conducted at the First Methodist Church at 2:30 p.m. Tuesday. The pastor will be Rev. Frank Story officiating. Masons will have charge of graveside rites.

Rev. Story will be assisted in the service by Rev. Murrell Abbott of Clyde, former pastor, and Rev. H. W. Bartlett, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Colorado City.

Born in Ellis County, Texas, Nov. 18, 1898, Mr. Taylor came to Loraine in 1912 and has made his home here since. He married Mattie Thompson here, Jan. 3, 1923. He began working in the First State Bank here in 1928 as a bookkeeper. Later he was promoted to assistant cashier, then vice president and cashier before assuming the presidency in 1949.

Prominent in civic and church affairs Mr. Taylor was a former city councilman, member of the Lions Club, member of the First Methodist Church where he was a member of the Official Board and treasurer of the church for many years. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge where he had also served as treasurer, Worshipful Master and other capacities. He was also a 32nd degree Mason, a member of the Scottish Rite Bodies in Dallas.

Survivors are his wife and two brothers, L. J. Taylor of Colorado City and Douglas Taylor of Cherry Hill, New Jersey.

RED CROSS GETS MONEY FROM UNITED FUND

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Mitchell County Farm Bureau Convention Held October 24

The annual convention for the Mitchell County Farm Bureau was held in the medallion room at Lane Wolf Electric Cooperative on Thursday night, October 24. A covered dish supper was provided by the ladies.

Entertainment was provided by The Four Silver Strings from Colorado City and Loraine.

In the business meeting the following resolutions of local, state and national interest were passed to be sent to the Farm Bureau State meeting in Fort Worth November 10-13:

1. We recommend that present skip-row planting be continued as now is.

2. We recommend that the present feed grain program be continued.

3. We recommend that a more concentrated effort be made by research and development to find answers to the insect and insecticide problems.

4. We recommend that surplus foods and fibers be sold abroad for cash payment.

5. We are in favor of continued price support on cotton, not to fall below 75% of parity.

6. We recommend that the state be divided into five geographical areas and that a representative be appointed or elected from each area to the state ASCS committee.

7. We recommend that the law be enforced to require school age children to attend school a minimum of 165 days a year.

8. We request that the present restriction on leaving cotton burs on the top of the soil until March 20, be removed so a farmer can apply burs, obtain subsidy, and turn them under as soon as practical for his operation.

Bruce Byrne, Charles Holman, Murrell Blasingame, Lindley Webb, and H. C. Lindsey were re-elected directors for two years. Rex McKenney was elected as a new director for a two year term.

TAX MAN SAM SEZ:

A lot of taxpayers claim too many dependents on their Form W-4. Some folks even deliberately misrepresent the number of dependents to cut down the amount of withholding. The instructions on the back of the Form W-4 point out the penalties for claiming too many dependents. If both the husband and wife are working make sure that you don't claim some of your dependents twice. You can claim too few, and pay too much tax to the government to make sure that you will have a refund coming at the end of the year, but you can't claim too many without risking serious trouble.

HERMLEIGH BOY IN EXERCISE BIG LIFT

With Exercise Big Lift Forces in Europe-Airmen Third Class Jackie M. Calvert of Hermleigh, Texas, is participating in Exercise Big Lift, the joint Department of Defense demonstration of U. S. capability for rapid massive reinforcement of NATO forces in Europe.

Airman Calvert, an Air Force autopilot repairman, is a member of a Composite Air Strike Force of 116 Tactical Air Command aircraft deployed to France and Germany. Combat air and ground forces for the exercise are being provided as elements of the U. S. Strike Command.

Big Lift also involves the largest transoceanic airlift in history with the Military Air Transport Service, assisted by Strategic Air Command and U. S. Navy elements moving 15,000 troops of the 2nd Armored Division to West Germany in a 72-hour period.

Farm Facts

Experiments at Pennsylvania State University reveal it is possible to change a cow's milk fat percentage and fat composition. Researchers there now are trying to learn whether milk composition can be influenced in any particular direction.

Success, says Dr. Robert D. McCarthy of Penn State, could mean cows could produce milk for ice cream, cheese, or specific diets. He and his associates are experimenting with control of bacteria in the rumen, key to development of tailor-made milk.

"The rumen, one of four stomachs, is a versatile fermentation vat where bacteria are influenced by the type of feed a cow eats," Dr. McCarthy explains.

"When you change food materials, sometimes you favor one bacteria over the other. The change in feed may strengthen certain bacteria and weaken others."

This changes the products of fermentation, likewise changing the material available for milk production. Such chemical changes in nutrients will influence composition of the milk.

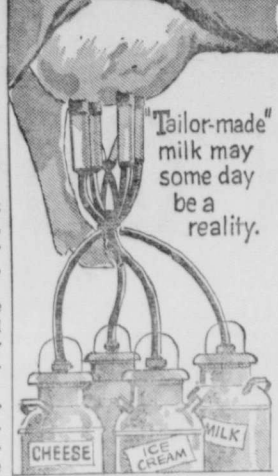

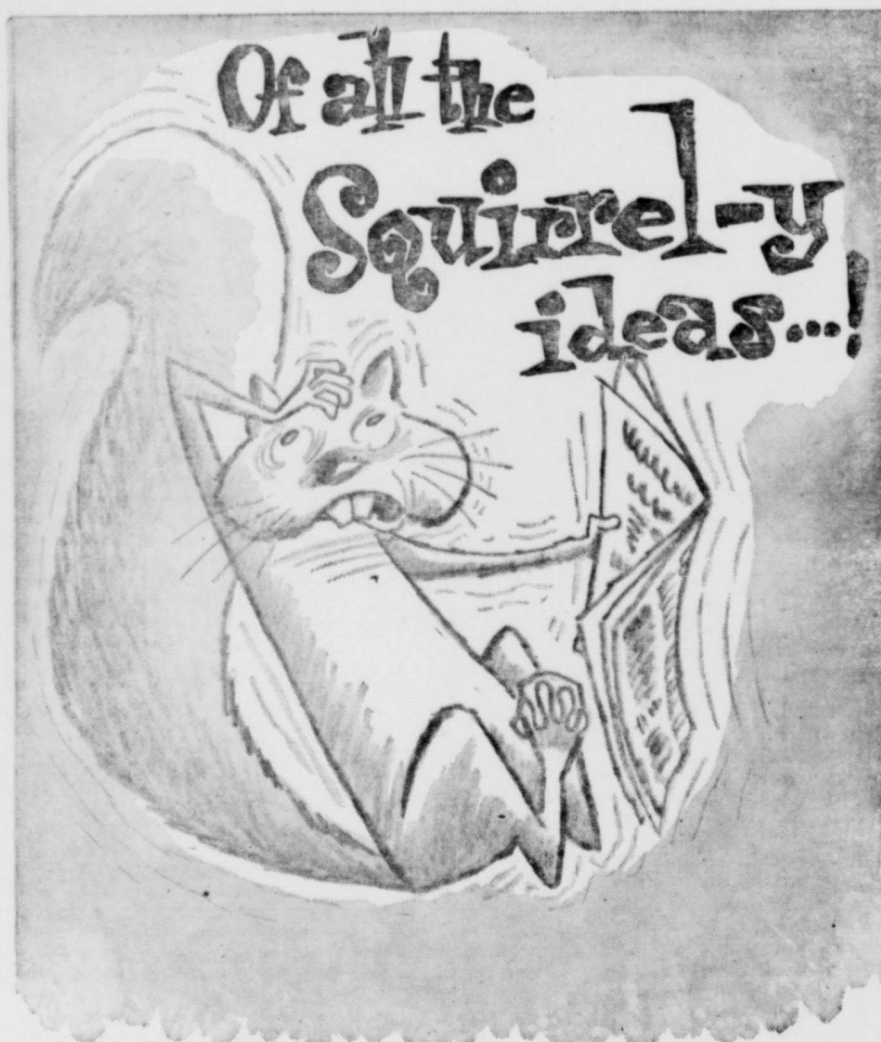
REVIVAL CLOSURE

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. Are veterans of World War I
entitled to a pension? If they are,
is there a required age and do
they have to be retired?

A. A pension may be payable to
a wartime veteran, regardless of
age, if he is totally and permanently
disabled not as a result of his
military service. The veteran
must be unable to pursue a gainful
occupation by reason of such
disability and his income from all
sources must be under certain
statutory limits. Details to fit an
individual case are available at
any VA office.

Q. I have been told that anyone
entitled to use the word "G.I." is
entitled to veterans' benefits. Is
this right and what does "G.I."
mean?

A. The term "G.I." might be de-
fined as "government issue" and
referred to varied supplies, equip-
ment, clothing, etc., issued to in-
dividuals or units in the service.
In time it became a slang term
referring to the servicemen them-
selves. It has no standing as an
entitlement to Federal benefits.

Q. Why are widows of World
War II or of Korean Conflict ve-
terans to get pensions
from the Government on the same
grounds that World War I widows

are? What is no longer true. Since
July 1, 1958, widows of World
War II or of Korean Conflict
veterans have been eligible to re-
ceive pensions on the same basis
as World War I widows. In brief,
a deceased husband had to have
at least 90 days of service of
which part was during wartime,
he had been discharged under
conditions other than dishonor-
able and the widow's annual in-
come is within statutory limits.
Individual details may be receiv-
ed at any VA office.

Obligation can also be recog-
nized by facing the question
"What am I?" Oh yes, we like to
think of ourselves in a very com-
mendable manner. We are some-
what like the minister asking the
church to call him. After a service
giving all his virtues, a leader
was heard to say to another, "He
shore does recommend himself
most highly." Often we expect be-
cause of the high opinion we have
of self and fail to remember that
"Pride goeth before a fall".

How are we using this word?

Are we expecting because of
humility, need, and faith in others
to respond? Are we expecting be-
cause a fatal ego that demands?

1964 FEED GRAIN PROGRAM CROP SUPPORTS AT 1963 LEVELS

Price support for corn, grain sorghum, and barley in 1964 will again be made available through both loans and support payments. Curtis E. Latimer, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, pointed out today. Growers will qualify for the supports by participating in the 1964 feed grain program, for which sign-up period is planned for early next year.

The total national average price support levels for the three feed grains in 1964 will be the same as in 1963, the Chairman explained, but a slightly larger proportion of the support will be made available through loans. As last year, the loan rate will vary according to counties. The support payment for each of the three grains, however, will be the same amount per bushel in all counties.

For the feed grains covered by the program, the loan rate, support payment, and total national average support are, respectively: Corn (per bu.), \$1.10, 15 cents, \$1.25; barley (per bu.), 84 cents, 12 cents, 96 cents; grain sorghum (per cwt.), \$1.77, 23 cents, \$2.

Besides qualifying for price support loans and support payments, the grower who participates in the 1964 feed grain program will earn a diversion payment on the acreage he shifts from feed grain production to a conserving use.

While the 1964 program is basically the same as the successful 1963 program, an important change increases the top limit on diversion from a farm's base acreage and also increases the rate of payment for maximum diversion. In 1964, any producer may divert as much as 50 percent of his feed grain base acreage (in 1963 it was 40 percent); the maximum acreage diversion will be acres if this is more than 50 percent of the base. Also in 1964, those producers who divert 40 percent or more of the feed grain base acreage will receive diversion payments at the maximum rate for all acres diverted.

"While all details of the 1964 feed grain program have not yet been announced," the Chairman said, "growers have questions about the 1964 program are encouraged to call at the ASCS county office, and our people will do their best to answer them."

Drought-A Growing Reality
Emergency drought relief measures-a familiar seasonal activity in the 1950's are once again underway for Texas in the fall of 1963.

After six years of relatively trouble-free crops, weatherwise, the spectre of drought looms across the land. In the remaining months of October, 88 Texas counties have been declared disaster relief areas and more are expected.

A paradox is evident from state weather map. Hardest drought-hit area to date is the normally wet Central and South Central Texas while the usually semi-arid Plains of West Texas is being plagued with unseasonable moisture which hampers harvest.

Fortunately, cash crops for this year are not yet too heavily hit. Most areas had good subsoil moisture and initial rains with which to get crops off to a good start. Cotton and grain sorghum in the drought area were, for the most part, able to coast through the season and were partially helped by the hot, dry weather which

made early harvest possible. Since the current drought "came in the back door" at mid-season, our most pressing immediate problem is our livestock. Without rain on the powder-dry pastures this fall, there will be no range feed for winter.

Supplemental feeding is very expensive. It is in this field where the most immediate help is needed. Some parts of the state-particularly in North Central Texas-have been without local hay for 60 days. Local hay generally costs from \$20 to \$30 per ton. Many stockmen report they now have to pay \$50 to \$60 per ton to have hay trucked into the area.

A side effect of the dry weather is already being felt in Central and South Texas by the dairy industry. Lack of feed has cut dairy production to such an extent that milk must be trucked into areas which normally produce about enough for local consumption.

A supplemental feed or hay program is expected to be proposed in the near future to counteract the initial phases of the drought.

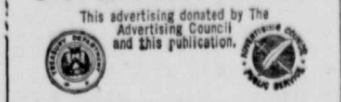

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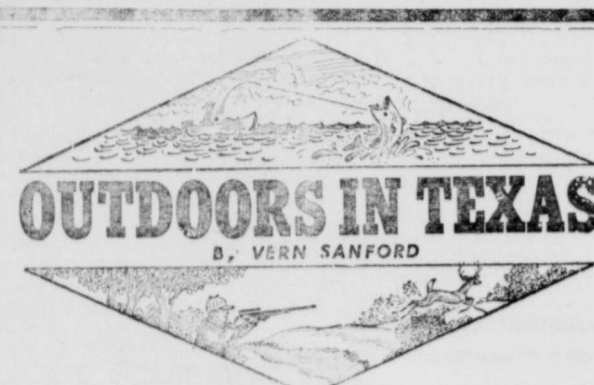


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OUTDOORS IN TEXAS

Most fishermen have old lures around which might well fit into a collection now being assembled in Dallas.

Jeff W. Moore, superintendent of the Dallas Aquarium, is developing a museum of old lures. He says that people who own some of these old timers send them to him.

Nearly everyone who has been to the State Fair of Texas has visited the Dallas Aquarium. If you haven't, you should. It is one of the finest in the United States. Operated by the Dallas Park Department, it is open (free of charge) to the general public year in and year out.

In this building Superintendent Moore hopes to establish a museum of old plugs. All plugs sent in will be properly identified and mounted. However, because of limited time and funds, it will be impossible for him to acknowledge receipt of the lures. But they will be placed on proper display.

If you have an old lure or a box full, this would be a good place to send them. Address your package to Jeff Moore, Superintendent, Dallas Aquarium, 963 Rustic Circle, Dallas 18, Texas.

Then put the aquarium on your "must-visit" list. It is open Mondays through Saturday from 8 to 5 and on Sundays and holidays from 12 noon until 6. Feeding time is 3 p.m. on Mondays and Thursdays.

This famous Aquarium was built in 1953-56 as a part of the Texas Centennial Celebration, which means it actually is a Texas heritage.

Displays are divided into three general classifications. In division 1 are fishes native to Texas waters. Here the water temperature is kept at a constant 68 throughout the year. This con-

stant temperature has helped 2,000 the fish in a better state of health and substantially has reduced diseases.

Division 2 consists of fishes from mountain lakes and streams. Refrigeration equipment maintains a constant temperature of 50. In this section will be found northern pike, five species of trout, blackfish from Alaska, muskies, walleyes and saugers.

In division 3, water is kept at 80 for the benefit of tropical fish from around the world.

Displayed are more than 3,500 individual fish of 200 species collected from Texas, New Mexico, Wyoming, Missouri, Tennessee, Arkansas and Iowa. Also on display are numerous species of turtles, salamanders, frogs, alligators and a pair of Harbor Seals.

In the Aquarium are two alligator gar fish which were caught near Dallas and placed in the museum on the day it was opened, June 6, 1956. Both are in good health, indicating something of the life span of this fish, which biologists say dates back to prehistoric times.

Water for the aquarium is supplied from a nearby well. Its flow is a crystal clear 68 throughout the year. This assures ample fresh water, with out minerals or pollutants that would be harmful to the fish.

By adding lures to their displays the aquarium will have another attraction appealing to the general public—but especially the anglers.

So, if you have a few real old lures send them in, whether you can identify them or not. There are old-timers around who can.
