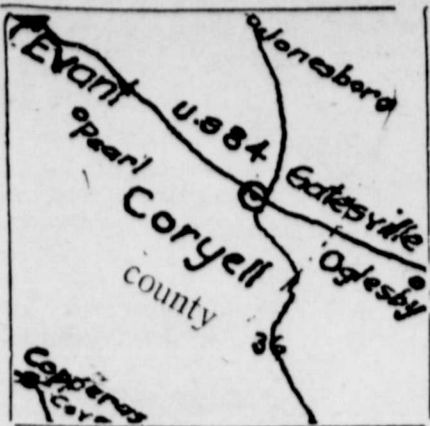




Four hours, Wednesday, we spent with "Insurance Specialists" here in Gatesville, and the discussion was "Fire Prevention", and what might happen, if more "fires were not prevented". The consensus, verdict, warning, etc., was the TOTAL CANCELLATION OF ALL FIRE INSURANCE IN GATESVILLE.

Why? Simply because ALL Insurance Companies, all of them together, are positively losing money insuring property in Gatesville (town only).

Pretty serious charge, and, no arson even intimated. Just bad wiring, building codes, plumbing codes, etc., and too many "fire runs", and, too late.

Including those who "got us told" yesterday were Virgil E. Hooks, Gulf Insurance Company, Dallas, R. U. Wright, New York Underwriters, Dallas, Buddy Nabors, Home Insurance Co., Houston, and Walter Plangman, a director of Texas Insurance Advisory Association of Austin.

Now, these men are in no sense of the word, what we consider just an "insurance agent". They are State Agents, or heads of insurance companies in Texas. They know what they're talking about.

During the '25, '26, and '27 storms in Florida, the insurance companies pulled out; cancelled all policies. Florida and Florida cities did something about it, and again, they operate there.

As for your pocketbook—the thing that affects you mostly. Mr. Gatesville sluffed of \$16,000.00 more insurance policies last year than should have been paid; simply because our fire record is so bad that we've got a 35% penalty. The companies had 190,000 insurance and the cost was \$170,000 or a net loss, the way they figure it, of \$75,000.00. And, commercial companies don't operate on that basis for long.

To bring it down to a U & I basis. Before our deficits started, first instance, you could get \$100 insurance with the 25% credit for \$75. Now, with the 35% deficit, it costs you \$1.15. Who's the loser? U & I, and speaking personally, mine's all out in February, and am I going to take a beating for the City's lack of codes, fire prevention, etc., etc.

(AP)—John Calhoun of Corsicana, newly elected State Democratic Chairman of Texas, told the Star-Telegram today he will call a meeting of the State Democratic Executive Committee and resign unless conferences in progress with high party leaders convince him he can "bring the Democratic forces of Texas together for national nominees".

Now, Lyndon Wants File A Suit: Still a Muddle

AUSTIN, Sept. 16. (AP)—Attorneys for Lyndon Johnson today asked the Texas Supreme Court for permission to file a suit for mandamus to force the Secretary of State Paul Brown to certify Johnson's name as the Democratic Nominee for United States Senator.

The high court must first grant permission for filing of mandamus suit before it can be presented to the court.

The action seeks to nullify the efforts of Coke Stevenson to prevent certification of Johnson's name for printing on the November General Election Ballot.

Earlier, Brown told the Fort Worth Star-Telegram that Johnson's name would be on the sample ballots that go Saturday to the official printers unless he is stopped by an official court order. He said so far, he has not been served officially with a restraining order.

Although the Atomic Age became a reality only a few years ago, the man who first elaborated the atomic theory of the elements as a result of physical experiments was born 182 years ago this week on September 7, 1766. He was John Dalton of Cumberland, England, where at the age of 12 he became a schoolmaster. At 20 he was an experimental scientist and at 35 author of one of the most important single generalizations in the history of theoretical and practical chemistry. Dalton studied gasses and their composition and from his study he drew the conclusion that the elements are made up of tiny particles called atoms and that chemical compounds of the elements are formed by the union of these atoms in simple numerical proportions. This is the Atomic Theory, the theory that has for years been the guiding principle of chemical study!
