Rebels Begin Season—One Win, Two Losses

The Rivercrest Rebels basketball teams, Varsity, Freshmen and Junior Varsity, kicked off their season against the Clarksville Tigers last week. The Rebel varsity lost their first game, 60-47, to the quick, tough Tigers. High scorers for the Rebs were Stan Wood, with a total of 16 points, John Hines with 11 points, and David Wisinger with 10. A lot of hustle was shown by the Rebels in the first half of the game, but they had a hard time connecting with their shots. James Strickland was taken out at the end of the

second quarter when he twisted an ankle. He reentered the game in the second half though. Strickland confused the opponents by some really spectacular ball stealing. Bubba Edge used his ability to out maneuver his opponent, and John Hines made a really good 25 foot jump shot to help the team. Bradley Moore brought the ball down the court for the Rivercrest gang, proving to be an excellent ball handler. Stan Wood suffered several falls during the game, but still contributed seven field goals, as well as two free throws.

A bit of half time humour was provided by Brian Harville and Alvin Rodgers, who competed against each other in a free throw contest. The prize for the contest was a pass to the rest of the season's ball games. After much "monkey shines," Brian Harville came out the victor in the contest. The junior varsity had a better evening than the varsity, coming out 49 to 42 against the JV Tigers. David Rozell contributed 18 points, Larry Denny 16, and Timmy Daniels seven, five of which were free throws. Denny pulled some tricky moves against Clarksville, racking up a good score. David Bell, with one second left on the clock in the first quarter, caught a pass from Denny, shot from the outside and brought the Rebels ahead 12 to 11. Time after time the Rebels made scoring look easy against the Tigers. David Rozell used his six foot three inches to take advantage of the inside

under the goal. Tim Daniels did a remarkable dribble of the ball while on the floor, until a referee called a foul on a Tiger. The game displayed considerable roughness and competitive spirit. The Rebel freshmen team were defeated by Clarksville, 54-33. They were unable to handle the Tigers, in spite of some good ball handling. Kelley Jeffery, shorter than most of the Tigers, still tore them up by shooting from around the free throw line. Jeffery led the scoring for the Rivercrest freshmen with 14 points, and Randy Galloway was close behind with 12. The team found themselves much outclassed in height, which made it difficult to stop the scoring by the Clarksville Tigers. Stanley Jessee and Shan Wilkins did well inside on rebounding the ball. The entire season shows promise of being exciting basketball.

Anyone Need A Good Used Fire Tower

If you're in the market for a slightly used, 100-foot metal lookout tower, the Texas Forest Service has a few for sale. According to Pat Ebarb, head of the Fire Control Department, these towers could have several recycled uses—other than scrap metal. They might make good, very high, deer stands, since each tower includes a 6-by-6-foot enclosed cab with windows on all sides. They also might be adapted for energy-producing wind generators, or control towers for private air strips, he said. Sealed bids, with the

required 10 percent deposit, will be accepted until December 1. Successful bidders must dismantle and remove the towers, foundations and all debris from the tower site within 45 days from the time of bid award. 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Bullock Says Tax Liens Have Been Filed

State Comptroller Bob Bullock has announced he has filed 12,443 tax liens against corporations in Texas who are delinquent in paying franchise taxes. The liens will prevent the corporations from selling assets until the delinquent taxes are paid and is one of the final legal steps necessary to revoke a company's corporate charter. The delinquent companies represent a small percentage of more than 243,000 corporations doing business

in Texas, he said. Corporate franchise tax receipts during the state's last fiscal year totaled \$340.8 million. The tax is levied at a rate of \$4.25 on each \$1,000 of stated capital, surplus and undivided profits of corporations doing business in Texas or \$4.25 on each \$1,000 of a company's real property. Bullock said the corporations being filed on for back taxes have been notified of the delinquency and told that the company's

right to do business in Texas has been forfeited. No estimate of the tax owed the state has been made, Bullock said, because the delinquent companies have not filed returns from which to make an assessment.

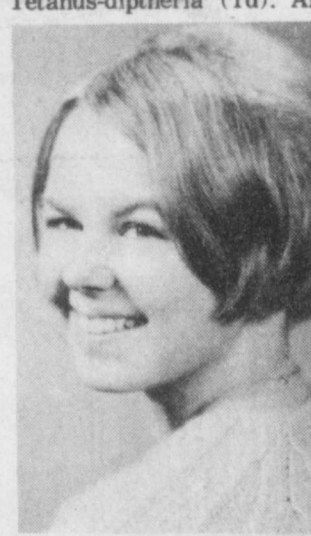

Survivors include her husband, George Cornelius, of the home; and one sister, Mrs. Mary Ervin Kennemer of Avinger.

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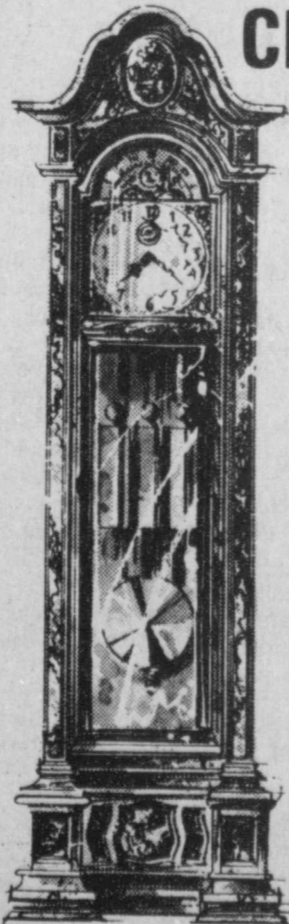

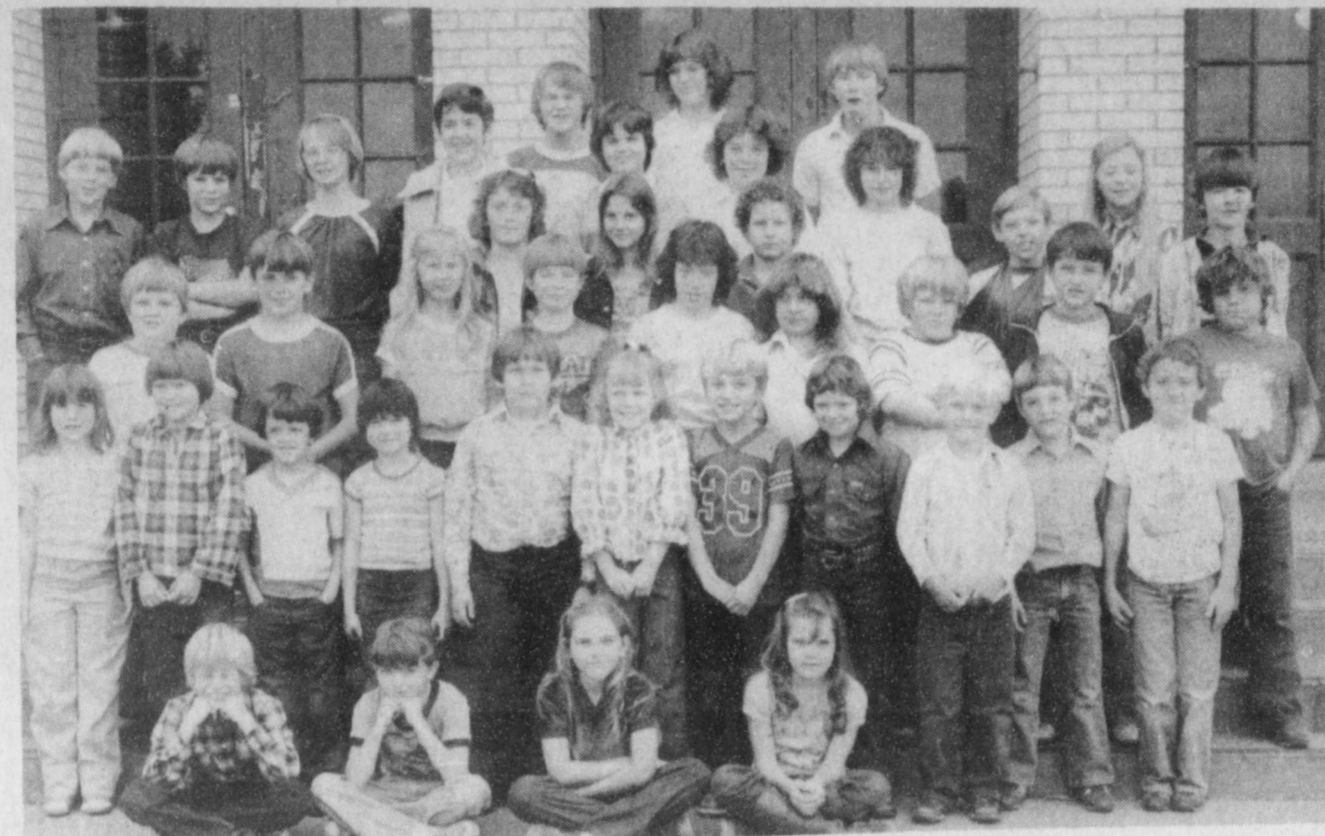

Those days were perfect in my mind, sometimes I wonder if they were as good as my memories make them. I do know the kids squabbled and fought and the more we fought and squabbled the tireder we became.

Holidays haven't changed too much, though, and that is one of the things that make them so very special.

Most people would say that fresh products are always higher in vitamin content than canned or frozen products, but this isn't always so, says foods and nutrition specialists with North Carolina Agriculture Extension Service.

If fresh vegetables aren't kept under the proper storage conditions they can lose some of their vitamins.

Vitamin C, for example, is one vitamin that is easily lost. Spinach stored at room temperature for two days loses 50 percent of its original vitamin C.

However, you can reduce the loss from 40 to 80 percent by lowering the temperature the spinach is stored at to 48 degrees F.

Humidity is also an important factor. Since vitamin C is water soluble, it will be lost as moisture is lost from the vegetable. When the humidity is low the vegetable will dry out faster, losing its vitamin C as it does.

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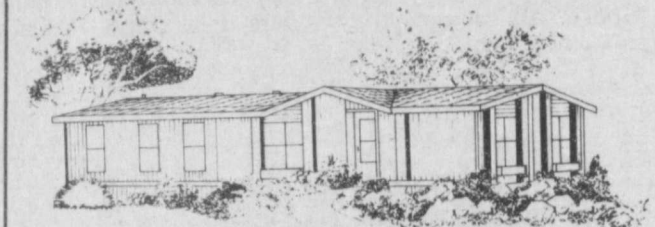
