spread with great rapidity.

Half of the block bounded by Annette,

Morale, Urquhart and Anthony streets,

comprising about fifteen small buildings,

was consumed.

The hydrants within four or five blocks

were frozen, hence it was impossible

to convey water to where it could be

used.

The women were employed in hauling

down buildings in the rear of the

fire. A number of persons were

seriously burned.

The loss is roughly estimated at about

\$50,000.
