Terracing Practices Payoff

Rains which inundated Mitchell County in recent days caused scattered damage to crops and fields across the county.

A survey by local Soil Conservation Service personnel indicated damage to terraced fields would have been much greater if farmers had not been maintaining terraces at an effective height, SCS Director Van Mills stated.

Mills reported the most severe damage was caused where creeks, such as Bone Hollow and Lone Wolf, flowed out of their banks due to heavy downpours.

Other damage resulted where dikes broke and where water flowed out of road ditches.

Terraces also held much better where the land had been listed, he said. This held the water in the lister furrows and kept it out of the terrace channels.

Chemicals had recently been applied on much of the land and this left a flat surface which proved conducive to runoff, he noted.

Most farmers had not had enough time to list their land following the recent rains, he said.

SCS technicians also noted where terraces had adequate outlets, such as waterways, See FLOOD Page 6

Charges Filed For Illegal Possession

Charges stemmed from an incident which allegedly occurred Thursday at 6:09 p.m., when Officer Jesse Dominguez stopped a 1973 Buick for an alleged speeding offense and discovered numerous items suspected of being a controlled substance.

City System Needs Sewerage Pumps

Colorado City Council will meet in special session Tuesday at 7 p.m. in city hall to consider requesting bids for three new pumps for the sewerage system.

The council will tour the sewer plant at 6 p.m., prior to going to city hall.

Water Superintendent Buzz Rich will address the council and explain the need for the new pumps.

According to Rich, the new pumps are a combined unit which will set up on the floor, where as the older pumps set in a "dry pit." The motor sets on the floor and a 14 foot drain shaft extends downward from the motor. The new pumps are hydromatic and self-priming. Rich estimated the cost to be about \$8,000 for the three units.

City Manager Brenda Tarter will also request permission to seek bids for a new 120 inch wheel base 1980 model police car to replace one older model.

A contract for a landfill site on property near the existing landfill will be considered.

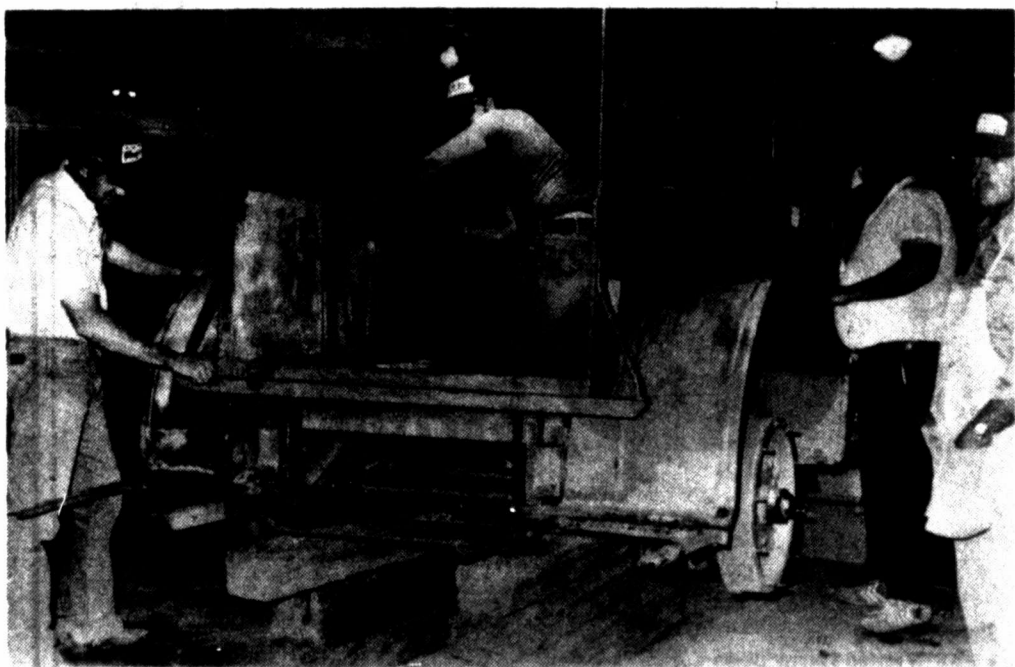
The airport zoning committee will report on the possibility of Ralph West and his wife living at the airport on a fulltime basis.

Also slated for consideration is the purchase of a piece of property adjoining the sewer plant.

The final public hearing, in a series of hearings, will be held during the meeting on use of Motel Occupancy Taxes. Any person or organization desiring the use of these funds, and who have not previously requested the funds, must appear at the meeting.

Mrs. Tarter indicated about \$15,000 is budgeted for the fund and requests have been made for only \$13,000.

Bids will be opened during the meeting for seal coating about 22,000 square yards of city streets on Seventh, Walnut and Eastover Streets.

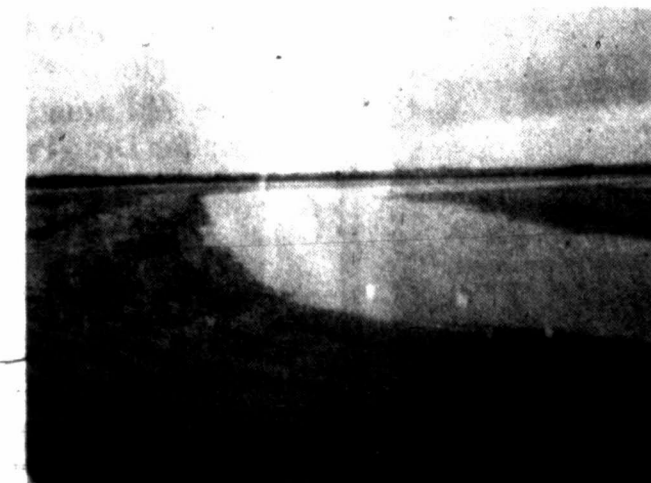
Spring Forward Today

under oath by a licensed engineer (who's going to pay him? If the funds are divided every year, that means new streets would require the certification of the engineer also?).

A "City Street Improvement Fund" is created which would receive its funds from the Omnibus Tax Clearance Fund. \$75 million would be deposited in the City Street Clearance Fund the first year.

"Under the provisions of this act, no city receiving disbursement from the city street improvement fund shall expend, from its own funds, less on street and bridge repair, maintenance or reconstruction, than the average amount the city expended from its own funds for such purposes during the previous five years," Blake explained.

In his closing statement Blake writes, "It is estimated that cities would receive \$1,225 per certified paved mile the first year." (Now people, that is a lot of dollars. Sure wish it could have stayed here to begin with).

His estimates show the first year Abilene would receive \$510,880; Big Spring \$204,000; Midland \$395,560; San Angelo \$474,858; Snyder \$99,200; Dallas \$3,918,400; Houston \$9,920,000 and Colorado City, Westbrook or Loraine were not listed.

He noted that not all cities turned in street mileage so no estimate could be given.

If you have an opinion, contact your local Senator or Representative and voice it.

I recently had a few questions posed to me about the United States Postal Service rules and regulations, as they apply to Westbrook.

I could not answer so I did some calling and made several inquiries and this is what I discovered.

Post offices in larger towns have different rules than the offices in smaller towns.

Larger towns are required to keep the window open eight and one-half hours a day except on holidays, and Saturdays and Sundays and the lobby must be open to meet the demands of the community it serves. At least, this is what I understood from the regulations and explanations given by Stan Sartain, Customer Service Specialist for this postal district.

Smaller offices may keep the window open for whatever hours are approved by the district manager. In this case, the window in Westbrook is approved to be open from 8 a.m. until 12:30 p.m. and 1:30 p.m. until 4:30 p.m. daily with the same exceptions.

The lobby remains open at the discretion of the postmaster. He is authorized to close the lobby at any time for the protection of the customer, if in his opinion there is danger to the customer, or danger of damage from vandals, etc. At any rate, Sartain stated most lobbies remain open until 7 p.m. and are sometimes closed on Sunday.

Those of you who have been dunned for postage due may not be aware that about two years ago, a policy change took place within the system. Postal workers were instructed to pull any piece of mail that looks like it might not contain enough postage and use a scale to weigh it. If additional postage is due, and some postage has already been placed on the mail, the receiver is dunned.

If no postage is on the mail, and a return address is available, the mail is returned and the sender is dunned.

Currently, the Westbrook window is open 8 a.m. until 12:30 p.m. and 1:30 p.m. until 4:30 p.m., five days a week. Lobby hours are 7:30 a.m. until 6 p.m., six days a week and closed on Sunday.

YOU AUTO KNOW

Q. Several weeks ago I noticed that my car bounced enough to hit bottom when I crossed a bump or dip. I replaced all four shock absorbers. And I used heavy-duty shocks. It helped, but it didn't eliminate the problem. Also, the rear end of the car sags, even on a level surface. What more can I do?

A. From your description it sounds as if your rear springs are weak. The problem can be solved in one of three ways. Obviously, replacing the springs will eliminate your worries. If you don't want to do that, air shocks will restore your car to its original height, but it still will bottom out on bad bumps. If you don't want that "sinking feeling" on bumps and dips, you can avoid replacing the rear springs by strengthening them with some spacer shims.

there was less damage. On the farm of Wayne Oliver, located northwest of Loraine, SCS technicians found soils low in organic matter and attributed this to increasing water runoff and soil erosion.

Oliver spread cotton burrs, planted peas and guar in cotton blanks, and planted forage sorghums to increase his organic matter.

He also planted vetch in his oats to improve soil conditions, Mills said.

SECTION 1. As of the effective date of this amendatory ordinance, and upon acceptance by Lone Star Gas Company of the provisions hereof, Section 4 of the aforesaid captioned franchise ordinance enacted on March 11th, 1980, shall be stricken, cancelled and nullified and there shall be substituted in lieu thereof a new provision reading as follows:

"SECTION 4. In addition to the rates charged for gas supplied, Company may make and enforce reasonable charges, rules and regulations for service rendered in the conduct of its business including a charge for services rendered in the inauguration of natural gas service, and may require, before furnishing service, the execution of a contract therefor. Company shall have the right to contract with each customer with reference to the installation of, and payment for, any and all of the gas piping from the connection thereof with the Company's main in the streets or alleys to and throughout the consumer's premises. Company shall own, operate and maintain all service lines, which are defined as the supply lines extending from the Company's main to the customer's meter where gas is measured by Company. The consumer shall own, operate, and maintain all yard lines and house piping. Yard lines are defined as the underground supply lines extending from the point of connection with Company's customer meter to the point of connection with consumer's house piping."

SECTION 2. Enactment of this amendatory ordinance shall in no way ever be construed so as to diminish or impair any consumer's ownership interest in service lines (or portions thereof) installed prior to the effective date of this amendatory ordinance.

SECTION 3. The terms and provisions of this amendatory ordinance shall be deemed to be severable, and if the validity of any section, sentence, clause or phrase of this amendatory ordinance should be declared to be invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of any other section, sentence, clause or phrase of this amendatory ordinance.

SECTION 4. Except as heretofore and hereinabove changed and amended, the terms, provisions, conditions and requirements of the aforesaid franchise ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 5. This amendatory ordinance shall become effective as of July 11, 1981 if the Company files its written acceptance of the provisions of this ordinance within sixty (60) days after its final passage and approval by this City and upon acceptance, the provisions hereof shall be binding upon City and Company, their successors and assigns.
