Rotary Hears McCall Speak On War Outlook In Far East

Matt McCall was the principal speaker at the regular weekly meeting of the Lamesa Rotary Club Friday at noon, using as the subject of his talk "General Douglas MacArthur."

Mr. McCall began his talk by stating that in his opinion General MacArthur was probably one of the saddest men in the world today. His second home has been lost!

"The fall of Bataan," Mr. McCall said, "brings back many memories to us. It recalls the treacherous attack on Pearl Harbor that deprived MacArthur of aid that he should have had in the defense of the Philippines. It reminds us that both Winston Churchill and the President of the United States, some months ago tried to prepare us for the shock, by indicating that we would have bad news—hinting that the Philippines might soon fall. It brings to our memories the fall of Singapore, the loss of the Dutch Indies, the retreat in Burma. It recalls the acts of heroism of our soldiers on Bataan as they fought on against hopeless odds—the Colin P. Kelly's, the bolo-swinging Filipinos, the sharp shooting artillerymen on Corregidor, General Moore from Texas A. & M.

"We take pride in the American sense of humor manifested so often under these unbearable circumstances. When the boys sent a message to the President asking for

State Is Short Of Peanut Goal

Although the latest report on indicated peanut plantings in the state is short of the 1,056,000-acre Food for Freedom goal, B. F. Vance, chairman of the Texas USDA War Board, believes Texas farmers will reach that goal.

The latest Agricultural Marketing Service report indicates prospective peanut plantings in Texas of 776,000 acres.

"County USDA war boards have been carrying on an intensive campaign to increase peanut acreage," Vance said, "and I feel that many farmers over the state have changed their plans to include greater peanut production since the AMS report was compiled."

The report, however, makes it all the more important that Texas farmers redouble their efforts to reach the state's peanut goal, the board chairman said.

"We cannot afford to fall short in peanut production," he declared, "peanuts are one of the most vital war crops and we must make the grade."

Vance expressed pleasure over the other increases indicated in the AMS report of 8 percent in corn, 2 percent in oats, 10 percent in barley, 12 percent in rice, 76 percent in soybeans, 14 percent in cowpeas and 20 percent in tame hay.

This increased acreage will furnish great supplies of feed for the expanded production of meat animals, he pointed out.

Average "Hell From Heaven" Man Is Chosen

Midland Army Flying School, Texas, April 3—Meet a Man! A bombardier!

Meet the average "Hell from Heaven" knockout puncher of Uncle Sam's Air Forces.

A key man, he will deliver the long punches, the hard punches, the haymakers, when Allied air offense opens full blast.

He is Cadet John V. Hogan, of Niagara Falls, N. Y. They found him at Midland Army Flying School, out in West Texas, at the largest of the Air Forces' bombardier colleges.

When officials at MAFS figured height, weight, and age of the hundreds of bombardier cadets to announce to the world a typical and average "Hell from Heaven Man", Hogan hit average right on the nose. Hogan became "it."

He is 23 years old, five feet, ten inches tall, and weighs 160 pounds. Hogan had two years of college work.

Twenty hours a day and night, seven days a week, Hogan and his bombardier mates buckle down to their practice bombing over nearby targets. In daylight or darkness twin-motored bombers take to the air over West Texas prairies on practice missions for the tyro "lords of the bombsight."

The bombardiers learn the deadliest science of war. Hogan and company are the "most dangerous men in the world."

The bombardiers learn to use America's most closely guarded secret device—the world famous bomb sight.

They learn to deliver Uncle Sam's most devastating punches with all the deadly strike of the rattlesnakes on the barren rangelands where their practice bombs fall.

Bombardier Hogan is just an average young American. He went to Niagara Falls, N. Y., high school and Niagara University. He took part in sports. Civilian Hogan was an operator in a chemical plant. Flying and baseball were his hobbies. He got his private pilot's license.

Yesterday Hogan was the average young man of Everytown, U. S. A.

Along came the war and changed all that. Hogan, and Smith, and Jones became bombardiers. Their days and nights now are spent in ground school and flying classrooms. Time is short. They have lots to learn. They work hard. But that's why they came to the bombardier college.

No Price Support Given For All Farm Products

The U. S. Department of Agriculture is supporting the prices of certain crops only and not of all agricultural products, the Texas USDA War Board points out.

Products whose prices are being supported at not less than 85 percent of parity include cheese, evaporated milk, dry skim milk, eggs, hogs, chickens (except broilers), tomatoes for canning, peas (Alaska and sweets) for canning, peanuts for oil, and soybeans for oil, B. F. Vance, board chairman declares.

Prices of the basic crops, cotton, rice, peanuts and wheat, are supported by regular Commodity Credit Corporation loans, he pointed out, while the production of rice and peanuts for oil is being encouraged also by 1942 AAA payments.

Some misunderstanding has developed about price support and the Food for Freedom program, Vance continued, in that the call for greater production of certain crops was interpreted in some quarters as a call for greater production of all farm commodities.

"The Food for Freedom program is designed to get increased production of commodities which are deemed vital to the war effort," he explained, "and price support is being given those commodities only. The government has not undertaken any intensive measures to support the prices of non-war crops."

Vance mentioned particularly the call for increased production of canning peas, pointing out that price support would be given only to Alaska and sweets for canning and not to the many other varieties which are grown in Texas.

CLUB BOYS FEED MANY CALVES, HOGS AND LAMBS

Texas 4-H Club boys fed out a sufficient number of beef calves, hogs and lambs in 1941 to furnish all the "meat requirements" of 32,000 soldiers for 365 days. In other words, the meat fattened and sold by Texas 4-H Club Boys in 1941 would feed Camp Berkeley, Abilene, for one year.

Saving Paper Is More Necessary Now Than Ever

Saving paper probably never has been more necessary than it is now, for the country needs large supplies for packaging war materials — to wrap shells, protect airplane parts, wrap army supplies and food sent abroad.

Louise Bryant, A. & M. College Extension Specialist in home management, explains that old newspapers, magazines, cartons and boxes are all used to make pasteboard. She suggests keeping papers in neat piles with cartons and cardboard boxes flattened out. This waste paper can be sold or given to some charitable organization to sell.

"You can save paper by using it economically, too," the specialist says. She suggests having several articles wrapped together when this is practical, using your own bags or boxes for shopping or carrying clothing to and from the cleaners, taking a market basket or a big cloth bag to the grocery store. Homemakers easily can make a big shopping bag of any clean strong washable cloth, she says. The material need not be new.

Small size paper bags should be used over and over again as long as they are clean.

Until the war emergency, smart housewives substituted paper for cloth wherever they could save washing. Now they need to help the country by using fabrics, glass or china instead of paper napkins, paper towels, picnic plates and cups. This means more washing, of course, but in war time everyone is willing to do a little extra work, Miss Bryant says.

SHOOT A DIME, BOYS, IT'S ALL LEGAL

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — Superior Judge M. T. Phelps "rolled a natural" as far as crapshooters are concerned when he ruled that dice games do not violate Arizona gambling laws unless banked. "Under the law," Judge Phelps said, "a banking game is one in which the house covers all bets. In table game such as craps, play rotates and there is no house or bank, and the man who shoots the dice bets that he will make 7 or 11 on the first roll." The decision will be appealed to the state supreme court.

tuer, 4-H and men over 50.

Jess Slaughter, is the rodeo arena director, and is being assisted by Ralph Nelson, Allen Stephens and Bill Miller, Sam Keene is clerk, J. H. Beal, Jr., assistant clerk; J. H. Beal, L. E. Long, and Stephens, judges, W. E. Berzett, is the announcer and Charlie Miller assistant.

Clyde Miller, Clayton Stewart and Dewey Everett are member of the committee in charge of the horse races, the event is to be staged some time this afternoon.

An estimated crowd of 5,000 are expected to attend from Borden, Howard, Dawson, Scurry, Garza counties.

Keep Pigs Free Of Parasites And Feed Good Feeds

"I have a nice litter of pigs on the ground now. They are about as good pigs as I have ever raised. I do not want to lose one days time in getting these pigs topped out this year. Usually it seems as if I always lose some time in getting my hogs topped out. What can I do to help myself this year, because I wish to do my part in the Food for Victory Program?"

Keep these pigs coming all of the time is the answer to this producers problem. But how is he to do it? First keep these pigs free of intestinal parasites. Keep them free of external parasites. Feed them a good growing feed up to the time they weigh about 100 pounds, and then put them on a finishing ration. A good feed for pigs is:

Ground threshed maize	55 lbs.
Wheat gray shorts	10 lbs.
Ground oats	20 lbs.
Cottonseed meal	9 lbs.
Tankage	6 lbs.
Limestone flour	1 1-2 lbs.
Salt	1-2 lbs.

This ration can be placed in a self-feeder where the pigs can get to it at all times. It should be so that the sow can not get to it. These pigs will get off to a good start, and keep right on growing and doing good after weaning.

Self-feeders are recommended because (1) a pig will do a better job of feeding itself than a man will do, (2) the pigs will come along faster, (3) they will grow out at a lower cost per pound, and (4) they will not have any setback at weaning time.

Warning Issued For Civilians To Obey Army Signs

MIDLAND Army Flying School (Special) — Lieutenant Colonel John W. White, Director of Flying at Midland Army Flying School today reiterated a request to citizens of this area to observe warning signs that surround U. S. Air Force Bombing Ranges in this vicinity.

It was pointed out that while bombs used by bombardier cadets training at the school are practice bombs, they can be dangerous to persons who do not heed warning signs that surround each target area.

The signs bear the following warning:

DANGER KEEP OUT—U. S. Army Air Force Bombing Range Do Not Proceed Beyond This Point Bombing Operations in Progress Day and Night.

WARNING—Picking Up Bombs or Ammunition Parts is EXTREMELY DANGEROUS And is Prohibited by Law.

Officials at Midland Army Flying School ask that citizens in this vicinity cooperate with the Army by staying off all bombing ranges. Colonel White also pointed out that no one need fear the consequences of bombing operations outside of designated target areas.

Grow Out Your Baby Chicks

Many farmers are giving their best thoughts and efforts to the best method of growing out their 1942 baby chicks. For poultry to be at its best it should receive every opportunity to reach its maximum growth and development. The only way to do this is to feed a good growing mash. Cost of such mashes is rising gradually, and many requests are coming in for a good formula that the farmer can mix at home.

Any formula for a growing mash must provide for minerals and vitamins as well as for proteins and carbohydrates. Below is a good formula:

Ground threshed grain	50 lbs.
Wheat gray shorts	15 lbs.
Finely ground oats	12 1-2 lbs.
Alfalfa leafmeal	5 lbs.
Meat scraps (or fish meal)	5 lbs.
Cottonseed meal	8 lbs.
Dried milk (skim or buttermilk)	3 lbs.
Ground limestone flour	1 lb.
Salt	1-2 lb.

Community Sewing Centers Are Advocated

Community sewing centers to provide self-help for rural women who do not have machines may be one result of the war.

Mildred Horton, vice director and state home demonstration agent of the Texas Extension Service, has asked county home demonstration agents and assistant agents in 191 Texas counties to investigate the possibilities of sewing centers. Equipment in WPA sewing projects is sponsor-owned and where projects have been discontinued machines might be obtained and put into service, Miss Horton explained after a conference with Mrs. Audrey C. Goree, state supervisor of WPA welfare projects.

Should centers be set up, they would be supervised by rural women trained in home demonstration club work. This same pattern was followed successfully in the 1940-41 cotton mattress demonstration program during which 3,869 community centers were in operation in Texas. The experience will be helpful this year in establishing community food preservation centers as well as sewing centers.

Rural women fortunate enough to have machines are being urged to keep their machines in good condition. "It's a patriotic and sensible responsibility in line with the Extension Victory Demonstrator's pledge," Miss Horton says. Women also are being encouraged to arrange for "machine clinics" where members may bring their machine learn to clean, oil and regulate them, and use the various attachments. These women then will help their neighbors put machines in good running order.

Arrangements may be made locally between county home demonstration agents and sewing project supervisors for trained club women to copy patterns used in WPA sewing projects, Miss Horton and Mrs. Goree have agreed.

GET HENS OF HIGH GRADE STRAIN FOR BEST EGG PRODUCTION

Hens that will produce an average of 210 eggs per year will produce eggs at a cost of 12 1-2c per dozen at present feed prices; hens producing 160 eggs per year will produce eggs at a cost of 15c per dozen; while hens producing only 112 eggs per year will produce eggs at a cost of 20c per dozen. Buy baby chicks out of known high production.

DANDELION RUBBER?

STOCKHOLM (AP) — Experiments with the Siberian dandelion, heretofore regarded by Swedish farmers as a plant pest, are being conducted at the Svalof Plant-breeding Institute at Skane, in an effort to find a domestic substitute for natural rubber.

Spread Of Disease Among Children Can Be Stopped

The cruelty of our war-time enemies is no more deplorable than the cruelty of American indifference which every year allows thousands of small children to suffer, and possibly die, from diphtheria and smallpox when these two diseases are absolutely preventable," Doctor Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, said today in commenting on President Roosevelt's act in setting aside May 1 as Child Health Day.

"There is no more important phase of national health than national child health, and the tragic annual death rate from diphtheria and smallpox is difficult to understand when we remember that science has produced successful immunization for the prevention of both these diseases," Doctor Cox said.

In pointing out the necessity for preventing epidemics, lowering the death rate from communicable diseases and elevating national health standards, Doctor Cox stressed the fact that if all parents would cooperate with the President in his campaign to have every child in the United States over nine months of age immunized against diphtheria and smallpox, these two killing diseases would be completely eliminated as threats to the health of American children.

President Roosevelt has asked the cooperation of all American parents in this nation-wide campaign to stamp out diphtheria and smallpox, by immunizing all children over country in urgent need of its entire manpower to successfully defend itself against an aggressor enemy. President Roosevelt has asked the same close cooperation in health matters that he expects to receive in all phases of our defense program.

Doctor Cox has notified all Local Chairmen of Health and Emergency Medical Service in the State of Texas that he, as State Chairman on Health and Emergency Medical Service, will greatly appreciate their complete cooperation in this vital matter and urging them to give this activity in their communities full support as a most important measure for the war-time protection of our civilian population.

"I sincerely hope," Doctor Cox asserted, "that Texas will cooperate with President Roosevelt in this Child Health campaign to the extent that every child in Texas will have been immunized against diphtheria and smallpox by May 1, National Child Health Day."

Look For Fire Hazards In Your Home To Be Safe

Are you hiding an enemy in your home?

It is hoped that you are not, but if there is a fire hazard lurking around your house—hidden away in the attic, shut up in a closet, tucked under the stairway, piled in a garage corner, then you are harboring a most vicious type of enemy.

Fire is a destroying agent when it breaks out. It can paralyze industry, seriously cripple our war production and assembly lines, halt the shipment of materials to the fighting fronts.

Drive out all suspicious enemies in your home; give no quarters to fire hazards; clean them out during Civilian Defense Clean-Up Week and keep them out.

Here are a few tips offered by Marvin Hall, State Fire Insurance Commissioner, on foiling the advance agents of disastrous fires:

Remove all accumulated trash, papers and other discarded or waste material of a combustible nature.

"Blackout" all matches, cigarettes and cigars before throwing them away. Carelessness with these ranks third in the list of known fire causes according to records covering a ten year period.

Gasoline, kerosene, benzine and naphtha are inflammable liquids that constitute serious fire hazards. Keep them all outside the house and never near an open flame.

Oil mops and rags soaked with oil and paint cause spontaneous combustion. Oil mops should be kept in a metal container and oil or paint soaked rags should be disposed of promptly after being used.

Before leaving an electric iron or other electric appliance in use, turn off the current. Permit only experienced persons to install or repair electrical fittings and appliances. Replace "blown" fuses with new ones; never use a substitute "bridge" in the fuse box.

Watch serious outside exposures. Dry grass, leaves, brush and trash accumulations outside the house are often places where serious fires originate.

Fires have no season—they must be prevented every hour of every day.

A Journalistic Coincidence

WASHINGTON — Over coffee and doughnuts in the Senate restaurant the other day, a group of Washington newsmen hashed over an amazing journalistic coincidence.

The eyes of Washington and perhaps the whole world that day were turned to New Delhi, India, where

Sir Stafford Cripps, No. 2 man in the British war cabinet, was holding a two-hour session with a scrawny little man in a loin cloth, Mahatma Gandhi. On that session depended much, perhaps the future of India and the tide of the war for months or maybe years to come.

And in Ventura, Calif., James A. Mills, one of the Associated Press' greatest foreign correspondents, died.

These seemingly unrelated happenings had a very definite relationship for it was Jim Mills who years ago "discovered" Gandhi for

the world outside of India.

One veteran correspondent recalled that the little man in the loin cloth was considered no more than a fanatical leader of one of India's many factions, when Mills met him, sensed the potential appeal to the Hindu masses in his philosophy and the power he was becoming in his land.

"Jim's dispatches years ago introduced Gandhi to the world," said the correspondent, and added, "and if I'm not mistaken Jim took the first news pictures of the Mahatma to be printed."

Certain it was that Jim was with Gandhi all through those months when the little leader in the fight for India's freedom was conducting his salt rebellion in 1930 and he went with him to that all-India round-table in London a year later. Certainly no single correspondent turned out more copy on the little man whose life is so bound up in India's destiny than Jim Mills.

On the day Gandhi was making his greatest decision, one that not only affected India, and the British empire, but the whole world, Jim Mills died.

It was Morgan Beatty, the radio commentator, who said: "You know that clinches what undoubtedly will turn out to be Gandhi's greatest prophecy." And to the queries of "How so?" he explained:

Mills was the last person to speak with Gandhi when the Indian leader entered Poona jail in 1932 and 17 months later when Gandhi was released, Mills was waiting alone for Gandhi's first words.

They were: "Why, Mr. Mills, if I should die and start to enter Heaven, I should expect to see you waiting to interview me at the gates."

But the encampment has been called off for the duration of the war.

Other trips and other honors were considered. But James A. Potts, Ola Mae Mixon, Gladys Koehne and Lloyd Rumsey will receive instead just whatever the trip would have amounted to in Victory stamps and bonds.

Accordingly each one of the 4-H winners will receive \$100 in Victory bonds and stamps. Funds for sending Texas 4-H Club representatives to the National encampment come partly from the Texas 4-H Club fund through sales of food and cold drinks at the annual Texas A. and M. College Farmers' Short Course and partly from the Texas Bankers' Association.

What To Do In Case Of Air Raid

1. Keep calm.
2. Get blackout material placed.
3. Cut off all gas at the heaters and stoves except in blackout room.
4. Get extra supply of water. Fill bathtub if possible.
5. Get two buckets of dry sand, and long handle shovel.
6. Get flashlight.
7. Place floor lamp in blackout room.
8. Turn off radio except in blackout room.
9. Turn off all lights except in blackout room.
10. Stay away from windows.
11. Do not use telephone.
12. Turn off all lights before opening door of blackout room to go to some other part of the house.
13. Stay inside until all clear signal is given.

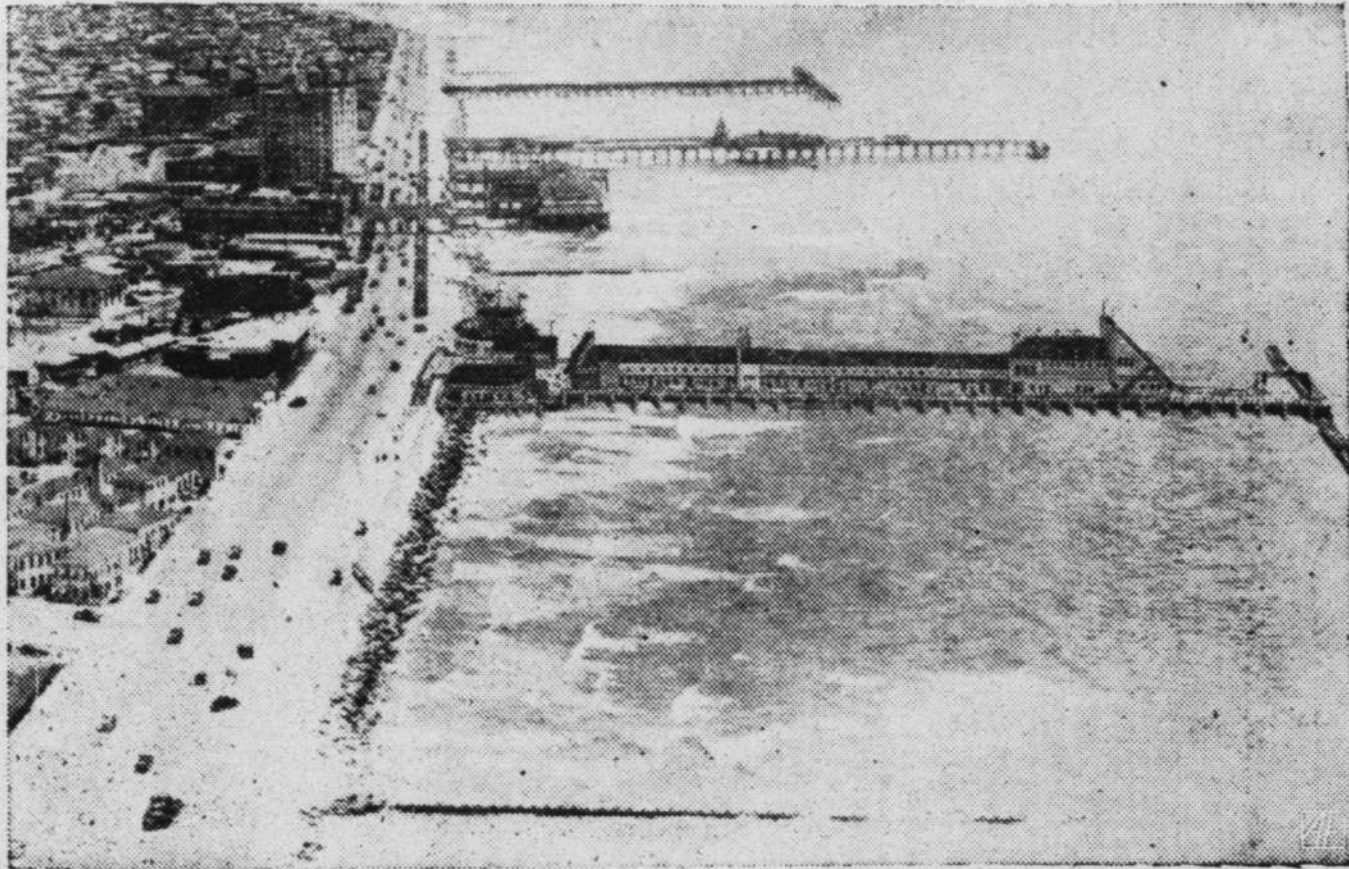

Terracing Takes Big Increase During March

Terracing jumped into the spotlight during March and is likely to stay there the rest of the year, according to Fred Rennels, assistant administrative officer of the AAA in Texas.

Under the terracing phase of the AAA program, 114 miles of terraces were constructed on 78 farms in 15 Texas counties during that month.

"This is only a fraction of the work that will be done but it's a step in the right direction," the AAA official said and explained that Texas farmers already have requested approximately 25,518 miles of terraces for this year.

Basic fair prices have been established in 73 counties with other counties expected to fall in line immediately, he said. These prices, which are set by county AAA committees, are based on costs for terracing easier type farms in the county. They vary from 24 cents per 100 feet to 75 cents per 100 feet throughout the state, depending on soil type, average size of farms, prices customarily paid, and availability of terracing equipment.

After the basic fair price for a county is determined, construction is done by contractors who are paid immediately by the AAA when terraces are completed. Prices for terracing individual farms within each county will vary according to soil type, length of terraces, number of fills required, and other related factors. No cash outlay is needed under the new set-up since costs are deducted from producers future AAA payments.

"In view of labor and machinery tie-up in the Food for Freedom program, this is a valuable plan through which Texas farmers can continue soil-building work and each maximum AAA payments this year," the AAA official said.

The Continental Congress on June 14, 1777, resolved: "That the thirteen United States be thirteen stripes, red and white; that the Union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field, representing a new constellation." According to legend the five-pointed stars were designed by Mrs. Betsy Ross.

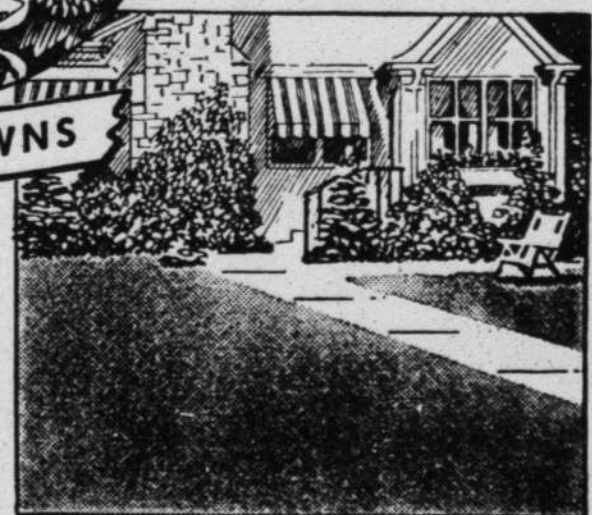
With the admission of Vermont and Kentucky to the Union two stars and two stripes were added to the flag following an Act of Congress in 1794. It was a flag of 15 stars and 15 stripes over Ft. McHenry that inspired Francis Scott Key to write "The Star-Spangled Banner." Congress in 1818 restored the original number of stripes.

How they sent a message to California telling them to hold out a few more days and they would send help.

It reminds us that one of our own members is there today, still among a group that is holding out. It reminds us that time and time again we have said "Thank God for MacArthur". It recalls that we have pointed to his brave fight and been proud we were Americans.

McCall continued, "MacArthur has been the hero of our nation and has caught the hearts of the world. We place him along with Washington, Old Hickory Jackson, General Lee, Sam Houston, Stonewall Jackson and will let destiny and history decide his place in the Hall of Fame.

General MacArthur, Mr. McCall related, was born in Little Rock, Arkansas, the son of another famous American general. He attended school at San Antonio, and graduated from West Point, as head of his class. His first scene of duty was in the Philippines.

During the first World War he was commander of the famous Rainbow Division, and was noted for his bravery and cool headedness in action. As proof of this was the 13 medals received from his own government and 24 received from other nations attesting to his skill and bravery. And already during this war he has received the highest honors the people of the United States can give their soldiers, the coveted Congressional Medal of Honor.

Following the World War, Gen. MacArthur was appointed commandant at West Point, the youngest man ever so honored. His reforms and efforts to rebuild the type of officers and men produced at this institution, once again brought him national honors.

Following his term at West Point General MacArthur was appointed Chief of Staff of the United States Army, again the youngest man ever to hold this position, which he also held longer than any other man.

In his report for 1933 as Chief of Staff, General MacArthur warned: "The obvious state of unrest prevailing throughout the world, evidences of which are plainly visible in our own country, the army strength in personnel and material and its readiness for action, are of the most urgent importance to the United States that this condition be rectified without delay."

But the pacifists and isolationists wouldn't listen, and today we are paying the penalty of not listening

to MacArthur.

General Hugh Johnson, has said this of MacArthur, "Douglas MacArthur is one of the most brilliant men in public service—one general who will not die in bed if there's half a chance to die elsewhere."

Mr. McCall then related some of his personal family history, and personal appearances.

After MacArthur had served his tenure as chief of staff, he resigned his commission to accept the job of Military leader of the Philippine Army, the place he still held when President Roosevelt appointed him Commander in Chief of the United States Armies in the Far East.

Then came Pearl Harbor, the conquest of the Philippines, the fall of Manila and the siege of Bataan.

Australia and the other United Nations began to cry "Give us MacArthur," and the President heeded this call, with MacArthur escaping from Bataan to Australia to assume the duties of head of the war effort in the Southwest Pacific.

Upon his arrival in Australia, MacArthur made this momentous statement: "I have every confidence in the ultimate success of our joint cause, but success in modern war requires something more than courage and the willingness to die. It requires careful preparation. . . . No general can make something from nothing. My success or failure will depend primarily upon the resources which our respective Governments place at my disposal. My faith in them is complete. In any event I shall do my best. I shall keep the soldier's faith."

General MacArthur's words were hard and healthy, and it was high time that they were spoken. Douglas MacArthur had the appetite for glory, but none knew better than he the great difference between the battle he had fought on Bataan and the war he now faced in Australia. None perceived more clearly the great gaps in preparation, manpower and weapons which had to be filled. His soldierly cynicism told him that unless the gaps were quickly filled they could engulf him and all the glory of Bataan.

MacArthur took with him to Australia all his sense of Destiny, of history and a name to be made—or unmade. He could ask no more of Destiny than this challenge. Nor could Destiny and the U. S. ask more of Douglas MacArthur.

In closing Mr. McCall quoted these words, as spoken by MacArthur: "The President of the United States ordered me to break through the Japanese lines and proceed from Corregidor to Australia for the purpose, as I understand it, of organizing the American offensive against Japan. A primary purpose of this is the relief of the Philippines. I came through and I shall return."

He also states, "that since registrants who were forty-five years old or over on February 16, 1942, are not liable for military service, there will be no National Lottery and no order numbers will be assigned, although the registration cards will be serially numbered by local boards."

It is estimated that one and one-half times the number of men who were registered in the third registrations, will be registered in the fourth registration.

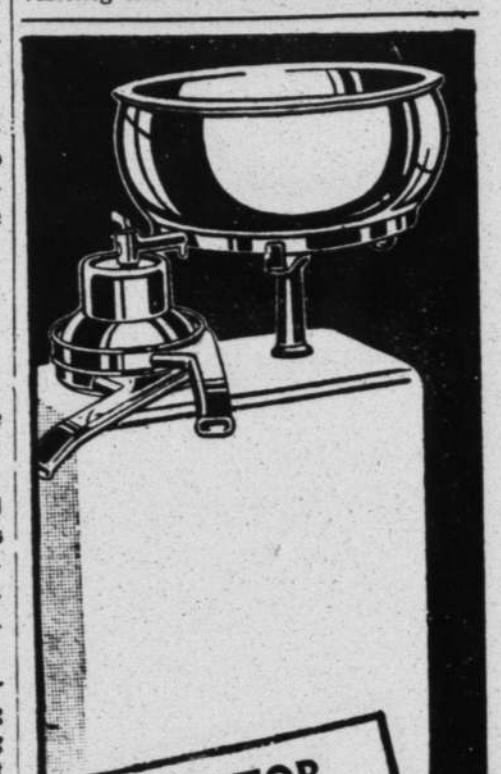
