NEW GAME LAW IS CITED

Austin, Tex.,—Game, Fish and Oyster Commissioner Will W. Wood has issued instructions to Game wardens in all sections of the State to devote special attention to violations of the State statutes in the killing of quail out of season. Season for deer opens on November 1 and of quail on December 1. It is the first time in years that the two seasons have not opened on the same date. For this reason and because of an impression that seems to prevail that quail may be killed after November 1 it has been found necessary to issue instructions to wardens.

Commissioner Wood also has requested the wardens to give as much publicity as possible to the fact that quail cannot be killed until December 1 in order that it may not be necessary to prosecute for violations of the game laws where such offenses have been committed through ignorance of the law. The instructions issued by the department also request the wardens to give particular attention to the ruthless killing of deer.

MUST HAVE LICENSE.

The Game Department also calls attention to the necessity for hunters providing themselves with hunting licenses and the requirements for making a license before game can be shipped. Non-residents must pay a license fee of \$15. Non-residents are classed as those who have not been residents of the State for at least six months.

Under these licenses, however non residents can take home game that is lawfully killed under certain stipulations as to affidavits for shipment.

Resident hunters must pay a hunting license fee of \$1.75 in order to hunt out of the county of his residence. County Clerks issue the license which provide for exemptions from the provisions of the State laws as to hunting.

"It shall be unlawful for any person to kill, ensnare, or entrap or in any way destroy any wild deer in the period embraced between the first day of January and the first day of November in each year; provided it shall be unlawful for any person at any season of the year to take, kill, trap or ensnare any wild female deer or spotted fawn within this State; and provided further, that it shall be unlawful for any person to take, kill, trap or ensnare more than three wild bucks during the months of November and December of any one year."

Special attention is called by the Commissioner to the limit on deer and that section of the law relative to killing of does and fawns. One section of the law that is to be given more than passing attention by the wardens of the department is that, with reference to "night hunting."

"NO 'NIGHT HUNTING.'"
"It shall further be unlawful for any person at any time to hunt deer by aid of what is known commonly as a hunting lamp or lantern, or any other light used for the purpose of hunting at night" is the section stressed, as well as the following relative to the use of deer calls, which was passed by the last Legislature:

It shall be unlawful for any person, at any time of the year, within this State, to use a deer call, whistle, decoy, horn, call pipe, reed, or other device, mechanical or natural, for the purpose of calling or attracting the attention of any deer, and any person hunting deer by such means, or attempting to use any such means in hunting deer shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$100 nor more than \$500, or by imprisonment of not less than twenty days or more than ninety days, or both by said fine and imprisonment, and each and every unlawful act shall constitute a special offense.

LAW AFFECTS CARRIERS

One phase of the law which is important to hunters is that relative to shipment of carcasses. The law states: "It shall be un-

lawful for any express company or any other common carrier, or the officers, agents, servants or employees of the same to receive for the purpose of transportation or to transport, carry or take beyond the limits of this state, or within this state any wild animal or the carcass thereof or the hide thereof. Nothing in this chapter shall be construed to prohibit the transportation or shipment of any of the game when lawfully killed from the place of shipment to the person who killed the same provided the person who killed such game shall accompany said game provided person making shipment shall first make proper affidavit in writing before some minister authorized by law to administer oaths and deliver same to said railroad or common carrier, or to the agent of said railroad or common carrier, at the point of shipment. Penalty for violation is in fine of from \$10 to \$100.

DEER PLENTIFUL

Commissioner Wood reports that advice to the department 'to the effect that deer are plentiful in most sections of the State where hunting has been going on a past year. Deputy Warden Beasley has returned from a trip of inspection through the various counties of the State and reports the game laws are being enforced far better than expected in the southern and border sections of the State it will be practically impossible to enforce to the letter the game laws but arrangements have been made by the department with the Federal officials as to hunting in the border strips of the State.

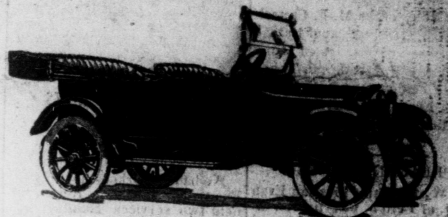

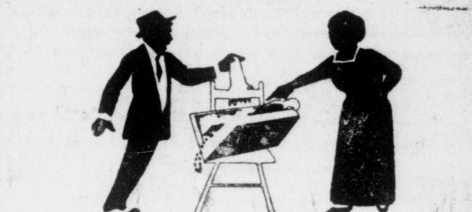
