Area Probation Departments Plan Drug Abuse Seminar

The Juvenile Probation Department of Bailey and Parmer Counties will sponsor a drug abuse seminar for interested adults in January of next year, according to Keith Madole, Juvenile Probation Officer.

The purpose of the seminar is to educate parents and other interested persons in the areas of drugs, substance abuse, and effects of abuse. 'This seminar is designed to answer common questions which many parents have, as well as destroy some common myths about drugs,' Madole said. 'I certainly don't want people to feel self-conscious about attending the seminar. Simply because a parent chooses to find out more about this particular social problem does not mean that the problem necessarily exists in their own home.' One of the major points of emphasis will be prevention

of drug abuse and early detection of the problem.

Madole went on to say that, 'It's very difficult for a parent to answer their children's questions about various drugs, when the parent themselves are not informed. In fact, many kids will not even bother to ask questions of their parents, because the parents have shown themselves to be ignorant of the problem.' Madole went on to say that many times the answer to questions which the child has are then sought through experimentation with drugs.

The seminar is scheduled to be held on three different nights, with each session lasting two hours. According to Keith Madole, 'There is just no way that we can cover this subject in one night. By breaking the information down into parts, we will be able to have adequate time for questions, a very important part of learning. The folks attending the seminar will also have time to digest information before going on to another topic.'

Subject matter, printed materials, and visual aids will be utilized, provided by the South Plains Association of Governments and the Lubbock County Mental Health/Mental Retardation Center.

Local law enforcement agencies have been busy the last two weeks with filings on warrants for bad checks and failure to appear violations on traffic warrants.

Mullettes Have New Coach, Two Vets And Potential

The 1983 Mullettes will have two returning starters from last year's team, along with a new coach in Jerry Johnson. Johnson is also the coach of the Muleshoe Cross Country Team, which took state honors this year, making it two in a row. Johnson will be assisted this year by the capable Jerry Robinson.

The plans for the Mullettes this year includes pressing and fast breaking at every opportunity available, in an attempt to make their opponents play their style of basketball. Twelve players will be used in each game, Johnson says, because of the Mullette's running offense.

A tough pre-district schedule faces the Mullettes, with most of the opponents picked to win their respective districts. The girls' varsity has a lot of good points in their strength, teamwork, passing, speed and quickness this year. Weaknesses for the Mullettes could be in the lack of height and their inexperience on the varsity level.

Senior guard, 5'4" Sherri Bessire has the ability to be one of the Mullettes zone busters. Besides being a good outside shot, she has the ability to go inside a rebound. Johnson will count on her as a defensive specialist for the team.

Playing wing, 5'7" Kristi Cambell will play an

important role as a rebounder. Johnson says that Cambell may well be the best defensive player among the big girls, with her sound, fundamental play.

Brenda Ellis, who is one of the quickest and fastest girls on the court will be an asset to the Mullettes on both offense and defense once she gets used to varsity play, Johnson says. She is 5'4" and a sophomore.

K.K. Flowers is a 5'6" senior post and is a consistent rebounder. She plays well on offense without the ball and is excellent at moving to the open spot. Coach Johnson says that Flowers could push Cambell as a defensive player.

Captain, Kelly Hamblen is a 5'8" senior post. She has the ability to play at post or win position and will be counted on a lot as a rebounder and inside scorer. Hamblen will most likely be playing against the Mullettes' opponent's tallest player.

Junior guard, Polly Harrison who is 5'3" could develop into the Mullette's best defensive player according to Johnson. Harrison will be used to help defend the Mullettes opponents best offensive players.

Doubling up at both post and wing positions will be 5'8" senior, Kacy Henry. Henry plays both positions because of her scoring potential at both. She will

Most Turnouts, Grades Better Than Expected

Cotton harvest season in Bailey and nearby counties is winding down extremely fast, according to a survey of area gins Thursday. Some gins have gone over what they estimated to be ginned, however, most are pretty close to their first guesses.

At Muleshoe Co-op Gin, a gin employee stated that the second gin there had been run some this year. The Co-op has ginned about 5,000 bales to date, and expect to gin possibly 200 more before closing out the season. They are caught up on module ginning for now, and are ginning off trailers. Employees there said that the turnouts for producers had been pretty good from 22 to 24 percent, with at least one producer getting 27 percent turnout. As a rule of thumb, a turnout of 25 percent is said to be 'good.'

Calvin Meissner, owner of Lariat Gin told the Journal that he had ginned approximately 1350 bales and expected to get another 50 bales. 'We will wind up the ginning out here this week, if the weather stays good,' Meissner said. Turnouts for producers ginning at Lariat have been from 19 to 25

percent, depending on the location of the crop.

In the far southeast of Bailey County, Benny Claunch at Claunch gin stated their facility had ginned about 2,000 bales of cotton this year. Claunch said that about 500 more are expected and then they will wind up the season, hopefully this week. Turnouts have ranged from 18 to 23 percent for customers in that area.

Nickles Gin at Goodland has ginned 1308 bales this year and a spokesman for the gin said that he expected about 1400 would catch the total this year. Turnouts have been good for farmers there, but grades have not. The Nickles facility will probably be through within the next week.

Bob Newton, Manager of the Farmer's Co-op Gin at Enochs told the Journal that about 3,000 bales had been ginned there. 'Right now farmers are working with special machines to pick up some of the cotton strung out in the rows from the damaging rain and hail earlier,' Newton said. Producers there have hopes of salvaging a good amount of this 'strung-out' cotton; and, if they do, the Co-op could gin from 700 to 1,000 bales more. Turnouts and grades of cotton have been 'fair,' Newton said. Newton expressed his satisfaction with the new electronic classing procedure for cotton. 'We can see a significant difference in the classing, now,' he stated.

A spokeswoman for the Maple Co-op Gin reported a total of 4900 bales ginned there so far, and expectations of about 1,000 to 1,500 more. Grades have been good and the turnouts have been mostly 25 percent or better in some areas of that part of the county.

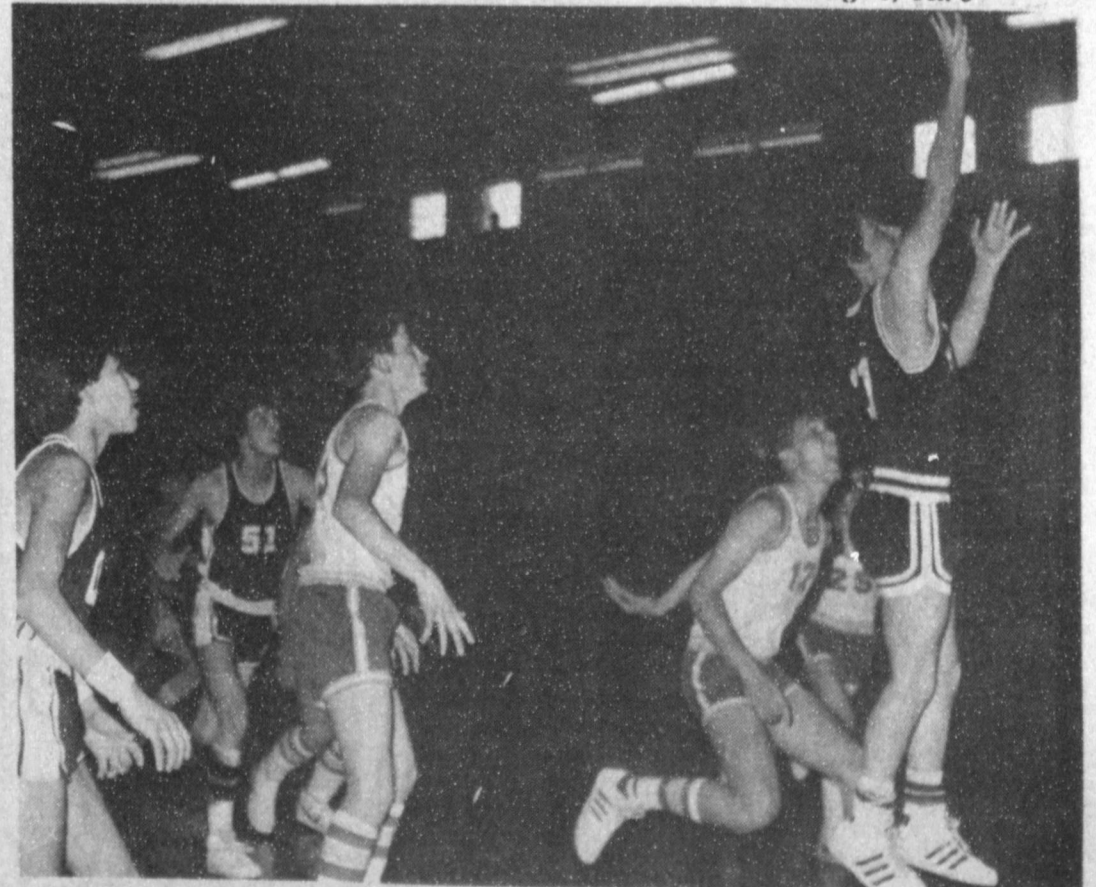
Commissioners Meet Monday

Crime Prevention Seminar Planned

A Crime Prevention Seminar for store owners, managers and sales personnel will be offered by the Office of Lifelong Learning at Wayland Baptist University next week.

Designed to help store personnel prevent crimes such as shoplifting and ar-

med robbery, the seminar is slated for Tuesday, Dec. 13, from 7-9:30 p.m. in Room 101 of the Nunn Business Administration Building, located near the corner of Sixth and Smythe Streets.

The seminar is open to all interested business personnel free of charge. Gary Gould, crime prevention officer with the Plainview Police Department, will be the instructor.

"Crime prevention experts generally agree that the best deterrent to shoplifting is an alert, well-trained sales staff which pays careful attention to the needs of the customers," said Dr. Billie Henderson, dean of lifelong learning. "This seminar is particularly significant during the Christmas season when most retailers are experiencing their busiest times of the year."

Most shoplifters are amateurs who steal impulsively when opportunities arise, Henderson said. Shoplifters come from all socioeconomic, ethnic, racial, sex and age categories.

"Armed robbery is a vicious and violent crime which takes place in the presence of the victim," Henderson said. "There are ways to discourage the armed robber and to minimize the chances of violence through sound business practices and proper employee training."

Persons interested in attending the seminar are not required to make any advance registration in order to attend.

At the North Lazbuddie Gin, employees report about 3550 bales ginned, and expect to gin maybe 300 more. At any rate, the Lazbuddie gin should be through the season by the week-end. Turnouts and grades were reported from good to fair.

Located in the northwest part of Bailey County, Beck Gin has ginned close to 1200 bales this season. Manager of the gin, C.E. Grant told the Journal, "We are really winding down fast out here. I've seen some of the highest turnouts on dryland and some of the worst in irrigated cotton hit by the freeze, that I've ever seen." Grant also said if the weather holds good, they should be through within a

week. Grades have been both good and bad, depending on the area of the cotton, he said.

Operators of the Circle-back Gin, east of Needmore, have ginned about 320 bales this season and lack about 50 more being finished. Grades have been good and micronaire had been premium on most of the cotton ginned there, a spokeswoman for the gin explained. She also said that although little trading is going on right now, prices have reflected an upward trend.

Although cotton crops are short this year in Bailey and many surrounding counties, there is always that hope for a better year next year," one gin operator commented.

Farmers Must Pay Estimated Taxes Soon

If you are one of the individuals who earned at least two-thirds of your 1983 gross income from farming, you have until Monday, January 16, 1984, to make a 1983 declaration of estimated tax and to pay any taxes due.

However, according to the IRS, farmers who plan to file their 1983 income tax return and to pay the total tax balance by March 1, 1984, are not required to make an estimated tax declaration.

Additional information is available in the free IRS Publication 225, "Farmer's Tax Guide," and Publication 505, "Tax Withholding and Estimated Tax." These publications can be obtained by calling the IRS number listed in the telephone directory.

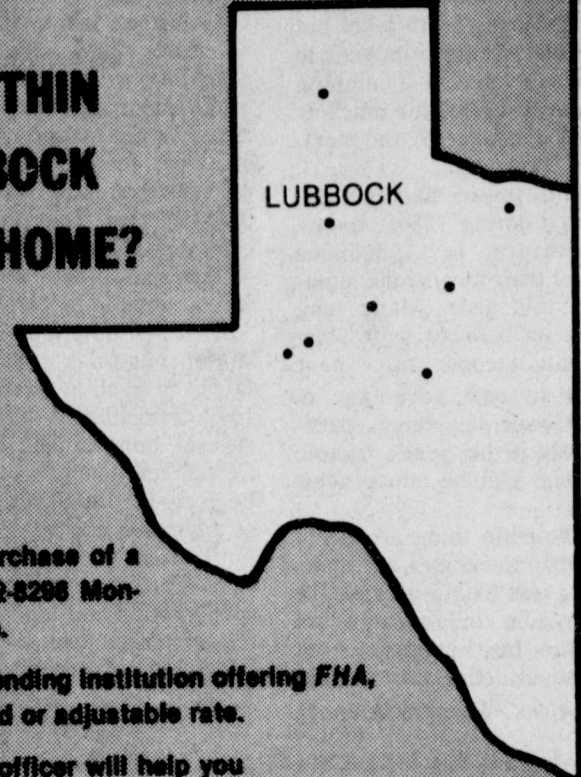

County Agent Gives Pointers On Year-End Tax Planning

Farmers and ranchers have only a few weeks left to make decisions that could affect their 1983 income tax situation.

Year-end planning can help save tax dollars, says Spencer Tanksley, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Such planning mainly involves decisions to adjust income or expenditures so as to come up with a more favorable tax situation. The primary purpose of year-end tax planning is to level out taxable income from year to year to avoid jumping through several tax brackets from one year to the next, says Tanksley.

With lower tax rates expected during 1984, producers may be in a dilemma about their income tax situation this year. Many may feel inclined to shift some taxable income into next year to take advantage of the lower tax rates, particularly if this year's taxable income will be above average.

The main thing producers need to avoid is a net operating loss (NOL) because for many that could mean a loss of the tax benefits from personal deductions and exemptions. These add up to

at least \$5,400 for a couple with no dependent children and \$7,400 for a family of four.

Social Security retirement benefits also will be affected by low net earnings in pre-retirement years. And contributions to a Keogh or IRA retirement plan may be affected if taxable income falls too low.

The first step in year-end tax planning is to calculate your 1983 taxable income and to project 1984 taxable income, says Tanksley. The IRS is presently mailing 1983 income tax tables and schedules along with forms and filing instructions. For a rough estimate of 1984 tax rates, figure taxes at 5 percent less for the same taxable income as in 1983. Remember that the maximum capital gains tax on the sale of land, machinery or other investments is 20 percent.

If it is determined advantageous for a cash basis taxpayer to shift taxable income from 1984 to this year, several steps can be taken. Certain cash purchases can be postponed until next year or payments can be delayed until after the first of the year. Certain soil and water conservation and land clearing expenses can be capitalized and depreciated rather than taking them all this year. Some tax and interest

payments might also be deferred until after year-end. Shifting capital assets bought before 1981 from a rapid method of depreciation to straight line depreciation can postpone deductions.

1983 income may also be increased by receiving payment for grain and livestock sales before year-end, through assignment of PIK entitlements to someone else, and by receiving advance diversion and deficiency payments through participation in the 1984 farm program. Certain assets might also be sold this year that would eventually be sold anyway, says Tanksley.

However, if the decision is to shift taxable income to 1984 to take advantage of the lower tax rate, a producer may avoid receiving income from any 1983 sales (especially crops) through a deferred payment agreement with the buyer. He may also delay counting PIK entitlements, crop insurance proceeds, and income from forced sales of livestock from federally designated drought areas.

Stepping up deductions can also postpone 1983 income, says Tanksley. This could include paying for and taking delivery of equipment and supplies before year-end as well as prepayment of such items as leases. Year-end tax benefits associated with farm machinery purchases (such as ACRS deductions, investment credit or the \$5,000 expensing option) may enhance the payoff of such purchases. And contributions to a Keogh and an IRA retirement plan are deductible as long as they are made before the tax return is filed.

If a producer does all he can to reduce his 1983 taxable income and still finds his earnings much higher than in past years, Tanksley suggests income averaging. If this year's income will be 20 percent above the average taxable income for 1979 through 1982 plus \$3,000, then income averaging may save tax dollars.

Tanksley advises producers to check with their tax consultants for further information on year-end tax planning.

State Governmental Fees, Licences Increase January

State government, like local governments, charge for some services that it provides.

While both taxes and fees fund state government activities, only fees are assessed directly to the users of a particular service. Some state fees have never been raised and others have not been increased in over 50 years. Since it takes the state \$11.31 today to buy what \$1 bought 50 years ago, charges for many state services have not kept pace with inflation.

Up until last year, revenue from general sources, particularly the oil and natural gas production and sales taxes, was growing rapidly enough to pay for the increases in program costs. However, when revenue growth slowed due to the oil glut and peso devaluations, Texas lawmakers increased the fees charged for state services. The changes are expected to bring an additional \$140 million into the state treasury during the 1984-85 budget period.

State and local governments have historically performed and charged for direct and definable services, such as inspections, examinations, licenses, permits, certifications and the use of public facilities. The fee income goes directly to fund the service program. Charges for birth and death certificates help defray the costs of keeping such records. Inspection fees help cover the cost of ensuring safety and quality standards. Registration and examination fees help meet the expenses of regulating and licensing the various professions, motor vehicles and recreational activities, such as hunting and fishing.

The fee increases enacted by the Legislature cover a wide range of activities. The Secretary of State will charge more for record searches and other services. Filing articles of incorporation for businesses will go up from \$100 to \$200. The Railroad Commission will charge \$20 per hour for research, up from \$2 per hour and will also charge \$100 for well drilling permits. Other fees raised include those for testing the accuracy of agricultural scales and measures, for inspections of agricultural feed and fertilizer, wastewater treatment plants and nursing homes.

Many professions and occupations are regulated by state boards and commissions, which give examinations to measure and certify levels of competency. The Legislature raised the fees for architects, barbers, medical practitioners and interns, morticians, securities dealers and tax assessors, among others.

The Department of Public Safety administers tests to determine driving competency. The fee for a regular four-year driver's license will go from \$7 to \$10 on January 1, 1984. The cost of a learner's permit doubled from \$2 to \$4 on September 1, 1983, and duplicate regular licenses went from \$1 to \$3.

The price of a motor vehicle title from the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation will go from \$3 to \$10. A duplicate title will go from 25 cents to \$2.

The Alcoholic Beverage Commission will increase many of its fees for, among others, brewers, distillers, package stores and private clubs.

The Parks and Wildlife Department will raise dozens of fees, including boat registrations, resident hunting licenses, fishing licenses and combination hunting and fishing licenses.

The biggest revenue gainers will be the Department of Parks and Wildlife (\$36 million), the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation (\$31 million), the Department of Public Safety (\$24 million), the Alcoholic Beverage Commission (almost \$20 million), the

Secretary of State's Office (15 million) and the Railroad Commission (\$7 million).

In future years, legislators will be able to set fees in the General Appropriations Bill, the state's basic budget document, rather than in the statutes as they have done in the past. The new law will allow lawmakers to increase fees to cover operating expenses without having to change the statutes to reflect the change.

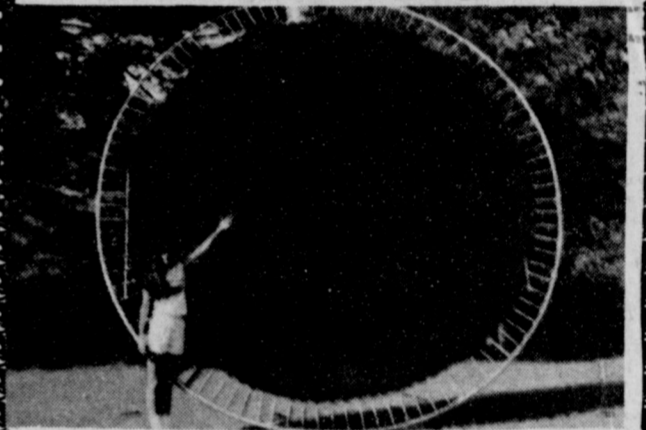
Not all fees are subject to this provision. Fees on a sliding scale, such as patient care charges and university tuition are exempted. Changes in these fees must be voted by both houses of the legislature and signed by the Governor.

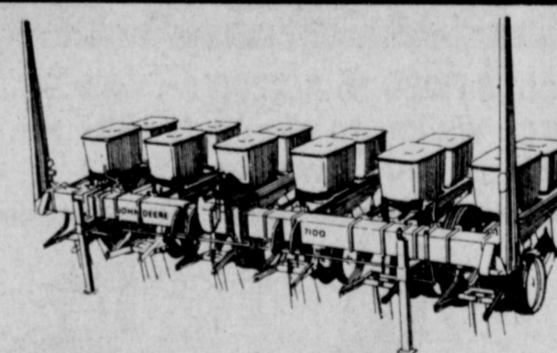

TSA Urges Awareness Of Impaired Driving

During National Drunk and Drugged Driving Week, December 11-17, and indeed throughout the holiday season, Texans are urged to be aware of the dangers of impaired driving and take precautions against the tragedies resulting from such driving behavior, according to George R. Gustafason, Executive Vice President of Texas Safety Association.

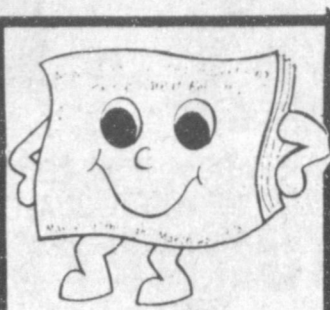
December was the worst month in Texas for DWI fatal accidents during the years 1979-1982 combined, according to Texas Department of Public Safety records. There were 335 fatal DWI-related accidents, resulting in 397 fatalities recorded by DPS. January 1 showed the most DWI-involved fatal accidents, 24, for the years 1979-1982 combined.

During this potentially deadly period, party-goers and party-givers are urged to follow these safety tips:
* Have plenty of food and non-alcoholic beverages available at parties where alcohol is also being served.
* When you mix drinks, use a jigger to measure the amount of alcohol. It's easy to underestimate the amount of alcohol you pour in a drink, especially if you've had a drink or two.
* Set up the beverage service so that guests can easily help themselves to refills of non-alcoholic drinks and to food items.
* Do not depend on coffee to sober up someone who

has been drinking. **COFFEE DOES NOT COUNTERACT THE ALCOHOL IN THE BLOOD STREAM.**
* Consider suggesting a carpool as part of the invitational process. One person in the group can serve as the designated driver. It's that person's responsibility to stay sober and drive the others home safely.
* If someone has had too much to drink, convince the person to stay overnight, ride home with someone else, or go home in a taxi. It's much more responsible to accept this minor inconvenience than to risk a person's life.
* Be sure to plan these safeguards into office parties as well as home settings. Drivers are also reminded to follow these precautions during holiday travel:
* Watch for drivers who have had too much to drink. Tipoffs of alcohol-or drug-impaired drivers include inconsistent driving speeds, frequent lane changing, disregarding traffic signs, and driving outside lane markers.
* Watch for pedestrians who may have had too much to drink.
* Wear your safety belt, ask your passengers to buckle up, and fasten children in child safety seats or safety belts, depending on their size and age.
* Plan ahead for long visits to relatives' and friends' homes. Winterize your car by checking the

brakes, fluids, tires, exhaust system, wipers, and headlights.

* Use the "two-second" rule to allow adequate following distance between you and the vehicle ahead. After the vehicle in front passes a particular point on the road, count "a thousand one, a thousand two, etc." If you reach the landmark before "a thousand two," increase your following distance.
* Keep the windows clear of ice, snow, and steam.
