President said 'eager' for Playboy interview

Although the White House once expressed interest in setting up a Playboy interview for President Ford,

presidential aides say Ford never really intended to appear in the magazine and that Playboy executives were just being given the

run-around.

Ford has been trying to staple Democratic presidential nominee Jimmy Carter to the wall for granting an interview to Playboy, but executives of the Chicago-based magazine say Ford at one time was eager for the magazine to interview him.

Both Ford and Carter spent Tuesday campaigning in the Chicago area, underlining their concern about the importance of the Illinois vote to the outcome of next Tuesday's balloting.

Ford spent the day criticizing Carter's foreign policy proposals. And he said in a broadcast political advertisement that his administration differs from that of Richard Nixon because "there's no dictatorial authority" under Ford.

Carter defended his foreign policy plans and expressed indignation at a pamphlet being distributed by the Ford campaign committee. The pamphlet, titled "Heartland," ridicules Carter, who said Ford "should be ashamed of himself" for allowing it to be distributed.

And Carter said if he is elected he will immediately start working "to restore a sense of cooperation be-

tween the president and the members of Congress."

Both the vice presidential candidates, Democratic Sen. Walter Mondale and Republican Sen. Bob Dole, were also on the campaign trail.

Mondale called on Ford to repudiate Dole's suggestion that World War II was fought because of the Democratic party. And Dole later backed away from his characterization of World War II as a "Democrat war." An aide said Dole backed off because of widespread adverse reaction to his comments.

Some Republicans have been hoping to use Carter' Playboy interview against him.

Playboy executives, obviously irritated at GOP barbs being thrown at the magazine, issued a statement Tuesday saying the White House had first suggested that the publication do a Ford interview.

Playboy said a later effort to set up a brief interview with Ford was unsuccessful because of scheduling conflicts and that the White House was cooperative in that effort.

But Ford's spokesman, Ron Nessen, said Playboy was being given the run-around and that Ford never had any intention of letting Playboy writers ask him any questions.

Court okays Watergate tape sale, broadcast

WASHINGTON (AP) — Richard Nixon's Watergate conversations with his associates were quoted extensively in print and made headlines during the 1974 cover-up trial. Now, the public may be allowed to hear

those incriminating and sometimes earthy tapes.

A court ruling Tuesday to allow copying, broadcast and sale of 30 White House tapes used as trial evidence displeased Nixon's lawyer.

"The effect of the (U.S. Circuit) Court of Appeals decision is to permit the commercial exploitation of the recordings of presidential conversations subpoenaed for use in a criminal trial," Herbert J. Miller said. "Accordingly, we will appeal that decision."

The court noted that "the tapes already have been played in a public forum" and said Nixon's claim of "intrusion on the sensibilities of those whose voices appear on the tapes" is groundless.

Congressman to tour Webb

Rep. Bob Krueger, D-New Braunfels, will tour Webb Air Force Base here Thursday, while he is in Big Spring in behalf of Democratic Presidential nominee Jimmy Carter.

Krueger will arrive at the Howard County Airport at 9 a.m., and will tour the base at 9:15.

The Howard County Young Democrats will then host a reception for Krueger at the Democratic Headquarters, 4th and Runnels, at 10 a.m.

Krueger, who was elected outstanding freshman member of the House of Representatives by his fellow Congressmen, will speak in behalf of Carter and Walter Mondale and the Democratic ticket.

He will hold a news conference at 10:30 a.m. at the headquarters, and will depart at 11 a.m. from the Howard County Airport.

Judge overrules motion to restrict publicity

District Judge Ralph W. Caton this morning overruled most of a motion to restrict publicity of judicial

proceedings concerning Maj. Harold Roy Freeman.

Freeman is charged with family sex crimes.

Judge Caton granted the defense requests to prohibit photographing, televising or broadcasting from inside the courtroom. He denied the other parts of the motion.

George Gilkerson, defense attorney, wanted the court to order that any reporters covering the trial be either licensed attorneys or have 60 hours of training in law school.

Bob Burton and John Edwards, two reporters for the Big Spring Herald, testified they had college degrees but had completed no courses in criminal law. District Attorney Robert H. Moore III agreed to the statement Carl McMillen, a radio station reporter, was not an attorney.

Gilkerson contended the defense had not been permitted to talk to Freeman's stepchildren and said the children had been "hidden."

"I've never heard of hiding a witness," Gilkerson said.

Moore objected. No attempt was made to take depositions from the victims while they were living in the area for six months, Moore said.

"For the record, the children are (now) in New Hampshire with their natural father," Moore said.

Moore objected to the children being interviewed in the absence of state officials.

"The children were told by Carol Freeman (their mother, also a defendant) that Mrs. Freeman would go to the electric chair if they testified," Moore claimed.

Gilkerson called the prosecution's allegation of intimidation attempts "just a figment of imagination of Mr. Moore."

Carter family return to West Texas area

"I'm looking for Howard County to give us the biggest majority (for Jimmy Carter) in the 69-county West Texas region," Glyn Day, Odessa, Carter's West Texas campaign manager said Tuesday.

"Local Democrats are really putting in a lot of work into this election, he added. He made the remarks at a regional strategy meeting here.

Day said that West Texas would go for Carter as a whole and that the Democratic Presidential ticket of Carter and Walter Mondale would carry every county except two, Midland and Andrews Counties.

"There are several counties where it will be close, but I think we'll pull it out."

GOPers, others to greet former governor

Republicans, Independents and Texans for Ford alike are being encouraged to greet John Connally when the former Texas governor and Secretary of the Treasury lands at the Howard County Airport at 10:30 a.m., Thursday.

Connally is stumping the state on behalf of the Gerald Ford-Robert Dole ticket. His plane will be on the ground here upwards to 40 minutes.

Connally will be accompanied here by his wife and Wells Madden, a well-known campaign worker.

The local delegation greeting Connally will be headed by R. H. Weaver, chairman of the Texans for Ford group in Howard County.

In the main, Connally will spend his

time conferring with the people though he will hold a short press conference before his aircraft flies on to the Midland Air Terminal.

Connally will stop at Lubbock, Plainview, San Angelo and El Paso, as well as Big Spring, in last-minute efforts to rally support for the incumbent president.

Pollsters still haven't been able to pick a Texas winner in the presidential race, although the Democrat, Jimmy Carter, is slightly ahead in the head-to-head confrontation.

A large number of "undecideds" remain in the state. It is to that group the Connally group is concentrating its efforts, in hopes of swinging the election for the GOPs.

TAC examiner says Southwest should get routes

AUSTIN — A Texas Aeronautics Commission hearing examiner today recommended that Southwest Airlines be allowed to fly to Midland Air Terminal and to Austin, Corpus Christi, El Paso and Lubbock in addition to currently authorized cities.

The Aeronautics Commission is scheduled to meet Dec. 1 when a vote on the recommendation is expected.

Hearing examiner John Soule said that testimony in public hearings showed there was "an overwhelming desire" for Southwest's lower fares and increased frequency of service.

Southwest currently operates flights to Dallas Love Field, Houston Hobby Airport, San Antonio and Harlingen.

DETROIT (AP) — Dan Ogden says he's used to surprising people who see him standing on suburban roofs, wearing a black top hat and tails. 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Fondness for sleep helped him survive

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Bruce Collins says three rainstorms and his fondness for sleep helped him survive a 28-day shipwreck ordeal that killed two companions adrift with him in a raft.

But his parents say self-confidence and optimism saved the tall, gaunt but rosy-cheeked young sailor who arrived here Tuesday aboard a Coast Guard cutter that plucked him from the Pacific Ocean on Sunday about 800 miles west of here.

"I just got into it — slept a lot," Collins said after he was rushed by ambulance to the U.S. Public Health Service Hospital. "I slept as much as I could.... I just felt fine. I'm a recreational sleeper."

Collins told his parents that emergency water supplies ran out 13 days after he, Jim Ahola and Camilla Arthur took to a small life raft when their 42-foot yacht Spirit sank during a storm on Sept. 27. Two other survivors were rescued from a separate life raft six days before Collins was found.

"We were able to catch rain water from the canopy on the raft," he said. "Probably after the water ran out, we got maybe three good rainstorms.... That would be a pint of water each time."

The 23-year-old business student-turned-adventurer refused to say how Ahola, 25, and Miss Arthur, 20, died. He said he first wanted to give their families the courtesy of personally telling them.

His mother, Kathryn Collins of Walnut Creek, Calif., said she asked her son whether he had given up hope during his days and nights alone on the high seas. "He said, 'Heck no. I was going to drift to California,'" she said. "He's always been strong and optimistic."

Though Collins was malnourished, dehydrated and infected with sores when rescued, his condition improved as he was fed soup and other liquids during the voyage here.

In fact, Collins arrived in such good condition that he wanted to try a hamburger as his first bit of solid food, his doctor said. His only serious problem was sores on his arms and legs caused by heat and lack of hygiene.

Rules rebates are illegal

HOUSTON (AP) — Federal Maritime Commissioner Bob Casey says that rebates given by shipping companies to customers to attract business are illegal.

He said Tuesday a recent investigation by the Securities and Exchange Commission showed that a single U.S. shipping ay have paid out \$19 million in rebates in a three-year period.

He said the investigation also showed that one shipping customer has disclosed more than \$250,000 in rebates.

He said the Maritime Commission has asked the U.S. Justice Department to enforce criminal laws on rebates.

Casey spoke to the Containerization Institute of shippers from the west Gulf area.

MIDLAND — The Midland city council and county commissioners are continuing plans for a proposed north loop around the city.

Plans are indefinite, however, because state funding is not immediately available.

The project includes widening Holiday Hill Road on the west of Midland, continuing north past the Andrews Highway, Airpark and Hogan Park and entering US 80 again on the east side of Midland.

Mrs. Collins, her banker husband, Kenneth, their daughter, Mary, and a friend of young Collins were allowed to see him aboard

ship and visited him at the hospital. Relatives said Ahola was an outdoorsman who had done some photography. Miss Arthur was his girl friend.

Collins told his rescuers that Ahola died Oct. 19, and Miss Arthur died two days later.

The other crew members were Miss Arthur's friend, Nancy Perry, 21, and Durel

Miller, 28, whom Jackson met on an earlier cruise around the Hawaiian islands. It was the rescue of Miller and Miss Perry on Oct. 18 by a freighter that touched off the week-long search for the other life raft.

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As stud, Humphrey the camel is dud

WASHINGTON (AP) — Humphrey the camel was bought by the National Zoo last year to father a herd of Bactrian camels. But as a stud, Humphrey's a dud.

"We checked his teeth and everything," said Dr. Theodore Reed, director of the zoo. They overlooked one detail: Humphrey has no testicles.

"Our hindsight was not so good," lamented Reed.

Although Humphrey "goes through the motions," as Reed puts it, there can be no little Humphreys.

The awful truth was discovered when personnel at the zoo's breeding farm at Front Royal, Va., began wondering why, after a year of "going through the motions," Humphrey's tribe was not increasing.

They set out to do a sperm count. One look told them a

sperm count was neither possible nor necessary.

Humphrey's plight became common knowledge in the scientific community recently when Reed was called to the stage three times to accept awards on behalf of National Zoo from the American Association of Zoological Parks and Aquariums.

First, there was the Edward Bean Outstanding

Birth Award for a kiwi born at National Zoo last year.

Secondly, Reed trooped to the stage to pick up a special achievement award for the zoo's having bred 50 pygmy hippos over the years.

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Weather Panhandle mist turns into snow

Mist turned into fine snow in parts of the Texas Panhandle and a wintry storm sweeping southward brought rain, drizzle and fog into most other sections of the state today.

It threatened some of the chilliest weather so far this season in many areas.

Sharp north winds herded the cold front downstate in early morning along a line from North Central Texas into the Big Bend country of far West Texas.

Occasionally heavy thunderstorms belabored much of South Texas, dumping rain at rates up to one inch per hour in places.

A travel advisory for the Panhandle cautioned motorists about possibly hazardous driving conditions. Another warned against winds exceeding 45 miles per hour through

Guadalupe Pass and elsewhere in the Guadalupe and Davis Mountains of West Texas.

Temperatures near daybreak sagged to 31 degrees at Amarillo and 32 at Dalhart and Perryton in the Panhandle. At the same hour the reading was 76 at Brownsville in the semitropical Lower Rio Grande Valley.

Skies were clear in extreme East Texas and at least partly cloudy everywhere else in the state.

More snow was promised the Panhandle and South Plains into tonight and mixtures of rain, drizzle and fog were forecast in other sections. Overnight temperatures dipping into the 30s were predicted in West and North Texas and down to around 50 in parts of South Texas.

Energy Emergency natural gas sales voted

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — The railroad commission voted Tuesday to permit Lo-Vaca Gathering Co. to make emergency natural gas sales for up to 10 days without requiring a public hearing.

Such sales could be made, the commission said, where the public health, safety or welfare is concerned.

Hearing examiner John Hays said now if a city's gas supply was cut off, Lo-Vaca could not provide gas service to the city until a hearing had been held.

The bill for a Fort Davis customer using 10,000 cubic feet of gas a month would rise 15 per cent, from \$20.05 to \$23.06. The cost for the same amount of gas in the Reeves County towns would rise 18.8 per cent, from \$15.95 to \$18.95, the commission said.

—Dismissed Lone Star Gas Co.'s appeal of Garland's refusal to grant a rate increase because it was not filed in time.

—Gave Southwest Texas Municipal Gas Corp., a non-profit corporation, permission to increase natural gas rates in the unincorporated areas of Fort Davis in Jeff Davis County and Saragosa, Brogado and Toyahvale in Reeves County.

Capital punishment called 'barbaric'

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP) — Organizers of a group to fight capital punishment in Texas say they will try to impress on the public and the governor that the death penalty "is barbaric and has no place in a civilized society."

Dr. Bob Brischetto, chairman of the San Antonio chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU), has invited religious and community leaders from across Texas to meet Thursday night in San Antonio to organize a statewide coalition.

In a news release Tuesday, Brischetto said that "unless some immediate action is taken by our governor or the legislature, Texas may very well have the dubious distinction of being the first state in the nation to execute a person since 1964."

"And once the switch is pulled on the first, the others will come much more easily," he added.

Henry Schwarzchild, a New York City lawyer who is coordinator of the ACLU capital punishment project, is scheduled to discuss organizing a campaign against the death penalty.

Texas currently has 48

persons on death row awaiting execution in the electric chair. The date of the first execution, Nov. 22, has been set for Ernest Benjamin Smith Jr., 28.

THE HAGUE, The Netherlands (AP) — Princess Christina of the Netherlands, 29, and her Cuban-born American husband, Jorge Guillermo, are expecting their first baby by next June.

A spokesman for the princess said Christina, who arrived here over the weekend, had a medical examination Tuesday in Leiden University clinic.

The couple was married in The Netherlands in July 1975.
