Little Interest Shown in Saturday Demo Primary

Annual Clean-Up Campaign Set For Hico May 9 thru 13

Mayor Bill Howard has declared next week as the period for the Annual City-Wide Clean-Up Campaign in Hico. In connection with the campaign, the City of Hico will haul off trash free of charge next Wednesday, May 11, and Friday, May 13.

All trash to be hauled off should be placed in suitable containers and placed as near

a curb as possible in order to speed the free service.

City officials have urged each and every citizen in Hico to participate in this special period of cleaning. They point out that it is a good time to clear away all excess cans, trash and other unsightly conditions, making for a cleaner and more healthy community.

Two years ago, Hico residents 440 strong trekked to the polls in the Democratic Primary, but unless more people become interested in voting in this Saturday's primary, the total may fall far short of that count.

Eleven of the 25 offices to be filled on the state and local level are contested, which should be enough to bring out a record number of voters. But, if interest in the various contests is as lax Saturday as it has been the past three or more weeks, then election officials will have an easy day.

Only real interest displayed locally has been in the Justice of the Peace race, where three candidates are vying for the office. A little flurry of interest has also been evident in the Constable's contest, where two announced write-in candidates are seeking the post.

Only one county contest faces Hico voters, that of County Clerk where Mrs. Genevieve Clark is seeking the post over incumbent Vada Williams.

In the Peace Justice race, incumbent P. W. Hamilton is opposed by Mrs. C. H. (Lois) Leeth, and Grover Renfro. If any issue

on the ballot is to get out the vote, this is it.

In the Constable race, W. B. (Old Sarge) Donley is passing cards for write-in election to the post, as is incumbent Tom Odom. Neither name is on the ballot, and those desiring to vote either of the two must mark their ballot "For Constable" and follow with their choice.

County Democratic Chairman Bradford Coorigan said Wednesday that votes would not be counted in the Constable race if the office was not indicated. He further stated that winner of the post would be assessed a regular filing fee just as other candidates whose names appear on the ballot.

Another contest which directly affects local people is that of Congressman, where incumbent Omar Burleson faces his toughest opposition in several years. Eldon Mahon, Abilene attorney, is seeking the seat now held by Burleson.

State Senator J. P. Word of Meridian is unopposed after his announced opponent dropped out of the race early in the campaign.

In the State Representative race, Hico voters will be casting their ballots for either incumbent J. E. Ward of Glen Rose or Bob Elder of Alvarado. Hico and Hamilton County was re-shuffled into Ward's district following re-districting late last year. He has served three terms in Austin. The new district is composed of Hamilton, Bosque, Somervell and Johnson counties.

Former Iredell Resident Credited With Saving Life of Dallas Negro

A Dallas policeman risked his life early last Wednesday to save a 31-year-old Negro from a burning house.

Patrolman Don L. Howard noticed the fire in the home of Herman Burroughs shortly after midnight and rushed into the blazing house to find Mr. Burroughs unconscious near the front door.

Patrolman Howard dragged the unconscious, badly burned man from the house and gave first aid before arrival of firemen and the ambulance.

Mr. Burroughs was in critical condition with third and fourth degree burns over most of his body at Parkland Hospital.

The fire was in Mr. Burroughs' bedroom and was confined to a small area of the small, frame house.

Patrolman Howard, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. F. Howard of Iredell, was not injured.

It Was 'Hail' in Hico Friday

A hail storm of gigantic proportions, accompanied by winds of tornado velocity and torrential rains, swooped down on the Hico area late Friday afternoon creating emergency conditions for a short time.

Hico proper was only in the edge of the storm, with full force of the hail, rain and wind centered in an area about two miles northwest of town. Worst hit areas was bounded by the Charlie Tolliver place to the west, George Golightly farm to the north, Ray Morrison place to the south, and the old Stephenville Highway on the east.

A quarter of a mile area that appeared to be worst hit was from just south of the George Kilgo home. Window panes were smashed at the Bud Roberson, H. A. Patterson and Kilgo homes and farther west at the Tolliver, Berger and John Golightly places. High winds uprooted large trees, blew down small buildings, and toppled a windmill. Only report of livestock damage was at the Tolliver place where several head of goats were killed.

Directly in the path of the storm, hail stacked up six inches deep

in open areas, and drifted as high as four feet in places.

One accident, involving three automobiles and a chartered Greyhound bus, was the direct result of conditions following the hail storm. The accident occurred at the old roadside park on Highway 281, and involved a car driven by O. B. McCampbell of Hico and one driven by a Walnut Springs lady. The third car was unidentified, and the chartered bus was occupied by Air Force personnel being transferred from San Antonio to Wichita Falls. No injuries were reported.

The accident occurred as Mr. McCampbell was attempting to turn around and was barely nudged by the slow-moving Walnut Springs car. The third car in turn hit the rear of the Walnut automobile, forcing it into the right front of McCampbell's car. The bus became involved when it swerved to miss the wreckage, bounding across the highway into the ditch on the left side of the road. The bus was not damaged.

Visibility at the time of the accident was zero, and only a warning from McCampbell prevented a more serious accident.

Wierd Scenes

Dense condensation from the accumulated hail on the ground created a wierd scene in the area. The heavy rainfall quickly put small creeks and branches at flood stage, and at one time, more than a foot of hail was stacked on the large stock tank on the Hill Bros. farm.

On the Home Range

By SONDRA KOONSEN
Home Demonstration Agent

Now that spring is here, it's time to store winter clothes. Special attention should be given to your wool and mohair garments. Spots and stains will be harder to remove—or they may not come out at all—a year later. Moth larvae are attracted more to soiled clothing. Send the soiled garments to a good dry cleaner and call his attention to any spots and stains.

Besides dry cleaning, brushing and sunning garments will also help rid clothing of moths including their eggs and larvae. Brush thoroughly, especially in seams, folds and pockets. For added protection store your clothing with "moth

balls"—paradichlorobenzene crystals, or naphthalene flakes or crystals. Directions on the container suggest the amount to use.

It is a good idea to remove plastic buttons, buckles and other plastic ornaments before storing. Avoid using plastic hangers, which may cause a stain or melt into the fabric. If space is available, store hangable garments in garment bags on rust-proof hangers.

Put sweaters and other knitted garments in bags or boxes. Tightly-wrapped paper packages, air-tight boxes or chests, or garment bags are the best storage places. Cedar

chests are old favorites for winter clothing storage, but all garments must be moth-free before they are put into a cedar chest. Cedar oil vapor does kill small moth larvae but not older, larger ones.

As a cedar chest gets older, however, there is less cedar oil vapor. Therefore, cedar chest that is several years old may give no more protection than any other air-tight container.

Old-fashioned enamelware is making a come-back, now designed for the dinner table and the freezer as well as for the kitchen range. Despite its new social status, this smooth-surface enamelware is still traditionally washable in hot soap or detergent suds.

If you use a metal filter top on your electric skillet, it must be swished clean in soap or detergent

suds after each use. These covers usually made of aluminum tend to collect grease as they escape.
