DISTRICT DELEGATES TOLD

Education Needed as Cancer Research Gains

Research is gaining in the effort to eliminate or prevent human cancer, but on the basis of current medical tools there still is need today for more cancer education.

That was the report here Tuesday of Dr. James O. Gillespie of San Francisco, Calif., West Coast Medical Director for American Cancer Society.

Gillespie was speaker at a noon luncheon for District 2 of American Cancer Society's Texas Division.

The luncheon in Civic House was attended by more than 40 delegates from the West Texas district and members of Colorado City's 3 civic clubs—Lions, Kiwanis and Jaycees.

In business session of the meeting, Mrs. Harry J. Russell of Midland, Dr. Noble Price of Lamesa and Mrs. Clayton Williams of Sweetwater were elected to the State Board of Directors of the Texas Division.

Cancer Society members in the all-day meeting from the Mitchell County chapter were Frank Kelley, Mrs. H. H. Simons, Miss Mabel Smith, Mrs. J. C. Womack, Mrs. Frank Kelley, Frank Wilson, Mrs. Bennett Scott, Mrs. J. L. Jones, Mrs. Cricket B. Taylor, Mrs. Paul Byron, C. E. Cogswell, Mrs. C. P. Gary, Mrs. James Kelley and Sallie Tharp, all of Colorado City; Mrs. Rex

McKenney and Mrs. Myrl Hambrick of Westbrook; Mrs. J. P. Nunn of Buford, Mrs. Doyle Hester and Mrs. Glen Coon of Lorraine.

In another meeting highlight, 14 counties were officially recognized for their outstanding achievement during the 1960 Crusade for funds.

These were Andrews, Borden, Dawson, Dickens, Fisher, Glasscock, Kent, Martin, Midland, Mitchell, Nolan, Stone, Wall, and Yoakum Counties. Five of these, Dawson, Glasscock, Midland, Mitchell, and Yoakum Counties, also received special awards for exceeding their Crusade quota for the past five consecutive years.

Dr. Gillespie, who is West Coast Medical Director for the American Cancer Society, said that within the last year there have been several times the number of significant discoveries as were made only three or four years ago.

Pointing out that the big research promise today lies in the new area of attack, chemotherapy, Dr. Gillespie gave specific examples of the results of tests of some of the scores of new compounds being used for cancer treatment. He told in detail of the efforts being made to develop a serum to provide immunity to certain types of cancer, and also the exploration of the theory that some cancers are virus-caused.

He concluded that research progress along these lines, on which millions of dollars are being spent each year, gives a hopeful picture of the future in the fight against cancer.

Other special presentations made at the meeting were concerned with the Society's programs of public education, campaign and publicity.

ASC Says Not to Wait for S. Bank

Mitchell County farmers were instructed this week to not delay their cropping plans with expectation for additional Soil Bank program.

"Notification is being given all interested farmers," said Wayne Worley, county office manager for Agricultural Stabilization & Conservation Committee, "there will be no authorization to accept additional land in the Conservation Reserve Program this fall for the 1961 crop year."

"And farmers should not further delay their cropping plans with the intent to place land in the program."

The ASC reports that existing Conservation Reserve contracts which expire in 1960 or later are no longer eligible to be extended for an additional period.

Annual payments for 1960 on Conservation Reserve contracts will be paid to all eligible producers within the next 2 weeks, according to Worley.

At the same time of the Soil Bank notice, the ASC emphasized that money still is available for carrying out timely practices under the 1960 Agriculture Conservation Practice program.

Requests for these cost-share benefits are being taken now for Practice F-1, seeding rye, oats or barley as small grain winter cover crop; Practice E-1, stubble mulching; Practice F-1d, applying cotton burrs to crop land; and Practice C-4 and C-5, standard terraces and diversions.

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PIONEERS HONORED

Fair Attendance Sets Record Above 6,000

Mitchell County Fair moved to a record attendance mark late Saturday before doors were closed for the 1960 event.

Total number of visitors for the 3-night and 2-day event was estimated at more than 6,000 persons.

And it produced a fitting climax to a weekend of activities which began Thursday with opening and dedication of Colorado City Historical Museum and the county's annual Old-Timers Reunion.

Not only did the fair claim a record in attendance—1,000 more spectators than in 1959—but also featured more than 40 concessions and commercial booths, plus expanded entries in all contest divisions.

Most popular new addition to the fair program, no doubt, was the free nightly entertainment in front of Civic House.

This feature, beginning Thursday evening with Colorado High Band concert and fiddlers contest, attracted more

crowds as the fair lengthened. The Landeros Orchestra was in the spotlight Friday night and Rock 'n Roll was the musical beat Saturday night.

At the pioneer reunion program Thursday evening in Colorado High Auditorium—after the crowd had talked over history and inspected the museum during the morning—awards were presented by Harry Ratliff, president of Colorado City Museum Association.

Plaques went to Miss Neal Mills and her sister, Mrs. Lurie Wilson, for having lived in Mitchell County the longest. Their residency dates back to 1881.

Mrs. Myrtle Mize of San Diego, Calif., was honored as having traveled the longest distance to the reunion. And Uncle Billy Bassham, 90-year-old local resident, received the oldest pioneer plaque.

Receiving tribute as the couple who had lived in Mitchell County the longest were Mr. and Mrs. Ed S. Jones, who have been here for 57 years.

Tommy Neal of Colorado City won the old fiddlers con-

test with Charlie Neal, of Lorraine, second, and John Deatheridge of Abilene, third.

Commercial awards at the fair were: Mary's Flowers and Texas Electric Service, first; Baker Hotel and Blossom Shop, second; Pennington Furniture and Tumbleweed Company, third.

Clerk Says Petitions To Be Ready

You probably will begin to see those local option petitions this week.

County Clerk Gilbert Leach announced Saturday that the initial request for the petition was in order and that copies of the petition will be ready Monday or Tuesday.

And that means proponents for the local option election will begin to circulate copies of the petition early in the week for signatures.

Leach is obligated by law to prepare the petitions upon presentation of a properly prepared and signed request by 10 qualified applicants. The request submitted to him Thursday had the signatures of 12 prominent citizens.

The county clerk said that he has requested assistance of an attorney in preparing the petitions so that all legal requirements would be properly met.

He pointed out also the petition will seek a local option election—limited to Colorado City—on the question of off-premises sale of all alcoholic beverages.

This fact was pointed out in the petition request printed Thursday in the Colorado City Record. But some citizens have understood the election request to pertain only to beer, Leach said.

Circulators of the petition will have 30 days—after receiving copies of the petition from the county clerk—to obtain sufficient number of qualified signers to require Commissioners Court to call an election.

The number of signers must be as many as 25 per cent of qualified voters within the city (based on the total number of votes cast for governor in the last presidential election).

Last presidential election was in 1956 when 1,491 persons cast votes in Precinct 1 and 12 in the governor's race.

On the basis of that total, the petitions must have approximately 375 signers to meet the requirements for an election call.

Supporters of the election call are confident that number of qualified signatures can be obtained. However, there is

Crop Dusting Plane Down On Fee Ranch

A crop dusting plane crashed Wednesday afternoon on the Bob Fee ranch, knocking out an electrical line and setting fire to pasture.

But the pilot came out of the mishap without injury. The accident happened at about 5:45 p. m. in the north area of the Fee ranch, southeast of Colorado City.

The plane, owned by American Dusters Company of Chickasha, Okla., and piloted by Bill Melott, struck a power line of Lone Wolf Electric Cooperative and crashed in a creek bed.

Police and firemen were called to the scene and an area in vicinity of the crash was without electric service temporarily.

Approximately \$5,000 damage was estimated for the Serman plane.

Freshmen Wolves Roll To 44-6 Grid Triumph

Scoring 2 more points than in their last encounter with Hamlin, Colorado City's Freshmen Wolves rolled to a 44-6 victory over the visitors Thursday evening in Wolf Stadium.

Coach Winn Talley said that the Wolves' third touchdown seemed to be the decisive one. After that goal, there was no stopping the Wolves.

Hamlin had a couple of good backs, but defensively, they were behind the eight ball all night. Larry Butler, the lad who scored for Ham-

lin, played a good ballgame, but he needed some more blocking.

In the first quarter, Wolf quarterback Dale Walker carried the pigskin for the first tally of the evening. Ronnie Lightfoot crossed over for the extra 2 points.

A few minutes later, Bill Boren was the carrier for 6 more points with Walker handling the extra point play for 2 more. The first quarter ended 16-0.

With less than one minute gone in the second quarter, Lightfoot scored, and Walker carried for the extra points again. Four minutes later, Boren hit paydirt again, but this time the extra point try failed.

On the return kickoff, Hamlin's Butler took the ball, eluded a couple of tacklers, and made a spectacular 65 yard run for the Pled Pipers' lone TD. Their extra point try was not good.

Two minutes before the half ended, Denzil Pendergrass caught a pass and added 6 more points to the Colorado City score. Lightfoot made the try for 2 extra points good.

It looked as if the Wolves would score again as they recovered a fumble on Hamlin's 25 yard line with still one minute of playing time, but the clock ran out with Colorado City in scoring position on the 10. This left the half-time score at 38-6.

The last half was a relatively slow one, with only one score made that counted. Just as the third period of play ended, Bill Boren crossed the goal line for the Wolves sixth tally. The extra point try failed.

During the fourth quarter, the Wolves made one TD that was called back for a penalty, so the game ended with a score of 44-6.

Defensive standouts for the Wolves included Bill Metzger, Lightfoot, Larry Dambrosio, and Melvin Morgan. Wal-

ker and Boren proved to be versatile by turning in good defensive performances also.

The Freshmen have won 4 games in 5 starts, losing only to the Rotar B team. Their game this week will be with Post in Wolf Stadium at 6:00, Thursday, Oct. 6.
