PEANUT BUTTER COOKIES

1 pkg. Duncan Hines yellow Deluxe cake mix
1 c. peanut butter
1/2 c. cooking oil
2 T. water
2 eggs

Preheat oven at 350°. Combine all ingredients and mix well. Drop from a teaspoon onto ungreased cookie sheet. Press a criss-cross on each cookie. Bake at 350° for ten to twelve minutes, until golden.

MUSHROOM CASSEROLE

1 1/2 lbs. ground beef
3/4 lbs. cheese
about 6 tortillas
1 flat can green chilies
1 can mushroom soup
salt and pepper to taste

Brown ground beef and grate cheese (leaving 1/4 c. for topping) and add together; add green chilies and mushroom soup. Cook until cheese is melted. Use a large baking dish and alternate the meat mixture with tortillas. Sprinkle top with remaining grated cheese and bake at 350° for 30 minutes.

PECAN PIE

2/3 c. sugar
1 c. Karo syrup
4 eggs
1 t. vanilla
1/8 t. salt
2 T. butter or margarine

Prepare uncooked 9" pie shell. Mix all other ingredients together and pour into pie shell. Cook one hour at 350°.

Easter Seal Appeal Letters Reaching Castro Residents

Because of the steady growth in numbers of crippled children and adults in Texas, the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas has stepped up its rehabilitation services.

According to Charles Sharp, who is the Easter Seal Representative for Swisher County, 20,570 handicapped Texans received Easter Seal treatments during 1973.

"Despite medical scientific advances," Sharp explained,

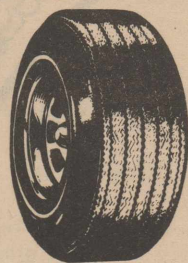
"the ranks of the crippled are growing. This is because of population growth, increased number of accidents and medical treatment which saves victims of crippling diseases who might not have lived in past years."

Quoting the annual report of the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas, he said that 18 affiliated treatment centers are in operation in Texas. They include treatment and rehabi-

tation centers, recreation and educational programs, and many others.

"Through these programs, persons with a wide variety of handicaps receive the help they need to live normal lives," Sharp said.

The largest group served includes those with major deformities of bones and joints, severe speech defects, cerebral palsy, arthritis, muscular dystrophy and multiple sclerosis and stroke. The Easter Seal Campaign, which provides funds for continuation of these services, begins March 1, and continues through April 14, Easter Sunday.

Camp Sweeney Diabetic Training Center for diabetic boys and girls (six through 16 years of age) will open it's 25th season June 2 with three-three week sessions as follows: June 2 to 22, June 23-July 13 and July 14-August 3.

Camp Sweeney is located nine miles east and one mile north Gainesville, Texas, on 338 acres of beautiful rolling timbered hills with three dormitories for boys and three for girls; a non-denominational chapel; a modern hospital; a 30 acre lake for boating, fishing and water skiing; a sanitary swimming pool, tennis courts, recreational pavilion, target range and 20 gentle saddle horses.

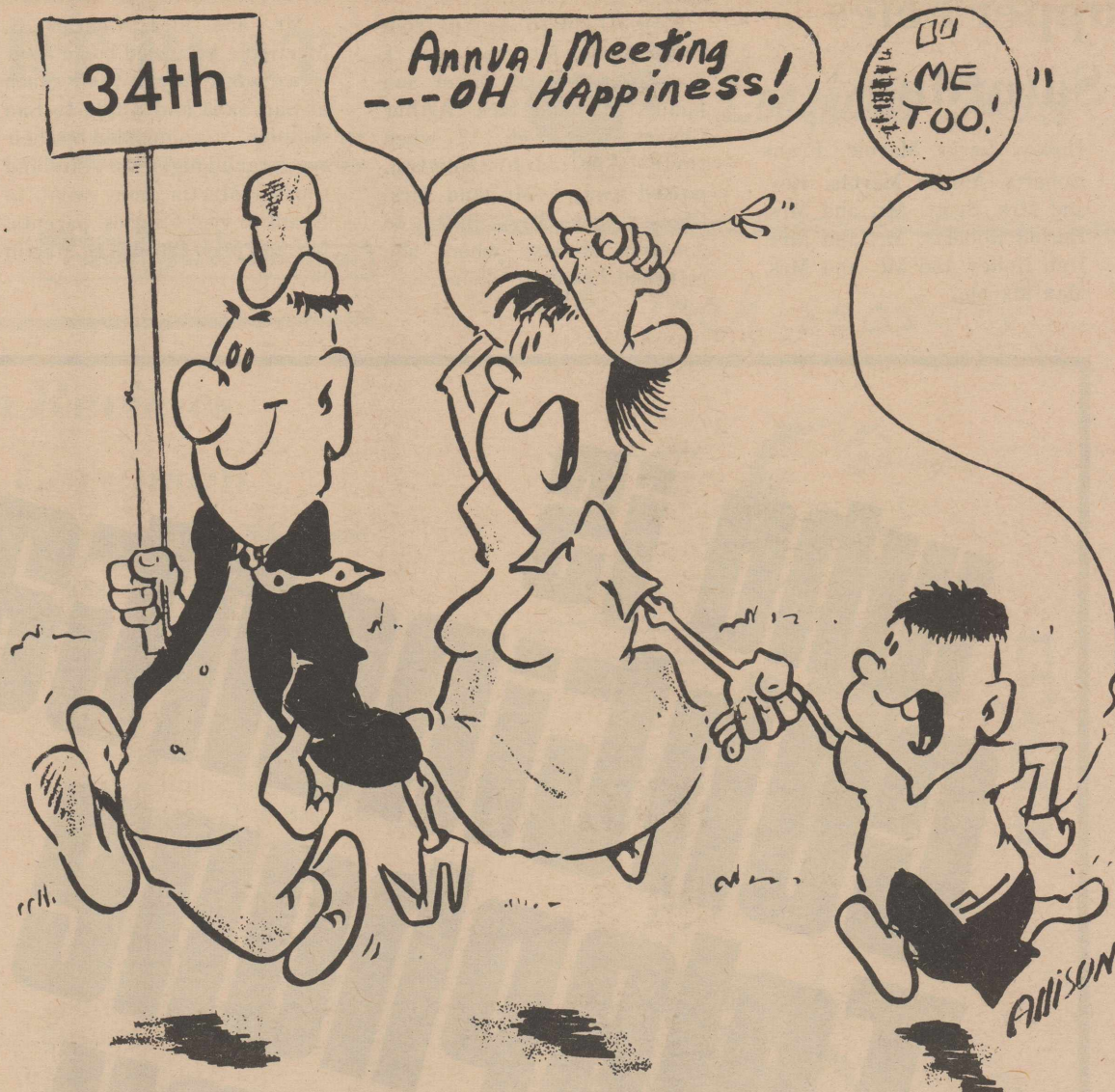
