VERNON-BURKBURNETT ROAD OFFICIALLY ACCEPTED BY STATE DEPARTMENT

de Allison To Face Trial Soon In Wichita Falls

A. Worker Granted New
Trial By Reversal Of Case

HOMICIDE CHARGED

de Allison will be given a trial in the near future upon charge of aggravated assault, according to Ned McDaniel, County Attorney in statement issued today. Allison was given an 18 month jail sentence in a case charged with negligent homicide in county court last spring for death of R. H. McFarlane, Supervisor. McDaniel said that an effort would be made to have the trial as soon as possible.

McFarlane was a WPA superintendent on a local project at the time he received injuries which led to his death a few moments after the conviction was reversed by the court of criminal appeals at Austin.

An opinion demanded that a trial be given on the basis of the evidence and that the evidence not warrant negligent homicide charge. If the appellant was found guilty it was for some degree of negligence to be determined by the court under proper instructions by the court.

George A. H. Carrigan, friend of Allison, aided in the prosecution of McFarlane is the brother of McFarlane congressman of the 13th district of Texas. The fatal encounter arose after Allison had been discharged by McFarlane on order from Wichita Falls.

ed Knauth Takes ad In Fight For Salaries Equities

Commissioner Demands
Even Cut From Top To
Bottom

'36 SCALE POSTED

County office employees whose salaries were slashed Jan. 1, by commissioners court were resented to their former pay roll ending Monday after members of the court, and other county officials, again declined a challenge to effect noticeable cuts in their own salaries.

Same Policy For All

Monday it was F. R. Knauth, commissioner for the Burk Burnett precinct, who proposed with the insistence that department heads and commissioners fall in with the salary slashing they applied to the departmental employees. The Burk Burnett official insisted that the court "start at the top and come right on down" with pay-cuts until they reached the deputies.

When it was pointed out that salaries of such officials are set by law, Knauth observed that the legislature convenes Tuesday and he asked to provide the desired "relief." Members of the court, and at least one department head, indicated that such a program would not prove "satisfactory."

Knauth then offered a motion that all salaries of deputies and clerks be restored to the 1936 scale without further delay. Lee, commissioner for the Wichita Falls precinct, seconded the motion. After much discussion, action on the matter was postponed. After the luncheon session, the motion was put to a vote. Negative votes were cast by commissioners Henry Hines of Electra and Miles Hines of Park. Knauth and Cooper voted affirmatively, and were overruled by Judge H. W. Filmore.

Economies Wiped Out

The younger son, Wendell is coach of basketball team at Jonesboro college and is teacher in French at the State school. The young man lettered in basketball and made all state in Jonesboro for the last seven years. He came here highly recommended, and was received graciously and enthusiastically by the local congregation.

Civil Service Exams Announced

The local post office announced a series of examinations for civil service employment this week for male stenographers. The federal government announced that there was a sufficient supply in the register of female typists and stenographers, but that positions would be open for men in the near future.

Among the center of examination will be Wichita Falls not later than January 21. For details those interested have been requested to see the local postal authorities. The rating will be based on the following schedule: Copying from plain paper draft, 30, typist, 15 steno; copying from rough draft, typist 30, steno, 15; general test typist, 40 steno 20; stenography 50. (required of stenographic competitors only.)

The applicants must have following qualifications: Over 18, under 53; sound physical health; citizens of the United States. The applicants must be prepared to submit photograph, finger prints, and other regular government rules. The salaries range from \$1260 to \$1660 per year.

Adoption Of Road Announced Thru Burk Commiss'nr

Hines Promises Hard Surfacing
For Entire Stretch In Near
Future.

RIGHT OF WAY NEEDED

Drainage, Bridge, and Widening
To Be Started Immediately
By Department.

F. R. Knauth received word Tuesday that the highway between Burk Burnett and Vernon via Harold had been adopted by the state highway department as a state highway, and that the improvement would start on the route in the near future.

The designation brought rejoicing to Burk Burnett citizens and organizations that had been working for the designation for several years. During the last few months intensive campaign had been waged to bring about the official recognition of one of the most important arteries of traffic in the entire district.

To Be Paved

Mr. Knauth announced that immediate steps would be taken to secure the necessary 100 foot right of way for the district, and that the state would start the movement of fences, grading, and bridge work as soon as the land had been secured.

Mr. Hines in his letter to the local commissioner stated that portion of the road which did not have hard surface at this time would receive attention as soon as it was possible to include it in the state program for paving.

Number Unannounced

The number or the letter for the highway was not announced at the present, but in the near future markers and numbers will be placed along the route.

Before the adoption, resolutions were adopted by Vernon and Wichita commissioners courts asking the attention of the department. From Burk Burnett and Vernon delegations visited the state board while the organization was in session, and asked for personal attention of the body to the route.

Deputy Collector Restored In Burk And Other Towns

Full Time Deputies Employed
For Short Time In Each
Precinct

REDUCTIONS RECALLED

After several stormy sessions of the county commissioners court the tax collectors were allowed deputies in each precinct for short periods during the rush collection. The recent salary reductions made by the county court were restored and deputies in other departments allowed.

In a period of severe economy the first session of the county court abolished five deputies in the sheriff's department. Three of these were later restored. Then the county deputy tax collecting substations were found to be a violation. They were abolished.

The recent action of the commissioners allows the same service. However, the deputies will be paid only during the rush period of collection. The total amount of money received will be more than was received under the former arrangements by local organizations establishing collection posts.

NEWS PAPERS

A short experiment was made last week in one of the local schools of placing a daily paper in the library and reading rooms of the school. It was discovered that more than half of the children in the classes did not have access to papers at home. These children almost fought over the right to read the papers, and at the end of each day the papers were worn and frazzled from constant use.

The result of this experiment suggests that some kind person in this small village of our might be able to contribute a very valuable addition to the libraries of all the schools. There are three dailies published in this district. The total cost of a subscription to all of them would be insignificant.

Therefore we are asking why can't some club or individual in the city see that each school has a subscription to each of the papers.

The value of the addition can not be overestimated. The alert minds of the youngsters are eager and ready to absorb every item in the papers. They will keep more informed on current topics of vital interest than the average adult if they are given a chance to read about what is happening over the world.

We sincerely believe that these children will be better prepared as citizens with this additional fund of information. They will know what is happening and in a degree what to expect of the future.

HAY STACKS

Last week during the severe cold spell, it was observed by the farmers and cattle owners of the district that the cattle of those farms that had hay stacks were least affected by the weather. One of the traditional parts of a normal farm is a hay stack, and such a thing is essential to the entertainment of the youngsters. Most of us remember before we became so wise that a hay stack was a place to have a lot of fun.

The more serious uses of the stack was revealed this week. On one farm, that of Emil Schroeder, the value of the stack was illustrated. From the day that the cold wave started, the cattle hugged the stack, leaving only when it was necessary to secure water. The farmer pronounced the stack as one of the most valuable parts of his farm. Providing a part of the food and all of the shelter necessary for the well being of the animals.

New types of harvesting machines that distribute the straw evenly over the field and eliminating the huge stacks may be more efficient. However, the efficiency of the machines in a sense is offset by the loss of this valuable part of the farm. Then think of the kiddies that are deprived of the privilege of getting chaff down their necks, and bouncing down a fresh stack. For one, we would like to object to any tendency to remove the useful things like this from a farm.

FRANKNESS NEEDED

There isn't any sense at any time in exaggeration of an existing evil and anger, but there is less sense in attempting to hid the same danger because of some superstitious prudery. For many years it has been the style of news papers and other members of society to disguise unpleasant affects of syphilis and related diseases under the general classification of "social" or "unnearable" infections.

The result has been that thousands of deaths caused by these infections secure classifications under impersonations. This weak policy has led to ignorance which has been a dangerous foe to accurate and intelligent solution of the problems created.

There was a time not many years ago when tuberculosis was considered disgraceful, and a family would do anything to prevent the publication of the real cause of death following lung infections. The Association for prevention and cure of tuberculosis persuaded the medical and news authorities to use frankness. Naturally a solution of the problem was inevitable. Today less than half as many people die from the disease. Education, prevention, cure followed intelligent examinations and analysis.

The disease of syphilis and similar nature will be stopped only when as complete frankness is used. The several million infected persons will cease to be a menace to society and future generations by intelligent treatment and guidance.

This is not a problem for far off cities or countries. Here in Burkburnett and Wichita county, those infected need intelligent information. Those free of infection need education. Neither of these objectives can be achieved as long as we close our eyes on an existing danger, merely because it is unpleasant to talk about.

FARM TENANTS

On the first day of the new session of congress a bill was introduced to make it possible for the farmers to buy their own farms under the direction of the government. The new bill aims at creation of Farm Tenant Home Purchase

HEADLINES

Cold weather and accompanying tragedies pushed the Spanish war out of the major headlines during the past week. Starting in the Bering sea. Near Alaska the severe cold wave swept down across the Western and Midwestern parts of the United States leaving death and suffering in its bitter grip. Not many people comprehend the extensiveness of the cold wave. In the Bering sea, it started as a major hurricane of swirling cold winds. Sweeping out in every direction the cold air and accompanying electrical disturbances swept into the United States. After the first storm cleared from the Arctic the second started forming immediately. Out on the Aleutian Island off the coast of Alaska another storm was created. It will follow right on the heels of our present wave.

Tension Growing

The Spanish war tension continues to grow. Germany and Italy apparently are determined to make the issue clearly a fight between themselves and France and Russia. France poured large numbers of troops unofficially into the area, and sent war supplies along with the volunteers. Russia dispatched ships to the scene. England increased her fleet by 100 vessels of various types. Germany defied the defenders of Madrid with a challenge and ultimatum. Italy line up 2,000 planes to send in case of violent reaction. This all leads nearer to the ultimate conflict. There will have to be some hasty diplomatic gymnastics now to prevent open and admitted participation of the four contin-

ental powers in the conflict.

Presidents Demands

The president demanded hasty action on neutrality legislation, and only a bone head by congress prevented the immediate stopping of all shipments to the defined war zone. However, in spite of the fact that the hasty legislation failed to stop shipment of planes that were already loaded at the dock in New York. It did give the president power to stop all future shipments. That is definite progress, and will possibly involve the movement to keep us out of the conflict. As soon as the legal 24-hour period ended the shipment with a sudden jolt. The embargo provides a fine of \$10,000 or five years in the federal pen or both for anyone that ships implements directly to Spain or any other country for trans-shipment directly to Spain.

Everyday Cooking Miracles

large greased layer-cake pans and place in cold electric oven. Set the temperature control to 365°, turn switch to bake and bake for 35-40 minutes. When baked, remove cakes from pans and cool. Then cut the cakes into small hearts with a cookie cutter.

haps "another heart, too, please ma'am."

These refreshments are little heart-shaped pieces of the best cake that ever melted in your mouth and they are covered with a thin layer of pink icing. The cake is made by that "never fail" scientific method—the cold oven Hotpoint electric range method. The bakership starts in the cold electric oven, the controlled oven temperature rising with the cake. And as a result you have a tall, feathery-light cake baked without any attention. Here is the recipe:

Miracle Hearts

(Makes 2 dozen small cakes)

- 3/4 cup butter
- 1 1/4 cups granulated sugar
- 2 3/4 cups cake flour
- 3 teaspoons baking powder
- 3/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup milk
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 4 egg whites

Cream butter. Add sugar slowly and beat well. Sift together the flour, baking powder and salt and add to creamed mixture, alternately with milk. Add vanilla extract, then fold in the stiffly-beaten egg whites. Pour into two

And now here is miracle Number 2! Place the hearts on a cake rack and place the rack on the smooth, spotlessly clean working top of the electric range. Then, without flinching, pour the following icing over the cakes and let the drippings fall smack on the enameled surface.

Icing for Miracle Hearts

- 2 cups granulated sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon cream tartar
- 1 cup hot water
- confectioner's sugar, sifted (about 1 pound)
- red vegetable coloring

Cook sugar, cream of tartar and water in a saucepan on the surface unit of electric range until a thin syrup (225°) is formed. Cool slightly. Then add enough confectioner's sugar to make an icing of pouring consistency. Add food coloring and then pour over the hearts, covering them thoroughly with the icing.

The icing on the range top can be quickly "picked up" and reheated for use—that is, unless you have a hungry nine-year old around—and with a swish of a damp cloth this polished surface will gleam again.

New Ships and Arms

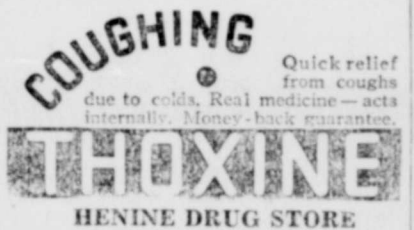
While striving for peace on one hand president Roosevelt asked for the stiffest appropriation for arms that has been asked for in peace times. The expiration of the Washington naval treaty and other pacts of that nature was the signal to go ahead with building. The naval treaty kept the U. S. from a race for supremacy. Two new 35,000 ton ships costing \$50,000,000 each are the first ships planned. In addition \$980,763,000 for arms, airplanes, new men in each navy and army department, for the rebuilding and modernizing of all ships, has been asked. This sum is 98 million dollars higher than any ever builded before by the military department.

Child Labor

Roosevelt has not abandoned his desire to pass child labor legislation. The resolution was sent down to the state several years ago, but it has never been ratified. Only 22 states have voted, yes. It will be necessary for 19 more to vote for the proposition before it becomes a law. There is a possibility that Texas will have an opportunity to vote on the question in the near future.



Pseudonym Used
By S. S. Van Dine,
Author of Serial

S. S. Van Dine, author of "The Garden Murder Case," our newest serial story, is actually named Willard Huntington Wright. This little known fact about America's foremost writer of detective fiction was uncovered only a few months ago.

As Willard Huntington Wright, Van Dine was an obscure literary, dramatic and art critic, also writing a few books on scholarly topics which gave him little fame. In 1916 he published his first novel, "The Man of Promise," but it attracted small notice.

It was in 1925 that the modern Van Dine was born. By way of occupational therapy after a long illness he wrote "The Benson Murder Case," creating the master sleuth, Philo Vance. In order to avoid comparison of this more popular type of literature with his previous scholarly works, he adopted the pseudonym of S. S. Van Dine, taking an old family name of his maternal grandmother.

"The Benson Murder Case" was published in Scribner's magazine and in book form during 1926. Within a year came Van Dine's second mystery story, "The Canary Murder Case." Already he had become a best seller and his detective, Philo Vance, was a household word.

Following an anthology, "The Great Detective Stories," and an introduction under his own name to "Some Famous Medical Trials," he continued the exploits of Philo Vance, turning them out since at the rate of one a year. After Van Dine's enormous success as a writer of detective fiction, his earlier neglected novel, "The Man of Promise," was reissued in 1929 and received high praise.

Born in 1888 at Charlottesville, Virginia, the author was graduated from Harvard university where he was a prize student in anthropology and entomology. With his wife, who was Eleanor Rulapaugh, a portrait painter known professionally as Claire De Lisle, he lives in Los Angeles.

Van Dine's newest story, "The Garden Murder Case," has received enthusiastic praise from critics everywhere. You will be thrilled by this tale as it unfolds serially in our paper.

Early Days On Burk Burnett Farm

Burk Burnett, Texas, Jan. 13.—Life in the pioneering days in this district nearly always started in a dugout. The farmers and ranchers that settled the area imitated the groundhogs that were so plentiful by literally burrowing into the earth for their first few months.

When Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Muller brought their family of four children to Texas from Sedalia, Mo., their friends at home told them of the horror of living in under ground structure in the wind-bitten prairies of the state. Like most hardy adventurers, the family did not believe the tales, and declared that they would never live in such an arrangement.

However, the family stepped off the train here January 1, 1910, at 3:15 p. m., only to find that the only available farm in the district that they would purchase was one that had only such a structure in which to live. To their surprise they found that it was a lot of fun living there during the cold winter months until they completed their permanent home that spring.

The simple structure which still stands on the farm today as the only relic of those days of its type that remains in the district serves as a storeroom for fruit, vegetables, and general catch-all for the farm. It is dug into the ground four feet, has a dirt floor, and is covered with a simple roof of slabs and a short wall. It was slightly more elaborate than the average structure of its type in that it had two glass windows in the front. It was built in 1907 when the general land sale in this district divided the large ranches into agricultural plots.

The farm is located on a small stream known as Wild Horse creek, about six miles west of Burk Burnett. The farm now has 140.8 acres, and Mr. Muller is known as one of the most successful farmers in this area.

Thursday morning he stated that when he first came here he had never seen a bale of cotton, but the first year produced 3-4 bales per acre, and 33 1-2 bushels per acre of corn on the land. The next year, 1911, was much more difficult. Corn was planted and hot winds wilted it at tassle time. The cotton which had been so successful the year before produced only one bale on the entire farm.

That winter two cows provided the livelihood of the family. Corn bread, syrup, and milk was the bill of fare. "But the children were in better condition than ever," the doctor said, "according to Mr. Muller. That year, 1911, was more like the last two drouth years than any others, according to the farmer. The same condition existed, except the government didn't offer any help.

The next year, 1912 it was sand storms that besieged the farmers of the district. Wheat was cut to ground level just as it started growing. Three weeks later when the roots had sent up new sprouts a severe hail storm swept the district, and what promised to be a bumper crop was reduced in less than 12 bushels per acre.

Something has happened to the district. It just will not grow as good watermelons as it formerly did. One day in 1914, the farmer hauled 73 melons on a single day from a small quarter acre patch.

The members of the family are Walter and Arnold Muller of Burk Burnett, Mrs. Erna Mertz and Mrs. Esther Klinkerman of Clara, and at home Edwin, Richard, Alvin, Hilda and Nora Muller.

Funeral services for A. J. Betts, 76, a Burk Burnett resident for more than a quarter century, will be held Thursday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock from the First Christian church in Wichita Falls. Rev. H. T. Wood, pastor, will officiate, and burial will be held in Burk Burnett cemetery under the direction of Owen & Brumley Funeral Home.

Mr. Betts died Wednesday morning at the home of a daughter, Mrs. Florence Smith, of 2114 Kemp boulevard. He had lived with her since a recent illness two weeks ago.

Mr. Betts built and operated the City hotel in Burk Burnett in 1909 and was in the oil business for a while.

Survivors include the widow, two daughters besides Mrs. Smith, Mrs. L. C. Carter of Ardmore, Okla., and Mrs. L. W. Gowin of Norcatur, Kans., and six grandchildren and one great grandchild.

Wilhoit Dies On 105 Birthday Here

Funeral services will be held for Isaac Wilhoit, 105, Wichita County's oldest citizen, a victim of pneumonia who died at the home of his son, George W. Wilhoit three miles West of Burkburnett, at the home Sunday afternoon at 1:30. L. N. Moody, Church of Christ minister at Vernon and former Burkburnett minister, officiated, assisted by Taylor Davis of Wichita Falls.

After the short service at the home, the body was carried overland by Owens and Brumley Funeral home for interment in the Floydada cemetery. The pallbearers for the service in Burkburnett were A. A. Jacobs, Dale Boyd, Dave McNeil, J. O. Roberts, and C. A. Morgan. The survivors include five sons, D. Frank Noles, N. M., M. Wilhoit, Lovington, N. M.; Douglas, Rock Springs, Texas, and Jim Colborn, Colo.; three daughters, Mrs. Mary Surginar, Floydada; Mrs. W. L. Aandy, Okla. Sparks, Young, Arizona; 40 grandchildren, 41 great grand children, 4 great, great grandchildren.

Death which came on the 105th birthday of the pioneer Texan was the result of an illness which was the third time during his entire life that he required the attention of a physician. According to Dr. I. D. Russel, attending physician, only twice before did the hardy Texan call a doctor. On one occasion a team of horses ran away when Wilhoit was 85 inflicting severe head injuries. Two years ago at the age of 103 injuries received while gardening at his home here caused the second official call of a physician.

Death brought the end of an adventurous and romantic career of a person that lived without pretension, helping to build a new empire in the Southwest. Having lived and fought in a state from the days that it was a Republic, he developed a love for the commonwealth that was near a sacred emotion. Recently when he spoke of the trials of the early days, there were tears in his eyes, tears of memory of great days that in spite of suffering and heart ache involved the thrill of living during a glorious period.

As Mr. Wilhoit told it, a bare foot boy, trudging behind a wagon, ever alert for the new adventures in that recently born Republic, entered, the state more than 94 years ago. Just a lad 11 years old and "going on to 12."

The year before his father and two older brothers had been killed in a Tennessee flood, and the young man and his mother and 100 other pioneers answered the call of a new nation.

The young republic had won its independence only a few years before, and the call had gone out for settlers. Men of every type freedom loving adventurers, criminals, bandits, and home seekers answered the call.

With friends and neighbors, the Wilhoit family settled in Red River county. The colony was bothered by Indian raids, and bad crops made the settlement unsuccessful. The group moved into Hunt county where Mr. Wilhoit met Elizabeth Brady, who became his wife more than 80 years ago.

When the Texans joined the civil war, Wilhoit left his wife and two children to aid in the conflict. He was enlisted in regiment "I" under Captain Rodrick. Mrs. Wilhoit had moved to the home of relatives in Erath county during the war. She had agreed to meet her husband back in Hunt county afterwards. Each thought it would be only a matter of a few months. While at Erath farm Mrs. Wilhoit was in an Indian raid. The red men wiped out over half of the community, scattering those that remained. In order to return to Hunt county after the relatives had been killed, Mrs. Wilhoit became one of Texas' first hitch-hikers. Walking most of the way, she caught an occasional ride with some pioneer family, and she carried two children most of the time.

the pioneer ran his own farm, and his wife until her death three years ago cooked and cared for her own home. After her death he moved to Burkburnett to spend the last few years with his son, George Wilhoit.

In 1935 he stated that his one ambition was to live to see the state celebrate its anniversary in 1936. Since that time he seems to have been more content. When asked why he had lived so long last week, he stated that it was nothing extra. He had just lived a normal life, worked hard and had plenty of good food. He is of Dutch descent and of a hardy family.
