The traveling man came in the early spring and found money coming in from the sale of mohair. A few weeks later he noticed that wool was being sold in large quantities, then in early fall cotton came along for its share of the credit for keeping Kimble County on the map. The mohair and wool came on the market again and was closely followed by the pecan crop. After these came hides and furs. All these aside from the sale of sheep, goats and cattle, contribute regularly to the income of this county. Variety is truly the spice of life in Kimble County, and the development of the resources of this county is in its infancy. We need several hundred more thrifty farmers to work the fine farming land that is available for cultivation.

The good roads have come to Kimble County in the minds of people from all directions and the natural and developing resources of the county are going to make it the banner county of Southwest Texas.

### Allen Produce Makes Big Shipment of Fat Turkeys.

The first shipment of turkeys of any consequence was made Tuesday of this week by the local buyers, Allen Produce Co. These turkeys were bought at around 26 cents a pound and were extra large for the time of year and in excellent condition.

More than 250 turkeys constituted this initial shipment.

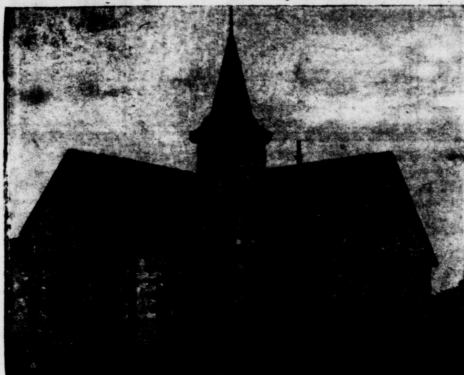

## FOOT BALL GAME DRAWS BIG CROWD

Local Team Defeated First Time in Six Years  
on Home "Grid," Resulting in Championship for Eight District Going to Comanche.

One of the largest, if not indeed the largest, crowd ever attending a foot ball game in Junction, were out last Saturday to see the last official inter-scholastic game of this district of the Inter-Scholastic League.

Many visitors came from Rock Springs, Menard, Mason, and Sonora, and home people turned out, as they had rarely done when a foot ball game was played here.

This was the last of many hard fought games on the part of the local team and was the first time they had been scored on this season. Both sides put every bit of energy possible into the game and exceptionally good playing was noticeable with both teams. During the first three quarters there was not a score made, then in the third quarter Richardson made a spectacular kick from the 35-yard line. This being near the end of the game it seemed that Junction was to again be winner, and thus gain the championship, but shortly after the three points were made for Junction, the Comanches go by with two end runs and finally made a touchdown and kicked goal.

There is victory even in defeat, and this victory was experienced by the home boys, when they lost to Comanche 7 to 3. The fact that the boys took their defeat and still remained in the best of spirits showed they played the game fair and came out with a clear conscience.

Athletics have played an important part in the school life here this year and the boys have won a name over this section of the State, well to be proud of, and if their academic accomplishments are in line with their athletic attainments, they still have more to be proud of.

Williams, Ariz, Nov. 7, '22. Dear Folks at Home: After such a long time I will write you again.

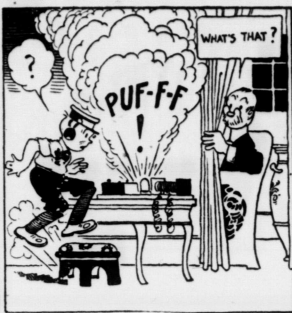
When I wrote last, I was living in Salt River Valley, near Phoenix; had lived there three years and liked the country fine. Everything there is under irrigation an dyou can raise two crops a year of wheat, milo maize and June corn, and dairying is carried on as a side line, but owing to the heat and low altitude we could not stay there longer so we are now living in the northern part of the State. We like it fine. It's a beautiful country; hills are covered with stately pines. This part of the state is a cattle country, some sheep and farming. We raise wheat and oats; but the principal crop is Irish potatoes, but the farmers lost heavily this fall, owing to the early snow which came the 28th of October; the snow here was 8 inches deep and at Flagstaff, 35 miles north the snow was 18 inches deep; and this snow does not usually fall here before December.

Well, I must tell you dear home folks, each and every one, I am living in far away Arizona with all her beauty and wonders such as the petrified forests and the Grand Canyon, with all its hues of the rainbow and beauty, but to me there is no place half so dear as old Junction and the South Llano with its clear rippling waters; every spot is so dear to me that I am sure you would ask, "Well, why don't you come back home, then?" Well, because Mr. Dowdy and J. Y. won't come; they like Arizona the best.

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Some Radio Prophecies of The Dr. Lee De Forest.

In a recent magazine I saw a picture whose message so appealed to me that it now hangs framed on my laboratory wall. It depicts a little hut, standing alone in a canyon in the moonlight. From a near-by tree a small aerial leads to the roof, a light shines from the cabin window and in its glow stands a youth, head bare with headphones on ears, their cords leading into the open window. He stands there with open mouth, hands outspread in silent ecstasy and wonder, looking upward into the sky of stars. "In tune with the Infinite," is the title of the picture, and no artist who had not himself felt the thrill of listening in the quiet night to the etheric music of some distant radio-phon could ever have conceived that picture or have painted it so wistfully well.

It will not be years now, nor many months, before the necessary high-power broadcasting stations will be planted in all our cities covering sufficiently wide area to enfold the entire land in a mantle of music, to breathe in to every listening ear voices of comfort, of nightly companionship with the world's doings and the world's best minds. "Just a song at Twilight"—but its lonely echoes shall be heard in the miner's cabin, in the rancher's hut, in the living-room of the old farm house; over the mountain range, beyond the desert, across the silent prairie, over the waters of the sea. And who can say what emotions are not awakened, what souls that were deadened, what hearts long embittered by loneliness, will not be stirred to a new life, a new outlook, by that sound?

I for one have no patience with those who regard radio-phon broadcasting as a "fad"—an ephemeral excitement, which, like Tiddledewink or Diabollo, will interest the youth of the land for a few months, to be then cast aside for a new toy. The "new toy" was what the skeptics of the day called the telephone of Bell. Surely those who so designate the radiophone fail at the outset to see the true significance of this invention, the true service radio communication now stands ready to per-

form. The engineers have done their work. Now all that we need is its application to the purposes of life.

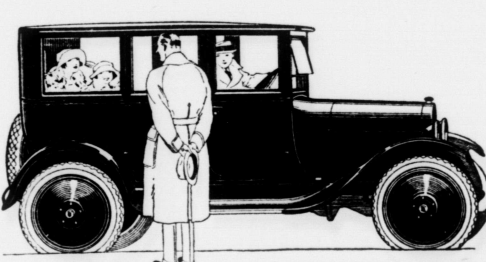

**Contract Soon to be Let For Remainder of Highway**

At the meeting of the Board of County Commissioners the first of the week, it was decided to advertise for letting of the contract to finish the Highway from the city limits of Kerrville to the Center Point Road District. Bids will be opened December 9th.

Claims for work during part of August and September and all of October on county roads was allowed to the amount of \$5,000.00.

The balance of the Jail Repair fund left after paying off all of the jail bonds, the balance amounting to \$1,399.85, was turned over to the Tick Eradication Fund.

Appointments were made on the Road and Bridge Fund as follows: Precinct No. 1, \$1,702; Precinct No. 2, \$518; Precinct No. 3, \$370; Precinct No. 4, \$1,110.

Owing to the heavy expenses of Tick Eradication causing a shortage of funds, the Board of County Commissioners decided to do without a County Demonstration Agent next year. This is to be regretted.—Kerrville Mountain Sun.

**Jewelry Store Looted of \$300 Value Sunday Night.**

A crafty burglar did a neat job here some time last Sunday night of smashing the show window of the Malone & Ragsdale jewelry store and getting away with something over \$300 worth of jewelry, and up to this time has escaped apprehension.

The job of window cracking was done with a small stone wrapped in a piece of newspaper. It appears that the stone was thrown through the window from the shattered glass. A hole just large enough to reach the hand through was broken out and everything within easy reach was taken with the exception of a \$50.00 pair of cuff buttons, which the thief reached over to get the watches. It is presumed that he did not know the value of the buttons or they would have undoubtedly been taken.—Bray Sentinel.

**Some Freak.**

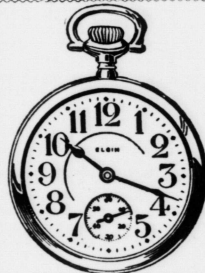

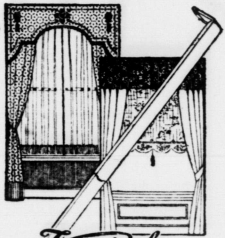

STATE CAPITAL NEWS  
From The Austin Statesman:

Rountree to Press For  
New Constitution.

Drafting a lot of joint resolutions to be introduced at the coming regular session of the Texas Legislature, proposing the calling of a constitutional convention to frame a new organic law for this State, has been virtually completed, announced Representative Lee J. Rountree, of Brazos County, one of the authors of the resolution, who spent Friday here on business with the State Board of Control.

Mr. Rountree said that the provisions of the resolution have been materially changed since it was first contemplated to introduce such a measure in the Thirty-eighth Legislature. One of the important changes made is in the personnel of the members of the convention. It was at first proposed that the membership should consist of ninety-three members, three being from each of the thirty-one senatorial districts, while the new resolution proposes a convention composed of 170 members—that is one delegate from each of the 150 representative districts and one delegate from each of the 18 congressional districts and 2 at large to correspond to the two United Senators from Texas.

"This will make a truly representative convention," said Representative Rountree, "and at the same time remove an objection that was urged at the last session of the Legislature to the resolution for a constitutional convention. It will also make it possible to elect really big men from these congressional districts, and at the same time have a representative gathering."

October Fire Losses  
Aggregate \$473,483.

During the month of October there were 178 fires reported in Texas by city fire marshals, entailing a loss of \$473,483, according to G. W. Tillery, State fire marshal, who added that this represents slightly above 50 per cent of the total fires in Texas, many small communities and rural districts not reporting.

These fires and losses are classified as follows: 60 unknown cause, \$285,461 loss; 15 adjoining buildings, \$11,529; 13 defective wiring, \$27,660; 12 matches, \$32,061; 12 sparks from flue, \$862; 11 carelessness, \$46,670; 11 oil, oil stove or oil lamp, \$9,168; 11 trash or ashes, \$31,260; 7 defective flue, \$4,364; 6 cigarettes and cigars, \$4,461; 5 incendiary, \$2,168; 4 spontaneous combustion, \$2,080; 4 gas stove or heater, or leaky gas pipe, \$2,396; 2 iron, \$12,500; 1 gasoline, \$35; 1 overturned stove or pipe, \$550; 1 car, \$5; 1 film in picture show, \$125; 1 lightning, \$127.

From present indications, State Fire Marshal Tillery said, the losses for 1922 will be heavier than for 1921.

Motion Filed to End Litigation in Ballot Controversy.

Motion seeking dismissal of applications for writs of error from the decision of the Dallas Court of Civil Appeals in the Corsicana and Groesbeck injunction suits which sought to prevent certification of Earle B. Mayfield's name as Democratic senatorial nominee, were filed in the supreme court today by attorneys for plaintiffs in the cases.

If acted upon favorably, the motions will end the Mayfield litigation in the state courts. Action is expected by the court tomorrow.

The motions were received by the clerk of the court late yesterday but were not filed until today. It was known, however, that such action probably would be taken.

State Prison Population Now  
Nearly Thirty-Five Hundred.

There are at present 3,496 convicts in the State penitentiary at Huntsville and distributed on the various State farms, according to advices just received by the Governor from the Prison Commission. These convicts are distributed as follows:

- Huntsville, 380; asylums, 18; Harlem State farm, 369; Eastham, 297; Imperial, 380; Ramsey, 479; Wynne, 113; Goree, 63; Shaw, 152; Clemens, 394; Ferguson, 177; Retrieve, 191; Darrington, 217; Blue Ridge, 142; Senior, 108; Blakely, 16.

Expenditures in Paddy's  
Campaign Totaled \$73,050.89

Expenditure in behalf of the candidacy of George E. B. Paddy of Houston, independent-democratic-republican candidate for United States senator in the recent campaign aggregated \$73,050.89, according to a report of campaign expenses filed in the Secretary of State's Department late Saturday by James P. Smith, of Dallas, campaign secretary. Contributions towards Paddy's campaign amounted to \$73,295.13 the report stated, of which \$48,000 was in loans. The expenses included attorneys fees for the Mayfield litigation also, according to the report. There was filed earlier in the day a report of Paddy's personal expenses which totaled \$900.

The report shows that the Texas republican organization contributed \$10,000. John H. Kirby of Houston, was reported to have contributed \$5,000 and to have loaned \$19,183.20 additional, while J. S. Cullinan of Houston, contributed \$5,000 and loaned \$29,936.66 to the campaign fund. The litigation incidental to the effort to keep Mayfield's name off the ticket, cost \$3,900, according to the report.

A. & M. Will Start Short  
Course for Stockmen Jan. 1.

Short course for feeders and breeders will be given January 1 to 6, 1923, at College Station by the animal husbandry department of the Texas A. & M.

College, according to an announcement received here Saturday by Walter E. Davis, Travis County agricultural agent from George S. Templeton, head of the animal husbandry department of the Texas A. & M. College.

Separate courses dealing with present day problems of breeding, feeding and management will be given for beef cattle, horses, hogs and sheep. The course will be practical and strictly on animal husbandry and veterinary subjects. Any white person over 18 years of age who is able to read and write English is eligible for the course.

Mr. Davis stated that he had received many requests during the past few weeks from farmers of Travis County for such a course.

Albert Rowan Taken  
To Federal Prison.

Albert Rowan, alleged "master mind" in the postoffice robbery at Dallas last year, left this afternoon under escort of Federal officers for Leavenworth, where he will begin serving his sentence of 25 years.

Rowan has been in jail in Dallas since shortly after the attempted robbery. It was said tonight that arrangements to send Rowan to the penitentiary were concluded so rapidly today that relatives did not see him before he left.

Ben Luna, given 25 years in connection with the robbery, has been in Leavenworth for some time, waiting for commitment papers which would admit him to the prison.

Frank Baker was in the Alamo City several days last week on business.

Lewis Jetton, assistant postmaster, has been ill this week and on this account was away from the postoffice.

## THE REGULATORS AND MODERATORS

A True Chapter From the Early History of Texas.

An Object Lesson to All Those Who Would Like to Govern By Other Than Lawful Means.

By HON. T. W. DAVIDSON. Part I.

In 1830 a band of thieves operated through Missouri, Arkansas and East-Texas. Land certificates, horses, cattle and slaves in particular were handled by regularly organized bands the secret leaders of who were often men of affairs and prominence.

A slave could not well afford to be stolen without his consent but this was often procured by promising him freedom. He would be secretly transported by the "Habolitionist", as the negroes expressed it, to Canada. His wife would be sent later of course, but if he did not want his wife, he could marry a white woman in that wonderful land where there was no slaves. In this way a great number of valuable slaves are said to have been collected and sold on the slave markets of New Orleans and other distant places.

Harrison, and adjoining counties, were filling rapidly with wealthy planter from the east, who came to the new republic and brought their slaves. These people fell easy victims to the band of thieves. The law seemed slow and inadequate. The people decided to take it into their own hands. "The Regulators" were organized. About this time Charles W. Jackson killed George Goodbreed in Shelby County, and the case was sent to Harrison County on a change of venue.

The following is taken from the minutes of that court: "Friday morning, July 16, 1841.

"The time arrived for the court to meet and was opened by proclamation. Present, Hugh I. Hayes, sheriff; David Stinson, district attorney, pro tem, and Samuel Stinson, district clerk. By order from His Honor, Judge John M. Hansford, the sheriff adjourned court, which order was as follows, to-wit:

"To the Sheriff of Harrison County, Texas.

"Being unwilling to risk my person in the court house any longer when I see myself surrounded by braves and hired assassins and no longer left free to preside as an impartial judge, at the special term of Charles W. Jackson, I order you to adjourn court tomorrow at 8 o'clock by proclamation with day. From your hand at the regular term I shall expect the prisoner. You will keep the prisoner, causing him to be securely ironed, and keeping a strong guard until delivered by the course of laws.

Yours, etc.

"John M. Hansford, "Judge 7th Judicial District." Minute Book A, Page 64.

"To the Clerk of the District Court, Harrison County, Texas.

"Sir: The gradual development of the circumstances which have come to my knowledge since and before the commencement of the special term of the District Court, and more particularly this evening, have assumed such a character that the district judge is no longer free in the exercise of his function as a presiding officer of this court, and unwilling to act as such any longer unless he can do so without compulsion or restraint, he is determined to avoid the mockery of holding a court under the government and control of hired assassins to secure the safety of his person to meet no more without a special force for his protection. You will preserve with care the records, and consider yourself no longer bound to attend at Pulaski, the county seat. I have the honor to be yours, etc."

"John M. Hansford," "P. S.: This record, and also the order to the sheriff beforehand you to him, and forward the copies of both of them to me. J. M. H."

Shortly after this Judge Hansford resigned and was subsequently shot as a result of a feud which in part was doubt-

less due to the strife prevailing throughout the county at that time.

The indictment in the Jackson case is recorded at length in the minutes, and is unique in its terms in that it charges the offense in great detail and length. It is styled "Republic of Texas, County of Shelby," and among other things charges "That Charles Jackson on or about said date, without the fear of God before his eyes, but moved and actuated by the devil, did with a rifle of the value of \$20.00, loaded with powder and ball, shoot Joseph Goodbreed, etc."

As soon as the court adjourned Jackson seized the reins of government. The mob was organized into a form of court, and the man who was to have been chief director of its proceedings. An order was issued for the arrest of the chief justice of Panola County. He was actually arrested and deported to the state of Louisiana. Jackson returned home and the law slept, but terror reigned through the land.

Charles W. Jackson had formerly operated a steamboat on the Mississippi river, and on the lower Red river, and probably into Big Cypress bayou as far as Port Caddo, of which port there is now nothing left more than the thickets and bramble where the old townsite of Port Caddo was once laid out, and where steamships came to discharge their cargoes. Port Caddo was situated in the eastern portion of Harrison County, on the beautiful waters of Caddo lake. Jackson abandoned his operations as a ship captain and opened a mercantile business where the city of Shreveport now stands. A reward had been offered for his arrest, and he was taken into custody by persons seeking this reward. He escaped from his captors and subsequently killed one or more of them. He came to the Republic of Texas, landed in Shelby County, and almost immediately became a candidate for congress.

At this time the Republic of Texas was issuing a great quantity of land certificates to former soldiers and early settlers, and these land certificates were not only issued by the general land office at Austin, but also by branch offices, one of which was in Shelby County, and it was believed, and in fact charged, that a great quantity of fraudulent land script was being dealt in by a regularly organized band of robbers and free-booters, who maintained organized bands and concentration camps for runaway slaves, whom they promised to take to Canada and set free, but were in fact carrying them to New Orleans for sale.

Jackson was defeated in his race and attributed his defeat to the Shelby County branch of the land office, and reported its actions to the general land office at Austin. In consequence of which, Joseph Goodbreed wrote him a letter notifying him that if he did not desist from his writings he would be shot to death.

Jackson took the letter to Goodbreed in the town of Shelbyville, presented it to him and immediately shot him down. On change of venue the case was sent to Harrison County, and here a large band of his followers followed him and organized to prevent his trial with the result as appears in the minutes of the District Court of Harrison County, as above copied.

Jackson and his party now associated themselves together under the name of the Regulators, and announced that they would regulate society, punish thieves, robbers, land swindlers and all other offenders.

Judge Arrington, in his book called "The Rangers and Regulators of Tehana," written in the forties, gives a fair view of the procedure:

A large number of the citizens were called together, including many of the very best men of the county, and it was decided that the land thieves and the deporters of slaves and all other objectionable characters would be arrested on the same night.

This conclave assembled in the heart of the forest, with sentinels stationed in all directions. They constituted themselves into something of grand jury to name these objectionable, undesirable citizens. In the list thus presented each man turned in names of all the thieves and crooks known to him, and it afterwards developed that many added the names of their enemies as well.

Captains and lieutenants were now appointed to go out and make arrests of all these persons against whom accusations had been lodged. In making these arrests several men were killed; but quite a number of persons were seized and brought into this forest court. Among them were some of the notorious bandits and robbers, and among them were peace-loving citizens. The ex-judge of the court, the plain honest hunter were arraigned for trial, along with the thief, like Christ on Calvary, and they were required to prove their innocence instead of the court first showing their guilt. There was no means by which they could send for witnesses, and, of course, it was impossible for them to prove their innocence.

They were then put upon oath and required to plead guilty or not guilty. All who pleaded guilty were punished, and all who refused to plead guilty were tortured for lying.

The committee that conducted this trial contained some good men, men of mercy and justice, but they were in the minority and the trial went on with all its barbarity. When a man finally refused to plead guilty, and had been tortured, the Regulators were then afraid to turn him loose and let him go free, because of the fact that he had become their mortal enemy.

Trial, therefore became rare, few prisoners were taken and each conflict was a fight to the death.

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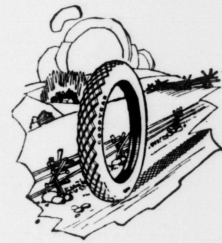

Dry Agents Held in Murder Case Are Denied Release.

Beaumont, Nov. 21.—Judge W. Lee Estes, in Federal District Court today, held that M. T. Gonzaullos and W. A. Nitzer, prohibition enforcement agents, must stand trial on a charge of murder in connection with the death of Justice of the Peace H. E. Showers here last July. The decision was on the defendants' writ of habeas corpus designed to bring about their release. Judge Estes held discharge would not be proper, but no date for arraignment was set.

Showers was shot in the business district of the city as he sat in an automobile during a raid conducted by Gonzaullos and Nitzer on a place where they believed liquor was sold. When no liquor was found in the place the officers attempted to search Showers car, according to testimony brought out at the hearing, and the shooting resulted. Showers, according to the officers, made a gun play and they acted in self defense.

Chivalry Permits First Woman to Sit in Senate.

Washington, Nov. 21.—The star of woman suffrage reached its highest ascendancy in American history today when Mrs. W. H. Felton, the "grand old woman of Georgia," was formally admitted as a full-fledged Senator of the United State.

She is the first woman Senator ever to take the oath of office on the floor of the Senate. Mrs. Felton won her Senatorship when chivalry triumphed over legality. A single objection from any of the 95 male Senators would have prevented her taking her seat. None objected.
