New Discovery Trix-Liz Field

Final gauge was reported Wednesday from one of two zones at what already is identified as the discovery of the East Trix-Liz field, an East Texas Woodbine find in North Titus County.

Sunray Mid-Continent Oil Co. and British-American Oil Producing Co. No. 1 Alvin Blalock, Samuel A. Boase survey, pumped 72 barrels of 22-gravity oil per day from the "B" zone at 3,634-40 feet. Still being tested is the "A" zone at 3,473-81 where initial pump gauge was 17 barrels in 10 hours.

This opener is nine miles east of Talco and a mile east of the Trix-Liz field. Same firms have spotted a confirmation location, but no work is reported yet.

In Red River County W. Earl Anderson, Dallas, has filed to drill a 2,000-foot wildcat in the northwest part of the county 12 miles north of Detroit near Kanawha. It is shown to be No. 1 International Paper Co., 2,200 from the east and 575 from the south lines of a 943-acre tract in W. K. Revier survey.

Construction Of Roads Planned

A farm road in Titus County from FM71 at Wilkinson south 32 miles to a country road, is part of a new two years farm to market road program. District Engineer Gilbert A. Youngs has announced.

This project will include concrete bridges over Green and White Oak Creeks to replace the narrow and rapidly deteriorating timber structures now in place.

This heavily traveled road will justify construction to high standards and a corresponding "high-standard location" and right of way width will be required, with relocations from the present road necessary, Youngs said.

In Camp County a farm road from State 11 in Leesburg northwest to a county road 1.8 miles north of Newsome was also included in this program. This 3.4 mile section is part of a long sought road to the New Hope Oil Field in Franklin County.

Engineering supervision of this work will be directed by J. H. Crawford of Mount Pleasant, senior resident engineer.

Titus County Tax Statements Are Mailed Friday

A total of 7916 property tax statements were mailed Friday to Titus County taxpayers, Tax Assessor-Collector Wallace Fields announces.

Total taxes covered by the statements amounts to \$212,400.01, Fields said, which includes \$38,707.77 state taxes, \$115,168.67 county taxes, \$27,649.11 road taxes and \$30,874.46 common school taxes.

The 1960 county valuation is \$12,121,505, up from \$11,543,120 in 1959 and the 1960 state valuation is \$9,216,205, up from \$8,781,595 in 1959.

The statements cover a range from 17 cents up to \$23,607.77. All taxes due the county tax assessor-collector this year are subject to discount if paid early, 3 per cent if paid in October, 2 per cent if paid in November and 1 per cent if paid in December. They are due in January, 1961 and penalty and interest accrues beginning Feb. 1, 1961, Fields added.

Poll tax can be paid beginning October 1. This is the 1960 Poll Tax Receipt and is valid for voting during the period Feb. 1, 1961 and Jan. 31, 1962. It cannot be used in the November General Election this year, he explained.

Trojans Wallop Rains Wildcats Friday, 32-6

Talco Trojans took advantage of five pass interceptions and alert ball-hawking on fumbles Friday night as Talco trounced Rains of Emory 32-6 in a non-conference game played at Talco.

The Trojans ran up an early lead and set up a stout defense with Rodney Russell, Johnny Mac Brown, Pete Dixon and Pat Parr leading the way for the Trojans.

Dixon carried the ball 211 yards on the ground and caught one pass good for 10 yards. He scored three touchdowns and ran two of the extra points.

Dixon crashed off tackle to his right and raced 54 yards the first time he got the ball. Then went through for 15 yards and the first touchdown. John Whitten plunged through the line for the extra points, making it 8-0.

Recovery of a Rains fumble on their 35 set up the second Trojan tally. Halfback Virgil Jones raced 35 yards on a beautiful reverse for the score. Dixon plunged for two points, making it 16-0.

Rains made a bid with a drive to the Trojan 20, but the Wildcats were stopped by an interception by Jones. Two stabs at the line brought the Trojans no gain, then Dixon thrilled the crowd with an 80-yard scoring sprint down the sideline with defenders bouncing off him for half the distance. Jones drove for the points and it was 24-0, with a few minutes left in the quarter.

Ramsey, a left-hander and Gene Waddle, a right-hander, took to the airways for the Wildcats, but the Trojans broke the string when Russell intercepted an aerial on the Talco 16.

The Trojans moved for three first downs, including their only pass completion of the ball game—a 10-yarder from Quarterback Johnny Gable to Dixon. Russell chipped in a 17-yard run and Dixon exploded for three yards and the touchdown. Russell ran the points, building the lead to 32-0.

Rains started another fine drive in the fourth quarter, but saw it die when Jones intercepted a pass behind the goal line for an automatic touchback.

Rains finally scored with a drive from their own 45. A pass attempt for points was batted down. Another interception by Dixon for the Trojans ended the game.

Deer Tags Needed By Every Hunter

Austin.—If you hunt deer you must have deer tags, even though you are entitled to exemption. This is the warning of the fiscal director of the Game and Fish Commission, whose job it is to provide hunting and fishing licenses.

For persons entitled to an exemption, the license is required only if you hunt deer or turkey. The exempt license is not required for other types of game.

The following are exempt from buying a hunting license: if you hunt entirely within your own county (except for deer and turkey); if you are over 65 or under 17 years of age. If you qualify for hunting without a license under these conditions you do not need a permit.

Tags are necessary, because it is illegal to possess a deer that does not have a tag. These tags must be securely attached to the deer immediately after it is killed. Just having the tag in your pocket is insufficient. As soon as you reach your deer, the tag, properly filled in, should be attached to the antler, if a buck, or a leg if a doe, where does are legal. It can be securely wrapped with string, or fastened with adhesive tape. And the tag should be put on so it will not become loose with handling the carcass in either the icehouse or the automobile while in transit. The deer tags are non-transferable and must bear the name of the shooter.

Widows Apply For S. S. at Age 62

"Widows should apply for social security benefits as soon as they are 62," Paul J. Files, Social Security Manager advises. "It would be even better if they applied a month or two before they are 62. Of course no one should delay, but widows in particular should be careful to apply for benefits promptly."

A woman's benefit based on her own account, or on the account of a living husband is reduced if she applies before age 65, but a widow's benefit is different. Widows' benefits are not reduced and the full amount is paid at age 62. "So, if you are a widow," Files explained, "And we once paid you a lump-sum or monthly benefits, you should apply again when you are 62. In fact, you can speed your first check by applying a month or so before."
