TEN YEARS FOR JOE HORNER.

Alboid, Bad Man to Get His Just Dues.

About ten o'clock in the morning of the 10th day of January, 1876, while the cashier of the bank at Comanche, this State, was quietly attending to his business, two men entered the institution, and while one of them held the muzzle of a cocked pistol to the official's nose, the other entered the vault of the bank and secured about \$5,000 in money. The robbers then compelled the cashier to walk with them to where their horses were hitched, and then mounting their steeds, they rode rapidly away.

About a month later, two young men, brothers, named George and Joseph Horner, were arrested in this city, charged with committing the robbery. Yesterday, Joseph Horner, the eldest of the two, was tried in the District Court here, and a verdict of guilty was rendered, the punishment being fixed at ten years in the penitentiary, the fullest penalty of the law, the prisoner being tried on an indictment of theft only. The indictment in this case measured fourteen feet of foolscap.

Joseph Horner is a young man, apparently not more than 25 or 26 years of age, and scarcely looking the daring desperado he has proven himself to be. He listened to the proceedings of the trial and heard the verdict pronounced with the most stolid indifference.

The younger brother, George, not much more than a smooth-faced boy, is yet to be tried. It is not believed he had any part in the robbery of the bank at Comanche, but when arrested he had some of the stolen money upon him. Both lived in the neighborhood of Comanche, and bore the character of being bold and dangerous persons. Two much praise cannot be accorded to our officers for bringing these men to justice. Deputy Sheriff McCall, we understand, made the arrest.

A Juvenile Thief.

Yesterday a small boy, only eight years old, was arrested on a charge of stealing two small silver balls and a chain from St. Mary's Church. The boy admitted stealing one of the balls, but refused to confess as to the other articles. It is supposed he was incited to the theft by some other person, but he refused to acknowledge that such was the case. The boy was released after receiving a severe reprimand.

While the boy was in the hands of the officer, his father, a Portuguese named John Bonifaz, made a brutal assault upon him, kicking him severely, for which he was arrested and locked up. It is not known whether the boy was seriously hurt by the rough treatment he received, or not.

And Still They Come.

Nearly every day we hear of the arrival of some good, substantial business man coming to this section to invest his capital and assist in developing the resources of the country. They are all heartily welcomed, especially such as Mr. Amos Babcock, of Brooklyn, New York, who purchased yesterday, from Adams & Wickes, 2,311 acres of land on the Leas, about nine miles north of the city. He has plenty of capital, and will at once commence improving and stocking his place.

Mr. Babcock will also purchase large tracts of land for friends in New York and Illinois, who will arrive here to take possession some time during the year. We like to see the lands purchased by actual settlers, such as these will be.

Police Court.

The Recorder did not have much business of interest yesterday morning, there being but one case of drunk and disorderly, one for violation of the sanitary ordinance, one vagrant and one concealed weapon "toter." The concealed weapon man and the vagrant occupied the same cell last night, and the latter so won his way into the good graces of the former, that this morning, he paid the vagrant's fines, besides \$25 for his own offense.

Obituary.

Dr. L. W. Herff, at the residence of Mrs. L. W. Herff, Wednesday, March 14th, at 2 P. M., of consumption. He was 67 years of age. He was born in Ambly, Lee county, Illinois, aged 30 years.

The deceased came to San Antonio only four weeks since, in the last stage of that dreadful disease, hoping even at so late a date to be benefited by our climate. He was a young man and father, and his death will strike sorrow to the hearts of many relatives and friends, who had warmly hoped for his recovery.

A younger brother of the deceased came to San Antonio with him, and was as devoted and untiring in his attention to his brother as it was possible for him to be. He left this morning with the remains for his Mother's home.

WELL PLEASED.

That's What's the Matter with Our Massachusetts Visitors.

They Will Report in Favor of Locating their Colony near San Antonio.

The EXPRESS has mentioned the visit to this section of a delegation of prominent gentlemen from Great Barrington, Massachusetts, who came with a view of locating lands for a colony at some point in Texas, at no distant day, if the country should be found satisfactory. They visited several parts of the State, but before leaving most unqualifiedly pronounced in favor of the country tributary to San Antonio. On Saturday last two of the party, Messrs. C. Ticker and Geo. H. Wheeler, visited a tract of land on the Castrolville road, about fifteen miles from the city, with which they were very well pleased. They expressed themselves as delighted with the Hondo Valley, near Bandera, their only objection to it being its distance from railroad communication, which, it is thought, will cause them to report in favor of the tract of land on the Castrolville road. Without reserve, all the gentlemen of the party spoke in great praise of the climate, quality of the soil, the water, in fact of the country in general, and were especially profuse in their complimentary remarks concerning the people they met here, not hesitating to declare that they found them entirely different from what they expected. They say the people of San Antonio and Western Texas have been badly misrepresented through the North and East, both as to their hospitality and general character. When they were led to expect to meet every body armed to the teeth, suspicious of his neighbor and ready to take life on the slightest provocation, they met a warm-hearted, accommodating people, always ready to resent insult or affront, it is true, but frowning upon and discountenancing desperadoes and lawlessness as much as do the people in any section of the country.

Mr. Marcus H. Rogers, editor of the Berkshire Courier, who was a member of the visiting party, informed an EXPRESS reporter that the report made on their return to those sending them would be so favorable that there would not be so much trouble in organizing a large colony to locate in this neighborhood. He said he was surprised at the extent of the disposition to emigrate, on the part of the people of his section. Speaking of the people of the colonization scheme, he said that, at the request of two or three gentlemen, he put a small notice in his paper stating that on a certain evening a meeting of those interested in such a scheme would be held at the court house in Great Barrington, and when the time for the meeting came, instead of ten or twenty persons responding to the call, as he expected there would be, there were present over two hundred men, all taking an active and enthusiastic interest in the proceedings.

These people are industrious, economical and enterprising, and a colony of them would prove a valuable acquisition to our country, heartily welcomed.

TEXAS CATTLE RANCHES.

Some of our "Patches of Ground" and Their Owners.

In the old-fashioned settled States, the possessor of 40, 60 or 100 acres of land, looks confidently about his "farm," the man who owns 100 or 200 acres is a "large land owner," while those possessing above that amount swell out as very real-estate princes, looked upon with admiration, if not with envy, as the rulers of vast domains. But how would these "domains" look in comparison with the "patches of ground" owned and controlled by some of our unassuming rancheros, who quietly speak of "going down to my ranch," as though they had in their mind's eye at the time, some little abode but in a five acre lot.

Occasionally come far away eastern dry goods clerks, having accumulated a couple of hundreds of dollars, and becoming tired of the monotony of his business, will startle his companions by declaring he has "half a mind" to throw up his job and go to Texas and buy a ranch. The figures given by the Cleburne Chronicle of the number of acres of land owned by some of our rancheros would prove interesting to some of the young men alluded to. Messrs. Coleman, Manis & Fulton have 28,000 acres; San Antonio and Texas counties, pastures under fence enclosing 209,428 acres; Capt. Kennedy has, to the southwest of Corpus Christi, 132,000 acres; Capt. King 175,000 acres. In the same vicinity other parties have, in the aggregate, 200,000 acres; and about Indianapolis, in Calhoun county, there are 60,000 acres belonging to different persons. In Refugio county there are 83,000 acres; McCampbell & Bros., near Rockport, have 30,000 acres; John Wood, near St. Mary, has 65,000 acres; Thomas O'Connor has 49,000 acres; John Calver has 28,000 acres; San Antonio and Texas counties, pastures under fence enclosing 15,000 acres; Jerry O'Driscoll has 30,000 acres, the last four all in Refugio county. In Bexar county, sundry persons have 42,000 acres; and in Atascosa county 75,000 acres. In Live Oak county there are 80,000 acres; in Victoria county 45,000 acres. Butler has, in Galveston and Harris counties, 60,000 acres; Mr. Sam Allen, in the same two counties, has 120,000 acres. Mr. Kuram, in Jackson county, has 75,000 acres; Pierre, Yalke & Co., same county, have 30,000 acres, and sundry persons in that and adjoining counties, 100,000 acres.

Other parts of the State, there are many large enclosed pastures, the owners and dimensions of which cannot be given.
