Mustangs Slosh Past Rebels

Hughes Springs sloshed past Rivercrest 20-0, in the season opener at Mustang Stadium Friday night. Deep, wet grass, a slippery ball, and numerous leg cramps plagued the Rebels for the forty-eight minute game.

The slippery pig squirted out of the Rivercrest position 11 times but the Rebels recovered seven, resulting in a loss of the ball only four times.

Hughes Springs lost the football three times with Rivercrest recovering the ball everytime.

Rivercrest's ground game appeared a little sluggish this week with only 112 yards rushing and 28 yards lost in busted plays. Hughes Springs splashed out an impressive 304 yards rushing and a loss of 37 yards when the Rebels sacked the quarterback eight times. Sacking the quarterback were Donald Jean, twice; Joe Rhodes, twice; Terry Williams, twice; Marlon Savage, one and Williams and Patton dropped the Hughes Springs quarterback for a jolting eight yard loss.

Rivercrest's ground game was led by Todd Wright, carrying the ball 14 times for a total gain of 48 yards. Wright's longest run was for eleven yards in the fourth quarter, when he went through the center of the Mustang line.

Wright was stopped only once in his 124 carries without a gain against the Mustangs.

Kip Stansell, Rivercrest's sophomore quarterback attempted seven passes, completing three, one to Patton for nine yards, one to Brown for 16 and one to Potter for six yards. Stansell only had one of his passes picked off by Hughes Springs late in the fourth quarter.

Hughes Springs won the toss and elected to receive the ball. Rivercrest's Jimmy Forsyth kicked off to David Qualls, who took the ball on their 11 yard line and ran it back six yards where the Rivercrest defensive team greeted the Mustangs. This series of 17 plays netted Hughes Springs 83 yards and six points on the scoreboard. Their extra point was thwarted by a five yard penalty and Donald Jean blocking the kick.

Jimmy Patton took the Hughes Springs kickoff on the Rivercrest 20 yard line and returned it to the 38. A series of seven plays netted the Rebels only 16 yards before they were forced to turn the ball over to the Mustangs. This was Rivercrest's only possession of the ball in the first quarter.

Hughes Springs ripped off two plays in the remaining seconds of the first quarter for one first down and the first play of the second quarter. Myron Watkins uncorked a short pass to Bill Terry, who put six more on the score board and added 70 yards to his team's opener. The Rebels again managed to block the Mustangs extra point.

Jimmy Patton received the Hughes Springs second kick off on the Rivercrest 25 and carried it back for eight yards to their 33. Todd Wright tried

the left side of the line for no gain and Ronnie Rape's skirt of right end found five yards. On third down Kip Stansell attempted a pitch out to Ronnie Rape and the busted play cost seven yards and put the Rebels in a kicking position.

Ronnie Rape's kick from the 31 yard line went only nine yards.

Hughes Springs lined up off side and received a five yard penalty with the snap of the ball. Donald Jean ripped through the line on the second play of the series and dumped Mustang quarterback Myron Watkins for a seven yard loss. Two incomplete passes turned the ball over the Rivercrest when Nicky Brown snagged the

ball on the 17 yard line.

Rivercrest ran three plays for eight yards and was forced to kick. Rape's kick was blocked and the Mustangs took over on the Rivercrest 27 yard line. The Mustangs ran six plays for 17 yards, then left the ball on the 10 yard line for the Rebels.

Seventy Workers Attend Swine Flu Training Seminar

Some 70 volunteer workers attended the swine flu vaccination training seminar at the Legion Hall Thursday afternoon, September 1, according to Eulabee Hines, county program chairman. Charles E. Hayden and Sharon Ricketts, program specialists of the Texas Health Department,

conducted the session designed to teach volunteer workers their duties for the actual inoculations.

Hayden told the group that workers can proceed to contact all those eligible and arrange necessary transportation on 24 hours notice. "Once again I want to emphasize the need for churches and other groups to

prepare now for the weekend of inoculations, whenever that may be," she said. The clinic for shots will be open in Clarksville on the Saturday; Bogata-Rivercrest, Detroit, and Manchester on the Sunday.

The health officials said that the vaccine will probably be offered to those 18 years of age and over at this time. They indicated that the inoculations are recommended for everyone in this category except the chronically ill and those with an egg allergy. The only anticipated physical reaction is local swelling in the arm, some redness and tenderness, in 20 to 40 percent, with slight fever within 24 hours for a very small percentage. Hayden said this is a "dead virus" vaccine and it is medically impossible to take the flu from the shots.

Local chairmen for the program include: Mary Margaret Sturdivant, Clarksville; Roberta Hendricks, Avery; Sarah Nell Peek, Annona; Anita Stubblefield, Bogata; Patty Barton, Bagwell; Lucille Ingram, Detroit; and Beulah Adams, Manchester. Those wishing to volunteer to assist with directing those coming in for shots, filling out forms, telephoning and transportation, and other duties are asked to call Mrs. Hines or any of the local chairmen.

Hayden praised Mrs. Hines and the Red River County organization, and he said that this County will be the first in northeast Texas to receive the inoculations as a result.

Rivercrest Selected Student Teaching Center

The Vocational Agriculture Department at Rivercrest High School has been selected as a student teaching center by East Texas State University according to Mr. Talmadge Morgan, superintendent of schools. During this semester Mr. Kenneth Lee Whitten, an Agricultural Education Major at East Texas, will spend the week of September 6 through September 10, 1976 in the Vo. Ag. Department. He will again be in the department from November 1 1976 through December 16, 1976.

This student teaching is part of the experiences provided students to become teachers of vocational agriculture and professional agricultural workers. According to Dr. A. C. Hughes, Head of the Department of Agriculture at East Texas, only high school vocational agriculture departments are selected that are considered to be outstanding. "We consider the Rivercrest Vo-Ag Department to be among the top departments in Texas," said Dr. Hughes. Doing student teaching will be Mr. Kenneth Lee Whitten whose home is at Paris. "I feel fortunate to have the opportunity of working in the Rivercrest Ag. Department," says Mr. Whitten. "Such experience," he continued, "will greatly enhance my university work and will make me a better trained professional worker in agriculture."

Rebels To Clash With Bulldogs

The Rivercrest Rebels have their work cut out for them Friday night when they meet the Cooper Bulldogs at 8:00 p.m. Friday at Rebel Stadium. The Bulldogs took the District 16-A title last year and are expected to be in second place this year. Their 1975 record showed seven wins and four losses, with a return of eight offensive and seven defensive starters among their 19 lettermen.

The Bulldogs quarterback, Randy Reynolds, plays both offense and defense, and has an impressive record in both

categories. The Friday night clash between the Prairiland Patriots and the Cooper Bulldogs found Randy Reynolds tossing eight for 63 yards. Greg Toon, Paul Morris and J. C. Morris took the honors for the Bulldogs's rushing.

Toon will have to be reckoned with by the Rivercrest defensive team, because of his excellent running abilities, an uncanny ability to get between the quarterback and the pass receiver.

Cooper's 32 man roster supports a lot of beef with a line average of 180 lbs., with several of the ends and tackles over 6 feet tall. The backfield has Randy Reynolds, QB, weighing in at 145 pounds and 5'9"; Greg Toon, HB, 160, 5'10"; Paul Morris, HB, 155, 5' 10"; and J. C. Morris, 175, HB, 6'1".

With a dry field and no leg cramps the Rebels should be able to chew up the Bulldogs. The Kip Stansell and Nicky Brown passing combination may pick up many yards for the Rebels this week. In the Hughes Springs game, Todd Wright showed consistency in his ability to carry the ball on a wet field with very deep grass. With the Rebels on home ground Wright should be able to grind out one first down after another.

With Rape and Patton out of the tall grass the Rebel fans should be able to see them make some good off tackle and end runs. Rivercrest Boosters will see a fired up Rebel team this week who will be out to change last weeks unbalanced scoreboard figures.

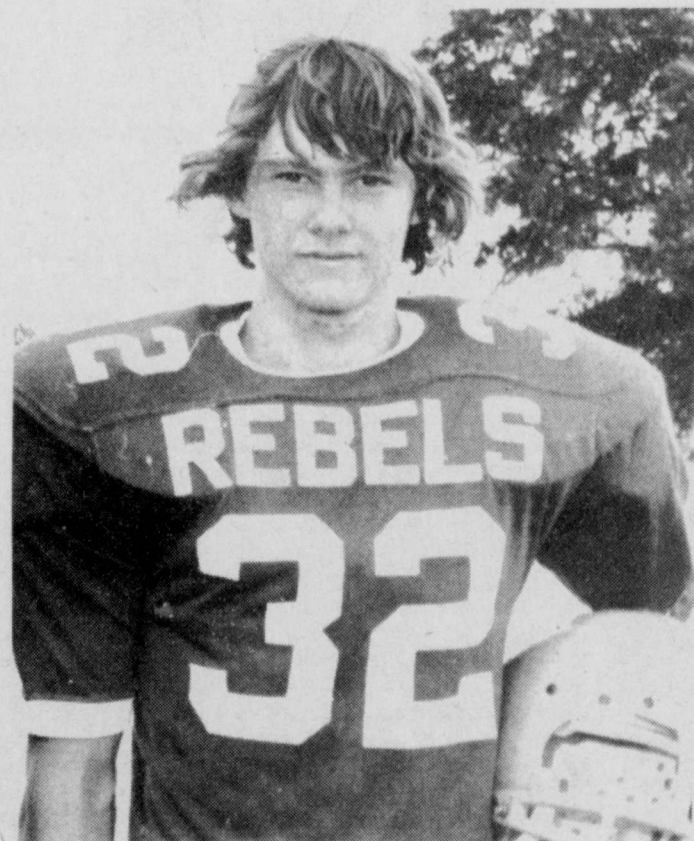

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Soil Conservation Service Field Day To Be Held At Knox City

A public field day will be held on September 23 at the Soil Conservation Service plant materials center in Knox City, State Conservationist George C. Marks announced this week.

New grasses, forbs, legumes, and other plants under evaluation at the center will be discussed during the day, Marks said. The center serves both Texas and Oklahoma.

Guided tours will be conducted through the 92-acre tract from 8:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. The center is located on FM 1292, 2 miles north and 2½

miles west of Knox City. Box lunches will be on sale for those who wish to eat lunch at the center.

Grass seed growers, seed dealers, conservation district directors, research workers, sportsmen, and others interested in the search for better plants are invited to attend.

Seed or rootstock from plants that show promise for solving specific soil and water conservation problems are collected, then grown and evaluated at Knox City. The more promising ones are then grown under field conditions on farms of soil and water conservation district cooperators under a wide variety of conditions. Selections that prove superior to other strains available are then released by conservation districts to commercial seed growers. These producers then grow seed and sell it to the public.

Approximately 1,200 different grasses, forbs, legumes, and woody plants are being grown at Knox City. Grass strains proven and put into use by SCS include Selection 75 kleingrass; El Reno, Uvalde, and Vaughn sidecoats gama; King Ranch bluestem; green sprangletop; and Grenville switchgrass.

SCS plant materials work also developed ways to profitably grow, harvest, and plant most of the range grasses now being planted in Texas.

Some of the groups who cooperate with SCS in its plant

materials work in Texas include Agricultural Research Service, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas A&M University, U. S. Air

Force, U. S. Corps of Engineers, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, and soil and water conservation districts.

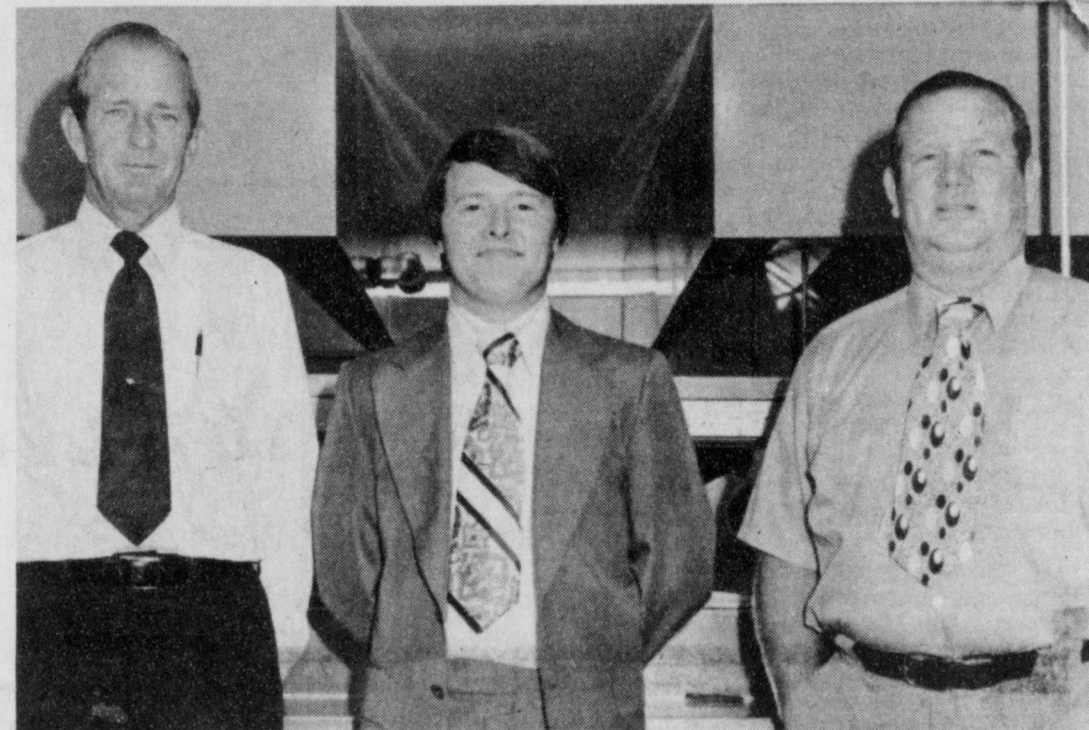

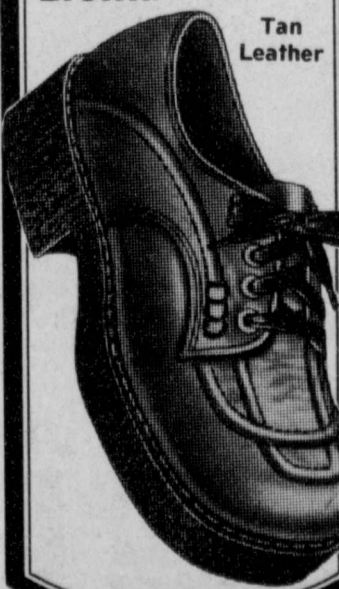

Stansell had trouble finding a handle on the next two snaps, and the Mustangs took over on a fumble at the one yard line. What should have been an easy touchdown wasn't.

First the Mustangs received a 15 yard penalty for holding and then Joe Rhodes found the quarterback three yards deep for another loss. The next play found Terry Williams and Donald Jean rolling Mitchell Simmons around in the water on the 24 yard line. A five yard penalty for delay of the game and an incomplete pass turned the ball over to the Rebels with only one minute 48 seconds to go.

Wright gained only one yard and Rape picked up 10 yards around right end putting the ball on the 40 yard line. Stansell got the snap from center on the next play and found it too slippery to hang on to.

Hughes Springs made two attempts to move the ball in the closing seconds of the first half, but their efforts found only a penalty and a fumble. The

Rebels took over for two more plays before the horn sounded. Patton picked up nine yards on a pass from Stansell and Potter came right back with a six yard gainer from Stansell. The first half ended with the Mustangs holding a 12 to zipp lead over Rivercrest.

The opening kickoff in the second half to Rivercrest gave Rape his longest run of the evening. He took the ball on the 26 yard line and brought it back to the 44. The slippery ball gave the Rebels only two plays before going to Hughes Springs on the 44 yard line.

Hughes Springs mounted a nine play drive that added another six points to their score. Celester Washington and Corry Stovall carried the brunt of the drive up the field to the Rivercrest seven, where Myron Watkins, on a quarterback keeper went over for the TD. The last two points of the game came on a pitchout to Washington, who went in standing up.

Mark Hudson took the second kickoff at the 35 yard line and was dropped in his tracks. The Rebels picked up one first down

on this series of plays, getting the ball out to the 46 yard line. They attempted two passes—one to Rape and one to Patton, both incomplete. Ralph Abernathy took Rape's 29 yard kick on the 25 yard line and returned it to the 45 yard line where he was met by a host of Rebels.

Rivercrest defense tightened up and the Mustangs started paying dearly for every yard. One ground play and one pass was all that Hughes Springs could get off in this series before Myron Watkins was jarred loose from the ball, and when the pile was unfolded Mike Mankins was in firm control of the ball.

Milton Scales opened up the next series of nine plays with a run around left end that netted a two yard gain. Kip Stansell lost the handle on the next two plays, but Hughes Springs managed to jump off sides twice for 10 yards giving Rivercrest a first down. The elusive ball squirted out of Stansell's hands again for a four yard loss. Stansell came back on the next play and hit Nicky Brown with a 16 yarder and a first down on the Hughes

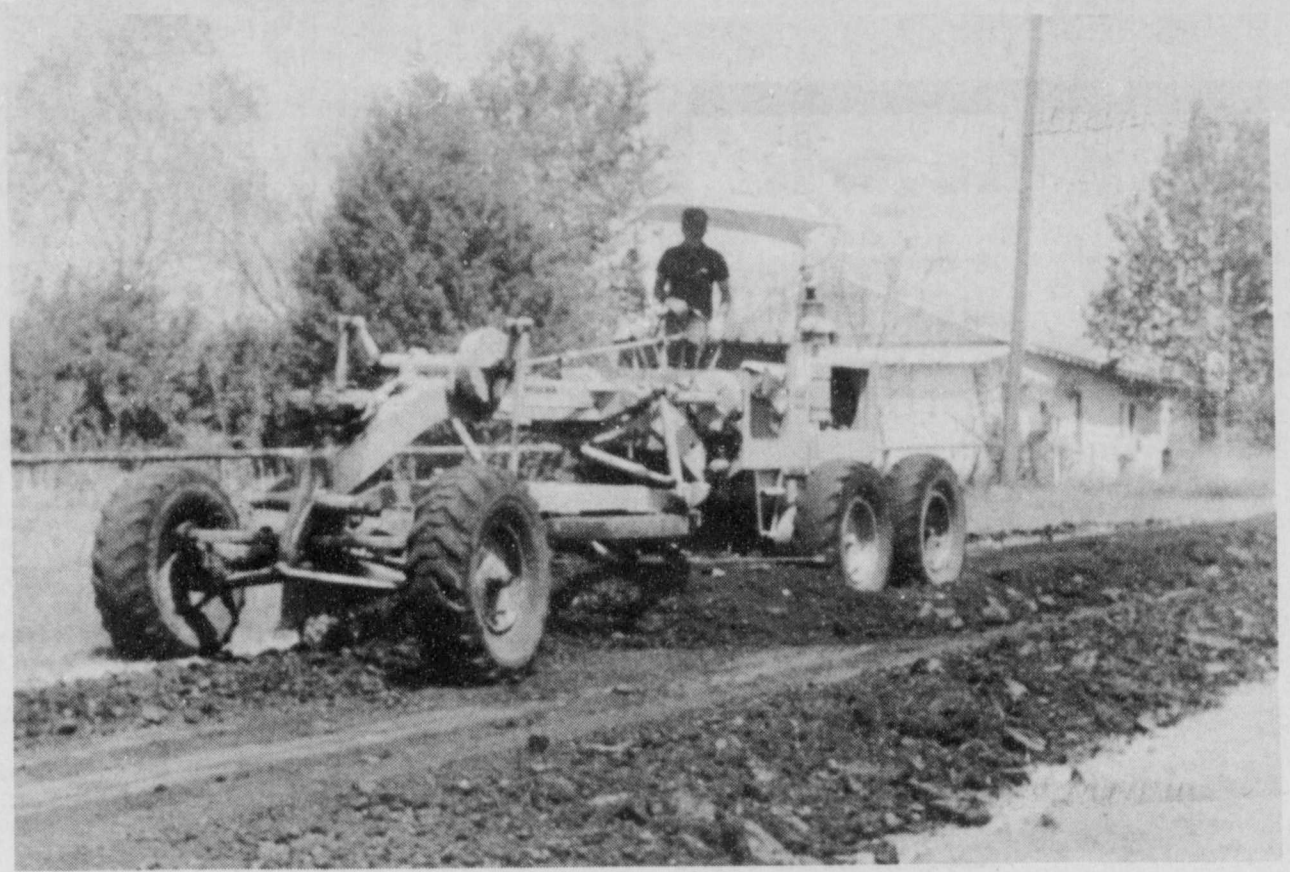
Springs 24 yard line. With one minute and 45 seconds left in the third quarter the ball was again turned over to Hughes Springs on a fumble.

The Mustangs mounted a nine play offensive that netted them three first downs and 48 yards, only to have the ball taken away by a fumble on the Rivercrest 25 yard line, recovered by Ronnie Rape.

Rivercrest mounted a 12 play drive that took them from the 25 to the Hughes Springs 27 yard line. Wright carried the ball for seven of the plays and Rape and Stansell twice each. Malpractice Commission Approves Report

AUSTIN—The state's medical malpractice study commission has approved a report that shows the malpractice insurance crisis has boosted health care costs. At the same time, the problem has shrunk availability of care. The report also says the crisis could stifle medical advances.

Many doctors are forced to practice "defensive medicine" because of the threat of malpractice suits, says Milton Davis, M.D., a study commission member. Doctors have to use medically unnecessary tests, x-rays and consultants to be protected legally in the event of a suit. Unfortunately this makes patients' bills go up.

Doctors don't like this trend but have no other choice if the present situation continues. If a doctor gets sued, whether deserved or not, his insurance goes up, in some cases up to \$30,000 a year. Some doctors' premiums have risen around 625 percent in about five years. Eventually some costs are passed on to the patients, Dr. Davis says. He is chairman of study commission Subcommittee II, the group that submitted the report in Austin on Friday (August 27).

Doctors also are having to discontinue services to avoid the threat of suits and to obtain insurance. Insurance companies say general surgery and certain other procedures have become "high risk" because they are involved in so many

suits. Many times a doctor can continue in practice only if he stops performing certain procedures for which he may be well qualified. Further, potentially valuable medical innovations may be avoided completely because of the legal risk, thus depriving the public of improvement in medical care.

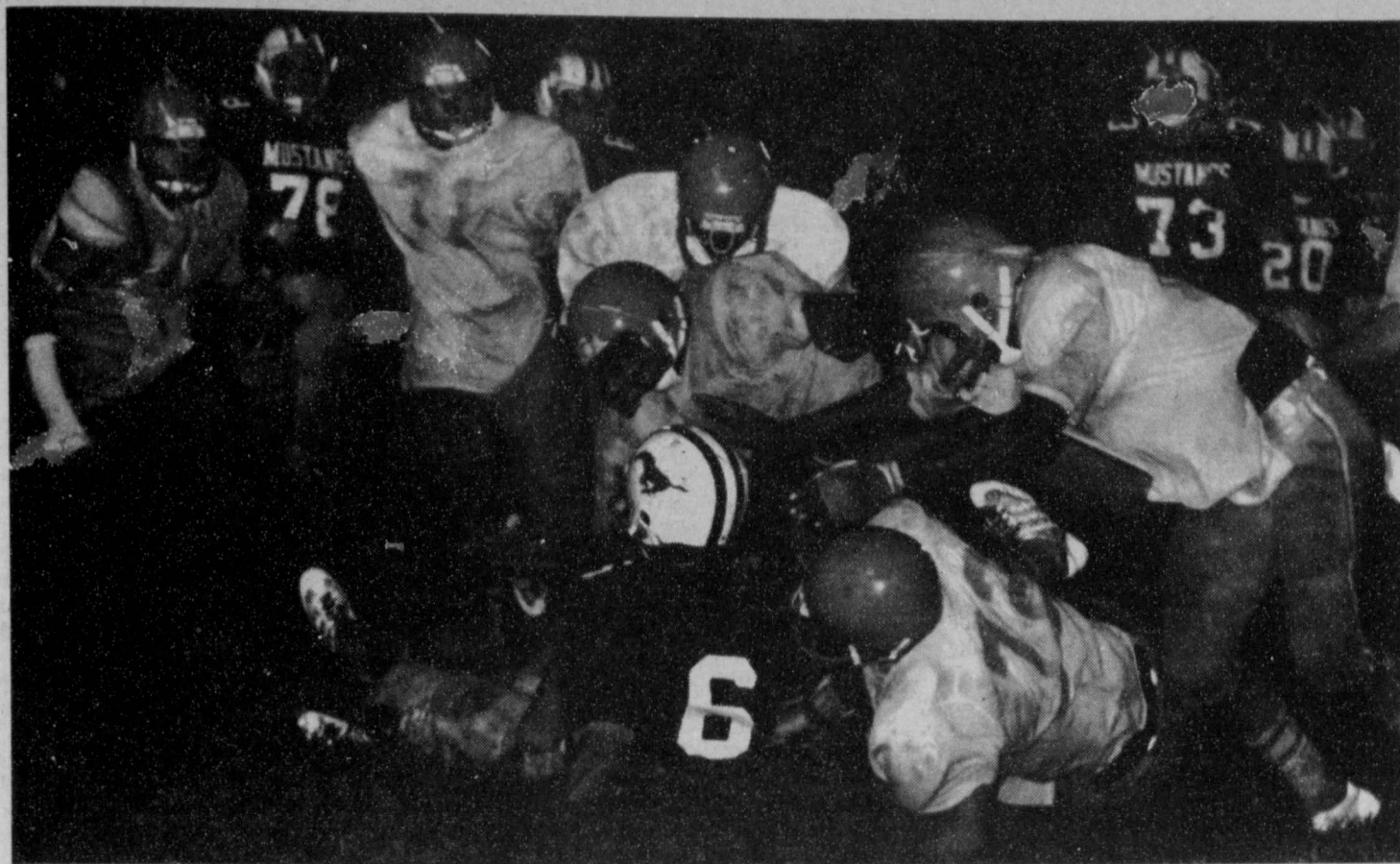
The crisis has multiple causes; it is not the fault of any one group but it affects everyone, says Dr. Davis, a Dallas physician.

Solutions will require legislative action. Included will be a look at the authority needed to broaden the Texas State Board of Medical Examiners' functions.

The commission also approved asking for a law to develop a statewide loss control program and a data gathering system to report on medical mishaps. The Board of Medical Examiners could use this data to investigate improper conduct.

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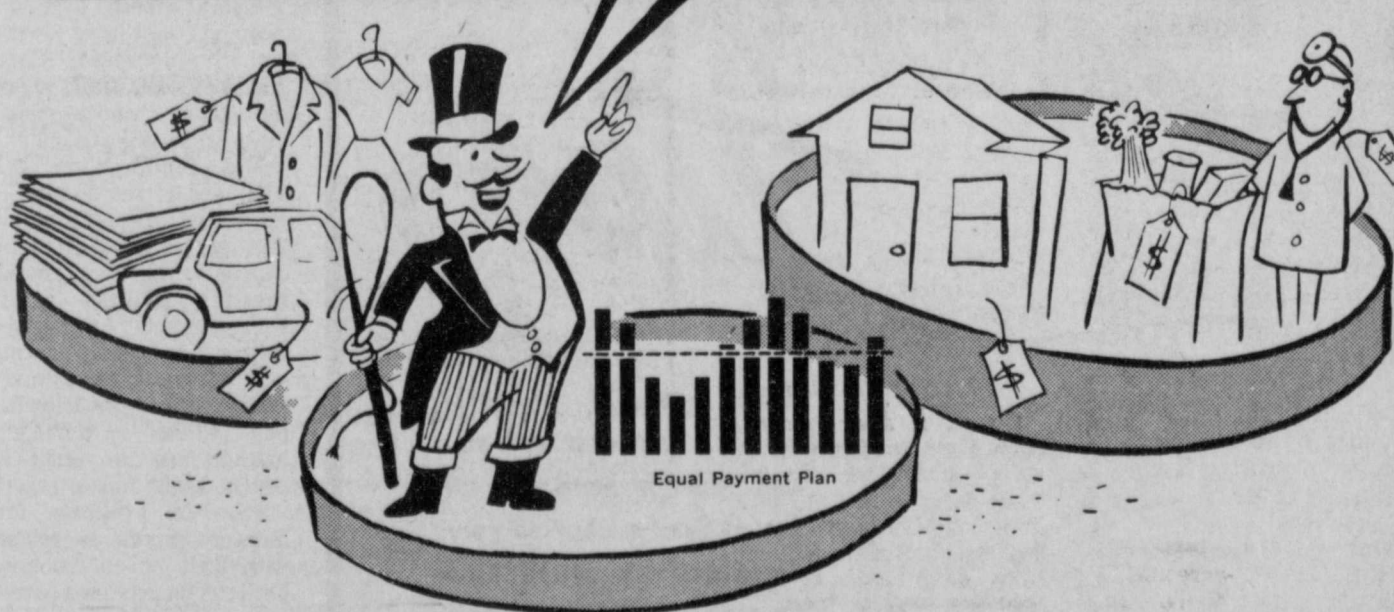
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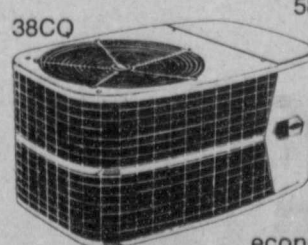


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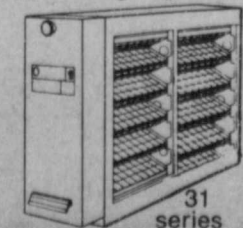
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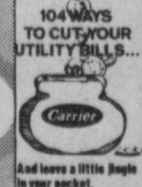
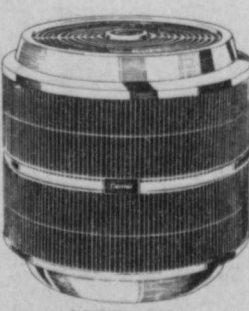


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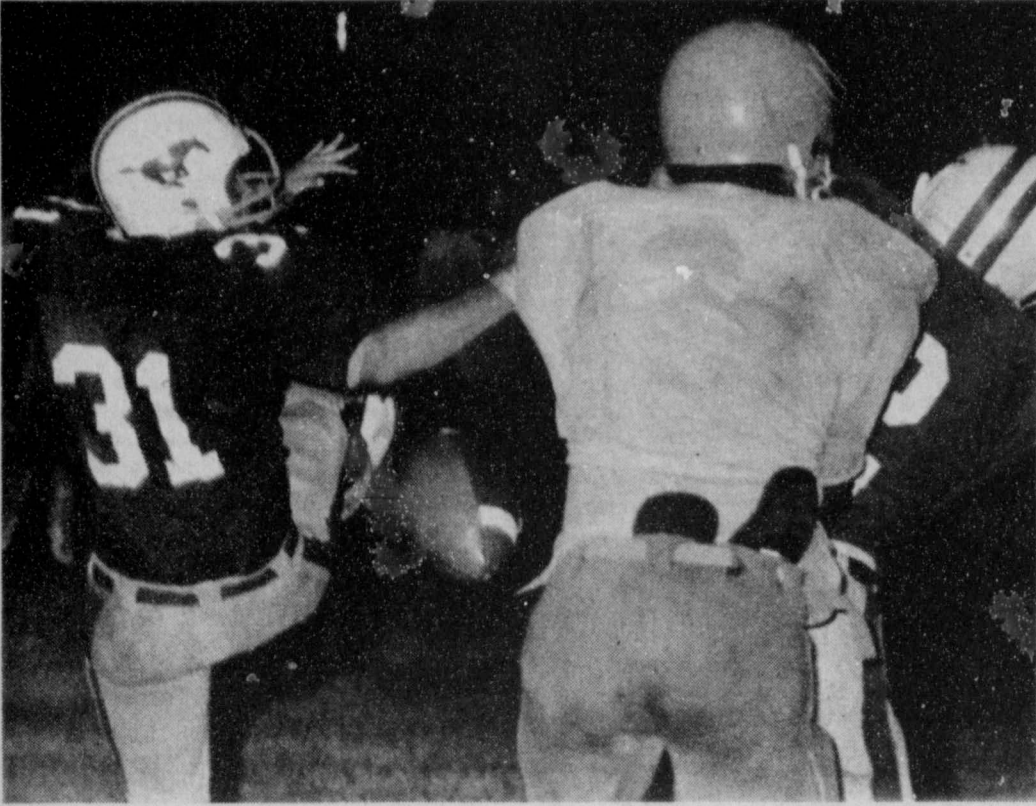


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JIMMY PATTON, his number made invisible by the mud, and two Mustang

Quiltmaking To Begin Sept. 14 At PJC

Two beginners' Quiltmaking classes will start at Paris Junior College on Tuesday, September 14, and Wednesday, September 15, in Room 129 of the Administration Building. Mrs. Zoan Fox Biglin, who taught the course last year at PJC, will teach the classes for those interested in learning the art of quiltmaking.

Tuesday classes will be held from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. for six weeks, and Wednesday classes will meet from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m. for six Wednesdays. Fee for the course is \$20.

In the course, Mrs. Biglin will teach the basic methods of piecing a quilt top, putting together and quilting the quilt, making patterns and transferring techniques, and the art of applique in quilting. Also included will be a discussion on how to build a quilting frame. Quilting techniques taught in the course may be applied in making clothing, pillows, wall hangings and other decorative items.

Mrs. Biglin, who moved to Paris from Virginia, is a member of the National Quilting Association and the Northern Virginia Chapter of American Quilters. She has done research on quilts and quiltmaking throughout the Washington, D.C., area and in the Pennsylvania Dutch Country. She exhibited handmade articles and demonstrated quilting at the Holiday Fair at PJC last year.

Reservations for Beginning Quiltmaking should be made by paying the fee one week before the class begins in the Continuing Education Office at PJC. Senior citizens may take the course for one-half the regular fee on a space-budget basis. Training Center To Be Located At Daingerfield

The Ark-Tex Council of Governments is sponsoring a CETA Manpower training center at Daingerfield, Texas. Facilities are provided by the Daingerfield school district and the courses are taught by Texarkana Community College. The college will grant diplomas upon completion of the three courses: Nurses Aid (begun Aug. 31), Welding, and Carpenter's Aid (starting September 20). The program was started for CETA, but is open to anyone interested. The intent of the program, funded by the Ark-Tex Council of Governments and the Texas Education Agency, is to give the unemployed a chance to learn a new trade.

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Work Plan Includes Widening Of White Oak Bridges

Recommendations for a 20 year program of highway work in the nine county Atlanta district of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation have been released by L. L. Jester Jr., District Engineer.

The recommendations are those of a McKinsey & Company study which has been going on since June of last year.

McKinsey management experts recently presented the results of the study to the Department, which has now released the contents of the report for information purposes

to the public.

Jester said the study identified a "backbone system" of highways consisting of 7190 miles of critical inter-regional links between major cities and routes with heavy inter-regional truck traffic. The backbone system will be given priority in construction, reconstruction and maintenance in times of scarce highway funds.

Projects included in the study plan were presented at two possible funding levels, Jester explained.

Level 1 included projects that could be constructed with existing funding over the 20 year planning period. Projects in this category for District 19 are:

Loop 151 in Bowie County from US 82 to US 59—Construct a four-lane freeway from US 82 to Westlawn Drive in Texarkana and construct a two-lane expressway between Westlawn Drive and US 59, including frontage roads.

US 59 in Bowie County from

the Red River to Interstate 30—Construct a four-lane undivided facility.

US 67 in Bowie County from Whitaker Street to the T&P Railroad Texarkana—Provide a one-way couplet by constructing an intersection of 7th and 8th Streets at the T&P Railroad.

US 59 from Atlanta in Cass County, through Marion County and into Harrison County to near Woodlawn—Convert to a four-lane undivided highway by widening bridges and resurfacing.

St. Hwy. 11 and St. Hwy. 49 in Cass and Morris Counties from the L&A Railroad in Morris County to Farm Road 250 in Hughes Springs—Construct a parallel overpass structure at the L&A Railroad and widen existing pavement to provide a four-lane undivided facility.

St. Hwy. 43 in Harrison County from US 59 to South Washington Avenue in Marshall—Widen to a four-lane urban type section.

St. Hwy. 43 in Harrison and Panola Counties—Replace timber pile bridges near the Sabine River.

US 59 in Harrison County from Interstate 30 to Farm Road 1186—Provide additional surfacing.

US 259 in Morris County from Interstate 30 to Farm Road 144—Reconstruct the existing two-lane facility.

US 259 in Morris County from Daingerfield to Lone Star—Construct a four-lane undivided facility with urban sections in Daingerfield and Lone Star.

US 59 in Panola County from Mt. Pleasant to Farm Road 1735—Widen 0.6 mile to a four-lane urban section and widen the remaining portion to a conventional two-lane facility.

Level 2 funding would require a modest increase in funding to allow the Department to "match" federal funds which would be available over the 20 year period.

District 19 projects included in Level 2 would provide all of the work listed for Level 1 plus the following:

Loop 151 in Bowie County—Extend the four-lane divided freeway with frontage roads for

the total distance of the project from US 82 to US 59.

US 82 in Bowie County from Interstate 30 to DeKalb—Reconstruct shoulders and mark for four lanes.

US 67 in Bowie County from Whitaker Street in Texarkana to the T&P Railroad—Provide the one-way couplet by extending construction along the entire length of the project.

St. Hwy. 8 in Cass County from 2.3 miles south of Douglassville to near Farm Road 995 at Red Hill—Reconstruct existing two-lane facility.

Loop 390 in Harrison County, from US 80 west of Marshall to US 59 north of Marshall—Construct a four-lane undivided highway.

US 271 in Titus County between the Franklin County line and Farm Road 1896—Widen 5 bridges.

US 271 in Titus County from Farm Road 1896 to Loop 419—Reconstruct existing two-lane facility.

According to Jester, the North East Texas District currently has committed projects in the planning stage which would require \$275 million for completion. Level 1, the current funding level, would provide only \$21.2 million and Level 2 would provide only \$34.7 million over the 20 year period to reduce the backlog.

The McKinsey study did not include an analysis of projects in the urban system, farm to market roads or safety and betterment programs, according to the district engineer.

The McKinsey report showed that on a statewide basis, Texas faces a \$9.9 billion fund gap over the next two decades, with work valued at \$11.8 billion in backlog and only \$1.9 billion projected to meet those needs.

Jester pointed out that the study revealed that should present financing arrangements persist, by 1981 no construction funds will be available for 100 percent state financed projects, by 1982 state funds will be insufficient to match federal urban system funds and by 1985 state funds will be insufficient to match any federal funds.

East Texas Coordinator Named

AUSTIN, Texas—A Tyler businessman and Marine Corps veteran has been named the Deep East Texas coordinator for the Carter-Mondale campaign, it was announced today.

Bob Schaefer, a 32-year-old land manager for a Tyler-based investment firm, will direct campaign activities in a 28-

county northeast Texas region, according to state coordinator Chuck Parrish.

"In the past week I've talked with every democratic county chairman in my region," said Schaefer. "I've spoken to every state representative and state senator and to both congressmen. Without ex-

ception they're enthusiastic about Jimmy Carter and they're ready to go to work. It's really an amazing kind of unity."

"Nobody I spoke to doubts that Jimmy Carter is the most popular presidential candidate we could have on the ballot in Deep East Texas," Schaefer continued. "What we want to do now is get everyone registered to vote and then turn them out so we can prove it."

An east Texas native, Schaefer served two tours of duty in Vietnam as a non-commissioned officer in the Marine Corps, winning the Navy Cross, two bronze stars, and two Purple Hearts. He is a member of the American Legion and a former state officer in the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

A business major while at North Texas State University, Schaefer is a member of the Tyler chamber of commerce. He is also the east Texas commissioner for the American Softball Association.

The counties in his region include Bowie, Cass, Camp, Cherokee, Delta, Fannin, Franklin, Gregg, Harrison, Henderson, Hopkins, Hunt, Kaufman, Lamar, and Marion Counties.

Also included are Morris, Panola, Rains, Red River, Rockwall, Rusk, San Augustine, Shelby, Smith, Titus, Upshur, Van Zandt, and Wood Counties.

Isbell Terraces Save Tax Money

Gordon Isbell of DePort is helping save taxpayers money. He recently installed a grassed waterway and parallel terrace system on his farm. The farm is located in the Peter's Prairie area Southeast of Clarksville.

Millions of dollars is spent each year removing silt from road ditches, channels and other areas. It damages roads, bridges and fills lakes. A large part of the silt is topsoil from unterraced cropland.

Parallel terraces like Isbells help keep topsoil in the field and out of streams and water

supplies. This reduces silt and the taxpayers expense of removing it from roads, lakes and other areas. These terraces slow water runoff, thus causing it to remove less topsoil.

A good parallel terrace system requires considerable survey time. Gordon Isbell's field was grid mapped. This map is used to determine waterway locations and to alien terraces parallel with proper grade.

Point rows were eliminated. The waterway was shaped and sodded to bermudagrass prior

to terrace construction. It serves as an outlet for terrace water.

John Spradling, Melvin Hines, Wayland Boyd and Curtis Bachman plan to construct new terraces this fall. The terrace systems will be cost-shared through the ASCS Office. Parallel terraces can be installed on most fields in Red River County. Landowners who are thinking of a terrace system should contact the Soil Conservation Service.

Many acres of cropland in Red River County are being farmed with no erosion control practices. This has caused severe erosion in many cases. Some fields were abandoned and others converted to pasture. The land could still be in row crop production had conservation measures been installed.

Landowners like Gordon Isbell is reducing erosion and decreasing the "hidden" price tag on silt for everyone.

Ticks Added To Screwworm Problem

MISSION, September 1: More than 83 percent of the 6,333 laboratory confirmed August screwworm cases from Texas livestock came from the 43 counties reporting Gulf Coast tick infestations, notes a U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) spokesman.

Dr. James E. Novy is director of field operations for the Screwworm Eradication Program.

Screwworm samples came from 117 Texas counties during August—5,269 of them from 43 south Texas counties harboring Gulf Coast tick populations.

The Screwworm Eradication Program, operated by the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS), uses sterile males in combatting the parasite of warm blooded animals. Female screwworm flies mate only once in their lifetimes—eggs they produce after mating with a sterile male will not hatch.

Female screwworm flies deposit eggs on wounds in warm blooded animals. As eggs

hatch maggots enter the wound to feed on live flesh. In about a week they grow to half an inch long before dropping to the ground to pupate for another week before emerging as adult flies.

Climatic conditions throughout Texas have been ideal for screwworms this year, says Dr. Novy. He is sure the situation would have been much worse if sterile flies had not been steadily distributed.

Early this year it seemed Texas was headed toward the worst screwworm year in its history. This pattern changed in April as a new strain of sterile flies came into use by the APHIS program.

By the end of August Texas had recorded 13,105 laboratory confirmed screwworm cases for the year. This compares to 54,769 by the same date in 1972. Novy comments only 26 August cases have been reported from Arizona, two from Arkansas, eight from New Mexico and 24 from Oklahoma. No screwworms have been reported in either Louisiana or California.

Income Status Changes Should Be Reported

Every month over 250,000 people in the United States who get Supplemental Security Income (SSI) fail to report changes in circumstances that may affect SSI payments.

Mrs. Emma Ware, District Manager of the Paris, Texas Social Security Office, advises that people most often fail to report a move or change in mailing address or living arrangements. An increase or decrease in income (no matter where it comes from) and help from relatives or friends who pay utilities or provide free housing are two other items which people fail to report.

The SSI program makes monthly payments to people with little or no income and limited resources who are 65 or over or blind or disabled. Eligibility for payments and payment amounts can be affected by changes in circumstances. People who report changes promptly can be sure that they will get the correct monthly payment at the correct address.

Under the law, people have 30 days to report such changes to any social security office. Failure to report such changes—or delay in reporting—can mean deductions in future payments to correct any overpayments involved.

Mrs. Ware emphasized that reports of changes may be made by telephone, by mail or in person to any social security office. An early report allows the office to make any necessary adjustments in payments without delay.
