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# Diary Of An Irrigator

## Winter Weather Creates Hearing Health Hazards

"Although winter can be one of the most enjoyable sports seasons for people both young and old, it can present particularly serious hearing health hazards," warns the Beltone Crusade for Hearing Conservation.

The crusade, sponsored by Chicago-based Beltone Electronics Corporation, world leader in hearing aids and electronic hearing test instruments, is designed to build public awareness to the vital need for hearing conservation.

Winter, with its characteristic cold wet weather, can increase the likelihood of headcolds and earaches. If left untreated, severe headcolds and earaches can result in serious and sometimes even permanent hearing impairments, the crusade officials said.

"If an earache or severe head cold is contacted, the victim should seek proper medical attention. Most of all, the serious long range after effects which can result from untreated headcolds and earaches should never be taken lightly," crusade officials said.

The officials also pointed out that common sense precautions, such as wearing proper ear protection and taking periodic breaks to warm-up are of particular importance to skiing, ice skating, tobogganing and snow mobile enthusiasts when exposed to excessive cold and wet weather conditions.

Parents and school teachers should be particularly alert to insure that small children do not let their enthusiasm for winter fun subject them to undue exposure to cold, wet conditions, they added.

**January 1**

 Still no test holes.  
 Called Joe the driller. Banker wonders if we have water.

**February 1**  
 Joe drives in with test rig. Truck breaks through frost. Rent four-wheeler to pull out test rig.

Joe goes back to town. Banker calls.  
 Would like to cancel loan. Joe's helper, 18 year old boy, Brings up rig for second try.  
 1st hole dry.  
 2nd hole dry.  
 5th hole dry.  
 Driller's helper goes to town. Dealer Bill returns.  
 Wants to sell system. Driller Joe returns.  
 Redrills hole No. 1. Finds 60 ft. gravel and water. Banker still not happy.  
 Buy 100 steers.  
 Banker gives loan.

**March 1**  
 Driller Joe Calls. Wants \$500 deposit. Banker agrees. Wife is unhappy. Steers get sick. Vet calls it over-eating. Gives medicine to supplement poor hay.  
 Driller Joe begins drilling. Hits rock. Stops drilling. Wants to charge for rock time. Joe uses dynamite. Pays for windshield in Banker's new pickup. Finds water in second day hole. Well looks good.

**April 1**  
 Dealer Bill brings out lease form.

Sign lease form and order system.  
 Banker smiles.  
 Banker approves loan for more steer feed.  
 Three-day snow storm. Three steers smother in snow. Early spring thaw. Semi brings system. Dumb driver gets stuck in fall plowing. Takes D-9 Cat to move semi. Part of system not on load.

**May 1**  
 Planted corn. Call dealer - no answer. About out of steer feed. Steer prices drop \$2. Dealer Bill calls. No trace of lost part for system. Corn coming up. Banker checks on steers. Banker approves loan for more feed.  
 Driller Joe calls and reports pump lost in transit. Corn plants dying. Call County Agent. He says it's wire worms. Still no rain. Some corn just sprouting. Herbicide didn't work. Weeds are six inches tall. Hired man begins cultivating. Daughter delivers lunch. Wife unhappy.

**June 1**  
 Still no rain. Hired man still cultivating. Driller Joe pumps well. Says it's 1500 gpm well. Banker smiles. Call pivot dealer. Call attorney to sue dealer. Dealer begins to set up system. Parts arrive for system. Call driller Joe. Pump still lost. Sign check for first lease payment. Receive a quarter inch rain. Hired man finished cultivating. Daughter still home. Call attorney. File suit on driller Joe. Pump arrives.

**July 1**  
 Driller Joe set pump. Joe hooks pump to system. System won't run. Corn wilting bad. Cattle eating good. Call attorney. Dealer comes out to start system. System runs. Corn gets first drink July 15. Banker smiles. Corn in tough shape. System makes first circle. Wife is happy. Daughter still home.

**August 1**  
 Nozzles on system spitting air. Call dealer Bill. No answer. Call County Agent. He checks well. Well is dry. Corn burning up. Daughter runs off with hired man. Dealer and Banker go to Lake Tahoe. Sell steers. Hit down market.

Included in the recipes Louise is sharing are two that she used frequently while her husband was in service. The chocolate cake she often served his service buddies, remains a family favorite.

The spaghetti dish was often pressed into use for dinner guests. It's economy made it well suited for "service man's pay."

**FRENCH DRESSING**  
1 carton sour cream  
1/2 c French dressing  
garlic salt

1/2 c mayonnaise  
small amount vinegar  
1 t sugar  
salt & pepper to taste  
paprika for color

Mix, chill and serve over favorite salad.

### BING CHERRY SALAD

2 eggs, beaten  
2 T sugar  
1/3 c lemon juice  
dash salt  
2 c small marshmallows  
1 20 oz can pineapple, drained  
1 20 oz can bing cherries, drained  
1 c nuts  
1 c whipped cream

Cook eggs, sugar, lemon juice and salt until thickened. Fold in marshmallows while hot. Stir to melt. Fold in remaining ingredients. Refrigerate.

### SPAGHETTI SAUCE

Cook hamburger with onions. Mix sauce:  
3/4 c catsup  
3/4 c water  
2 T vinegar  
2 T Worcestershire sauce  
1 T salt  
1 t paprika  
1/2 t black pepper  
1 or 2 cans tomato sauce  
2 t sugar

Pour sauce over cooked hamburger meat and simmer for about one hour. If desired, add 1/4 cup barbecue sauce for pork, etc.

### WATERGATE SALAD

1 9 oz carton Cool Whip  
1 box instant Pistachio pudding  
1 lb can crushed pineapple & juice  
1 c miniature marshmallows  
1/2 c pecans, cut up

Fold dry pudding mix into Cool Whip, add rest of

ingredients and refrigerate for 2 or 3 hours.

### CHOCOLATE CAKE

Preheat oven to 375°. Have egg whites at room temperature. Sift an ample amount of flour onto a square of paper.

Measure and sift together 3 times.

3/4 c sifted cake flour  
7/8 c (3/4 c plus 2 T) sugar  
1/4 c cocoa

Measure into large mixing bowl.

1 1/2 c egg whites (about 12 whites)  
1 1/2 t cream of tartar  
1/4 t salt  
1 1/2 t vanilla

Use medium speed. Gradually add, 2 tbsp. at a time 3/4 cup sugar. Beat after each addition. After last addition of sugar, turn to highest speed. Continue beating until meringue is firm and holds stiff straight peaks. Scrape sides of bowl constantly with rubber scraper.

Place flour-sugar-cocoa mixture in sifter and sift about 3 tbsp. over the entire surface of

meringue. Fold gently with wire whip or rubber scraper until mixture disappears using about 8 to 10 complete folding strokes and turning the bowl a quarter of a turn with each stroke.

Repeat this folding process until all of the flour and sugar and cocoa is folded in. Then scrape down the sides of the bowl with rubber scraper and fold 8 to 10 more strokes or until mixture is completely blended. This mixture will be very thick.

Carefully, with a rubber scraper, push the batter into ungreased tube pan, 10 x 4 in. Lift the last portion lightly from the bowl into the pan, being careful not to stir it.

Carefully cut through the batter going around the tube 5 or 6 times with knife or steel spatula to break large air bubbles in mixture to even up batter so it is level and touches the sides of the pan. Bake 30 to 35 min. in 375° oven until top springs back when lightly touched. Deep cracks in the top are typical of this cake.

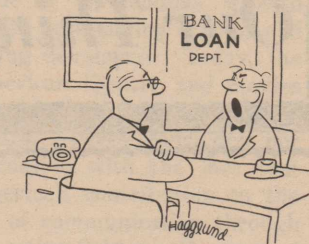
Immediately turn pan upside

down, placing tube part over neck of funnel or bottle. Let cake hang in pan until cold.

To remove cake, loosen from sides and tube with spatula close against pan. Turn pan over and hit edge sharply on table to loosen. Split cake crosswise in 3 even layers with a saw-toothed knife. Spread Chocolate Fluff between the layers and then over top and sides. Keep in refrigerator until serving time.

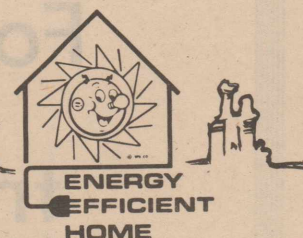
### CHOCOLATE FLUFF

Mix together in chilled bowl: 3 cups heavy cream, 1 cup sifted confectioners' sugar, 3/4 cup cocoa, dash of salt. Beat mixture until stiff enough to hold a point.
