Clothing Collection Drive Is To Be Held Here In April



Sgt. John M. Blair Gets Purple Heart

WITH THE 96 DIVISION IN THE PHILIPPINES — Sgt. John M. Blair whose wife, Jeynelle Fay Blair and baby daughter, live on Route A, Lamesa, was awarded the Purple Heart during ceremonies held recently in the Philippines.

Sgt. Blair was wounded by a piece of shrapnel as a result of a Japanese bombing raid.

He was formerly employed at Sanders Grocery and the Lamesa Meat Company prior to his induction into the Army in the fall of 1942. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Blair of 907 South Fifth also have another son serving in France with the Infantry.

Sgt. Blair is a member of a combat engineer unit of the 96th Division.

Pfc. Travis Fuller Is Serving In Belgium

Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Fuller who reside in this city have had word from their son, Pfc. Travis Fuller, that he has landed in Belgium, where he is serving with the Infantry.

In service for the past 3 years, this makes Pfc. Fuller's second time to be assigned overseas duty. He served in the Pacific War Theatre for a period of 11 months.

Pfc. Fuller was employed locally prior to his entry into the service.

A first Machine Gunner in the 7th Division of the Infantry, he has been in service since February 4, 1942. Overseas for the past 2 years, he has been stationed on the Aleutians, Marshalls, and Gilberts. Prior to entering the Infantry, he farmed with his father.

Representatives from churches and various organizations met in the county judge's office Thursday afternoon, March 8, to formulate plans for the National United Clothing drive, which is to be held throughout the nation beginning April 1, and extending throughout the month.

This group will meet in the near future and make further plans concerning the best methods of collecting clothing for such a campaign.

Representatives present at the meeting discussed a possible goal of 25,000 pounds of clothing for the April drive. The quota for the United States has been placed at 150,000,000 pounds.

It was thought that the schools would be a good medium for successfully carrying out the drive in this area.

During the campaign, officials hope to gather a large quantity of wearable and clean clothing. They will ask for good, used womens, mens, and childrens clothes, and ask that you start assorting your contributions now, in order that everything will be in readiness when the drive officially opens in April.

These articles will be shipped to areas needing the garments, such as England, where many homes and personal articles of the British have been destroyed by bombings.

Make an inspection at your home, and see how much you can gather together for the drive. It will begin April 1.

Cameras Go Bug House In The South Pacific

NEW YORK — Even the bugs in the South Pacific theater chew up the military cameras.

The story of the bugs and how they were overcome is told by technicians of the Fairchild Camera and Instrument Corp., New York, which makes the big 60-pound cameras, the eyes of the Air Forces.

Mites, which are tiny, spiderlike bugs, crawl between lenses and etch the glass by secretions. To overcome this special preparations for wiping lenses were provided.

Fungi ate the cork lining used in some parts of the cameras. These germ-size creatures were after the animal glue which sealed the cork. That was solved by substituting fiber glass for cork.

The cameras are packed in a steel box to keep them dry. The boxes were moisture-proofed with felt inner linings before, but fungi ate the felt to get at the glue. That problem was met by omitting the felt lining, and keeping aerial camera dry in electrically heated boxes.

Care Should Be Given To Flocks During This Time

About this time last year, many of the local highways were lined with dead chickens. There was a disease among chickens which killed thousands of laying hens in the county.

Mrs. Myrtle Negy and T. A. Barfield, county agents, state that they believe that there are some indications that there are a large number of hens dying in the county again. Dead hens are beginning to appear on the highways.

They state, "Perhaps, if these instructions were followed there would be less spreading of disease among hens: Clean all chicken yards and premises thoroughly. Remove sick hens from flock. Bury or burn all dead chickens, because dead chickens on the highways constitute real danger. Dogs, crows, and other birds and animals are apt to spread the germs.

"Some citizens have had favorable results with the use of blue stone and vinegar in stopping infections or disease among flocks. A stock mixture of 2 ounces of blue stone to one pint of vinegar is good. Use 1 tablespoon of this solution to a gallon of drinking water to stop infections and disease. After using this formula for 4 or 5 days, a period of 4 or 5 days should pass before it is again used.

"This formula should be given to hens in non-metal containers which should be cleaned every day.

"Remember clean premises, remove sick hens, and bury or burn the dead ones, and sterilize all drinking and feeding utensils.

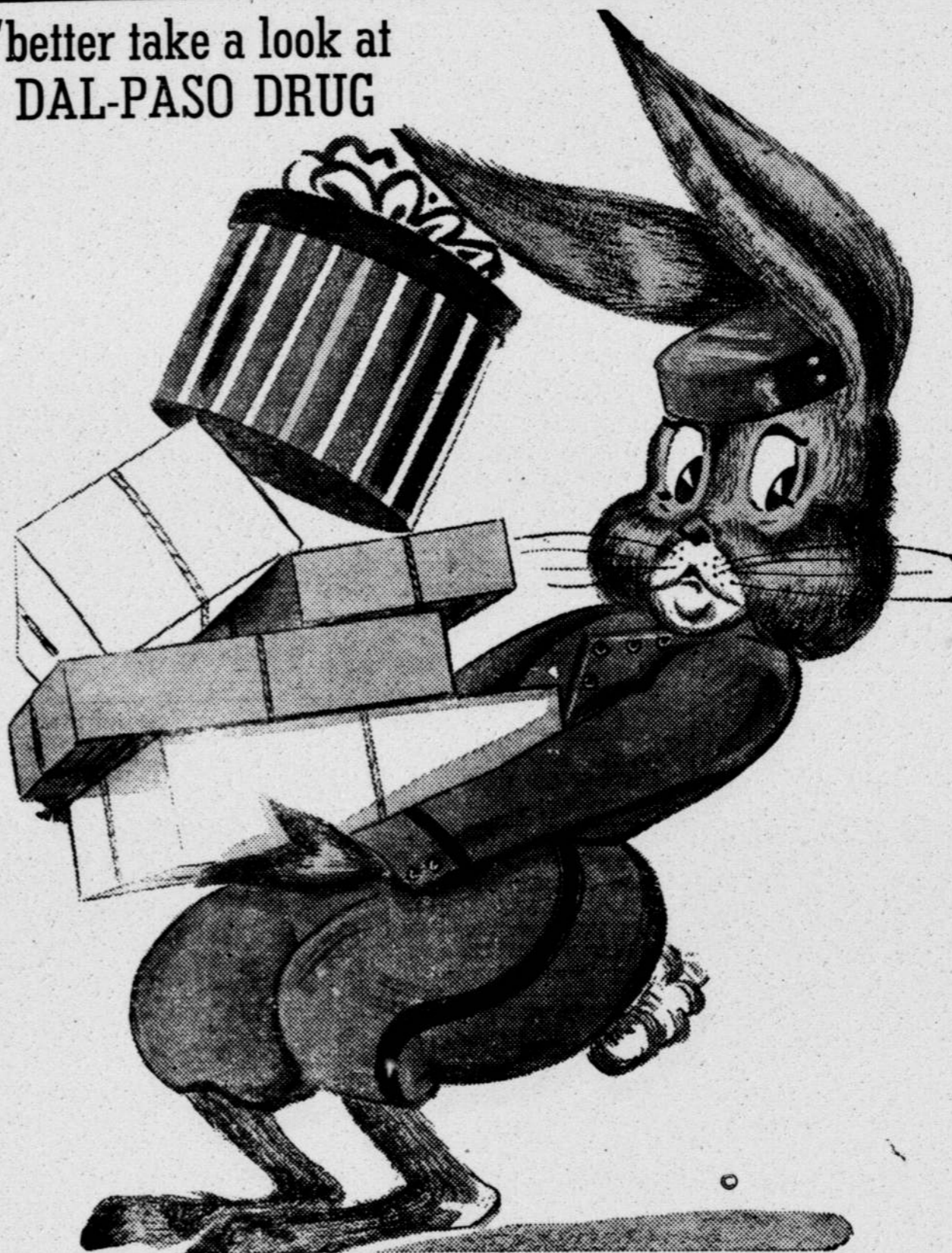

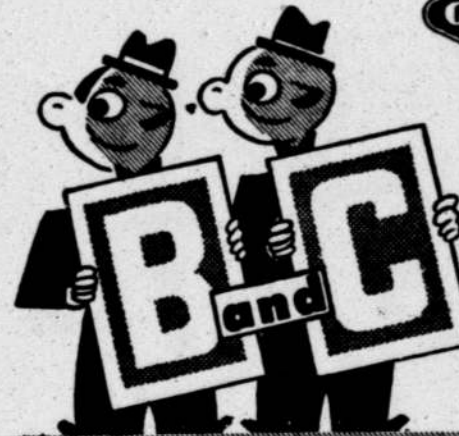

Numbers became legends as these men assaulted and took hills 1000 and 1500, during February. Previously in a sustained drive against heavy resistance they captured Suicide ridge.

From these decisive peaks Japs directed fire on advancing Yanks. From these cavernous defenses the enemy laid heavy mortar, machinegun and light artillery fire on our men, supply lines and communications.

The troops had to begin the sheer ascent up the rocky face of 1500, subjected to almost constant mortar, machinegun and sniper fire.

Their efforts were not in vain, however, as they took the hills.

Major Heston McDonnell of 112 South Second Street in this city has been assigned to duty at the Air Transport Command's Fairfield-Suisun Army Air Base, it has been announced.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. T. McDonnell of this city and entered the Army on March 21, 1942. Prior to his entrance into the Army, he was an accountant in California.

While at the California base, Major McDonnell's duties will aid in the successful execution of the mission of the ATC installation to dispatch high priority cargo, per-

sonnel, and air mail across the longest over-water airway in the world to the strategically important Pacific Theatre of Operations. A fleet of giant ATC C-54 Skymaster transport planes fly sick and wounded military personnel from combat zones to the Fairfield Base on regular air evacuation flights and also returns combat-wise veterans to the U. S. under the Army's overseas rotation plan.

There's GOLD In Lots Of Places

If the world were wiped out tomorrow, and all that remained was a list of geographical names, there wouldn't be any doubt that this universe rotated around money.

Man's search for gold is recorded in the names he gave to new places: Magellan christened Mindoro in the Philippines — the name is a contraction of the Spanish Mina de Oro, or Mine of Gold. The Spaniard Saavedra tagged another island, now called New Guinea, Isla de Oro, or Island of Gold in 1528—even though gold in this region was a myth until this century.

In 1568 Mendana discovered and named the Solomons — the chain of islands believed to be a source of gold for Solomon's temple in Jerusalem. The name of Britain's Gold Coast Colony was borne out by gold found later in quartz veins and rock beds. Spain's Rio de Oro colony in Africa has neither rivers nor gold.

The name El Dorado, of the gilded one, became synonymous with any place where easy wealth was supposed to be waiting for the explorer. It was applied early in the 16th century to the chief of a South American Indian tribe, who supposedly officiated at a yearly festival covered completely with gold dust. Several Spanish explorers tried to find the place, and so did Sir Walter Raleigh.

Slavic Europe has a sprinkling of gold-plated towns — beginning with the prefixes Zlato and Zoloto. There's Goldfield in Nevada, a

Golden Gate in San Francisco — and even a Goldberg in Germany's province of Silesia.

Capt. Harrington Leads Flight In Pacific Mission

FIFTH AIR FORCE, PHILIPPINE ISLANDS — Captain B. C. Harrington, son of Dr. and Mrs. J. M. Harrington and husband of Myrtle B. Harrington, Lamesa, led his flight of planes in the paratroop assault against Corregidor Island during the decisive battle for Manila Bay.

Flying through enemy anti-aircraft and small arms fire, his Fifth Air Force troop carrier dropped paratroopers, artillery pieces and

flame throwers on the island fortress as U. S. bombers, fighters and warships laid down a barrage of protecting fire.

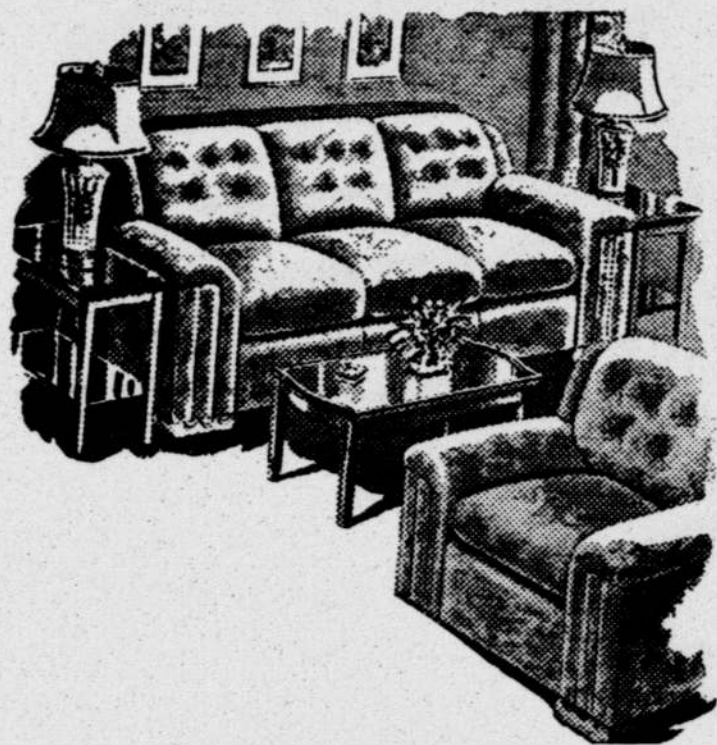
The dropping area, located between steep cliffs and the Jap-held barracks on the legendary rock, was one of the smallest targets ever attempted. Several dropping passes were required for each plane stretching in single file for five miles before the precedent-breaking operation was completed.

The airborne attack was launched from C-47's of the veteran "Jungle Skippers" of the 317th Troop Carrier Group commanded by Brig Gen. Paul H. Prentiss, the outfit which

has led every paratroop mission in the Southwest Pacific. Captain Harrington, a flight leader, also flew on the drops at Noemfoor Island off the coast of New Guinea and at Tagaytay Ridge south of Manila during the drive to liberate the capital city.

Entering the army in January 1942, he received his pilot's wings at Lubbock flying school, departing for overseas duty in December 1943. In recognition of his achievements in accumulating a total of more than 1300 flying hours, he has been awarded the Air Medal with one Oak-Leaf cluster.

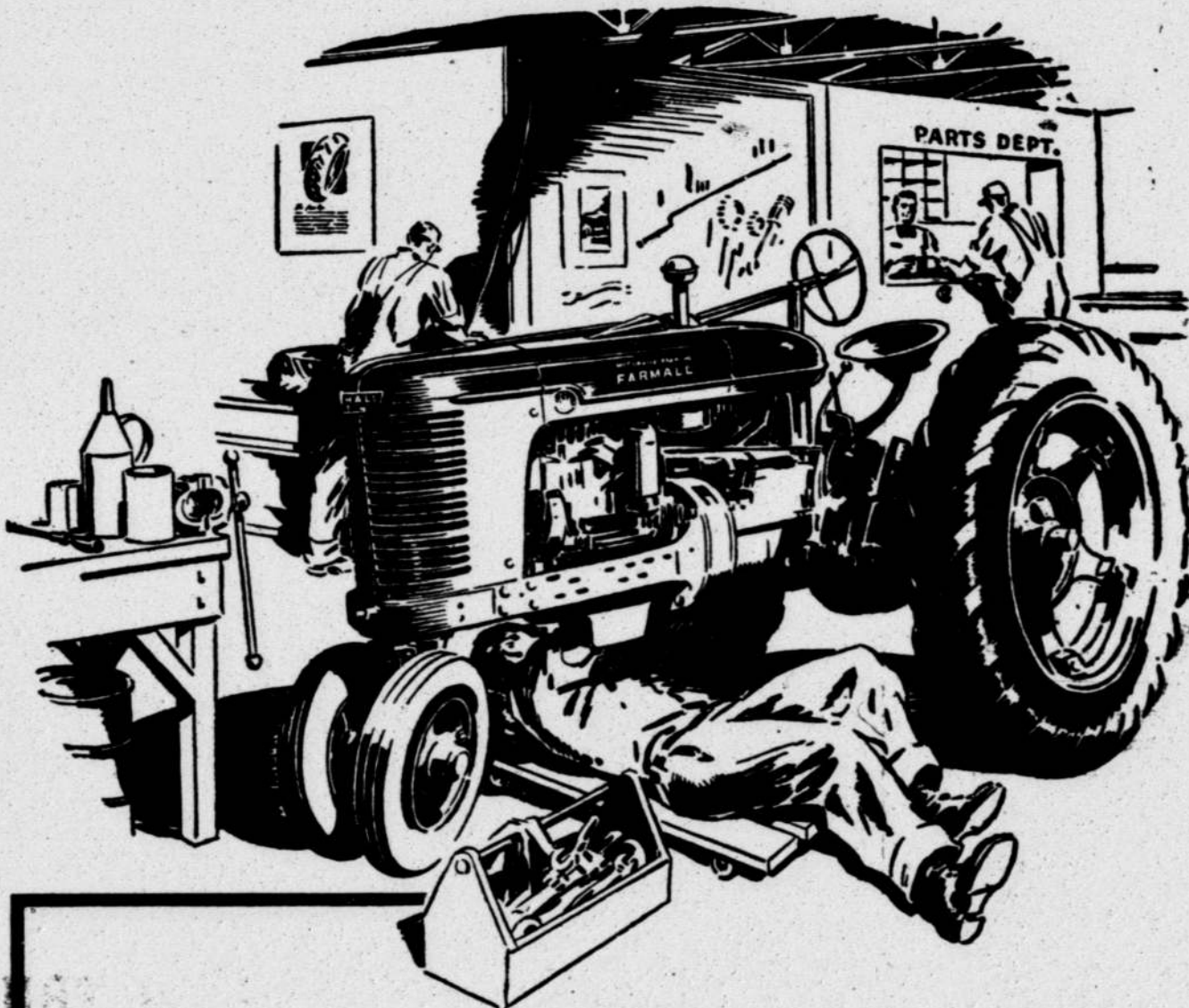

PAN-AMERICAN HIGHWAY NEEDS BRIDGES

Several hundred new and replacement bridges must still be built along the 3,356-mile-long Inter-American Highway between the Texas border and the Panama Canal, according to the U. S. Public Roads Administration.

About three-fourths of the highway, which runs through Mexico, Honduras, Nicaragua, Costa Rica and Panama, is now open. It is expected to be finished in 1947.

29, 1945, the group in which their store belongs, District OPA Director Howard R. Gholson announced today.

The annual gross sales of retail food establishments determine in which of four groups the store is classed, and this in turn determines the mark-ups the store is permitted to use, Gholson explained. To the consumer this means the retail price they will pay.

It is important, therefore, that the stores be classified on the basis of their gross sales during their most recent calendar year.

The four store groups are:
Group 1, independent stores with annual gross receipts of less than \$50,000.

Group 2, independent stores with annual gross receipts of \$50,000 and less than \$250,000.

Group 3, chain stores with annual gross receipts of less than \$250,000.

Group 4, any store with annual gross receipts of \$250,000 or more.

Meat Rations To Be Tightened In Area This Month

The tightening of meat ration values which became effective Sunday, March 4, was necessary to bring them into line with restricted supplies of meats for civilians use resulting from heavy military requirements and the fact that hog marketings are running below previous estimates, according to Ely Fonville, District Rationing Executive for the Office of Price Administration.

The meat allocations to civilians in March, Fonville said, will be five or six per cent below February on an average weekly basis, and 13 to 15 per cent under January. "It is likely that for the first six months of 1945 the supply of meat for civilians may be further below that of a year ago than the 15 per cent we originally anticipated."

Fonville also pointed out that the rationing of red point foods for March will be stiffest since rationing began.

CITIZENS ASKED TO SAVE ALL PAPER POSSIBLE BY MARCH 24

With a car of waste paper to be loaded on March 23 and 24 in this county, local citizens need to begin saving all paper now for the campaign, in order that a complete car can be loaded and shipped from this area.

Dawson County residents are to salvage all the paper they can by the time the drive ends, and take their collections to the railroad track in this city on March 23 and 24 where it will be loaded and shipped to paper-mills.

The growing demand for paper has come at a time when the supply of wood pulp, basic raw material of paper is diminishing rapidly. Thus, the paper shortage stems directly from a raw material shortage. Crux of the problem of wood pulp shortage of woods labor—the men who fell the trees, cut them to cordwood length and move them to paper mills for conversion into wood pulp. Contributing to this shortage are loss of men to the Army and to war plants at higher wages. Another factor in the scarcity of wood pulp has been the loss of tens of thousands of tons formerly imported from Canada and from overseas.

Canadian wood pulp production has fallen off because of manpower shortages and because of diversion of electric power from pulp mills to war and munitions plants.

American inventive genius has found many substitutes for scarce raw materials. Chief substitute for scarce pulp wood is waste paper. Not only can waste paper stretch diminishing supplies of wood pulp—it can be used directly in the manufacture of many important war products, thereby saving proportionate amounts of wood pulp for other uses.

Unable to obtain full requirements of wood, paper mills all over the country must rely to an increasing extent on waste paper as raw material in the manufacture of war supplies of paper products. This year, more than 8,000,000 tons of waste paper will be required to maintain adequate mill inventories. Currently, supplies of waste paper are not adequate to fill mill requirements. Many mills are operating against waste paper inventories of days, even hours.

Other mills, even less fortunate, must operate on curtailed part-time schedules of 3 and 4 days weekly. Collection of waste paper must be upped, if vital war production is to be maintained. You can do your part in the drive, by saving all you can, and turning in a nice supply of waste paper March 23 and 24.

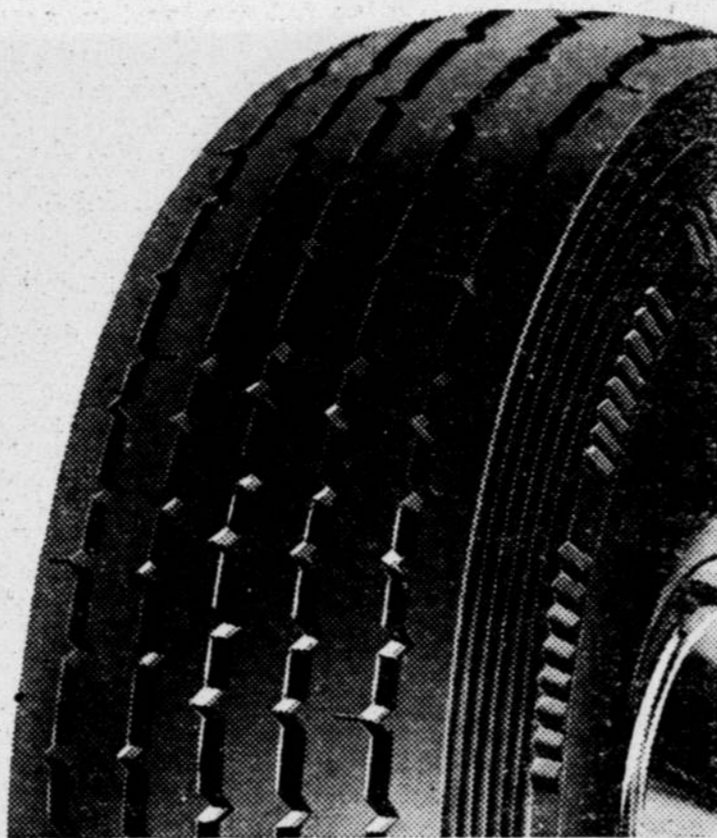
