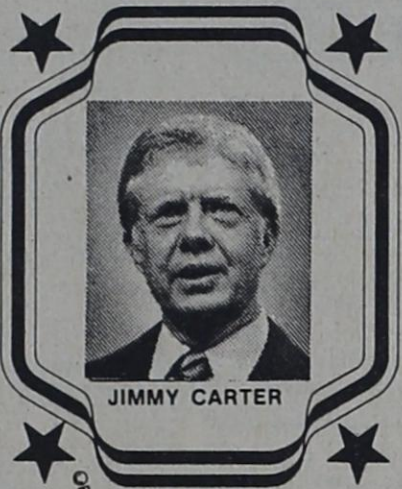

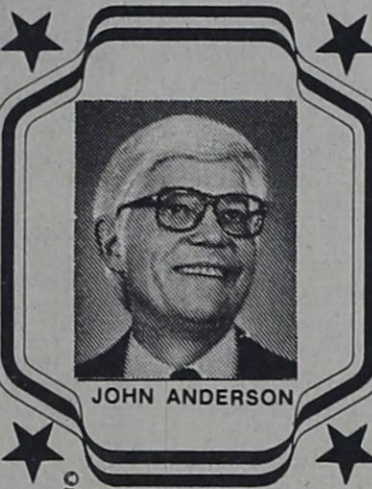

Early Peanut Grades Reported Good Vote

With snow flurries in the forecast for Tuesday evening, the peanut prospect is looking even bleaker. Some frost damage was all ready reported early Saturday morning when temperatures dipped into the low 30's. Most peanuts were only frost bit on the top of the plants and can possibly go on and mature in the next few weeks. This will only affect the hay to a minimal amount.

A talk with Franklin Cox, manager of the Pioneer Co-Op found early grades really good. All that has been brought in Mr. Cox

stated has been irrigated peanuts. He said grades on Spanish were ranging from 72-75 and on Runners 74-79. Yields on these early irrigated fields are looking strong as some farmers are making over 100 bushels to the acre.

According to Jerry Winfrey, owner of Winfrey Feed and Peanut, he is receiving both dry land and irrigated peanuts. Grades on the dryland Spanish fall in the 60's. Irrigated runner being brought in range from 70-78.

One bright spot this year is the Bonus currently being offered by Birdsong Peanut Com-

pany of \$100.00 per ton in addition to the regular price support set at \$455.00 per ton. This is only on Segregation I peanuts. The Bonus began several weeks ago at \$30 per ton and has gradually increased from \$30 to \$35 to \$75 and now stands at \$100.00. This is due to the short supply of peanuts. Competitive buyers are willing to give more money to insure their own contracts, which were negotiated earlier.

Segregation II and III price supports are set this year at \$250.00 per ton.

Voters in Rising Star will go to the polls on Tuesday, November 4th to make their choice for a Presidential candidate and will also vote on 9 Constitutional Amendments.

Amendments You'll Vote On Nov. 4

AMENDMENTS

In 1979 the Texas Legislature proposed 12 constitutional amendments for voters to adopt or reject. Of the three considered in the 1979 election, voters adopted two. The other nine will be on the ballot in the general election November 4, 1980.

To date, Texas voters have spoken on 378 proposed amendments. They have adopted 235.

To promote better understanding of the nine proposed amendments on this year's ballot, the Texas Legislative Council has published a booklet explaining the proposals. Most of the following explanations come from this booklet.

AMENDMENT 1

Senate Joint Resolution 35, proposing a constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to authorize banks to use unattended machine within the county or city of their

domicile or a shared basis to serve public convenience.

The proposed amendment authorizes the legislature to permit state and national banks to establish and operate electronic teller machines located away from the bank's buildings. A bank would assign to each participating customer a unique form of identification, such as a card or identification number, so that the customer could use the machine to communicate with the bank in confidence.

Without the assistance of a bank employee, the customer could withdraw or deposit money, transfer money between accounts, or perform any other banking function.

The use of a machine permits a bank to provide better services for its customers at convenient locations away from the bank building

and at times other than normal banking hours.

The amendment provides that a bank must be allowed to share with other banks in the use of a machine that is located in its area if the machine is not located at another bank's office, and that bank may share in the use of a machine with savings and loan associations or credit unions located in the same area.

AMENDMENT 2

House Joint Resolution 97, proposing a constitutional amendment to grant the state the right of appeal in criminal cases from certain rulings of the trial court.

The proposed amendment of Article V, Section 26, of the Texas Constitution grants the state and the defendant in a criminal case the right to appeal before the conclusion of the trial from a pretrial ruling of the trial court on certain motions or on the constitutionality of a

statute.

The constitution currently denies the state any right of appeal in criminal cases. The main purpose of the amendment is to grant the state a limited right of appeal. The state's appeal will always precede the conclusion of the trial. The defendant's right of appeal is also affected by permitting appeal of those same matters preceding the conclusion to the trial, whereas under existing law the defendant must wait until the conclusion of the trial to appeal.

AMENDMENT 3

House Joint Resolution 98, proposing a constitutional amendment to require a single appraisal and a single board of equalization within each county for ad valorem tax purposes.

This proposed amendment of Article VIII, Section 18, of the constitution that requires

equalization of property values for tax purposes, would eliminate the requirement that the county commissioners court sit as a board of equalization.

It would also require the legislature to enact a law providing a single entity in each county to appraise property for the taxing purposes of the county and of all cities, school district, and special districts within the county. That entity could appraise property outside the county when a city, school district, or special district has territory located outside the county when two or more counties choose to consolidate appraisal services and use only one appraisal office.

The amendment would also require a single board of equalization for each county and disqualify elected officials from serving on the board of equalization.

Counties are not presently required to participate in the single appraisal method, but 215 of the 254 counties in the state are voluntarily participating.

AMENDMENT 4
State Joint Resolution 18, proposing a constitutional amendment to authorize bingo games for charitable purposes on a local option election basis.

The proposed amendment of Article III, Section 47, of the Texas Constitution would authorize the legislature to pass a law permitting and regulating bingo games conducted by a church, synagogue,

religious society, volunteer fire department, nonprofit veterans organization, fraternal organization, or nonprofit organization supporting medical research or treatment programs.

The law must permit the voters of a county, justice precinct, or incorporated city or town to determine whether the bingo games may be held in the county, justice precinct or city or town.

The law enacted by the legislature also must require that: 1. The proceeds from the Bingo games are spent in this state for a charitable purpose of the organization conducting the games. 2. The games are limited to one location on property owned or leased by the organization. 3. The games are conducted, promoted and administered by members of the organization. 4. The organization must report quarterly to the comptroller of public accounts about the proceeds collected from the games and about the purposes for which the proceeds are spent.

AMENDMENT 5
Housing Joint Resolution 86, proposing a constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to grant budget execution powers to the governor, subject to approval by a budget execution committee.

The proposed amendment would empower the legislature to authorize or direct the governor to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of appropriated state funds (excluding constitutionally dedicated

funds). This power, commonly called "budget execution authority," would exist only to the extent granted by law and would be subject to procedures, conditions, and limitations provided by law.

Further, any action of the governor would be subject to approval of a budget execution committee composed of the governor, the lieutenant governor, the speaker of the house, and the chairman and vice-chairman of the house appropriations committee and of the senate finance committee.

AMENDMENT 6
Senate Joint Resolution 8, proposing a constitutional amendment to authorize the governor to remove appointed officers with the advise and consent of the senate; and allowing the governor to call a special session of the senate for this purpose.

This proposed constitutional amendment would add Section 9 to Article XV of the Texas Constitution. The new section would authorize the governor who appoints an officer to remove that person from office with the approval of two-thirds of the senators present. It would also authorize the governor to call a special session of the senate to act on a proposed removal. The removal session could not last more than two days.

AMENDMENT 7
House Joint Resolution 121, proposing a constitutional amendment relating to the authority of a county to perform private road work.

The proposed amendment would authorize any county with a population of

5,000 or less to build and maintain private roads if the county "imposes a reasonable charge for the work." Revenue collected by the county could be used only for construction and maintenance of public roads. The legislature would be authorized to limit the authority conferred by the amendment.

AMENDMENT 8
Senate Joint Resolution 36, proposing a constitutional amendment to change the names of the courts of civil appeals and the names and qualifications of the justices of the supreme court and to prescribe the jurisdiction and authority of the appellate courts.

The proposed amendments of Article V, Sections 1 and 2 of the Texas Constitution would change the name of the courts of civil appeals by deleting the word "civil" and the name of associate justices of the supreme court by deleting the word "associates".

The proposed amendment of Section 2 also would change the qualifications of the justices of the supreme court by requiring them to retain a license to practice law in this state while serving in the office and would clarify the authority of the governor to fill a vacancy in the office of the chief justice.

The proposed amendment of Section 3 would delete the provisions that give the supreme court appellate jurisdiction of questions of law arising in the courts of civil appeals and substitute appellate jurisdiction in all cases except in criminal law matters and as otherwise pro-

vided in the constitution and by law.

The proposed amendment of Section 6 would provide for supreme judicial districts in each of which there would be a court of appeals which appellate jurisdiction of all cases, civil and criminal, for which the district and county courts have original or appellate jurisdiction. Section 6 would also include transitional provisions relating to the justices of the present courts of civil appeals and to the supreme judicial districts.

The proposed amendment of Section 16 would conform the provisions that require the appeal of certain civil cases to the court of civil appeals and certain criminal cases to the court of criminal appeals.

S.J.R. No. 36 also proposes the repeal of archaic provisions in several of the amended sections of Article V and specifies that the amendments would become effective

September 1, 1981. **AMENDMENT 9**
House Joint Resolution 54, proposing a constitutional amendment relating to the conversion of marital community property into separate property.

The proposed amendment of Article XVI, Section 15, of the Texas Constitution would allow spouses to agree in writing that the income or property arising from one spouse's separate property will be the separate property of the spouse. An agreement could encompass both property existing at the time the agreement is made and property to be acquired in the future.

The proposed amendment also would allow property to be acquired in the future.

The proposed amendment also would allow property to be acquired in the future to be included in a written partition of marital property into separate interests, permit persons to partition property before being married, and create a presumption in the constitution that the scope of a gift of property from one spouse to another includes all income or property that might arise from the property that is the subject of the gift.

County Motor Vehicle Sales

Austin, Texas—State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday said the automobile industry's woes brought

about by sagging sales in the past year are reflected in the state's income from the motor vehicle sales tax.

Bullock said for the 12 month period that ended September 1, 1980, the four percent motor vehicle tax levied on the sales of cars, trucks, motorcycles and mobile homes amounted to \$439.4 million.

He said this was \$3.7 million less than was collected in the previous period.

Harris County was the number one contributor of motor vehicle sales tax during

fiscal year 1980, collecting more than \$93.6 million, a slight increase from the \$93.1 million collected in fiscal year 1979.

The motor vehicle sales and use tax gross collections from September 1, 1979 through August 31, 1980 for Brown County was \$932,028.71 and for Eastland County were \$482,493.81.

Motor vehicle sales taxes are collected by county tax assessor-collectors and the counties retain five percent of the amount and send the rest to the state.

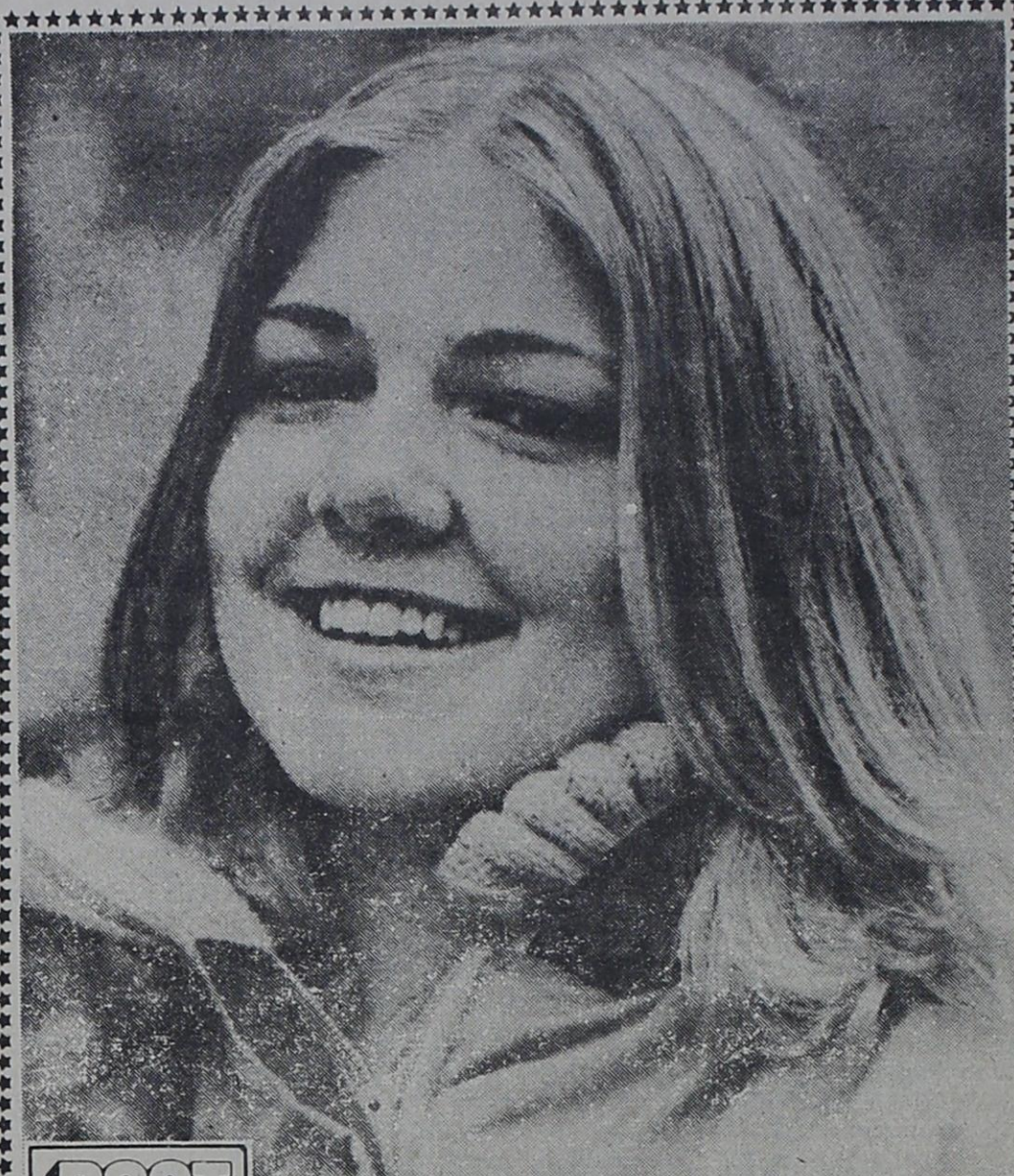

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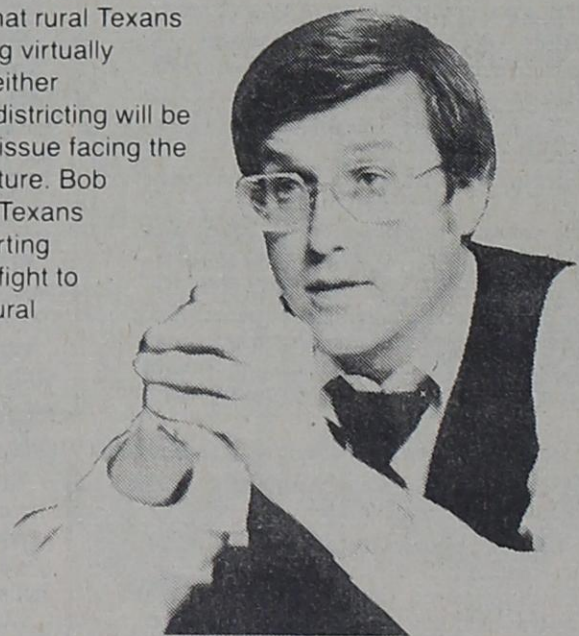

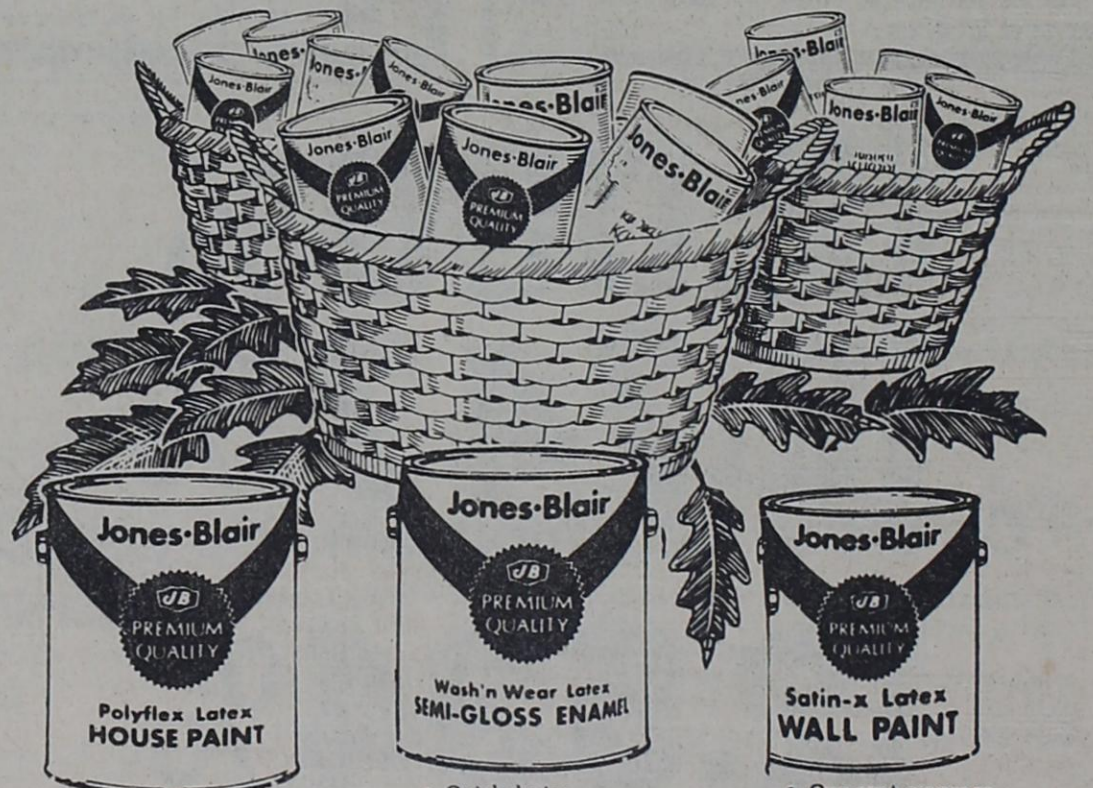

"Unless a person's business is urgent, it is best to call after the middle of the month. Inquiries can be handled more efficiently in that period," Hammons said. Examples of the things that can be handled by telephone include:

- Applying for social security benefits. A claim can be started over the phone and completed by mail.
- Applying for Medicare.
- Changing name or address in social security records.
- Reporting a change in marital status.
- Reporting stopping or starting work or to report any event that may affect checks.
- Reporting a lost or stolen check or delayed payment.
- Getting help in filling out a Medicare form.
- Arranging for direct check deposit.
- Getting an estimate of benefit amount.
- Requesting a statement of earnings record.
- Getting help in requesting that claims decision be reviewed.
- To ask any question about social security or to request free publications.

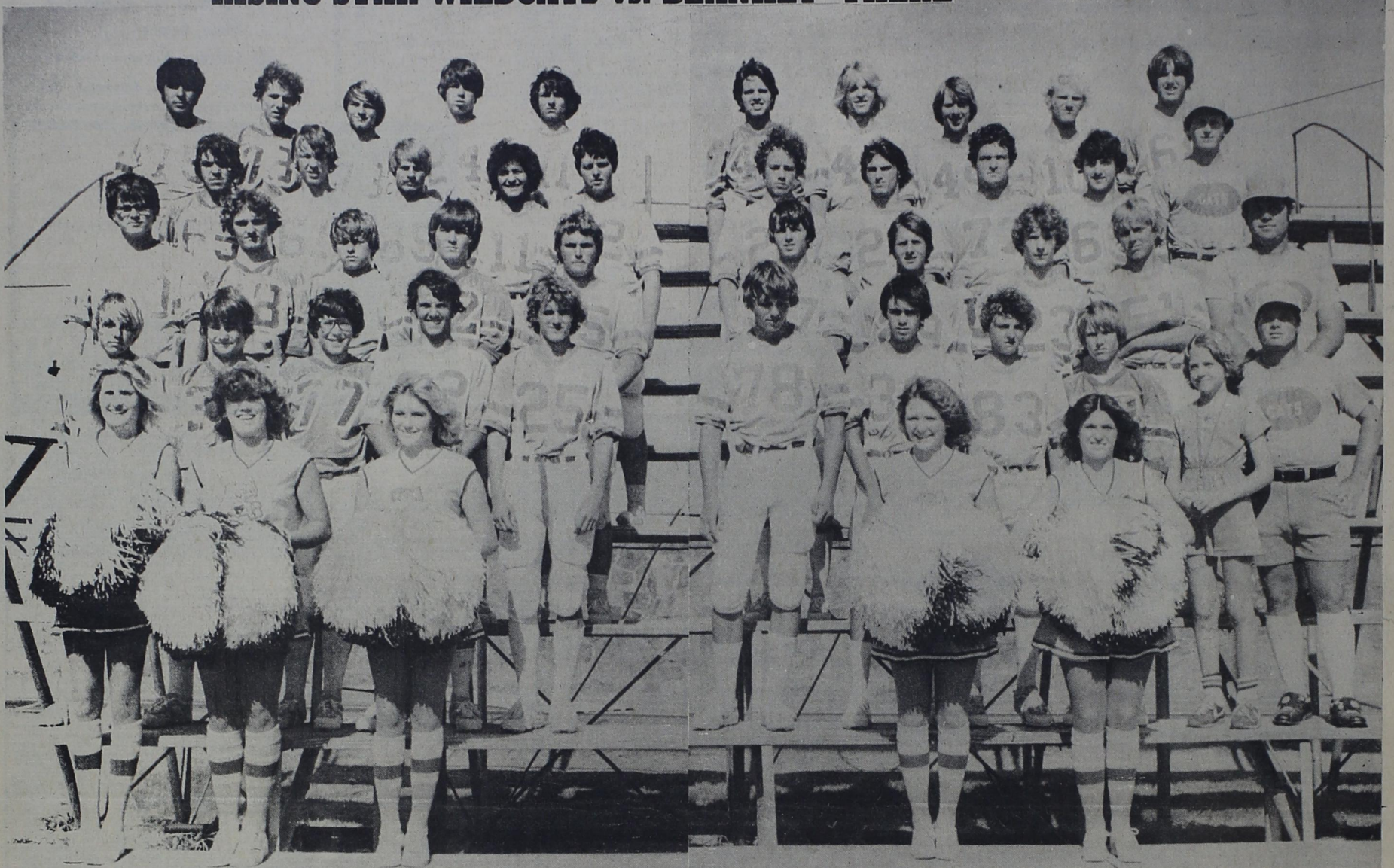
