Lindy And Anne Morrow Marry Unexpectedly 9,000 Rotarians Swarm Dallas In 20th Annual Meet

Representatives From All Parts Of World Attend

De-centralized Control Of Legislation Is Discussed By Voting Delegates In First Session Monday

Moody Is Speaker

Airplanes, Trains And Cars Bring Visitors To Convention; Thirteen Resolutions Are Presented

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, May 27.—Discussions of de-centralized control legislation occupied voting delegates today as the sun and din of a busy city was increased with the arrival of more than 9,000 delegates to the twentieth annual convention of Rotary International.

Airplanes, 16 special trains and hundreds of automobiles unloaded their burdens today. Some delegates went immediately to Fair Park where, in the afternoon, the first session of voting delegates only was held. Others milled about, greeting friends and seeing the sights until the formal opening of the convention tonight at which Governor Moody was the main speaker.

Thirteen resolutions were presented at the legislative meet. One, offered by the British delegation, urged abandonment of the slogan "profits must who serves best." Another said that the 1931 or 1932 convention shall be held outside of North America. That resolution was expedited, when presented at the general convention, to draw the opposition of Memphis, Tenn., which is making an active fight for the 1931 meet. San Sebastian, Spain, and Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, also are under consideration.

Will another proposed change build give the aims and object committee of Rotary International direct responsibility for Rotary education, continuing that activity as one of its duties of the local clubs. The delegation from Italy proposed a resolution making clear the position of a Rotarian to his country.

Record-Breaking Flies Are Given Rousing Ovation

Robbins And Kelly Forced To Land Sunday Following 172 Hours, 32 Minutes In Air

FORT WORTH, May 27.—A world's record for endurance flying safely tucked away, R. L. Robbins and James Kelly today awoke from a long sleep to be greeted by the applause of thousands throughout the world.

They added almost a full day to the sustained flight record when they landed their single-motored plane yesterday afternoon after 172 hours, 32 minutes and 1 second aloft, and today the barograph from that plane was on its way to Washington, where it will be examined, photographed and recorded before the fliers gain official recognition.

Leaders Seeking To Reach Early Agreement

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, May 27.—Leaders in congress gave serious consideration today to overcome the deadlock in the farm relief conference committee over the export debenture plan as a part of agriculture legislation.

There was no immediate reaction from their discussion to indicate that an early agreement would be reached but most of the conferees expressed the opinion that the difficulty would not prove insurmountable.

Stick to Opinion
Senate members of the conference committee said they would stick squarely by their opinion that the house should agree to give a general discussion to the two farm bills passed separately by the house and senate and report a disagreement on the debenture section.

Some Are Hopeful
Some are hopeful, however, that if the senate is asked to vote on the debenture plan again, those who favor it may be shown what the party stalwarts include the utility of attempting to include debentures in the farm bill.

75 In Attendance

Two-Day Encampment Is To Close This Afternoon As Training Sessions Come To End; Eaton In Charge

FOLLOWING an afternoon of group instruction in judging of livestock, poultry, dairy cattle and grain, 75 or more 4-H farm club boys of the South Plains flocked for more than an hour upon the green of Texas Technological college campus, then were guests of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce at a theater party at the Lindsey theater.

At 7 o'clock Monday afternoon the boys were guests of the chamber of commerce at the college cafeteria, for supper. After the theater party they repaired again to the college campus, where beds were spread here and there about the livestock judging pavilion, chaperoned by D. F. Eaton, Lubbock county agricultural agent; R. B. Davis, Terry county agent, and several other county agents and club leaders.

Because of rains of the past three weeks delaying planting time throughout the South Plains, only about half as many boys were present as would otherwise have been here. The encampment will break late this afternoon, following morning and afternoon group training sessions similar to those of Monday.

Supreme Court Hands Down Unanimous Decision In Favor Of Hoover's Right In Closing Sessions

WASHINGTON, May 27.—The validity of presidential pocket vetoes was upheld in an unanimous decision handed down today by the supreme court, regardless of whether the legislature in question was sent to the White House in the closing days of a session which was the final session of a congress.

ENGLEWOOD, N. J., May 27.—The long heralded wedding of Miss Anne Spencer Morrow and Col. Charles A. Lindbergh materialized unexpectedly today in a simple ceremony at the home of the bride's parents, Ambassador and Mrs. Dwight W. Morrow.

The ceremony was performed in the drawing room of the Morrow home in the presence of only seven guests, all members of the two families.

The bride, dressed in simple white chiffon, carried a bouquet of blue larkspur picked by the bridegroom in the drawing room of the Morrow home in the presence of only seven guests, all members of the two families.

After the ceremony the Colonel and his bride drove away in an automobile, and newspapermen standing guard at the gates for so long thought it was just another afternoon's drive. They were unaware of the wedding until the Ambassador announced it through his secretary more than two hours later.

No details of the couple's honeymoon plans were revealed, but reports from Roosevelt Field, N. Y., said Lindbergh had ordered his plane serviced for a take-off tomorrow morning.

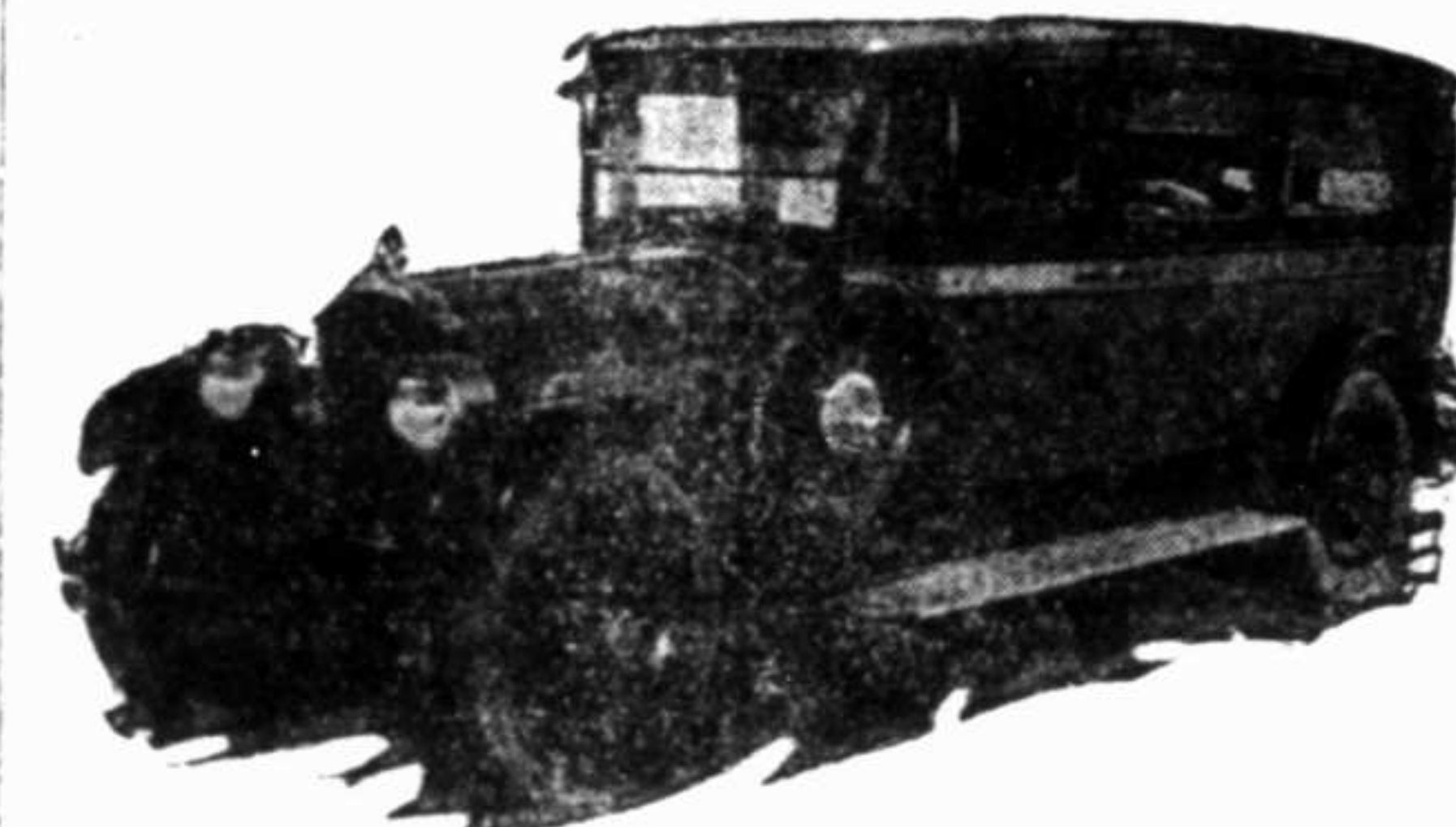

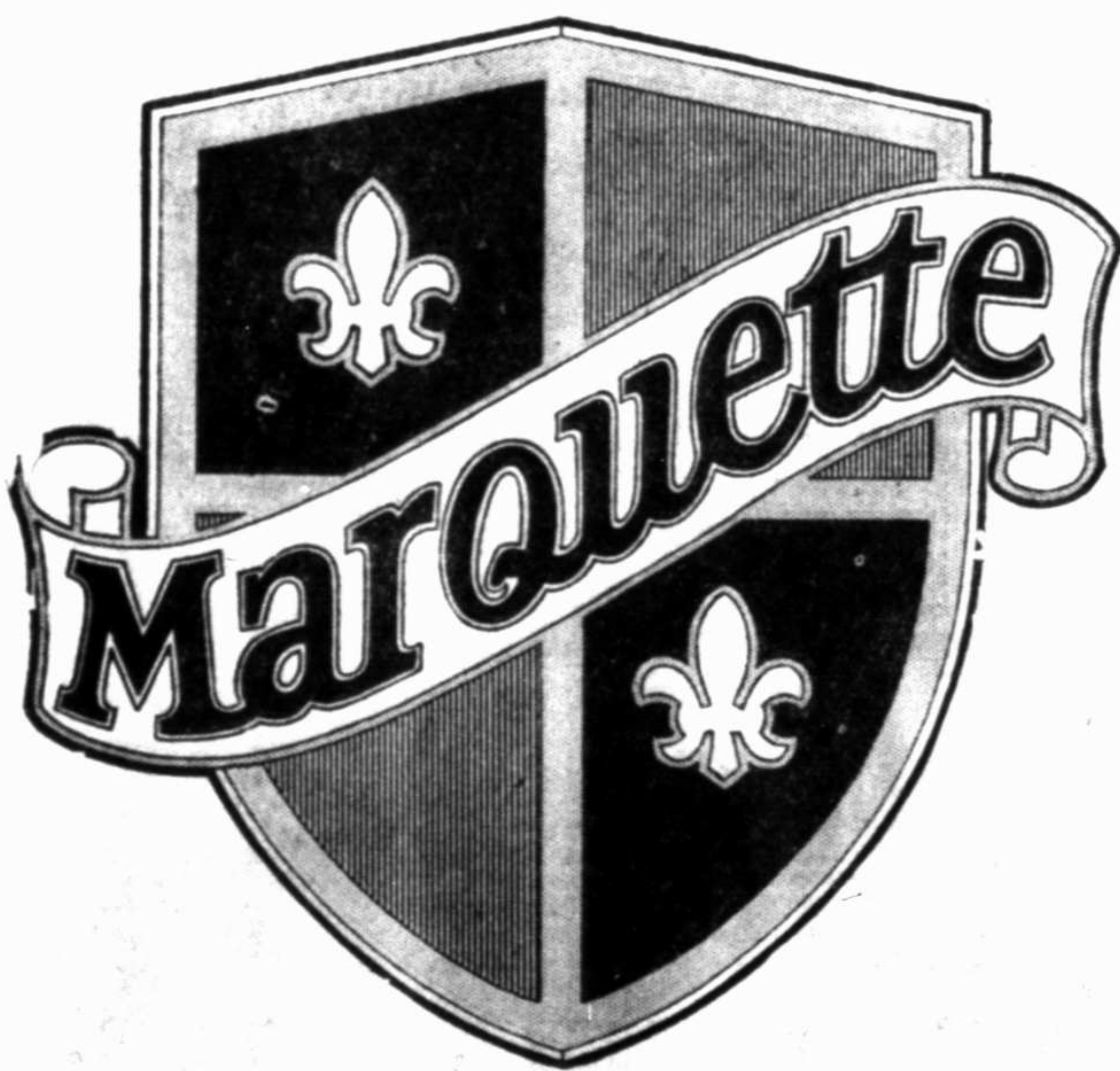

Fugazy, the other half of the self-styled (Pair of Jacks), "didn't know about it" and at first refused to believe that Dempsey had taken advantage of technicality in their agreement.

Oil Tests In Scurry County

Seven Thousand Acres Are Blocked By San Angelo Geologists; Activity Is To Begin In Sixty Days

(Special To The Avalanche) SNYDER, May 27.—V. E. Cottingham and Glenn O. Briscoe, San Angelo consulting geologists, have blocked approximately seven thousand acres in Scurry county on which will start oil tests within sixty days in the center southeast quarter 47, block 97, Houston and Central survey. It was announced today. The well will be about one John R. Truss and will be carried to 3,500 feet unless production is obtained shallower.

The location is about two and a half miles south of Ft. Stockton, between terminus Rescoe, Snyder and Pacific railroad and is only one-fourth mile east of Scurry county line. The nearest test that has been drilled was Stivers and Streeter in Snodgrass in Borden county, nine miles west and three miles north. It recently was counted dry at 3,500 feet. More than a million dollars has been paid in leases and royalties in the Platte section the past six months. L. Powers has been instrumental in securing acreage.
