If you've been missed, don't forget that your part of the fund is still unpaid.

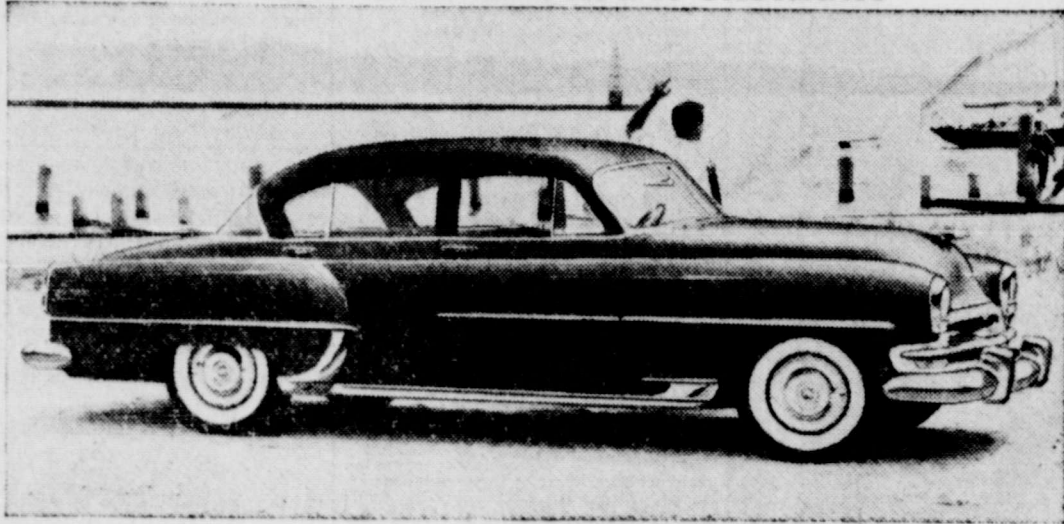

LOBOES WIN OVER DE LEON BY 18-7 SCORE IN B-TEAM BATTLE

The Cisco Lobo "B" team scored a touchdown in each of the last three quarters to win over De Leon "B" 18-7 at Chesley Field Tuesday night.

Howard Hamilton, Cisco quarterback, scored the first touchdown in the second quarter on a five yard scamper around end. In the third quarter Paul Ford, Cisco halfback, made it 12-0 on a plunge over the goal line from five yards out. David Ewell wound up the Cisco scoring when he plunged over from the two in the final period.

De Leon's only tally came on a 60 yard sprint by the left half. Cisco received the opening kick to start the game and put the ball in play on their own 46. In seven running plays by Hamilton, Joe Gilmore, David Ewell and Paul Ford the ball was worked to the De Leon one. A fumble at that point stopped the drive and gave the ball to the visitors. De Leon worked out to the 12 and kicked to the 40. Hamilton returned the punt to the 22. Two plays later a fumble gave the ball to De Leon on the 15. They kicked out from that point as the first quarter ended.

In the second quarter Cisco put the ball in play on the 40 and worked to the 29 where they lost possession on downs. De Leon took over and worked to the Cisco 24 where the Lobo defense stiffened and the Cisco team took over on downs. A sustained drive carried to the five where Hamilton carried over on a keeper play. Gilmore failed to convert. That ended the scoring for the first half.

Bill Dill's Team Wins Pro-Amateur Golf Match Here

The team captained by Bill Dill, Weatherford pro, won the pro-amateur tournament held at the Cisco Country Club Saturday. Dill, former Cisco pro, and his team, posted a low ball score of 63 to nose out the Cisco entry by one stroke.

The Cisco team, captained by Pro Jack Milner, shot a low ball score of 64. Several of the six other teams entered posted scores of 65 and 66.

The Cisco team was composed of Dill, Ralph Glenn, Charles Graham, West and Bobby Bennie. There were eight teams entered in the tournament.

Bill Dill and Jack Milner tied for the low pro prize when each posted a 72.

Milner said that there would be a pro-am match at the Breckenridge Country Club Saturday afternoon and that teams from this section of the state were invited. The deadline for entry in the matches has been set for 12:30 p. m. Saturday.

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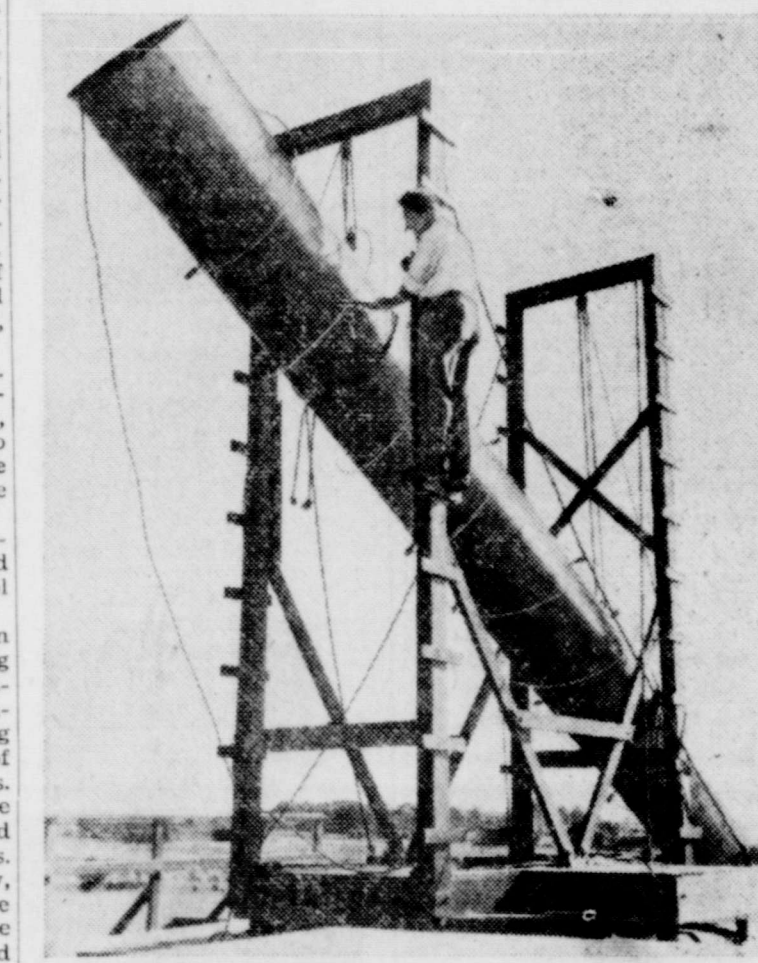
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Budget For Coming Year Given Approval By City Commission

Junk Ordinance Is Passed By Council

The 1953-54 budget for the City of Cisco was adopted by the City Commission at the regular semi-monthly meeting Tuesday night at the City Hall. The budget proposes expenditures in the amount of \$208,863.83 — some \$23,000 less than during the past year.

Cash receipts for the coming year were estimated at \$209,438.42. The budget anticipates revenue as follows: taxes, \$79,700; corporation court, \$2,200; cabin rentals at Lake Cisco, \$2,400; cemetery, \$3,000; water and sanitation, \$100,000; gross receipts tax, \$7,500; parking meters, \$4,500, and other lesser items.

The budget provides for major departmental expenditures as follows:

In other action, the commission passed on first reading a city ordinance as requested by County Attorney Joe Nusselle to require all buyers of junk to keep a register of purchases for the inspection of police. The ordinance further provides that junk purchased must be kept on hand for at least three days and that none shall be bought from minors not accompanied by their parents.

Mayor G. C. Rosenthal read a letter from Lester Clark of the Cisco Gas Corporation, formally withdrawing that firm's offer to sell their distribution system to the city. Local citizens turned down a proposition to buy the gas companies in a recent election.

A request that West 12th Street between Avenues H and I — the block just south or behind the junior high school building — be closed to traffic was taken under advisement. Other routine matters were discussed.

WANT TO SEE YOUR SENATOR?

The easiest man to get in to see is your Senator. Although many people think of a U. S. Senator as a man closeted behind heavy doors of a suite in the Senate Office Building, the man you helped elect to the U. S. Senate (or even voted against!) is easier to see than a smalltown mayor.

To convince people that seeing their Senators is a lot easier than most of them think, Pageant magazine sent a reporter to Washington to do a story on the "who, how and why" of cornering a Senator. The November issue of the magazine, in an article entitled "Look Here, Senator..."



explains the procedure for visiting a Senator.

Right off the Senate Chamber, in the north wing of the Capitol is a long, high ceilinged hall called the Senate Reception Room. In one corner near the entrance is a small desk. Visitors who come in stop at the desk, fill out a white card and sit down to wait. A page takes the card into the Senate Chamber and soon some distinguished looking gentleman steps through the doorway at the far end of the room. The visitor spots him, walks over, shakes hands and starts talking. It's as simple as that.

Who comes calling on the Senators? Although the leading group are lobbyists (822 currently registered) whose job it is to try to get certain laws passed, a lot of Very Average Citizens come calling on the men who represent them.

Why do they come? The lobbyists, who represent everything from foreign powers to the NAM, the CIO and regional cotton growers, hope to talk the legislators into voting for laws that will help their special interests. The Very Average Citizens have requests too — a son who wants appointment to Annapolis, teachers who need better wages, widows who want higher pensions. There are the schemers and the crackpots, too, but the door is always open.

The Pageant reporter visited the Senate Reception Room during the busy last week of the 83rd Congress, while the Senate worked overtime to finish up and go home. Crucial tax and budget bills were up for debate. Yet with almost no exception, each time a visitor's card was taken in, out came the Senator. It's a wise servant, public or otherwise, who knows his master, concludes Pageant.

Top Vegetables With Cheese



Here are two hints to make vegetables look their best, taste their best: plan unusual platter arrangements and serve with cheese sauce for color, flavor and good nutrition. As the highlight of a luncheon plate, a whole cooked cauliflower looks inviting with a golden cheese topping. Provide contrast with whole green beans and broiled tomatoes. You can make a quick cheese sauce by melting pasteurized process cheese food with a little milk. Or use a new pasteurized process cheese spread which needs only to be heated and it becomes a sauce.

Vegetable Luncheon Plate

1/2 pound pasteurized process cheese food
1/2 cup milk
Broiled tomato halves
Hot buttered whole green beans
Pimiento strips
1 cauliflower

Melt the cheese food in the top of a double boiler. Add the milk gradually, stirring constantly until the sauce is smooth. Cook the whole cauliflower, drain well and place it in the center of a round chop plate. Pour the hot cheese sauce over it and surround it with broiled tomato halves, and green beans garnished with pimiento strips.

HEALTH TALKS

It has been determined that the part of the brain just above the eyes, consisting of the two frontal lobes, is the area chiefly responsible for the "personality" of the patient.

In certain drastic types of mental disease (for example, a severe personality disorder called "schizophrenia" in which the patient may be so withdrawn from reality he must be kept in an institution for a lifetime) operations on the front part of the brain may be successful when all other psychiatric methods have failed to improve the patient's condition. Patients who are a danger to themselves or others also have been helped in some instances. Also, when extreme pain is unrelieved by ordinary treatment, an operation on the frontal lobe has made the patient comfortable.

Although the first operation of this kind was performed as early as 1891, it was not until the mid-thirties that such surgery was considered safe enough to be used for many patients. In one of the first methods, the entire front part of one side of the brain was removed. As surgeons learned more about the organ, they were able to remove the exact amount from the right location to produce desired results. Several other operations were developed with decided advantages: the personality and intelligence of the patient was changed less and the death rate was reduced to practically zero.

After brain surgery of this type, the personality is basically the same; however, it is more flexible. Anxiety and tension may be relieved, but at first the patient is likely to be confused and lack insight and initiative. Rehabilitation is begun right after surgery and continued until it is evident that no more improvement can be expected. It includes helping the patient return to his former job or train for a new one, helping him renew an old hobby or learn a new one, helping him fit into a normal family relationship or, in some instances, removing him to a new environment if that is necessary.

Patients for brain surgery must be chosen with care, and for best results the operation and rehabilitation which follows have to be highly individualized.

Cub Den Four Enjoys Party On Tuesday

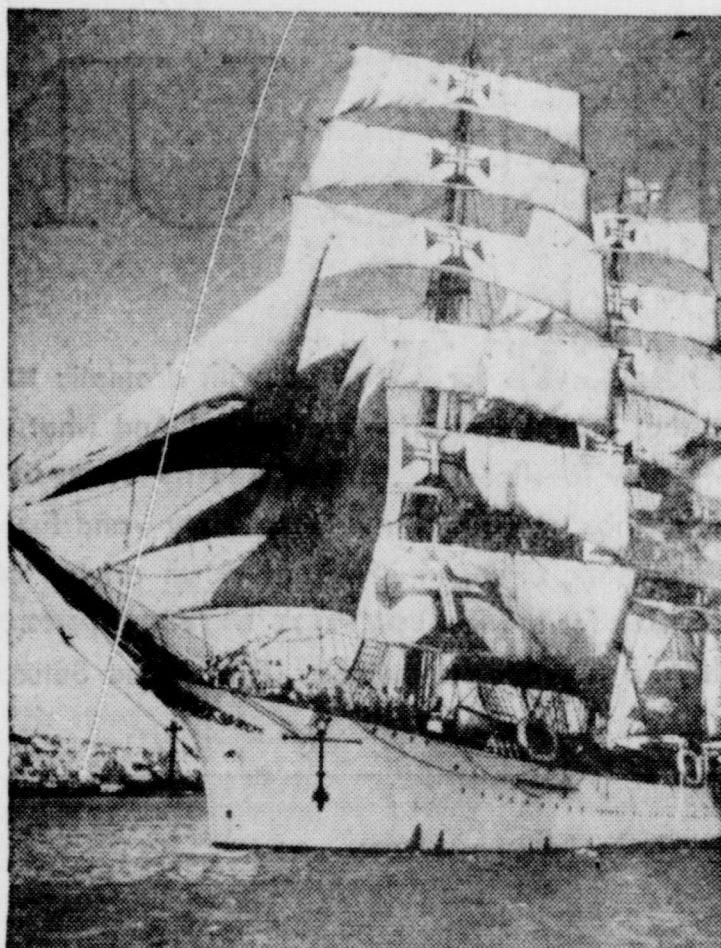

Highlights and Sidelights FROM Your State CAPITOL

AUSTIN—Thirty of the conservative Democratic leaders held a private meeting here and laid plans to retain control of the party in Texas through the precinct, county, and state conventions next year.

Among those present were Wallace Savage of Dallas, state democratic committee chairman; George Sandlin of Austin, secretary; and Claud Gilmer of Rock-springs, chairman of the Texas Democrats for Eisenhower campaign in 1952.

This session came three months after organizers had begun their work, looking to next year's struggle with the liberal Democrats.

Governor Shivers was present, but according to reports coming out of the meeting, he gave no indication as to whether he would be a political candidate, and if so, in which race.

Texas Young Democrats have become a new focal point in the old political feud.

Dormant since 1947, the organization is being built up again, says Boyd Taylor, a University of Texas student.

Taylor reports that according to the rules, state organizations must get a new permit every two years from the National Young Demos and pay a \$100 fee.

This requirement has been carried out by his group, Taylor says. As evidence, he shows a telegram from John F. McCarthy of Bridgeport, Conn., treasurer of the national organization.

Taylor's associates are the Ad-lai Stevenson type of Democrats, as opposed to the Shivers type.

Several young Texans met with Stephen Mitchell, chairman of the National Democratic Executive Committee, when he was here last July, says Taylor, at that time Mitchell suggested that the young Texans get a charter.

Now let's get the other side of the argument.

George Sandlin of Austin, secretary of the Texas Democratic Executive committee, says he

never officially heard of Boyd Taylor.

According to Sandlin, Taylor's group failed to follow the prescribed procedure, which is to be certified by the state Democratic chairman, the national committeeman and committeewoman.

(None of these had certified Taylor's group," Sandlin said.

As far as the State Democratic Executive committee is concerned, the present head of the Texas Young Demos is Max Triplett of Hillsboro, who occupied that position in 1947, and for whom no successor has officially been chosen.

So — here we go again, the so-called liberal democrats versus the so-called conservative Democrats.

Boyd Taylor and his Young Demos, on the liberal side, plan a state convention in San Antonio Friday and Saturday (October 30-31).

Among the speakers will be Ralph Yarbrough of Austin, who lost to Shivers in the race for governor last year; and Byron Skelton of Temple, who has opposed Shivers' party leadership.

Texas Republicans, meanwhile, were carrying forward their own election plans for 1954.

But Senator Price Daniel, in a speech at San Antonio, said he does not think they have much chance.

"Texas is a Democratic state," the senator said. "I don't think the Republicans are going to win any (statewide) offices next year."

Eisenhower's victory in Texas in 1952 was not a Republican triumph, but a personal victory for Ike, in Daniel's view.

There will be no special session of the Legislature on drought relief at this time, the governor has announced.

In an official memorandum, Attorney General John Ben Shepherd ruled that the governor can use his \$200,000 deficiency appropriation to finance a state-federal hay program.

Agriculture Commissioner John C. White, in Shepherd's opinion, is empowered to administer the program for Texas.

The governor's deficiency appropriation is the Legislature's authority to the chief executive to spend money for any necessary purpose that may be unforeseen while routine appropriations of state moneys are being made.

With \$200,000, the governor estimates, the drought relief program can be carried along for a couple of months. After that time, the situation can be restudied.

Texas oil production was reduced again, for the third straight month, by the Railroad Commission.

November's quota is 2,803,528 barrels daily, 360,374 barrels less than the figure for July, when the downward trend began.

From the Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Association came cries of protest at the drop in production.

Association spokesmen protested that the reduction in Texas oil production comes about by virtue of the importation of foreign oil.

"We have merely forfeited more of our domestic market to foreign oil," said M. D. Bryant of San Angelo, president of the association.

Imports of foreign oil amounted to 869,125 barrels daily in September, according to reports received by the Railroad Commission.

There are too many insurance companies in Texas.

So says Garland A. Smith, newly-appointed chairman of the State Board of Insurance Commissioners.

Smith added that he intends to draft legislation that will cut down the number of new insurance companies which have insufficient securities to protect holders of their policies.

There are now 1,822 insurance companies operated in Texas, Smith said. Of the total, 500 are Texas companies and the others are national companies with branches in Texas.

"That's far too many," Smith asserted. He cited that three companies have liquidated in the last year, and one company could not meet \$800,000 in liabilities.

Tightened enforcement of the liquor laws will be possible by the addition of 10 new inspectors for the Texas Liquor Control Board.

Coke R. Stevenson Jr., the board's administrator, announced that a training school will begin November 2 for selected candidates who seek the jobs.

After an intensive course of study, they will take an examination, and those who pass it will start work as inspectors.

Because most of these men will be assigned to the undercover squad, the trainees' names are not given.

It is the responsibility of undercover men to gather evidence regarding violators of the Texas Liquor Control Act.

For years, the Legislature has worried over laws regulating the annexation of territory by cities.

Still troublesome, the question will get a going-over by a Texas Legislative Council committee composed of Senators Gus J. Strauss of Hallettsville, Neveille H. Colson of Navasota, and J. S. Fuller of Port Arthur; and Representative Marshall O. Bell of San Antonio, Charles Murphy of Houston, Scott P. Sayers of Fort Worth, and Tom King of Dallas.

How to provide for the orderly expansion of cities while protecting the property rights of citizens is the problem.

Lieutenant Governor Ben Ramsey is chairman of the council. He also appointed committees on game and fish laws, juvenile code, and revising Texas' court system.

This week, calls for 1,264 men were being placed in the mail by Texas draft boards.

To be inducted in December, the draftees will join 1,210 to go into the service in November and 1,208 summoned for October induction.

Texans ought to "learn more about the aims and organization of the United Nations so that they may lend more support to its underlying ideas and spirit."

Those words are from Governor Shivers' proclamation designating last Saturday United Nations Day.

University Of Texas Will Install New President In Ceremony Oct. 29

AUSTIN, Oct. 28.—The National University of Mexico, founded in 1551, will be the oldest institution represented Thursday (Oct. 29) when Dr. Logan Wilson is installed formally as University of Texas president.

Almost 300 colleges and universities, along with learned societies, have named official delegates to participate in the inauguration ceremony at 10 a. m. on the Main Building Terrace.

Harvard University, founded in 1636, is the second oldest institution of higher learning to be represented. Youngest are Pan American (Junior) College of Edinburg, 1952 (formerly Edinburg Regional College), and Brandeis University, Waltham, Mass., 1947.

In the academic procession which will precede the inauguration, official delegates will march in the order of age of the institutions they represent, the oldest first and the youngest last. Also marching in the procession will be members of the University of Texas Board of Regents, state government representatives, faculty members and representatives of the Ex-Students' Association and Students' Association.

Chairman Tom Sealy of the Board of Regents will install Dr. Wilson following the inaugural address by Dr. Harlan Hatcher, University of Michigan president.

Chancellor James P. Hart will introduce Dr. Hatcher and will present President Wilson for installation.

Dr. Hatcher will speak on "The Role of the State University in Higher Education in the Second Half of the Twentieth Century." Dr. Wilson will deliver an address on "The University of Texas and Higher Education in the Second Half of the Twentieth Century."

An inauguration band, directed by Bernard Fitzgerald of the University of Texas music faculty, will play for the colorful procession and for the singing of "The Eyes of Texas," which will conclude the simple but impressive ceremony.

ive ceremony. University of Texas President C. Paul Boser will preside. vocation and benediction will be offered by Dean James McCall of the Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary. The day's events will include noon luncheon for official delegates and the president's reception at 4 p. m.
