



Harkins, Vest Winners

Carter, Reagan, Bentsen Top Vote Getters

Carter, Reagan, Bentsen, Sadler, Harkins and Vest were major winners in Saturday's Democratic and Republican party primaries in Mitchell County. Only about 30 per cent of voters registered in the county voted in the primaries.

Of major interest to Mitchell County voters were two contested local races with both incumbents victorious. C. G. (Skeet) Harkins won over challenger C. C. (Mike) Burt for Tax Assessor-Collector 885 to 549.

In the race for county commissioner for Precinct 1, incumbent W. M. (Marcus) Vest was re-elected over challenger James F. (Jim) Kelley 419 to 176.

Girl Found Dead At Westbrook

Jeanne Gregory, 18-year old Senior at Westbrook High School, was found dead hanging in a shower stall in the girls dressing room in the gym by school custodian Max Fuentes about 8:30 Friday morning.

She was found with a length of cotton rope around her neck and attached to the five-foot high shower head. The rope had been used as a jump rope in an exercise class and had taped ends.

Justice of the Peace George Sweatt of Westbrook ruled suicide by hanging after an autopsy, according to Deputy Sheriff Mike Stutts, investigator.

Miss Gregory, the niece of Marvin Hale of Lake Colorado City, had caught the school bus to school Thursday morning and eaten breakfast as usual with friends but then was not seen during the day. She did not attend classes at the school Thursday.

Mrs. Hale notified the police department at 2:07 a.m. Friday that Jeanne was missing and Assistant Police Chief L. C. Devorce notified area towns to be on the look out for her. Stutts was called by Sheriff Bill McGuire about 7:30 a.m. that Hale's niece was missing and he began an investigation.

Then Fuentes found the body in the school gym Friday morning. She had attached the rope to the shower head and then knelt down, using the weight of her body to pull the rope tight around her neck, Stutts speculated.

Her parents are Lola Jean Gregory of Abilene and Charles Gregory of Abilene. She had lived at Westbrook about 18 months.

Services for Miss Gregory will be at 2:30 p.m. today (Sunday) in the First Baptist Church at Westbrook. The Rev. Bob Manning, pastor, will officiate, assisted by the Rev. Steve Stroope, youth minister of First Baptist Church in Abilene. Burial will be in Westbrook Cemetery under the direction of Kiker-Seale Funeral Home.

Born Jan. 17, 1958 in Ogden, Utah, she was a member of First Baptist Church at Westbrook and was manager of the Westbrook High School boys' basketball team. She was also Betty Crocker Home-maker of the Year at WHS this year and active in other school activities.

Survivors include her parents; a sister, Kathy of Abilene; a brother, Mickey of Abilene; her aunt and uncle, Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Hale of Westbrook; maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Hale of Portales, N. M.; paternal grandmother, Eulena Gregory of San Bernardino, Calif.; and paternal grandfather, Dan Gregory of Magazine, Ark.

In the first Democratic and Republican Presidential primaries ever held in Texas and Mitchell County, delegates pledged to Jimmy Carter won out over the combined total for delegates pledged to George Wallace and Texas Favorite Son Lloyd Bentsen by a more than 2 to 1 margin.

In the Republican primary, delegates committed to challenger Ronald Reagan won out over the votes for delegates to incumbent President Gerald Ford by almost a 4 to 1 margin.

In the race for the U. S. Senate, incumbent Lloyd Bentsen was successful in his bid for a second term as he outdistanced the only serious challenger Phil Gramm by a vote total of 770 to 551.

In the race for the Railroad Commission, Mitchell County voters went heavy for Jerry Sadler, who is not expected to be anywhere

near the top when votes are tallied statewide.

In second place in Mitchell County for the Railroad Commission was Jon Newton with 346 votes with the next highest vote getter for that post being Lane Denton with 210 votes.

District 61 State Rep. Elmer Martin of Colorado City received a total of 1,303 votes in his home county.

There were a total of 1,473 votes cast in the Mitchell County Democratic primary and 108 in the Republican primary. More than 4,800 voters are registered in the county.

Precinct conventions for the Democratic party were held Saturday night with the county convention to be held at 2 p.m. in the District Courtroom and the Republican county convention to be held at 3 p.m. Saturday in the home of Republican County Chairman Bob Reily, 975 E. 17th.

CMS Open House 1:30-3:30 Today

Open House is set this afternoon (Sunday) at Colorado Middle School from the hours of 1:30 to 3:30.

The main building of the school has been renovated and the entire campus turned into a Middle School complex which includes the older classroom building, gymnasium, library and cafeteria and shop.

Members of the school board will greet guests at the door of the main building and the CMS House of Representatives, Grades 6, 7 and 8, will guide visitors through the facilities where teachers and school personnel will be available to answer questions and point out changes.

The building has been carpeted, freshly painted, and has new ceilings and light fixtures, new plumbing and, most notably, a new heating and air conditioning system.

The old windows of the building were plastered on the outside and then fixed on the inside with hanger board which can be used for displays, etc.

Interior colors are yellow, green and rust and the carpeting is in darker shades of these colors.

First day of classes on the new Middle School campus was April 12 as the move was made during the preceding week and weekend.

Hail Damages Buford Area

A scary looking storm struck Mitchell County about 5 Wednesday afternoon, accompanied by high, gusty winds, hail and lightning, dumping from 2 to 3 inches of rain on most parts of the county and almost demolishing the Buford area.

Many residents of Buford reported broken windows, beat up woodwork and screens and damaged roofs. Most costly damage, however, was to terrace systems which had recently undergone repair for this year's planting and which will now have to be repaired again.

Heaviest hail fell in the Buford area, north and east of the gin. Murrell Blasingame reported house and shop roofs totally destroyed, all terraces broken and a broken window on the north side of the house from heavy hail from marble size to golf ball size which lasted about 45 minutes and covered the ground like snow. "It was still on the ground Thursday morning," Mrs. Blasingame said.

All trees and shrubs were knocked down, losing leaves and limbs. The Sefton Pickens home suffered a damaged roof and two broken storm windows but no win-

dow was broken in the J. F. Bodine home nearby.

Dennis Wright at Buford reported broken windows, as did Roy Petty and Rafael Martinez.

The storm was also heavy in the area south of Loraine between North and South Champion Creeks as terraces there were heavily damaged and some outbuildings destroyed by high winds.

Anastacio Alvarez, who lives at Lone Wolf Mountain north of Loraine, reported three broken windows on the east side of the house and probably some roof damage but he said an insurance adjuster would look it over Monday.

Insurance agencies in Colorado City said most requests for inspections have come from the Buford area with some from the north side of the city.

About 100 requests for roof inspections have come in, about 90 for automobile damage from hail and the Farm Bureau reports about 10 irrigation wheel systems damaged. Estimates of the amount of damages will have to be tabulated following the inspections.

The three delegates for Democratic presidential candidate Jimmy Carter got 727, 701, and 649 votes, respectively, while the three for Bentsen got 252, 326 and 238, respectively and the three for Wallace got 178, 192 and 169 each.

Sheriff W. R. (Bill) McGuire was the leading vote getter of local uncontested candidates with 1,320. In the statewide race for judge of the court of criminal appeals, incumbent Truman Roberts was the winner in Mitchell County with 801 votes with challenger Jerome Chamberlain receiving 361 votes.

Votes received by other local uncontested candidates included, District Attorney

Frank Ginzler, 1,254; District Judge Weldon Kirk, 1,267; chief justice 11th district court of civil appeals Austin McCloud, 1,293; Paul Hunter, commissioner Precinct 3, 366.

Carter-Love Win Regional

Colorado City is the new Region I tennis champion as determined in playoffs Friday and Saturday in Odessa with Colorado City winning first and third place in doubles and third place in singles.

Denver City, who won last year, finished second with 20 points behind Colorado City's 25 points.

Colorado City's Craig Carter and Chop Love, both juniors, breezed through four matches to win first in region, defeating 6-2, 6-4 the same Denver City team that defeated them last year for regional. They'll go to state competition May 14-15, the same as they did last year.

Tony Love, a senior, won third in singles for Colorado City and the Colorado City team of Terry Culbertson and Ivy Johnson, also both juniors, won third in doubles, winning over teams from Coleman and Morton and losing to the Denver City team that won second, and then winning over a second Morton team for the right to be in third place.

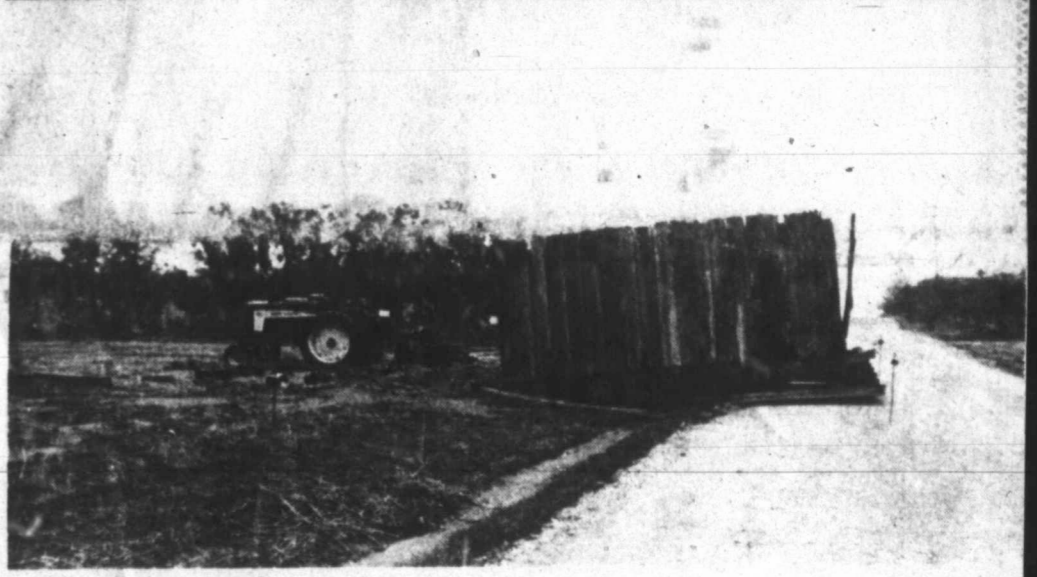
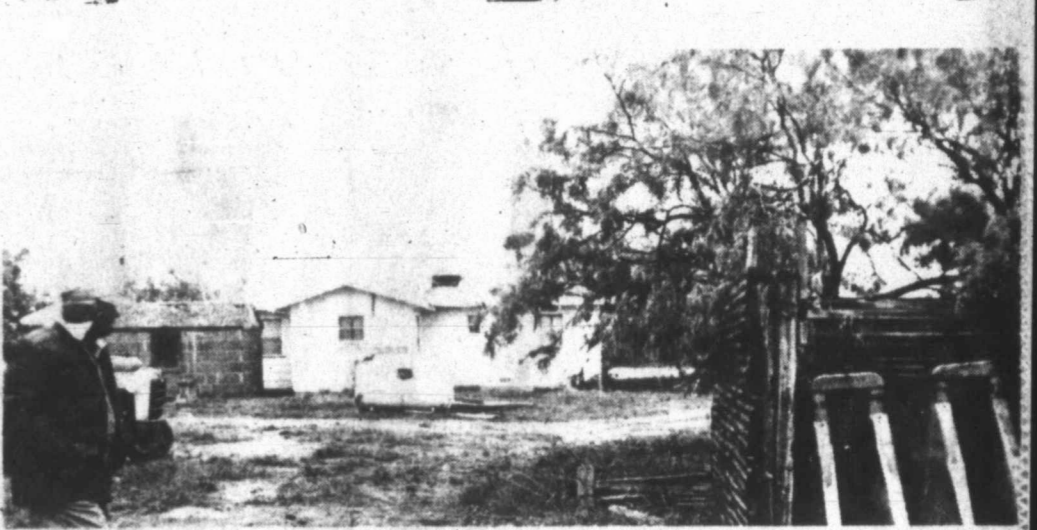

McElligott also spoke to the 5-county pharmacist's group in a meeting in Colorado City Thursday night and said he likes the opportunity to discuss his work as a PA.



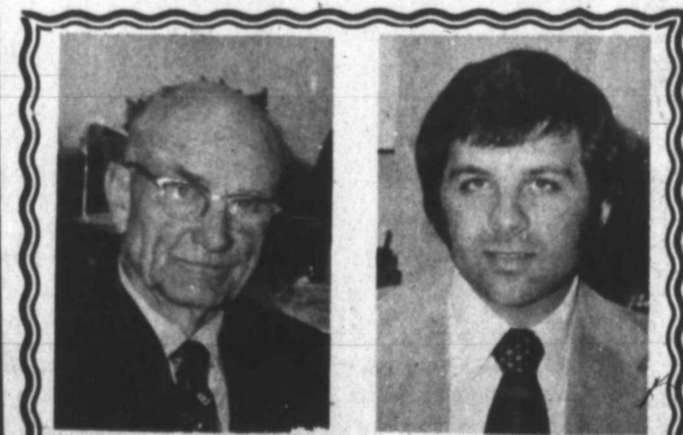

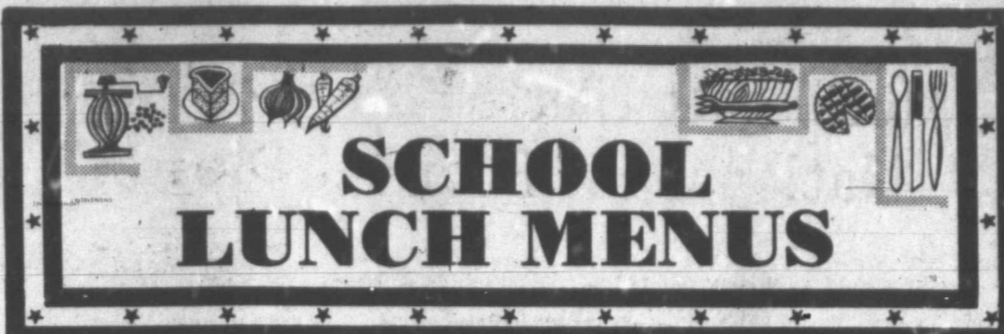
WW II Veteran Dies

Utilities Again Hit By Storm

The Wednesday afternoon storm that hit Mitchell County caused problems for utility companies as well as local homeowners.

Workers for Southwestern Bell Telephone and Lone Wolf Electric Co-Op were working most of Wednesday night to repair damage. Texas Electric Service Co., local manager B. B. Hardee said TESCO was extremely lucky and only had a small amount of problems that were solved in just a few hours.

The following is a statement from Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. District Manager Bill Gilliland of Snyder.

Local Telephone wire chief Ray Medley reported that there were about 350 telephones out locally Wednesday evening with crews working all night and all but about 30 telephones were back in service by 5 a.m. Thursday.

"As occurred on April 14 and 15, a storm struck Colorado City the evening of April 28. A number of telephones were again knocked out of service by the wind, hail and lightning.

"The local maintenance forces worked through the night and had the major damage repaired by 5 a.m. the morning of April 29.

"Although scattered reports continued during the day Thursday, the majority of these were repaired that day.

"The inclement weather

most definitely has interfered with the telephone service although there is another factor that contributes to out of service conditions on some telephones. This is known as an overload in the telephone office.

"An overload is caused whenever the majority of telephone users try to place a call during the height of a storm whereby all switching equipment is utilized. This is a condition that is system wide and by no means unique to the Colorado City office.

"Whenever an overload occurs, a subscriber might pick up his receiver and not get a dial tone and immediately think his telephone is out of order. Actually the telephone and related lines are in perfect working order but all switching equipment is busy, thus no dial tone.

"The public's help and assistance is needed in these cases. Following are some guidelines to use in the above mentioned cases:

"-Hang up and occasionally lift the receiver to check for dial tone.

"-Keep all calls brief so that emergency calls can get through.

"-Please don't tie up the lines unless the call is absolutely necessary.

"The people at the telephone company are working to make your service the best possible. Your assistance will be greatly appreciated."

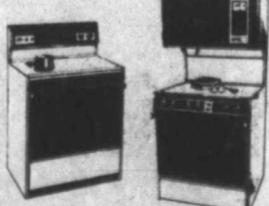

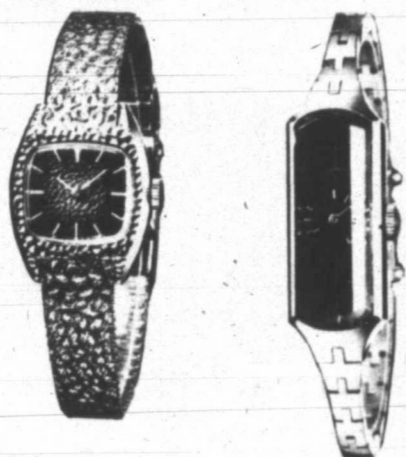

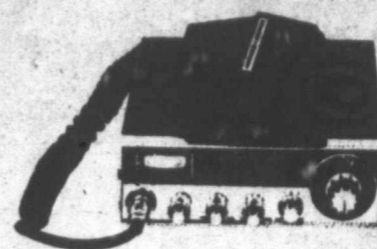

How Good Is Good Enough?

I would like to briefly discuss the following three statements that show some people's feelings about a very important subject.

1. I am not good enough to be saved.
2. One is saved by being good.
3. Being good has nothing to do with salvation.

Some people feel that they are so bad or worthless or have sinned so much that they can't be saved by God. This is incorrect thinking for two reasons. One is that it limits God's power to cleanse and forgive, or it is the same as saying that Christ's death on the cross was not adequate enough. When people tell me that they aren't good enough to be saved, I often ask them if they have murdered any Christians. Paul said that he was chief of sinners because he persecuted the church and killed many Christians. Yet, Paul's life was transformed when he believed in Jesus as his Lord and God.

Susan Atkins was one of the three women who was convicted with Charles Manson of murder. She was the most devoted follower of the three. The TV special, "Helter Skelter," showed accurately how she gladly participated in one of the cruelest crimes of history. At her sentencing, she admitted she was guilty but she claimed to feel no guilt or remorse—a cold, feelingless response. But this past year she and one of the other two women, who are serving life terms in isolation, both invited Jesus into their lives. They seem to evidence a genuine spiritual birth.

John Newton was a slave trader, brutal murderer, and what many would call the scum of the earth. But in his rotten condition, he was convicted of his need for Jesus and he became a Christian. Later he wrote one of the most outstanding hymns of history, "Amazing Grace."

The second reason why it is incorrect thinking to feel that one isn't good enough to be saved, is that it assumes one is saved by being good. This leads us into the second statement.

It needs to be explained that to be saved by being good is possible only if one is perfect. One lie, one selfish act, or one bad thought is enough to disqualify us from becoming a Christian by being good. The problem is that we fail to realize that God is so holy, righteous, and perfect that He can't have fellowship with sinful man unless a solution is found for man's sin. The solution could never be so cheap as to be our good works or effort. But there is a solution—the cross. Jesus paid the price for man's sins, and the man who receives Jesus by faith is declared to be as righteous as Jesus in his standing before God. That is amazing grace. It leaves no room for pride but offers hope to everyone.

Ephesians 2:8 & 9 in the New English Bible says, "For it is by his grace you are saved, through trusting him; it is not your own doing. It is God's gift, not a reward for work done."

But the next verse tells us part of the purpose of God in saving us. It says, "For we are God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to devote ourselves to the good deeds for which God has designed us."

This shows us that being good or doing good deeds does have something to do with our salvation. We are saved to be new creations in Christ whose desires, reactions, and life are different. We must not get the cart before the horse but having the horse first we should not forget the cart. Salvation must come by faith before good works, but good works will follow in the life of one who has been born again by accepting Jesus as the Lord of his life.

As one man said, "Faith alone saves, but the faith that saves is never alone."

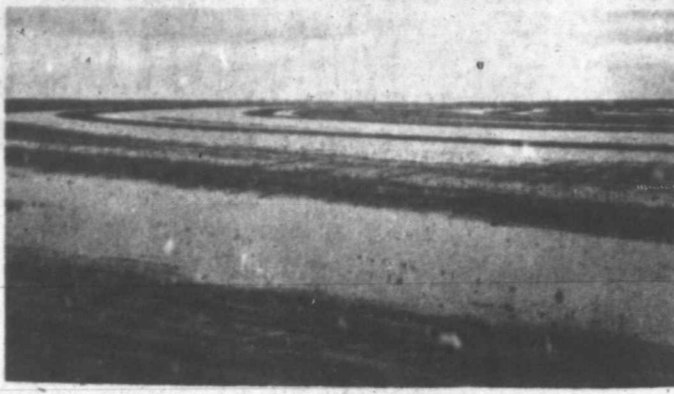

THE RAINS which fell on Thursday showed the effects of good and poor conservation farming practices. The above picture shows chiseling across terraces. The chisel furrows funneled all of the water into the terrace channel instead of holding it on the contour where it does the most good. Most of the terrace damage was caused by chiseling or disking across the terraces.

Rains Affect Soil

What Is Rainfall Worth? Most of Mitchell County has received at least four inches, or more, of rain in April. Some of this rain was lost due to poor conservation farming practices such as chiseling or disking across terraces.

This causes most of the water to wind up in the terrace channels, causing the terraces to break.

A large tandem disk will reduce the effective height of a terrace by half a foot in four or five trips across terraces.

Rainfall is only effective when it is kept in the furrow where it falls. Herbicides can be incorporated just as effectively by going with the terraces as going over them.

How much is this rainfall worth to you? It would take a 400 GPM well 23 days to pump three inches of water on 160 acres.

It would cost over \$600.00 to pump this much water.

Twenty-three years of research showed that contour farming with terraces out-yielded cotton in straight rows up and down the slope by 71 per cent of lint per acre.

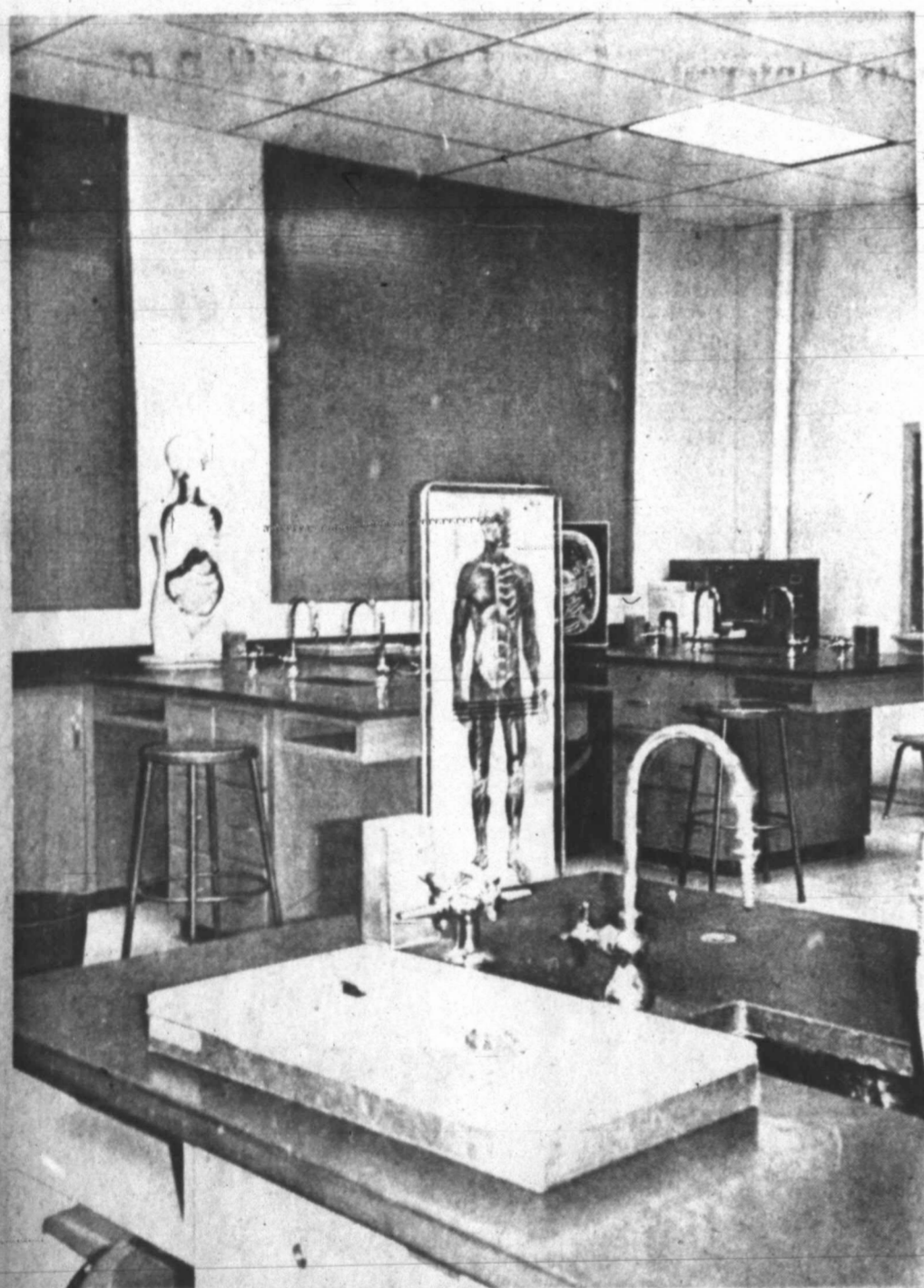
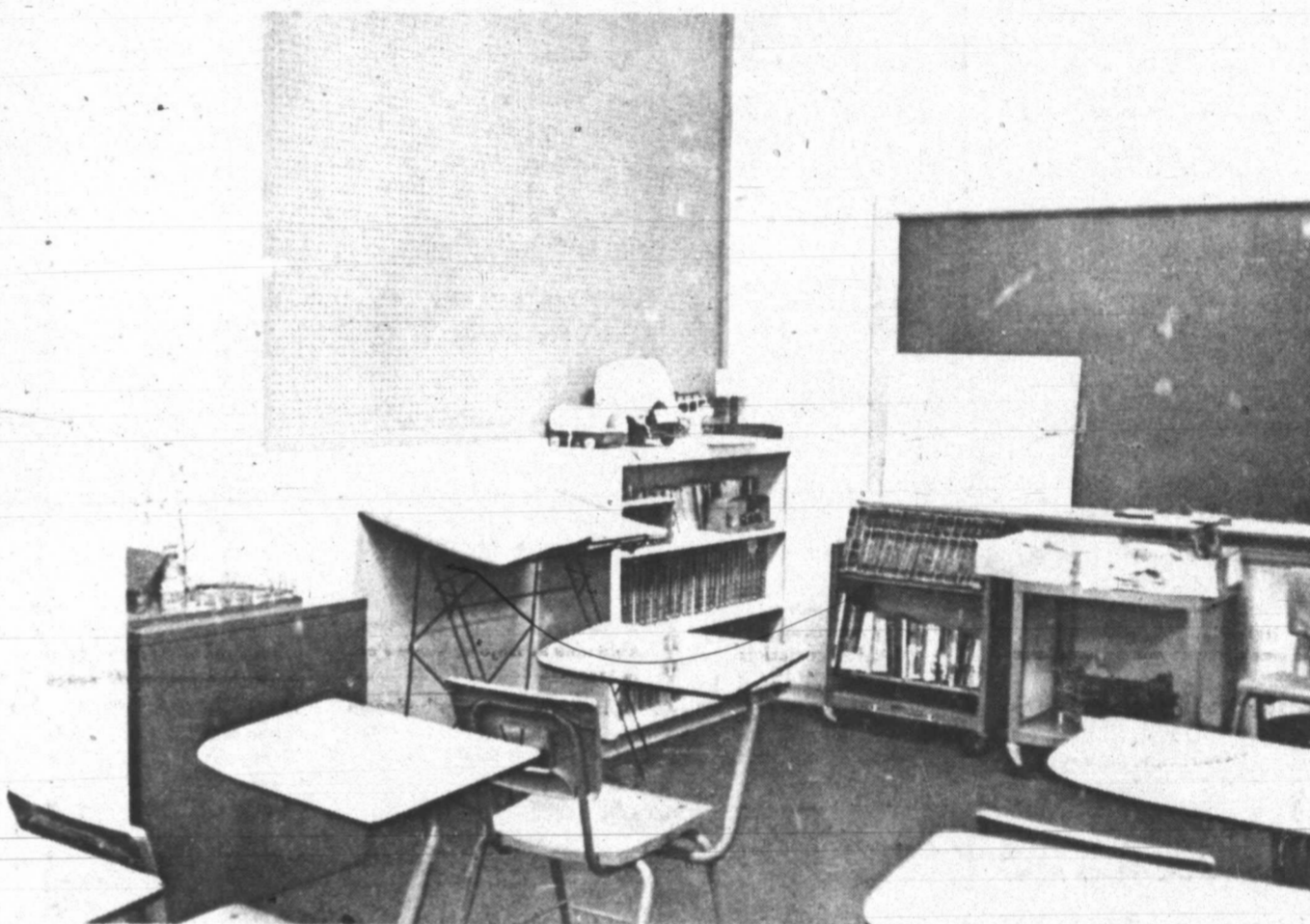

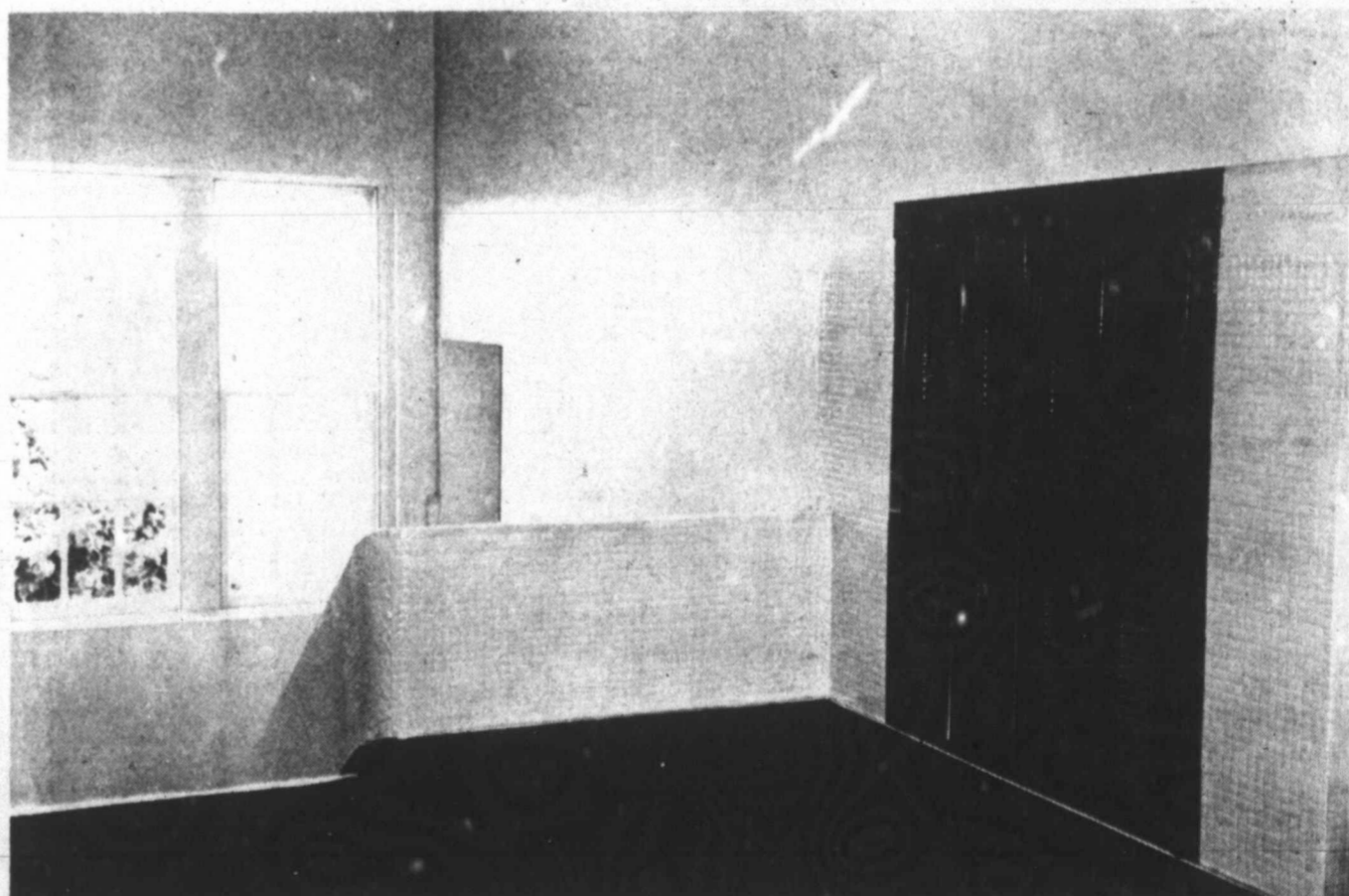

West Texas Banker Dies

Kenn Edwin Eastin, 58, a well-known West Texas banker and formerly with the City National Bank in Colorado City died at 8:30 p.m. Thursday at Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene.

Services were at 2 p.m. Saturday at the First United Methodist church. The Rev. Bob Ford officiated. Burial was in the Colorado City Cemetery under the direction of Kiker-Seale Funeral Home.

Eastin was named senior vice president at Citizens National July 1, 1973. Before that, he was senior vice president at Commercial Bank and Trust Co. in Midland and had been with the City National Bank of Colorado City for 11 years prior to his appointment with Commercial Bank and Trust Co.

Born May 24, 1917 in Hugo, Oklahoma, he married Josephine Chesney March 24, 1940, in Colorado City. Eastin, brother-in-law to Gus D. Chesney, executive vice president of the City National Bank, was elected in 1952 to serve as president of the West Texas Conference of the National Association of Bank Auditors and Comptrollers.

Eastin graduated from high school in Fort Worth and was a graduate of Wisconsin Graduate School of Banking, where he was president of the junior class of 1933. He served in the Air Force during World War II, receiving a medical discharge.

Returning to Colorado City after World War II, Eastin served as commander of Oren C. Hooker Post of the American Legion.

He was active in civic affairs in Midland and was a past president of Midland Downtown Lions Club. He was a member of the Elmwood Lions Club and the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ).

Eastin is survived by his wife; a sister, Dorothy Eastin of Fort Worth; and his brother-in-law, Gus D. Chesney.
