GIVES DEMONSTRATION IN PECAN BUDDING.

An interesting and instructive pecan budding demonstration was given Wednesday, the 16th at the Evergreen school house, on South Llano. Mr. A. P. Swallow, Horticulturist from the Extension Service of the A. & M. College of Texas, was in charge. There were about forty people present. All of Mr. Bierschwale's pupils attended in a body. Besides the school boys and girls, there were present several property owners of that vicinity who attended, because of the opportunity offered to learn something regarding the improvement of their pecan groves.

The improvement of the thousands of native pecan trees by budding, along the streams of Kimble County, offers a wonderful opportunity to land owners to enhance the value of their property.

Mr. Swallow pruned and budded several small trees, doing the work slowly, explaining each step as he went along, and answering numerous questions about every point connected with the budding process. By doing the actual pruning and budding before the eyes of those present, the explanation of the work was of so far more value than had he just talked to an incoherent audience.

After putting in several buds and clearing up points not fully understood, a budding school was opened to those who wished to do the work themselves, under the supervision of Mr. Swallow and County Agent McMillan.

Mr. Bierschwale, principal of the Telegraph school, asked Mr. McMillan to assist him in training the larger boys and girls in budding pecans so that they might begin improving their home groves.

That the value of the pecan to Kimble County is being recognized, is evidenced by the many questions asked Mr. Swallow, and in the statements various persons confidently made.

Mr. Edwards stated that in a good year, native trees would yield \$5.00 to \$6.00 per tree on his place.

Mr. Hardeman told of several young pecan trees of his that were budded several years ago, that even last year yielded one to two gallons of fine nuts per tree.

Mr. H. H. Williamson, State Agent for the A. & M. College Extension Service, and Mr. W. H. Darrow, District Agent of the same department, thated their belief that there was no more profitable service that could be obtained from the County Agent than assistance in making the pecan business more profitable.

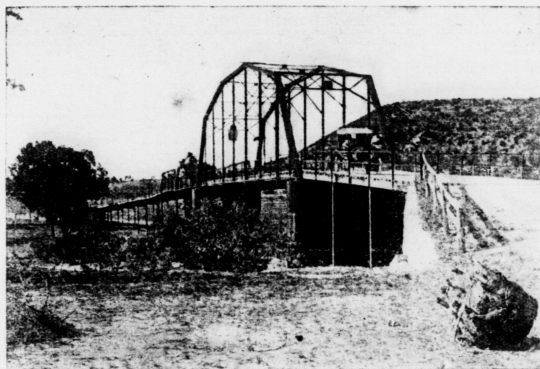
Mr. Williamson was surprised to find such a wealth of native pecan timber in Kimble County, and expressed his satisfaction that such interest is being taken on the part of the people here in developing this great industry.

NEWS FROM SONORA.

Sonora and Sutton County were well represented at the West Texas Chamber of Commerce convention at San Angelo last week. Following the proclamation of the mayor asking the business houses to close for the occasion, most of the business interests did so, and their managers and employees attended the convention. Miss Velma Savel was Sponsor for the town. A splendid display of Sutton County products were shown at the Crowther Hardware store.

The Parent-Teachers' Association closed their year's work with an open meeting, when fathers were guests for the evening. A report was read showing that the Association had made and spent on the school, \$1,189.00, this giving Sonora a well equipped stage and playground equipment, showing that the P. T. A. could work as well as play.

Wool buyers have been making the ranchmen happy, as the prices are good and indications are that we will have a prosperous year.

The road leading into Sonora from San Angelo is nearing completion. Further improvements on other roads will be made soon. Sonora is planning a big time for the Fourth of July celebration. Everyone is invited. Races, rodeo stunts, free barbecue and a good time for all.

Mr. Cameron Marshall, head of the voice department at Howard-Payne College, and Mr. Alben Bell of Brownwood are coming on the Llano.

BEAR CREEK BRIDGE WILL BE REBUILT.

County Judge Baker states that the Bear Creek bridge, recently destroyed by a cloudburst on the head of Bear Creek will shortly be rebuilt. The new bridge will be of reinforced concrete, the same height of the old one and at the same location. The road will also be repaired and built up for one hundred yards on either side of the bridge. This county was fortunate in securing State and Federal aid, as it would have been impossible to have rebuilt the bridge with funds available from the county alone.

The Federal Bureau of Roads has appropriated \$4,000, the State Highway Department \$2,000, and the county will make up the difference of about \$2,000. Thus the State and Federal aid amounts to three to one.

The bridge and work on either side is estimated to cost about \$8,100.

FINE RAINS.

Fine rains came last week that will greatly benefit the growing crops in this section. At Junction about two inches fell. Towards Kerrville, the rain was lighter, but was enough to do a considerable amount of good. About one-half inch fell at Kerrville. The grain harvest is in full sway in the Kerrville country, but the rain did little damage to grains.

At Menard nearly two inches were reported. The rain extended west to the Sutton County line, with light showers scattered over that county. From Eldorado north a good rain fell as far as Christoval. Heavy rains also fell around San Angelo.

On Tuesday of this week still more rain fell at Junction and over a good part of the county. Two and three-quarter inches was the precipitation at town while other places report more. Several inches fell along Cedar Creek, southeast of town causing this creek to overflow much of the lowlands. The rise is estimated to have been about 12 feet. Considerable hail was also reported on this creek and along South Llano.

South Llano at Junction rose to a height of some ten or twelve feet, and North Llano was still higher. The Mason and Sonora mail cars did not leave town, but mail came in on time from Menard, and the Kerrville car left in the afternoon. The bridge near the Segovia school house was reported washed out.

At Junction some hail fell, but not enough to damage the growing crops.

PROMINENT LONDON CITIZEN DIES SUDDENLY.

News was received at Junction about noon Wednesday that Sam Hampton Weaver, prominent ranchman of London, had died suddenly at his farm near London that morning, about 9 o'clock, of paralysis of the heart.

He was born in Sevier County Arkansas, February, 20, 1860, and came to Texas with his parents, who located in Kerr County, in 1862. Later he lived near Austin and at Bandera, coming to Kimble County in 1877.

He has been very active in local and county affairs, and was one of the best known men in the county.

Funeral services were held at London Thursday, Elder John S. Darrist conducting the services.

His wife, a daughter, Miss Jessie, and three sons, S. H. Jr., C. G. and Bobbie, survive him.

In the death of S. H. Weaver, London has lost one of its best citizens, and the Eagle, with the many friends, extend sympathy to the bereaved family.

NEW HIGHWAY LAWS.

At the regular session of the 38th Legislature, a change was made in the State Highway law, providing that the State may maintain the highways that it is interested in. That is, those on which State and Federal aid have been secured in building.

This is similar to the provision that the Constitutional Amendment, to be voted on in July, will allow.

If this amendment is passed, the State will not only help to maintain certain main highways but it will be in position to build new ones or fill gaps in old ones. As the new law is now, the State will only maintain or help to maintain roads on which State and Federal funds have been used. The law becomes effective January 1, 1924.

J. A. Heyman returned from Albuquerque, New Mexico, last Saturday, where he had gone several days before, following a telegram stating that his brother, W. W. Heyman, had been killed.

Mr. Heyman was shot after night by one Steve Petcoff. He had gone to the kitchen to answer a call from some one asking for something to eat. Without warning a shot was fired from just outside the door, and Mr. Heyman died instantly. Petcoff had formerly worked for the deceased on his irrigated farm, and some difficulty had arisen, but it had been settled satisfactorily.

Petcoff, who is a foreigner, was arrested and is in jail.

Deceased has a wife and one child who survive him.

ROUNTREE'S DEATH RECALLS CLASSIC TO MIND.

The news of the death of Lee Rountree recalls to mind a gem from his pen written one year ago, while Mrs. Rountree lay upon a hospital bed in Bryan, convalescing from a severe attack of pneumonia. The article follows:

"In The Hospital."

Night had fallen and electric lights pierced the grey gloom of the lowering clouds as the rain gently pattered on the roof of the hospital. It was the closing hours of the Holy Sabbath day, the shades were being drawn so that the sick and weary, the suffering and the dying could rest, clear and hopeful the great church bell across the street rang out, bidding all to come to the house of God to worship.

"What is that, a church bell?" asked the weary sufferer, as she lay with her poor broken body suffering and distressed. The awful fever had abated and she could hear the bells and see the flowers sent her by her loving friends and hoped to be well again. "It is the first time I've heard it in a long time. I hope they will pray for me." In all the ages the call of prayer has been the refuge in God's eternal promise—that he will not forsake us. In the storms, the mountain tops, the peaks and the crags, in the ocean's road and out on the vast and limitless plains God hears prayers of His people and speaks to the deep of their souls. It has been so through all the ages. When Stonewall Jackson, the knightliest man of his race, was dying on the battlefield with face towards God, he prayed: "Let me pass over Death's river and rest under the shade of the trees." With that eternal prayer he met his pilot face to face. After Henry W. Grady had returned from Boston and had delivered his great speech to the world, setting forth the purposes and hopes, ambitions and devotions, and the people of the South, in the dark days of reconstruction along the lines of the "New South," he was dying in a hospital at Atlanta, with pneumonia and while the head of his heroic gray-haired mother was resting on his breast in the last hour, he prayed: "God, you and mother will not desert me when my feet are in the river." The great and the strong, the powerful and the good, have always remembered that God would not forsake His children and offered the prayer of redemption that rings true, strong and enduring throughout eternity, "where no storms ever beat on that glittering strand and the years of eternity roll." When the church bells rang out upon the dying Sabbath as the clouds of night came on the noble woman, voicing the everlasting and undying faith of God's children since the world's creation, she said, "I hope they will pray for me," words mighty, powerful, deep and eternal, more enduring than the earth is the refuge of prayer, made glorious, eternal and undying by God's promise to His children who have lived, hoped, labored and loved for all time.

BUT DON'T TELL HIM.

A wise old minister, before parting with a young couple he had joined in matrimony, used to slip a card into the bride's hand, on which was printed this advice: "When you marry him, love him. THE REGISTRATIONS AT CONVENTION OVER 3,400

Approximately 3,400 persons registered for the West Texas Chamber of Commerce convention, closing in San Angelo last Wednesday night, an incomplete check Friday indicated. Up to Tuesday night at closing time, 3,052 had registered; there were a few more Wednesday and, in addition, about 175 sponsors and newspaper men were registered complimentary.

Proceeds from the pageant Tuesday night totaled \$1,789, there being around 2,200 paid admissions, children included. This does not represent the attendance, however, as all persons registered were admitted. These two figures added account actually for 5,600 persons who witnessed the historical spectacle.

With \$6,000 rain insurance collected, the local convention committee will "break even" at least on the convention, it was indicated Thursday morning when a check of finances was incomplete.—San Angelo Standard.

REMAINS OF FORMER GOVERNOR EXHUMED.

Liban, Hood County, Texas, May 24.—The remains of Thom as Stevenson Drew, who was governor of Arkansas from 1844 to 1849, were exhumed here Wednesday and taken to Poca-honta, Randolph County, Arkansas, where his wife was buried. It had been planned to exhume the body of Gov. Drew Tuesday, but the committee from the Arkansas Legislature, which was delegated to come here on this mission, was delayed enroute by washouts and did not reach here until late Tuesday evening.

Addresses in connection with the exhumation ceremonies were delivered at the tabernacle here Tuesday night by Congressman Fritz G. Lanham of Fort Worth and by Senators Meek and Jackson of the Arkansas State Senate.

Former Gov. Drew came to Hood County in the '50s and bought a ranch near Lipan, where he died in 1879. His wife had died before he left Arkansas and he had made his home here with a widowed sister, a Mrs. Marr. He was about 80 years old at the time of his death.—Weatherford Democrat.

SUTTON WOOL SETS RECORD PRICE OF 70C.

All records for wool in West Texas, or in the United States, this season were broken here Thursday morning when Sutton County wool exhibit here during the convention sold for 70 cents a pound. About 100 pounds were auctioned at the Crowther Hard ware store, where Sonora maintained headquarters during the three day session of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce convention. G. F. Jonas, representing the J. T. Meadow Co. Inc., at Boston, purchaser the small offering.

The wool was raised by Thom as Bond, was of high quality, fine texture, long staple and light shrinkage. It attracted much attention during the convention, especially from visitors who had never seen wool in its raw state. None got away from Millard Cope, who was in charge of the Sutton County exhibit, without learning the home of

the flock that produced such fleece and that San Angelo is the largest primary wool market in America.

Fifty-seven and one-half cts. was the previous high mark any where in the country, being paid at Del Rio week before last. The record price of 70c is not a criterion for the market, fifty-five and fifty-six cents a pound remaining the ruling price.—San Angelo Standard.

FARMERS ARE BUSY HARVESTING GRAIN.

Harvest in the Hill Country is under way this week and will continue for the next ten days. Some fields of oats were cut last week and from all reports the yield will be very light on the average, although in some sections fifty to sixty bushels are expected.

The fields of wheat are badly damaged by the rust and it is feared that some will not pay for cutting. However, like the oats, there are exceptions and some few fields will yield a fair average.

The lack of sufficient moisture last fall was probably the main cause for the light grain crop. Still a good rain three weeks or a month back would have been of material benefit, especially for the late plantings.—Kerrville Mountain Sun.

MASON GIRL WEDS MENARD YOUNG MAN

It is announced that a wedding of interest, locally, took place in Menard last Saturday evening when Miss Meta Loeffler, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Loeffler of this city, became the bride of Mr. Ike Murchison. The bride is a talented young lady and for the past couple of terms has taught in the Menard High School. The groom is a stranger to many people of this city, but is said to be one of Menard's most promising young men. The News is pleased to extend these young people congratulations, and wish for them a long and happy journey thru life.—Mason County News.

WINANS IS APPOINTED STATE SURVEYOR.

Some time ago Mr. J. F. Winans, who was until last election, County Surveyor of Edwards County, applied for a position as a State Surveyor, and he informs the Leader that he has now received the appointment. It is quite an important office. The Land Commissioner at Austin is likely to order him to any part of the State to do surveying, or to assist in the settling of boundary disputes. It also gives him authority to survey anywhere in the State.—Edwards County Leader.

Twenty years ago San Angelo the scene of the recent big convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, was scarcely larger than Junction today. The two are, in a way, similarly situated. Each is the center of an extensive trade territory, and each is situated at the juncture of two splendid streams, assuring an abundant and never failing water supply, without which no town can become a city. The men of San Angelo, twenty or more years ago, had a vision of a city built on the banks of the Conchos. They worked to that end, and today San Angelo is able to entertain fifteen thousand guests. With the individual, growth is to a great extent, a state of mind. If you feel that you can win, you generally can. With the town or community, growth is even more dependent on the state of mind of the citizens of which it is composed. If they are alive and believe in the future possibilities of their home town, it will grow and prosper. If they feel that all the opportunities are elsewhere and that every other place is better than their own, the chances are that they will be correct later on, if not now.

We recently had an experience in moving a printing plant, and any one who has never had a similar experience, cannot appreciate how much fun it really is. Besides the building, we moved about twenty-five thousand pounds of machinery and fixtures. Three of the heavier pieces of machinery weighed some fifteen thousand pounds, and each has to be handled like a baby, to prevent serious damage. However, the ordeal is about completed. We are now located a block north of where we were and within the next few days will have our plant completely arranged and will be glad to have the many friends and patrons of the paper pay us a visit.

Many people do not realize that we have here at Junction a real modern printing establishment. A visit will be a revelation to many, and if you will watch us work from twelve to sixteen hours a day, you will conclude that it takes lots of effort to get out a weekly paper such as this one.

Watch Junction Grow.

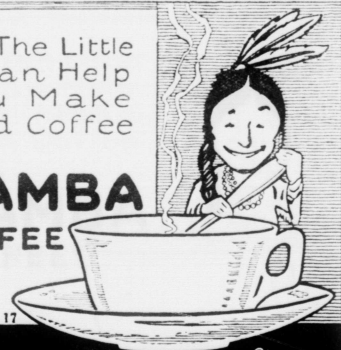

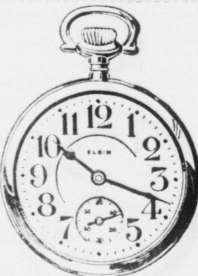

**EIGHTEEN BILLS WERE
SIGNED BY GOVERNOR.**

Austin, May 26.—Governor Neff Saturday signed and filed with the Secretary of State 18 bills. All of these measures were passed at the second called session of the Legislature, and include the bill placing a tax on coin-operated vending machines, providing a more efficient method for collection of delinquent taxes on land and for collection of delinquent taxes on levee improvement districts. These three measures to become effective ninety days after final adjournment of the second called session. Other bills signed and filed are:

Making available to the Board of Control unexpended balance of the appropriation for the American Legion Hospital. Effective ninety days.

Authorizing condemnation for facilities for removing sand, shell and gravel under State permits. Effective ninety days.

Simplifying the method of registering bonds in the State Comptroller's Department and validating certain registration. Effective ninety days.

Providing that citizens reaching the age of 21 years after February 1, and before the day of a following election shall be entitled to vote at such election without either a poll tax or exemption certificate. Effective immediately.

Providing for condemnation of material for road construction. Effective immediately.

Closed season of five years on antelope, mountain sheep, wild pheasants, wild woodcock, wild woodcock and wild prairie chicken. Effective ninety days.

Prescribing the method for holding elections to organize water improvement districts. Effective immediately.

**GOVERNOR INDIGNANT
OVER ADJOURNMENT.**

Austin, May 26.—To Lieutenant Governor Davidson and all other legislative callers Saturday, Governor Neff, following up his striking back at criticizing legislators as evidenced in his interview given out at Dallas Thursday, has promised there will be a wholesale disapproval of every appropriation bill in his office by Monday or Tuesday unless the Legislature shows some signs of "doing something" before the time limit he has fixed.

That he may say something in "talking back" far more caustic than in his Dallas statement, was also plainly indicated. The Governor says he is "righteously indignant" over the fact that "legislators who clamored for his return to Austin voted in both House and Senate to adjourn until Monday, within a few hours after he got back to his office from West Texas."

Various appropriation bills now on the Governor's desk, subject to veto, aggregate \$39,000,000, of which \$18,600,000 would not become available until the second year, beginning September 1, 1924.

Anticipating failure to provide the revenues to meet the appropriations and therefore expecting the wholesale vetoes, some House members were in conference Saturday in an endeavor to cut the appropriations to meet the revenues.

America's Marvels

NATURAL AND OTHERWISE

By T. T. Maxey

THE FIELD MUSEUM

The exhibits at the World's Fair, Chicago, in 1893, offered an exceptional opportunity for the founding of a museum as an everlasting memorial of this great international affair and to preserve its endless antiquities. To start and further this movement, Marshall Field, Chicago's merchant prince, donated \$1,000,000, and the exhibits desired were selected and placed on display in the Art palace on the exposition grounds.

When Mr. Field died in 1906 he left \$1,000,000 additional for a building to be erected on a permanent site, and another \$4,000,000 to provide for its maintenance. The great, imposing, spacious-hulled palace of white Georgia marble—covering eleven acres of ground, said to be the largest marble building in the world, which now stands in Grant park on the lake front in Chicago, the Field Museum of Natural History, is the result.

Inside, the world, it might be said, awaits your inspection. One room holds the exhibits which show the advances made by men of ancient times that led up to the present civilization; another displays Egyptian antiquities without end; a third, bronze and ancient glassware from Rome. Another section contains displays representing the early races of North and South America and the Pacific islands. A highly instructive exhibit is that which shows various birds, animals, fish and reptiles artistically grouped in their natural habitats. One hall is packed with exhibits from China. The habit of growth and structural makeup of many flowers and seeds is shown in an extremely interesting fashion. The display of woods from various parts of the world and the products made from wood is extensive. Numerous examples of meteorites and crystals, and models showing the workings of mines of many kinds, are shown. Ethnological and geological collections from Africa, India, Japan and other far-away lands contain many curious objects.

The entire world was searched and everything which the authorities considered as worthy appears to have been brought to this central headquarters for the public to view and study. The carcass of a monstrous herbivorous dinosaur which roamed the earth centuries ago is perhaps the oldest inhabitant; the skeleton of a monster whale is perhaps the largest single exhibit; the smallest probably is the miniature seed of some wee plant; an Indian medicine wheel, found on a mountain top, surrounded with an air of ceremony, perhaps of sacrifice, too, its use conjectural, certainly is a most peculiar exhibit.

At any rate, the generosity and foresight of a wealthy public-spirited man has made it possible for future generations to "see the world" in his home town—Chicago.

OPPOSE DOWNWARD REVISION OF TARIFF.

Fort Worth, May 28.—The livestock interests of Texas and other States are threatened with the greatest calamity in the history of the industry in the form of the proposed reduction in the present tariff rates, according to W. N. Waddell, veteran livestock raiser and former official of the War Finance Corporation.

In a statement to the press today, Waddell quotes information just received from Argentine and Brazil which indicates that cattle in that section are in excellent condition and have practically no value. If the present duty on stocker and feeder cattle is reduced fifty per cent as requested by the American Farm Bureau, the next step will be a reduction of the duty on beef and a general decrease will follow on all livestock schedules, Waddell points out, letting the South American cattle replace Texas livestock in the markets of the country.

The same interests which led the fight for free hides when the present tariff measure was before Congress are responsible for the demand for a reduction of rates on cattle, Waddell asserted. All livestock interests of Texas, as well as the banks and merchants who are in a measure dependent on these industries in conducting their business are requested by Waddell to strenuously oppose any effort at downward revision of the present tariff rates.

The fight being waged by the soap and varnish interests to reduce the duty on vegetable oil is cited by Waddell as an example of the attack that will be made against all raw material schedules, and especially livestock and agricultural schedules.
