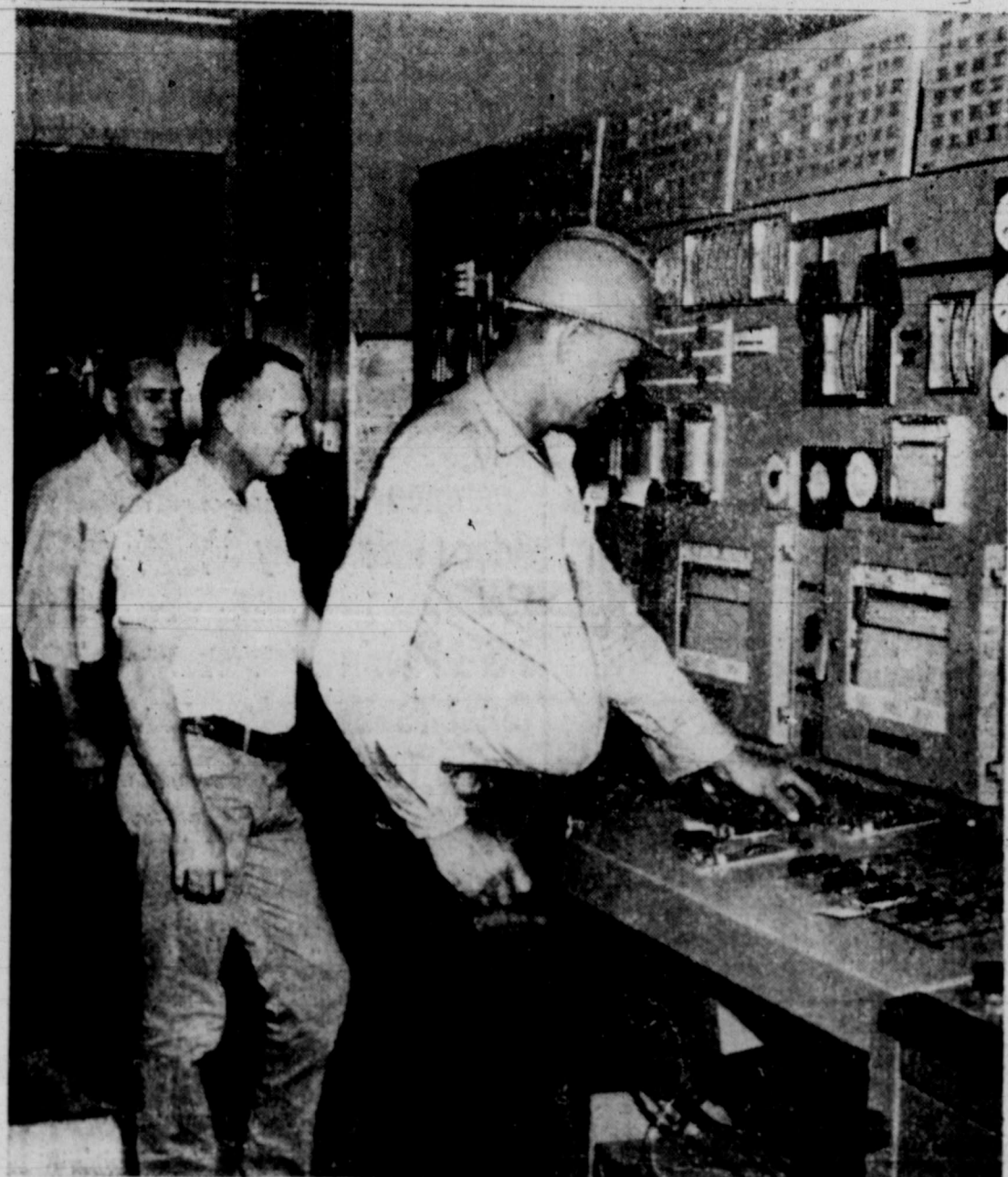

Largest Power Unit Now In Check-Out Operation

Expansion Project Nearing End

Largest electric power generating unit of Texas Electric Service Company is undergoing final checks and adjustments at the company's Morgan Creek Power Plant on Lake Colorado City. These checks and adjustments signal the final phase of a huge multi-million dollar expansion of the plant. When this trial operation period is concluded, the new unit will go into commercial production later this month—making available half million more kilowatts for TESCO's power system.

The new 509,000 kilowatt unit first produced electricity two weeks ago at Morgan Creek Plant, just 19 months after groundbreaking ceremonies in October 1964. It is the sixth generating unit to be installed at the plant and will bring the total generating capacity of Morgan Creek up to 833,000 kilowatts—making it by far the largest electric power plant in all west Texas. First generating unit at the plant was put into service 16 years ago—in June 1950 with a generating capability of 22,000 kilowatts. A second unit of the same size was started the following month, July 1950.

Power for the new 500,000 unit just being completed will be fed directly into Texas Electric's new extra high voltage steel tower transmission line that extends from Odessa to the Fort Worth area.

Texas Electric has seven more steam-electric generating plants and the new unit will increase the company's system capacity to 2,250,000 kilowatts.

Design and construction of the new Morgan Creek unit was by Ebasco Sewerco, Inc. The turbo-generator was built by General Electric and the boiler by Foster Wheeler, a firm which provided Colorado City with publicity in full-page advertisements published in national trade magazines.

Boiler for the huge new unit stands high as a 15-story building and the generator-turbine shaft is 149 feet long. A tribute to the combined efforts for construction of the See Unit Page 7

TEACHER AND MISSIONARY

Westbrook Rites For Ruby Hines

Funeral service was conducted Saturday in Westbrook Baptist Church for Miss Ruby Burton Hines, 39, former missionary to Brazil who taught Spanish in Colorado High.

Miss Hines died Thursday at about 3:30 p.m. while being rushed in an ambulance to an Abilene hospital, after being wounded in the chest by a gunshot at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Burton Hines of Westbrook. She was found at approximately 12 a.m. by her mother lying just outside the residence's yard after taking a .410 gauge shotgun to shoot rabbits.

The teacher, who had devoted 17 years of her life to Baptist missionary work in South America, earlier had asked her mother for instructions on operating the single shotgun so she could shoot rabbits. Mrs. Hines reported she had heard one shot after which the daughter returned to the house, then went outside again.

Another shot was heard by the mother, who shortly after went outside when Miss Hines who was unfamiliar with handling a gun, did not return. Critically wounded, Miss Hines was rushed to Root Memorial Hospital here in Colorado City, then over to Abilene after emergency treatment.

Conducting the funeral service was Rev. M. A. Smith, pastor of Colorado City's First Baptist Church.

Burial was in Westbrook Cemetery under direction of Kiker Funeral Home. Pallbearers were Tom Moore, Bill Carter, Jimmy Harrison, Frank Rocha, Allen Barreera, David Anderson and Olson Sweet.

Miss Smith had been in ill

health ever since returning from the mission field. She had taught in Del Rio and Colorado High since her return. She lived in Colorado City, where she was a member of First Baptist Church, but had moved to the Westbrook residence of her parents for the See Rites Page 7

Youngest in Flying Club Solos at 16

The 16 year-old Colorado High has been taking flying lessons for three months and celebrated his 16th birthday June 10, and thus became eligible by age to take the plane up solo.

After finishing his solo with a flourish he was well on the way to becoming the third member of "The Flying Hunters."

He is the son of Paul Boyd Hunter and his wife, Dornthea. Both Mr. and Mrs. Hunter are licensed private pilots. They are both members of the Colorado City Flying Club.

Glenn is, himself, a member of the flying club, and has the distinction of being the club's youngest member.

Young Hunter did his solo in the Cessna 172, owned by the Flying Club, and in which he has been taking lessons from Frank Deregibus, flight instructor. Hunter has completed approximately 8 1/2 hours in the air, Deregibus said.

IN MITCHELL COUNTY

Tour To View Historic Sites

A motorcade tour of historical points of interest in the county's western and northwestern communities is planned for Tuesday, July 12.

Mrs. Witt Hines, chairman of Mitchell County Historical Survey Committee, announced plans for the tour Saturday.

Included in the tour will be visits to Abrahams No. 1, the Westbrook discovery which opened up the huge Permian Basin oil development which now stretches to New Mexico.

Also to be seen are Will Berry's museum—a personal collection of rare artifacts and antiques admired for years by museum curators and historians; the Teeville Cemetery and Cuthbert Store, with a history of furnishing supplies for the West Texas frontier

development.

Mrs. Hines said the tour, in addition, will visit the site of Lockhart Brothers loading rack for the first oil shipped from Westbrook as the Permian Basin production was opened.

The tour will begin at 7:30 a.m. July 12 and all interested persons will meet at the Courthouse here in Colorado City to start the trip in automobiles.

"The public is especially invited to join the group," Mrs. Hines emphasized.

The tour is the first historical excursion planned by the survey committee for the appreciation of local history. It is in cooperation with the state-wide historical recordation, appreciation, marking, preservation and survey program.

Even little children knew most of the words to songs like "Columbia, the Gem of the Ocean," and its Three cheers for the Red, White, and Blue!

IN SPITE of the teachings of a deeply patriotic father and the compelled memorizing of "Hats Off, the Flag Is Passing By," the Red, White and Blue used to mean many things . . . only vaguely patriotic, and then only because of association.

Red always meant red soda pop, Strawberry, White was for the Sunday dresses most of the lovely ladies wore, white slippers on most little girls. Blue was for the open sky.

Childish? Yes. "When I was a child I thought as a child." Few of us ever "put away childish things" completely, when it comes to old memories, at least.

BUT now . . . now that I am a woman count me as one who knows, and shall recall that Red is for bravery, courage, and the blood shed by my country's heroes.

White is for purity . . . purity of motive and of this Country's ideals of freedom.

Blue is for truth. And I shall remember, July Fourth, and every day lived, pray God at least this: "We hold these truths to be self-evident . . . That all men are born free and equal."

That is truth. And to try to qualify that truth or try to justify feeling and preaching that it means only "all men of my culture, my creed or color" is to be blind.

Blind to the true meaning of Freedom. And to the meaning of truth.
