## Teachers told to stand together

Eva Jo Kasinger, president of the Texas Classroom Teachers Association, told a crowd of nearly 200 here Monday night that "there are a lot of inequities in public education that we're going to have to take care of."

Mrs. Kasinger, an elementary school music teacher from Abilene, was the keynote speaker at the fall teacher banquet sponsored by the Colorado Classroom Teachers Association.

"Whether it's through the Legislature or whether it's through our home towns and school districts or through TCTA, we need to stand together and conquer together for the betterment of the schools of Texas," she said.

Political awareness was the theme of the banquet which included brief remarks by District 66 State Representative candidates Dick Burnett (D-San Angelo) and his Republican challenger, Tim Weatherby, also of San Angelo.

"We don't endorse candidates," Mrs. Kasinger said of TCTA. "We work behind the scenes. We get the information out and let you decide for yourselves - that's the key."

However, she said she does

believe in putting blame where blame is due.

"Sometimes we want to put the blame on someone for all the troubles we have had in education," she said. "I like to put blame where blame is deserved and I think you can put most of it in the lap of our governor and I think you can put a good deal of it in the laps of our unions."

Mrs. Kasinger was just one of several state TCTA leaders on hand for the banquet held in the Colorado Middle School cafeteria. Also present were Walt Staats of Colorado City and Francine Allen of Snyder, formerly of Colorado City, state board members, and Wendell Whittenburg of Sweetwater, president-elect of TCTA.

Burnett said when the next session of the legislature convenes Jan. 13, lawmakers will be looking at a "shortfall" in the budget of \$6-7 billion, but he said that education should remain at the same funding level "if not at a higher level."

"You have to realize that in 1972, \$1.3 billion was what the public education cost the taxpayers," he said. "In 1985, that was at \$5.4 billion. Much has been put into public education over the last 13 years."

Burnett said he thinks the main issue in education during

the next legislative session will be whether or not to have an elected state board of education. He said he thinks there is a move underway to continue with an

appointed board.

"The no pass, no play rule is here to stay," he said, but predicted the controversial issue to be "fine tuned" during the

next session. "I would imagine that the sit-out period would be less than six weeks," he said.

## Roach named hospital chief of staff

Colorado City's newest physician, Dr. Dee Roach, M.D., has been named chief of staff of Mitchell County Hospital, it was announced at Tuesday night's hospital board meeting.

Ray Mason, hospital administrator, said Roach was elected chief of staff during a recent meeting of the staff. Dr. Thomas Aguilon was formerly chief of staff.

The announcement came during the board's routine approval of the medical staff for the

coming year. The board extended full-time staff privileges to Roach, Aguilon, Dr. Rod Caldwell and Dr. Joe Terry. Dental privileges were extended to Colorado City dentists Drs. Billy B. Bridgford and H. J. Steakley. Approval also was given to Ruby Lee, the hospital's full-time certified registered nurse anesthetist.

The board also reviewed and approved the bylaws of the hospital and nursing home and approved a three-year plan to be

used as a guideline for capital purchases.

Assistant administrator and comptroller Richard Murphy presented the financial reports for the hospital and nursing home and noted that September 30 ended the fiscal year.

He said the hospital had \$142,000 in cash at the end of September and that "the cash standing is far superior than it was a year ago."

Murphy noted that the September income for the hospital

was up "primarily due to an increase in admissions and an increase in patient days." There were 24 more admissions in September than the previous month.

Murphy said that disputed prior Medicare claims by the hospital could result in additional \$314,000 payments to hospital for the period from September, 1984 to July 31 of this year. Murphy said it will take about two weeks to hear from Medicare about the claims.

Murphy said for the fiscal year which ended Sept. 30, total operating revenues for the hospital net of adjustments were \$144,024 below budget. However, total current revenues for the year exceed last year's revenues by \$149,421 for a 9.5 percent gain.

He said expenses for the year were \$114,263 under budget with labor 5.4 percent under, supplies 6.1 percent under and other

Johnson, 19, of Colorado City, is charged in the March 23 slaying of a Snyder convenience store clerk. Also charged and awaiting trial is Amanda Lynn Miles, 19, also of Colorado City.

"There will be a move probably to ditch the career ladder for teachers," he said. "There was talk about that in the special session."

Burnett pointed out that local school districts have financial problems and that if the price of oil is in the \$14-15 a barrel range the first of January, school districts will be faced with having to raise taxes to bring in the same amount of tax dollars generated by the \$22 a barrel value placed on oil now.

Weatherby, last to speak on the program, said that he is concerned with the education system in Texas and said it is time to take "politics out of education."

"We need to get a long-range plan, something to get us through the next five to 10 years," he said. "And we can't do that with politics."

"We need an elected state board of education and we need to get more teachers in the decision-making process," he said.

Weatherby told how he and his wife as substitute teachers saw "some of the problems in the classroom," citing paper work and discipline as two areas of

concern.

"As far as discipline goes, my wife was locked out of her class by a hostile sixth grade group," he said.

"Taking aim at Burnett, Weatherby told those in the audience that they should ask Burnett why he supported free education for illegal aliens and why "he (Burnett) didn't say anything about House Bill 72 as an issue until after it had already passed."

"Mr. Burnett has received the endorsement of TSTA (Texas State Teachers Association) and I told their representatives that I didn't think we needed any labor unions in our public education system," he said.

Entertainment was provided by Colorado High School choir director David Shelton who was accompanied by Connie Penland at the piano. Mrs. Kasinger also closed her remarks with a duet with her husband, David, who accompanied on the guitar.

Kitten Arthur, president of the local CTA, was master of ceremonies for the evening.

expenses 1 percent under.

For the month of September, the hospital had a total operating loss of \$57,865 but had a total net income of \$145,878 because of tax money supplements in the amount of \$210,000.

Valley Fair Lodge finished the fiscal year with an operating loss of \$63,594, some \$56,000 under the budgeted amount of \$120,000. Total revenues for the year exceeded the previous year by \$45,859. Total operating revenues continue to exceed budget by \$29,638, or 5.1 percent excess.

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YOU PROBABLY WILL NOT HEAR THIS:**

The big banks of Texas hope to create a bank monopoly at your expense. Proposition Four has disguised branch banking as "full service banking." 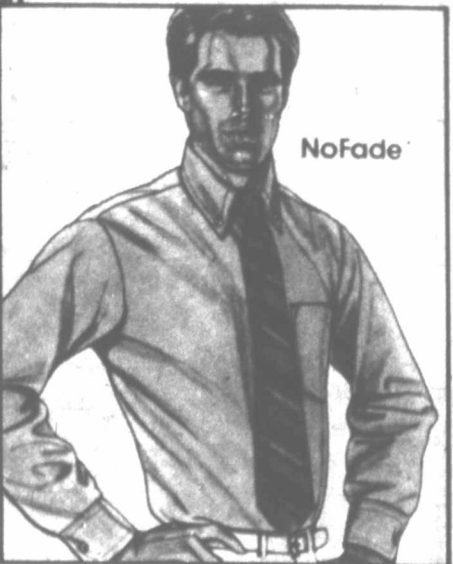

## Candidates answer question on finances

The Texas governor's race has become a heated debate between incumbent Mark White, a Democrat, and his Republican challenger Bill Clements. Voters also have a third choice in the Nov. 4 general election with Libertarian candidate Theresa S. Doyle of San Antonio.

A capsule of each candidate has been provided by the League of Women Voters of Texas which asked the candidates how they will deal with the severe financial crisis facing the state:

**Mark White**, a lawyer by training, has served as attorney general, secretary of state and governor.

"I have recently outlined to the Legislature my plan for balancing the state budget. We have proposed dramatic cuts in appropriations totaling \$1.4 billion. Because we are committed to continuing the progress we have made in education, I have drawn the line at taking any money that has been designated to maintaining educational excellence and have, therefore, called up on the Legislature to impose a temporary increase of the state sales tax by 1.1-8 cents.

"We have to fix this current crisis with our current tax system. But we must face the fact that the current structure no longer fits the changing Texas economy. We must work to reform not only our sales tax, but also property taxes, severance taxes - all those taxes that are getting out of step with changing times and a changing Texas economy. I will make recommendations to the Legis-

lature in January to reform our system."

**Bill Clements**, former Governor, said:

"We don't have a financial crisis as much as we have a leadership crisis. The \$37.2 billion state budget is at an all time high. Tax revenue under three years of Mark White's administration has increased 38 percent, and yet we are facing at least a \$2.2 billion deficit. For the first time in 25 years, the state ended its fiscal year with a quarter billion dollar deficit. We need to curtail our spending and live within our means.

"I will follow the same sound business principles that worked during my first term: instituting audits by private businesses of each agency to identify and eliminate waste, duplication and inefficiency; requiring agencies to prioritize spending and incorporating management by objective. During my term no new taxes were imposed and state government lived within its means. White has raised or proposed to raise taxes every year he's been in office."

**Theresa S. Doyle** is a former schoolteacher and a housewife. Her reply to the question is:

"That the government of Texas is experiencing a financial crisis is the result of its stepping out of its proper role as protector of individual rights and into the position of paternalistic planner. That the private sector of Texas is also experiencing a financial crisis is the result of intervention by government (at all levels) into the free market process.

"People are creative and cooperative. It is natural for them to produce and to participate in a voluntary exchange of goods and services. The only way to prosperity is to allow this process to flourish. Taxation and regulation by government increases business costs and results in unemployment and business failures. Without hindrance, success or failure will rightfully belong to individuals. Let us begin now to reduce the size and role of government to the functions of protecting lives and adjudicating disputes.

## Wolves hopeful of win over Wylie

Clyde High School's victory over Colorado City Friday night cleared up the district 5AAA race for the Bulldogs while four other teams are still pondering the possibilities.

The state ranked Ballinger Bearcats continue to rule with a 5-0 district mark and third ranked 8-0 season record. Clyde's 49-14 win over the Wolves kept the Bulldogs one game behind the Bearcats at 4-1 and 5-3.

To capture the district runner-up spot, all Clyde has to do is win one of its two remaining games against Sonora and Wylie.

Brady, a winner over Coahoma Friday, also stands at 4-1 but faces Merkel tomorrow and Ballinger next week. Clyde's earlier win over Brady gives Clyde the edge in case of a second place tie between the Bulldog clubs.

Should Clyde falter in the last two weeks it would put Brady back into prime contention unless Brady loses to Merkel tomorrow which would open up a bigger can of worms—even the possibility of a five way tie for second.

Sonora and Wylie are very much in it—especially since they're the teams Clyde faces to end the season. The Broncos win over Wylie Friday left both

teams at 2-3 along with Merkel. Those 2-3 teams can see their way to a playoff spot by ganging up to deal Clyde and Brady losses.

That leaves out in the cold the 0-5 Coahoma Bulldogs and the 1-4 Colorado City Wolves, who host the Wylie Bulldogs tomorrow at 8 p.m. and end the season next Friday here against Sonora.

"Clyde was really quick," said Colorado High School head coach Tom Ramsey. "Probably as quick as Ballinger."

The Bulldogs scored on six of their first seven possessions and held a 35-0 halftime lead.

At 1-6-1, the Wolves can already look forward to next year

when they return 16 lettermen, almost as many starters and a group of quality athletes from this year's junior varsity.

That doesn't mean the Wolves consider the rest of the season meaningless. Coach Ramsey insists on productive workouts—whether in August or November.

"If I can find a ball and a needle we'll practice."

The Wolves won't be going anywhere this year, but victories at any time go under the win column and are remembered most.

"The next two games will be the last for our seniors."

They want to go out with a good showing. A good ending to this season would make the best

beginning for next season.

"Wylie's an up and down team. I think their big loss to Ballinger really hurt them."

The Bulldogs were in control of their destiny until Friday's loss to Sonora.

Ramsey said as quarterback Jeff Quick goes so go the Bulldogs. "He's been up and down."

Colorado City runningback and linebacker Jerry Hulme will be back in No. 20 this week after seeing line duty as No. 64 Friday night. Senior running back Terry Jackson never recovered from a deep thigh bruise.

The Wolves dominated Wylie here last year only to have the Bulldogs escape with a 13-12 win.

## Bulldogs could end up with undefeated season

The 1986 Loraine High School football team stands a good chance of going undefeated with a 7-0 record.

An unblemished Bulldogs record would have an asterisk through.

It would read that the Gold and Black were beaten on the field in week number five and despite an undefeated regular season missed the playoffs.

"I want the people to know that this is their store and we want their business," he said. "We want to have on hand what the customers want to purchase."

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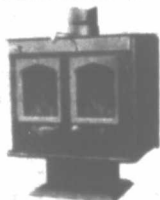
