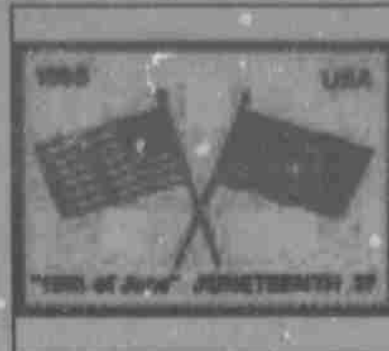

Second Big Town Hall Meeting Set For Sunday Night, February 28th

The second Big Town Hall meeting about the increase of burglaries and robberies will be held Sunday evening, February 28, 2010, at The Bridge, 1301 Redbud Avenue, beginning at 7:00 p.m.

More than 100 residents were in attendance at the last meeting on Sunday, January 31, 2010. There was much discussion about these problems. Several residents gave their concerns about what should be done.

"The meeting on Sunday will be more specific about what we should be doing," said Donnell Hooper, one of the coordinators of the meeting.

"We need the help of the entire community so we can come forward and take proper actions to help solve these problems," continued Hooper.

"We would appreciate it very much if Chief Dale Halton who insist that the Lubbock officers would know the residents of the areas in which they patrol," said Larry Alexander. "Once they become more involved with the residents, they can combat other crimes which happen in the community," he continued.

"You know in a community where the Lubbock police know everyone, this would decrease opportunities for crack houses, break ins and home invasions," said Alexander.

"This is not a cure all solution, but would an opportunity to

solve one problem at a time," said Eddie P. Richardson. "This would begin with home invasions and thieves and robbery, as this would increase a success story," he continued.

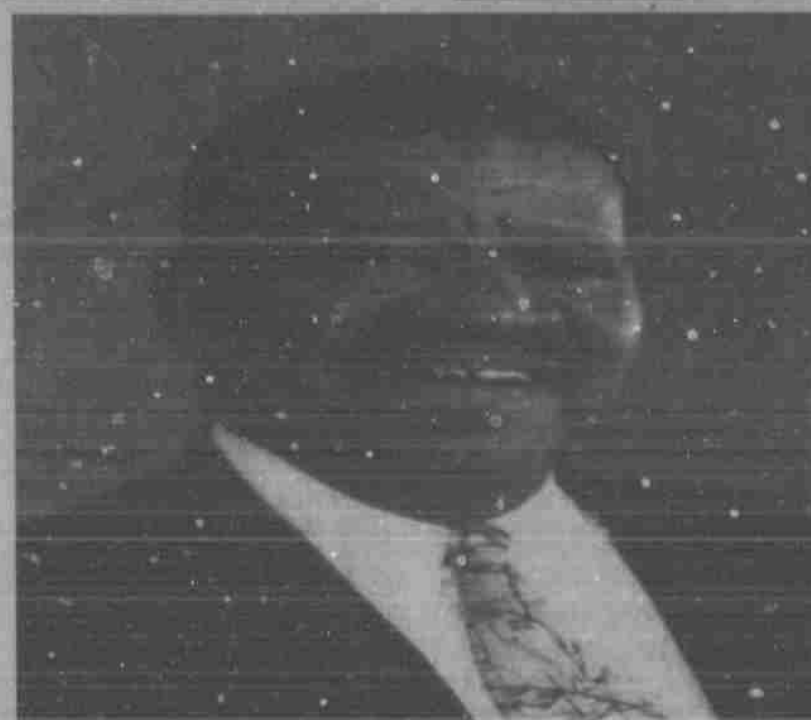
"We want to continue these kinds of meetings to let the entire community know what we can be doing to make our community a much better place to raise our children," said Hillary Hutchinson.

T. J. Patterson, Sr. T. J. Patterson Will Be Honored By

Congressman Neugebauer In Special Recognition Friday

During Black History Month, tributes are always paid to African Americans who struggled with adversity and made great contributions to shaping our nation. In Lubbock, T. J. Patterson, Sr. has made a true difference in the community and exemplified the role of a public servant.

In 1977, T. J., co-founded the *Southwest Digest* with Eddie P. Richardson, a newspaper that has served a strong voice for Lubbock's African-American community for over 39 years.

In 1984, T. J. was the first African-American elected to serve on the Lubbock City Council. T. J.'s many accomplishments have made him a pillar in the community and a role model for young people.

He was instrumental at the state level where he was the first African-American elected as President of the Texas Municipal

League (TML), and was instrumental in organizing the Texas Association of City Council Members (TABCCM), serving as its first president.

Patterson has also served as a Board of Director of the National League Cities (NLC), and chairman of the Energy, Environment, Natural Resources (EENR) steering committee.

In celebration of Black History Month, Congressman Randy Neugebauer will recognize Patterson for his dedication to the 19th Congressional District of Texas, as well his leadership in honoring Black History Month in Lubbock.

A special presentation will be made Friday morning, February 19, 2010, at the Bobbie Gean & T. J. Patterson Library, 1836 Parkway Drive, beginning at 11:00 a.m.

The public is invited to attend this special recognition.

From the Desk of Parson D.A. Smith
"An Empathic Civilization"

Jeremy Rifkin, author, "The Empathic Civilization: The Race to Global Consciousness in a World in Crisis" asked the question "Why have we become so uncivil?"

The meaning of "empathy" is 1: the imaginative projection of a subjective state into an object so that the object appears to be infused with it. 2. The action of understanding, being aware of, being sensitive to, and vicariously experiencing the feelings, thoughts, and experience of another either the past or present without having the feelings, thoughts, and experience fully communicated in an objectively explicit manner; also: the capacity for this—Merriam Webster. Rifkin noted in an article this month that: President Obama has made an unprecedented plea for civility in public discourse. Washington insiders say they can't ever recall a period in America public life as full of anger and polarization as now. TV and radio talk show host in particular, have fanned the flames of hatred with occasional outrageous personal attacks on public figures and advocates of

policy agendas with which they disagree. If we continue along this toxic road, it could lead to unfathomable damage to the America psyche. The question is "Why is the United States becoming so uncivil?"

Rifkin noted: "When we talk about civility, we are really talking about empathy: the willingness to listen to another's point of view, to put one's self in another shoes and to emotionally and cognitively experience what they are feeling and thinking. 'To civilize is to empathize.'" Below all of the fiery rhetoric and finger pointing, the acid comment and degrading personal attacks, is a deep-seated fear and mistrust of the "other" — in other words, a lack of empathy.

The thoughts of Rifkin's can be seen in our community of Lubbock. For example if one type in blogs Lubbock online.com/conservative category/fascism—one could see how uncivil and racist the mindset that is eating at the core of our community. What is so unfortunate is these sons of perdition cannot see they are hastening

their own Armageddon. The idea suggested by the current governor and the fools of Lubbock who believe his bull that Texas will secede from the United States is ludicrous. This writer is embarrassed every time Chris Matthews on MSNBC refer to the governor of Texas as the "secessionist" governor.

If the governor and his "fools of a new paradise free from minorities" is not enough for one not to believe we are under a cloud of an empathic civilization, Stephanie Mencimer recently wrote... "thanks be to Glenn Beck, the National Review, New Gingrich and others, have fuel a firestorm of right-wing paranoia that President Obama has secret police with the power to knock down doors and arrest law-abiding America citizens. Mencimer noted that Interpol agents don't even carry guns and have no right to arrest people, and that its American office boasts all of five people. Mencimer also noted the hysteria over Executive Order 12425 is not confined to the Tea Party movement but has reached the highest levels of

In Black Caucus, a Fund-Raising Powerhouse

WASHINGTON — When the Congressional Black Caucus wanted to pay off the mortgage on its foundation's stately 1930s redbrick headquarters on Embassy Row, it turned to a familiar roster of friends: corporate backers like Wal-Mart, AT&T, General Motors, Coca-Cola and Altria, the nation's largest tobacco company.

Soon enough, in 2008, a jazz band was playing at what amounted to a mortgage-burning party for the \$4 million town house.

Most political groups in Washington would have been barred by law from accepting that kind of direct aid from corporations. But by taking advantage of political finance laws, the caucus has built a fund-raising juggernaut unlike anything else in town.

It has a traditional political fund-raising arm subject to federal rules. But it also has a network of nonprofit groups and charities that allow it to collect unlimited amounts of money from corporations and labor unions.

From 2004 to 2008, the Congressional Black Caucus's political and charitable wings took in at least \$55 million in corporate and union contributions, according to an analysis by The New York

Times, an impressive amount even by the standards of a Washington awash in cash. Only \$1 million of that went to the caucus's political action committee; the rest poured into the largely unregulated nonprofit network. (Data for 2009 is not available.)

The caucus says its nonprofit groups are intended to help disadvantaged African-Americans by providing scholarships and internships to students, researching policy and holding seminars on topics like healthy living.

But the bulk of the money has been spent on elaborate conventions that have become a high point of the Washington social season, as well as the headquarters building, golf outings by members of Congress and an annual visit to a Mississippi casino resort.

In 2008, the Congressional Black Caucus Foundation spent more on the caterer for its signature legislative dinner and conference — nearly \$700,000 for an event one organizer called "Hollywood on the Potomac" — than it gave out in scholarships, federal tax records show.

At the galas, lobbyists and executives who give to caucus charities get to mingle with lawmakers.

Being tagged the first black pairs skaters is not a disadvantage, they insist.

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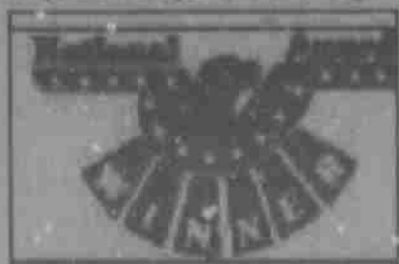

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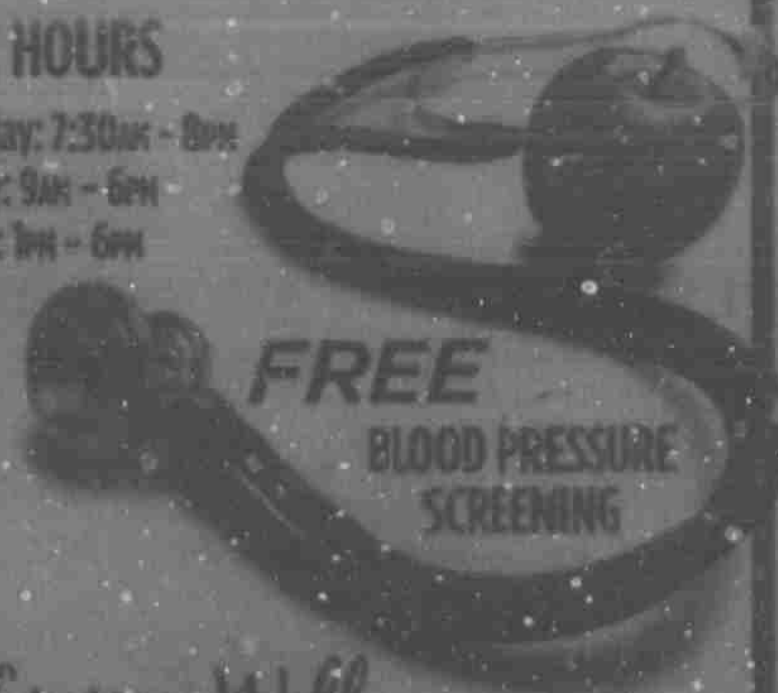
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
