DEMO HOSTS GATHER AT HOT SPRINGS

NOTIFICATION FOR ROBINSON DRAWS THROG

OFFICIAL HOLIDAY IN HONOR OF NOMINEE FOR ARKANSAS

HOT SPRINGS, Ark., Aug. 30.—From the four corners of the nation, Democrats were trooping today into this valley of the Ozarks for the formal notification of a Southerner, Senator Joe T. Robinson of Arkansas, of his selection as the party's vice-presidential nominee.

They found a city bedecked for the occasion, and nearly every one expressed surprise at the natural beauty of the little amphitheater in which the ceremonies will be held tonight.

The Senator, in order to greet personally as many of the visitors as possible, had arranged to be up early and also had disposed of his business so as to have the day free to devote himself to welcoming friends.

Preparations for the ceremonies were completed last night. Before retiring, the senator spent a few minutes testing out the amplifiers which have been installed to carry his voice to the distant corners of the amphitheater and also well up the mountain sides where many are expected to gather.

From every hotel, bath house and office building floated red, white and blue streamers while the streets were arched at intervals with banners, among them several bearing the inscription: "Our Joe, next vice president."

CURTIS RAPS DEMOPOLICY

ASSAILS TARIFF ON FARM PRODUCTS IN ADDRESS

HARRISBURG, Pa., Aug. 30 (AP).—The democratic tariff policy, particularly as related to agriculture, was attacked by Senator Curtis, republican vice presidential nominee, in a speech here today before members of the National Grange.

He declared that if the democrats are returned to power nothing could be expected from them "but an immediate revision of the tariff," and said many democratic leaders already had committed themselves to such a policy.

In the eleven months ending August, 1921, when wheat was on the free list, the senator said, "Canada sold \$90,472,000 worth of wheat to the United States. During the fiscal year ending June 30, 1928, Canada sold us wheat to the amount of \$19,801,447, about \$80,000,000 less of foreign wheat to compete with farmers of the United States. For the 11 months ending August, 1921, when wheat flour was on the free list, Canada sold to the United States wheat flour valued at more than 12 million dollars, while in the last year the wheat flour imported was about one half million dollars."

"The figures show that wheat imported from Canada for the week ending April 6, 1923, the week before the order was issued increasing the duty on wheat from 30 to 42 cents per bushel, was 2,260,000 bushels, while only 37,000 were imported during the week after the order became effective. But why go on and on? Pennsylvania are well informed on the imports from our neighbors across the border."

DENY BOOST TO BE ASKED ON OIL LIMIT

WINKLER COMMITTEE REFUTES RUMORS FROM GOTHAM

NEW YORK, Aug. 30 (AP).—Wall street heard today that the advisory committee in charge of the production of crude oil production in Winkler county, West Texas, one of the four large pools in which the crude yield is restricted under agreement, contemplates asking the Texas government to order an increase in production at least to 200,000 barrels daily. At present their permitted production is 175,000 barrels daily. The committee is divided on the subject, it is understood, some members being opposed to any increase because of the large yields being held back elsewhere in Texas, increased yields in California and growing productions in Oklahoma.

Present Output 75,000 Barrels

PORT WORTH, Aug. 30 (AP).—The Winkler county advisory committee is not planning to ask the Texas railroad commission for permission to increase the allowed crude oil output of the pool from 175,000 to 200,000 barrels daily, according to J. D. Collett, Port Worth, independent operator and chairman of the committee. Collett's statement was made as a result of reports from New York that such a step was contemplated.

"The matter was discussed by the committee," Collett said, but all finally decided that it was not justified at this time.

Eaton Says Cotton Pest Menace Not Yet Critical

A serious problem and an optimistic body of men locked horns at luncheon today with the result that the problem was eventually decided to be less serious.

The problem was the boll worm menace and the body of men the Kiwanis club, in regular weekly session at the Hotel Lubbock.

D. P. Eaton, Lubbock county agent, and Don L. Jones, head of the state experimental farm here, discussed the present agricultural condition of this county leaving it "neither in the cellar nor bumping its head against the ceiling, but on middle ground."

Continuing that many of the insects causing alarm were harmless bugs and that the present situation was by no means critical, Mr. Eaton asked the business men of the city to hold their nerves until the problem became serious or disappeared.

Depends on Weather
Mr. Jones said that Lubbock should be neither over optimistic nor pessimistic. "At the present time we have a fair crop," he told the Kiwanians. "The possibilities are good but it all depends on the weather from now on."

Depicting a diversification trend for the department of agriculture, Jones encouraged feeding out, grain raising, dairying and poultry raising as the best insurance against any kind of crop failure.

CROPS BETTER SAYS MONTHLY BANK REPORT

DALLAS, Aug. 30 (AP).—Improvement in the condition of growing crops, a good wheat crop harvested and marketed at fair prices, cotton in fair to good shape in all sections except south Texas and in isolated localities elsewhere, and a material change for the better in the livestock industry are noted in the monthly business review of the Federal Reserve bank of Dallas, dated September 1 and issued today.

The indicated yield of corn in the eleventh reserve district, which includes Arizona and Oklahoma is substantially above the average production, says the report. Most minor crops promise fair to good yields.

Wheat Menace Cited
Calling attention to the August 1 report of the department of agriculture the district's largest cash crop—cotton—this year would reach the second highest total on record. The reserve bank continues:

"Nevertheless, it must be borne in mind that the fields in most sections are infested with weevils or other insects and while damage to date has been slight, except in a few instances, the presence of insects in large numbers presents a serious potential danger to the crop which may serve to greatly reduce the yield."

While conditions in some portions of the livestock area had become acute prior to the July rains, grain in practically all sections has been revived and has made rapid growth in recent weeks. Since improvement.

Plainview Boosts For City Airport

PLAINVIEW, Aug. 30.—The Plainview board of city development will investigate the feasibility of establishing an airport at Plainview within the immediate future according to an action taken at its regular meeting Tuesday evening when an airport committee headed by R. H. Knochlin was named.

The committee will make a study of the requirements for an airport, and report back to the board such recommendations as it cares to make after the study is completed.

\$36,000 Bonds In County Are Okeed

Bond issues totalling \$36,000 for three Lubbock county independent school districts were approved yesterday by Assistant Attorney General D. L. Whitehurst, according to advices from Austin last night.

The independent school districts affected include Liberty, Wolfarth and Hurwood. The amount of the issues were: Liberty, \$4,000; Wolfarth, \$20,000; and Hurwood, \$12,000.

RUMOR WRECK OF AMUNDSEN PLANE FOUND

TRACE OF CRAFT IS DISCOVERED IN NORTH NORWAY

LONDON, Aug. 30 (AP).—An Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Copenhagen, says the Oslo Aftenposten has received a message from Harstad reporting a rumor of the finding of wreckage in North Norway believed to have come from the Latham plane in which Roald Amundsen disappeared last June.

The advices said there was a disposition to receive the report with caution until further investigation could be made.

NEW YORK, Aug. 30 (AP).—The finding of a wrecked Latham airplane in the sea near Vesteralsen, North Norway, was reported today in a cablegram from Oslo to Herndon S. Prentice.

Prentice, who was American chairman of two Roald Amundsen expeditions, said he believed the plane was the French craft in which Amundsen and his companions were lost in the search for Italia disaster survivors.

Last Gap In Orient Rail Line Compete

ALPINE, Aug. 30 (AP).—The last gap in the Kansas City, Mexico and Orient railway between Topolobampo, western terminus on the Gulf of Lower California, and the American border at Ojinaga, opposite Presidio, Texas, is expected to be completed about Sept. 15.

Robert D. Wade, territorial manager of the Railway Guide, just concluding a tour of the line, said General Don Travino, superintendent of the Orient operations in Mexico, expects the gap to be bridged by mid-September.

City Sets Example For New Ordinance

The city of Lubbock believes in the old saying, "practice what you preach."

In keeping with an ordinance passed by the city commission recently concerning livestock within the city limits, the city started this morning to move the city barns outside of the created zone.

Located on 5th street between Avenues J and K, the barns are being moved near the dumping grounds and the city incinerator.

"We are setting the example and we expect others having stock within the city limits to follow," City Manager Gus McCleary said this morning.

Attempted Robbery Of Katy Train Frustrated

PARSONS, Kas., Aug. 30 (AP).—An apparent attempt to halt and rob Missouri-Kansas-Texas passenger train No. 22, bound for Kansas City was frustrated between Erie and Kimball, Kas., today when an armed and unidentified man boarded the engine and was overpowered.

Whether the man had accomplices was not determined. He was taken in charge by William Bailey, Katy special agent, and placed in jail at Fort Scott. The chief of police at Norton said the man either was too intoxicated or too daunted from the beating he received to tell his name.

Information received here was that the man, believed to have boarded the train at Parsons, climbed into the cab of the locomotive at a point between Erie and Kimball, 25 miles north of here and covered Engineer Ward and Fireman Lewis with his gun.

He was knocked down and disarmed, and Bailey was called to take him in charge.

SPANISH FORK, Utah, Aug. 30 (AP).—A police late today charged a second slaying within a week to Miguel Secordino, 23. Two other persons are dead as a result of the first killing last Sunday.

James E. Wilkerson, 28, a night watchman, was found early today lying in a pool of blood in the store here where he was employed. A bullet, puncturing his lung, had ended his life.

Florino Pacheco, 21, was shot and fatally wounded early Monday morning in the business district at Bingham, Utah.

Deputy Sheriff Oscar Fulmer, 50, of Salt Lake county, and his Mexican interpreter, Paul Berra, 26, while giving chase to the killer, were dashed 400 feet over a precipice to their death several hours later.

Police Seek Girl Bandit In Dallas

DALLAS, Aug. 30 (AP).—Police today were seeking a pretty woman bandit and her male escort who last night robbed two drug store deliveries here. In each instance the couple, driving a green roadster, accomplished their purpose without the use of firearms.

After ordering a small package of merchandise and requesting that change be sent for a \$10 bill, the pair sat in front of the designated residence in their automobile. When the boy appeared, they took the package and change as the woman held out the bill to the boy. Before he could seize the bill, the driver started the car and sped away.

ILL-FATED PLANE, IN WHICH TWO CRASHED TO DEATH, WAS LINDBERGH'S NEW MACHINE

(By The Associated Press)

BOND EDDY, Pa., Aug. 30.—The bodies of the two aviators, Mabel M. Merrill and Edwin Ronne, lost on a flight from Buffalo to New York were found at dawn today in the wilderness near this little town by five residents of Milford.

The body of one of the men was in the wreckage, the other body was found in the brush fifteen feet ahead, where it had been hurled when the Curtis-Falcon plane crashed.

There was no fire, the rescuers said. The plane was smashed to pieces.

Before it crashed the plane, owned by Colonel Charles Lindbergh, tore the top from a tall pine tree, 400 yards from where it plunged nose down into the ground.

The motor and fuselage of the plane were buried in a hole, five feet deep and twenty feet wide. When it hit, the plane broke in half. The wreckage of the rear half was found a hundred yards ahead of the motor. In this was one of the bodies.

The wreck was found a half mile off the abandoned Pond Eddy road. The bodies will be packed out to the road by the rescuers and taken in a wagon to Milford where an inquest will be held.

The bodies were not badly mangled, rescuers said, although the clothes had been torn off the body thrown clear of the wreckage. Even the shoes were gone.

COUNTY AGENT ADVISES FARMERS TO PLANT MORE IN GRAIN

"More wheat should be planted in Lubbock county," he said, "for grazing if for no other reason. Grazing alone will more than pay for itself. This year's wheat in this county was short, but it is indicated from reports of farmers that the tendency is to plant more of the grain next year."

Mr. Eaton advised an early planting of wheat. He suggested that it be planted in September or October.

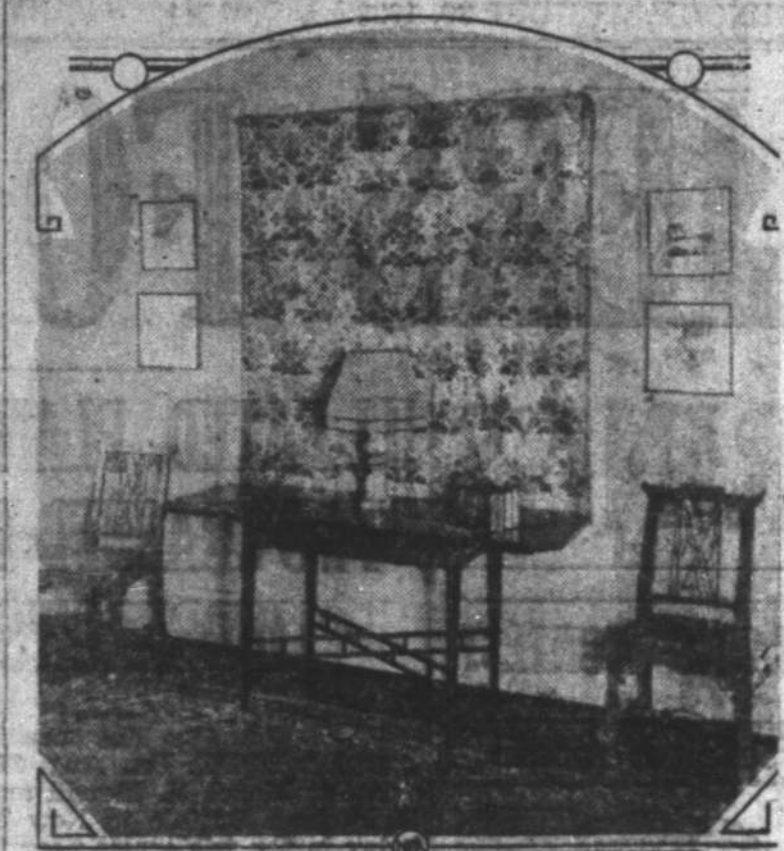

"If you weren't stopped," said Police Chief Freeman to Skinner, "You'd make Evanston dogless. And that would be too doggone bad."

The chief told Skinner the dog catcher's records showed 1,336 dogs have been captured since March 1.

"That's a lot of dogs," the police head said in informing Skinner his dog catching duties were about to terminate. "You caught all kinds, muzzled and unmuzzled, licensed and unlicensed, thoroughbreds and just plain dogs. The human society complains you also shot several that you couldn't catch."

"It appears you are altogether too good at catching dogs to be a good dog catcher," Gene Deservi was appointed to succeed Skinner. Upon his appointment Deservi issued a statement.

"No dog," he said, "need fear that I will take undue advantage of his authority. Every dog will have his day, and every day his dog."

Four marshals of France, Foch, Petain, Lyautey and Franchet D'Esperey, gold starred batons in hand, marched as mourners, followed by Premier Poincare and the cabinet members, behind the casket-laden gun carriage.

Joffre was the only marshal absent from the procession. He was unable to participate because of ill health.

Scarface Named In Philadelphia Quiz

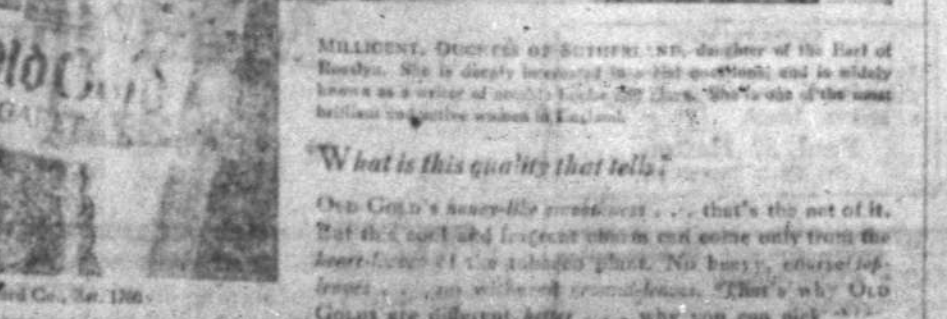

LEARNING TO BE AN AIR PILOT

YOUNG PILOTS ARE WARNED TO KEEP WITHIN EASY GLIDING DISTANCE OF FIELD

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the sixth of a series of articles in which Captain Malcolm J. Buchanan, writer for The Journal and NEA Service, explains the use of the airplane and how to operate it. Buchanan was a pilot with the U. S. Army Air Corps on the Western front during the World War and is now on the editorial staff of the Ft. Worth Press.

By Capt. Malcolm Buchanan

One of the many things that the new pilot has had impressed upon his mind is that a landing field must always be kept within striking distance. This precaution not only applies to new pilots but to those of experience.

The beginner is warned to keep within gliding distance of the field at all times. This distance varies because the gliding angle of planes varies. The less weight per square foot on the wing area the greater the distance the plane will travel forward from any given height. Thus a plane weighing 500 pounds will glide approximately twice as far from the 100-foot altitude as one weighing 1000 pounds, even though they have the same wing spread.

A landing 20 feet in the air and a sudden drop to the ground is a usual stunt for the beginner. This causes the ship to bounce and the landing has to be done over again, this time without any forward speed unless the student thinks to open the motor in time.

The first solo landing is a real experience. Sometimes the pilot gets excited and furnishes some amusement for the spectators. Perhaps he may decide to turn loose and let the plane make its own landing. This method usually ends in disaster.

Not Fanny Far George

A thing which happened to a companion student during my training days is an example.

Our class was out on the field, each man waiting his turn to fly the new and numerous and none too trustworthy training ships. We were doing a lot of ground flying—discussing the feelings and sensations of the first solo. My friend, we shall call him George, did not take an active part in the humorous aspects of the discussion. With him it was a serious matter.

His turn came and he climbed into the cockpit. Then he fastened his seat belt and getting fixed in the seat. He made a nice take-off, made the proper circles at designated places, and finally got around to the other end of the field preparatory to landing. Down he came—just right until he got near the ground. Then he lost his nerve. Just when the job was all but finished he decided that every thing was wrong.

He pulled open the motor and shot skyward in a steep climb. Around the field he went again and in for a landing. This time he had too much speed and he overshot the landing field, which was a large one. George made two more attempts, but each time he lost his nerve. The landing attempts were either too short, too fast, too slow, too low, or too high. So he decided to stay up and not land until he had to.

The gas was good for about 45 minutes, at the end of which time the motor began to sputter. Then it stopped.

Down came George—He landed his ship, but wrong side up.

George said he remembered trying to land the ship but couldn't recall the details. This pilot turned out to be a real flyer and later he brought down several German planes over the lines. George learned from this experience that

when a job was to be done — to go ahead and do it and not wait for a thing to take its own course.

Open Country

A flyer should try to keep over open country when he is in the air as it always affords, in case of forced landings, a place to set down his ship with reasonable safety. All the air routes over the country are mapped out with the idea that the best route is over smooth country.

Of course there are times when woods, broken country, mountains and lakes must be crossed and in such cases the pilot usually gets enough altitude to glide to a smooth landing place. The present day motors and planes are not so dependent on level country but it is highly desirable. Pilots will have forced landings for some time to come.

A pilot also should know how to distinguish between smooth and rough landing fields. A field may appear ever so smooth from the air but when the wheels of a fast moving plane hit the ground it is sometimes found that the eyes have deceived the mind. Any field which has crop rows planted in a poor place to land. The ground is soft and unless the plane lands with the rows the machine may turn over on its back.

Pasture land looks smooth from a high altitude but when the aviator nears the ground he can sometimes see contours similar to those on a relief map. They are difficult to see at noonday as the sun casts no shadow, but in the forenoon or afternoon the shadow is cast and the rough places stand out. High grass can be detected because it appears as waves or ripples. Grass is dangerous as it will sometimes catch on the wheels or break the propeller. Wet ground is darker than dry and can be distinguished from a great height — a good thing to watch as an airplane can stick in the mud.

The day is coming (things are working to this end even now) when every town of size throughout the country will have its name displayed for the air traveler. Emergency landing fields already have been established along air routes and even the smaller towns are inviting air visitors by furnishing small fields for planes.

POISONING BY HOME BREW IS CHARGED PAIR

CONSPIRACY IN DEATH OF HUSBAND HELD TO WOMAN

(By Associated Press)
NEW BRITAIN, Conn., Aug. 30.—Mrs. Katherine Weiss and Samuel Weiss, her brother-in-law, were held by police tonight under bond on the theory that they conspired the death of the woman's husband by putting poison in home brew beer from which two others also died.

After questioning Samuel Weiss tonight, detectives said no progress had been made in efforts to prove poison found in John Stehr's stomach was put into the beer.

The third victim of the brew is John Stehr, 40, who drank a bottle today "to show that the deaths of Weiss and Stehr on Sunday night were not caused by the stuff."

Records at police headquarters revealed Mrs. Weiss and her brother-in-law ran away together on August 1, 1927, and that John Weiss was arrested that day for fighting with his brother. Since that date Weiss complained to police that his brother and his wife had disappeared on several occasions.

LEGION MEET IS CONCLUDED

FORT ARTHUR CHOSEN NEXT LONE STAR MEETING PLACE

(By Associated Press)
TEXARKANA, Tex., Aug. 30.—Calm that follows a storm hung over Texarkana today as its citizens bade farewell to several thousand delegates to the joint convention of Arkansas and Texas Legionnaires.

Streets that for three days and nights echoed to the strains of martial music and happy shouting men seemed strangely silent, and hotel lobbies appeared deserted in comparison to their mad crush for 72 hours. Employees of the city were busy clearing the streets of an accumulation of litter and the populace was preparing to make up for lost sleep.

At the close of the session of the two state departments Wednesday, officers were elected and sites selected for next year's conventions. Rufe Scott of Paris was elected state commander for Texas, and Fort Arthur was chosen the 1929 Lone Star convention city.

The Arkansas delegates elected Dr. L. J. Kosminsky of Texarkana to the office of commander, and named Blytheville their next meeting place.

The Arkansas delegation, weary from their three days activity and anxious to get home, rushed through their closing session record time, but the Texans put in the entire day wrangling over proposed resolutions and constitutional amendments. The Longhorns finally decided after a wordy argument to retain the present staff of state officers until after the national at San Antonio.

Leonard Withington of Fort Worth, sponsor of the measure, successfully contended that a new staff taking charge this time would be seriously handicapped in arranging for the big conclave.

SMITH DELIVERS SECOND ADDRESS SINCE NOTIFIED

By D. HAROLD OLIVER
(Associated Press Staff Writer)
SYRACUSE, N. Y., Aug. 30.—After his second speech since he was notified of his selection as democratic presidential candidate, Gov. Smith today was the central figure of a gathering of state politicians here to name a new party chairman and also of the daily throng that is turning out for the New York State Fair.

A meeting of the democratic state committee was called to ratify the selection of M. William Bray, of Utica, as chairman to succeed Lieutenant Governor Edwin Cornigan, resigned. Gov. Smith said he would have nothing to say on state politics.

After an appearance at the state fair later, with a brief non-political speech to the Governor returns to Albany tonight to spend the rest of the week and some of next on state business. His presidential campaign plans still are indefinite and he insists he will have nothing to reveal about his speech-making tour until one of three distinct routes mapped out for him is finally chosen.

Seeks Tax Reduction
Addressing several hundred officials of New York state farm organizations last night at the Onondaga Golf and Country club, the governor confined his talk of half an hour to costs of local governments and an appeal for a reorganization of town and county control groups to bring about a reduction of taxes and overhead.

The affair was the annual "farm dinner" given by Jerome B. Barnum, publisher of the Syracuse Post-Standard, and the governor spoke after Governor Gore of West Virginia, Commissioner Lowell of the tariff commission, who is from New York, and a number of state farm leaders.

At one point he referred to a hostile legislature having reduced his appropriation recommendation only "one hundredth of one percent," and brought laughter by adding: "They made old 'ian Voistead look like a piker. In some mysterious way he hit on one half of one percent."

HOOVER RESISTS EFFORTS TO MAP OUT HIS DRIVE

By JAMES L. WEST
(Associated Press Staff Writer)
WASHINGTON, Aug. 30.—Herbert Hoover is resisting efforts to have him map out an extensive speaking program during the remaining nine weeks of his campaign for the presidency.

Deferring his next excursion from Washington until around the middle of September, he has reiterated to advisers his own desire to limit his public platform appearances to three or four between that time and his next westward trek late in October.

From his experiences during his last journey to his California home, the republican candidate realizes he will be obliged to make a number of addresses when he sets out for home to vote and will reserve his energies for a vigorous drive at that time.

Economical in his own efforts and expense, Hoover also is adhering to his originally announced plan to have the whole republican campaign conducted on as small a budget as is possible. To that end those in charge of financial affairs have initiated conferences with chiefs of the various divisions for a study of expense estimates and a paring down wherever possible.

Wants 'Modest' Organization
Hoover has insisted on what he

terms a "modest" organization, but he also wants an efficient one, and he believes machinery set up by his colleagues is efficient. There has been more decentralization than customary in a campaign, with the state organizations looking for a good share of the work.

Radio expenses in campaigns are becoming heavier with each campaign, but it is stated officially the budget for this will be held down within low limits. Each time that Hoover makes a prepared address arrangements will be made for an extensive hookup of stations, and the principal party speakers also will use the radio in carrying their addresses within a comparatively small circle.

Hoover's friends assert the nominee is well pleased with the situation generally as he has found it from reports of leaders, and he holds that not within thirty years has the party been so united as during the present campaign.
