

STATE REJECTS SOUTH HIGHWAY

**FINAL DECISION FAVORS NO
4 OVER EAST ROUTE IN-
TO CANADIAN; NOW
READY TO ACT**

It looks as though the final decision as to the routing of State Highway No. 4, southeast from Perryton to Canadian has been made. County Judge Flowers received communication from State Engineer Van London, a few days ago, in which Van London stated that the route with eight miles and then southeast toward Canadian was out of question, owing to the fact that no suitable connection from Hemphill county could be found without a material increase in mileage and cost of construction. This means that the route will angle southeast from the city limits of Perryton crossing Wolf Creek about two miles east of the Lipscomb county line.

This is not the route that is favored by the people of Perryton and the greater part of the county, but when we can not always get just what we want in life as well as in highways. The actual mileage in Ochiltree county and cost of construction is less on the southeast route than it would have been if the road went south eight miles and then angled. We must, in our criticism of the state highway officials for not selecting the route we favored, remember that the federal and state governments are putting up two dollars against our one dollar on the cost of this highway and just naturally are entitled to more consideration as to the location.

The matter is now square up to the Commissioner's court and a decision will no doubt be made at the next meeting. The state highway department is ready to proceed with the hard surfacing of No. 117 from Perryton southwest to the Hamford county line, and with the grading, drainage structures and paving of No. 117 east to Booker, and with No. 4 from the Oklahoma line through Perryton to Canadian. All they want now is a decision from the Commissioners that Ochiltree county is ready to cooperate. The bonds have been voted for many months.

LIBERAL OFFER- ED LOWER GAS

**NEW COMPANY PROPOSES FOR
TY CENT GAS RATE FOR
RESIDENCE CONSUMP-
TION AT LIBERAL**

Mayor Earl Walker states this morning that he has been in communication with a good company which offers a bonafide proposition for furnishing gas to Liberal consumers at the following rates for residences:

40c for first 15,000 cubic feet
30c for next 60,000 cubic feet
23c for next 100,000 cubic feet
15c for next 200,000 cubic feet
12c for next 300,000 cubic feet
8c for all in excess of above
amount.

Mayor Walker says that the company offers to drill new wells and in addition to offering gas at the low rate, will give an option on the whole concern in case the city ever wishes to buy it. This option would be at a reasonable figure but the city would not be tied up in way.

The company offers several different propositions, according to Mr. Walker. Among them is an offer to drill wells, put in the system, lease the system to the city, and lease the city.

"It is a real bonafide proposition which this company has to offer and I am well pleased with it," Mayor Walker stated this morning. "The reduction offered by the Liberal Gas company recently was not sufficient, I feel."

The new company will ask for a franchise."—Liberal News.

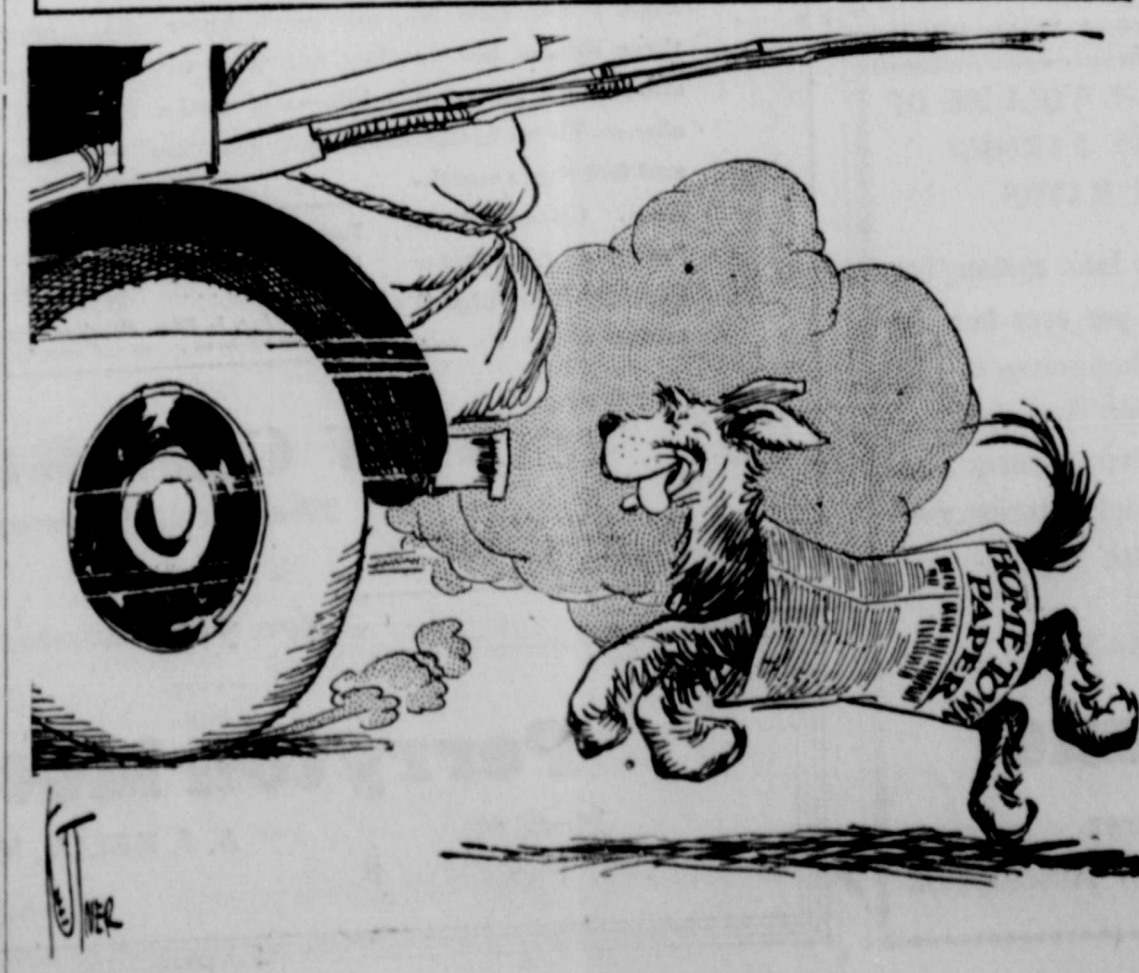

POULTRY OVERSHADOWS ALL OTHER FARM STOCK RAISING

College Station, Tex., July 27.—Poultry on farms as measured by the number of farms keeping poultry over-shadows any line of livestock enterprise, Dr. F. A. Buechel, assistant director, bureau of business research, University of Texas, told the poultrymen's group at the Farmers Short Course, Texas A. & M. College, Monday, in discussing "Distribution of Poultry and Egg Production in the United States." The 1920 census showed that 91 per cent of all farms in this country had poultry, whereas 75 per cent had hogs, 71 per cent dairy cattle and 29 per cent beef cattle. With the rapid expansion since the war, poultry production has advanced and plays a prominent part among the important farm products, the speaker said. In 1925 only dairy products, corn, cotton, hay and forage were of more importance, in value, to the farmers than the raising of poultry and eggs. Poultry and egg production is thus a major agricultural enterprise and in consequence fluctuations in the prices of these products have an important bearing on farm incomes, Dr. Buechel said.

The bulk of the eggs shipped to the principal consuming markets come from the farm flocks of the Middle West, the speaker went on to say. Most of the selected quality eggs are produced in specialized plants scattered from New England to the Pacific Coast. In 1920 exports of eggs in the shell from the United States amounted to about thirty million dozen. In 1928 only twenty million dozen were exported. Imports of eggs into the United States are mostly in the form of dried and frozen eggs, mainly from China. These products are used chiefly for commercial baking and cooking purposes. Virtually no eggs in the shell are imported into the United States, it was added.

EVERY FARM SHOULD PRODUCE ITS OWN HOG MEAT

College Station, Tex., July 27.—Just four pigs, dressing 170 pounds each, will give a farm family 680 pounds of bacon, ham, pork loin, spare ribs, sausage and lard worth approximately \$190, A. L. Ward, Dallas, educational director, National Cottonseed Products Association, told the livestock group at the Farmers Short Course, Texas A. & M. College, in speaking on "Opportunities of Hog Production."

Every farmer should produce meat enough for his home use at least, Mr. Ward said, adding that on most farms enough kitchen waste together with feed-lot waste to raise a litter of pigs will be found. If a farmer produces feedstuffs, he will, of necessity, have to market them in some form of livestock. Due to their high efficiency in converting feedstuffs into meat and to the quick turnover that they offer—it being possible to reach the finished market in six to eight months—hogs offer one of the best means of marketing such feeds, the speaker said.

Development of the dairy industry will, in many cases, be the governing factor in the matter of the number of hogs on any particular farm, Mr. Ward continued, pointing out that in those districts removed from the centers of population where cream is sold, pigs are in demand as a means of using the skimmed milk and other dairy by-products.

SHEEP RAISERS MUST REDUCE PRODUCTION COSTS

College Station, Tex., July 27.—In view of the present prices of lambs and wool, it is necessary for owners of farm flocks to make every effort to reduce production costs and increase returns on the animal in order to make the flock profitable, A. K. Mackey, professor of animal husbandry in charge of sheep and Angora goats, Texas A. & M. College, advised members of the livestock group at the Farmers Short Course here Monday.

tures in order to save on the feed bill was recommended. Attention was called to the importance of controlling parasites and other factors of loss that increase cost of producing lambs for market as well as wool.

Prof. Mackey suggested the slogan, "Grow to Marketable Age and Weight Every Lamb that is Born Alive and Strong," as a good rule to follow in increasing the returns on the individual animal. He recommended earlier lambs and creep feeding in order to get them on the market when prices are usually higher and before hot weather begins. Breeding of ewes so they will shear more wool a head was also recommended as a method of increasing returns.

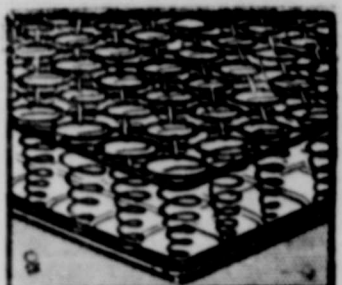
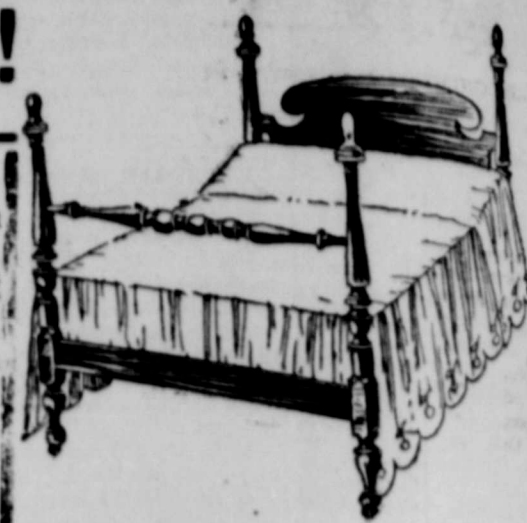

Grange Head Speaks

Master Louis J. Taber, National Grange Executive, Address at Farmers Course

College Station, Tex., July 31.—Any successful farm organization must be built from the bottom up, not from the top down, and it must be founded upon a bona fide farm membership, centering around the farm family, said Louis J. Taber, Columbus, Ohio, master of the National Grange, in discussing "Organization and Progress" on the general program of the Farmers Short Course at the Texas A. & M. College Friday.

"Some people look upon progress and success as the result of luck or accident," Mr. Taber said. "The student realizes, however, that organization and progress go hand in hand. Ours is the greatest republic in the world because of the character and nature of the government organized by our fathers. Unfortunately the farmer has lagged behind the rest of the nation in utilizing the machinery of organization for his own advancement and welfare. Agriculture has furnished its full share of the funds, the material and the leadership that has made America great. If the farmer has not received a fair return, it is his own fault because he has failed to use the forces of organization, education and cooperation for his own benefit."

The local unit of a successful farm organization, centering around the farm family, must be bounded by a community interest and welfare, and these local, or community branches, must be bound together in strong and compact county organizations, the speaker said. County organizations, in turn, he continued, must be welded together into a well-balanced state organization, and finally, state organizations into a national organization of sufficient size and strength to make the voice of agriculture articulate in the legislative halls of the nation and the market places of the world.

Mr. Taber pointed out briefly the scheme of organization of the National Grange. Half a century ago the Grange was strong in Texas. In recent years the organization faded from the state but new Granges are again being formed in Texas, he said.

HOME HINTS

Don't use strong soap or soap powders on dishes decorated with gilt.

Watermelons are a good source of two important vitamins, A and C, and contain detectable amounts

of two others, B and G.

To remove grass stains from washable materials, treat them while fresh with hot water and soap, rubbing vigorously. If traces of stain remain on white linen or cotton materials, they may be bleached out with Javelle water.

Save small pieces of soap from the kitchen and bathroom, and run them through your meat grinder to make soap chips. Be sure to wash your food chopper well. Fill a jar with soap chips and hot water and let it stand, to make soap jelly, for various kinds of washing needs, including shampoos.

Blotting paper is a great help in the household. Keep a package of new, white, good-sized blotters in the desk and in the sideboard. When a bowl of flowers tips over on a polished table, or ink is spilled, or milk or fruit juice spills on the tablecloth, take up the liquid quickly with a piece of blotting paper before it penetrates or spreads. Use a blotter to remove candlewax drippings. Scrape off what you can with a dull knife, then lay the cloth between clean white blotters and press with a hot iron. The blotters will absorb the melted grease.

Farmers Can Hold Own

National Master of Farm Grange Says That Farmer Can Hold Own By Keeping Step

College Station, Tex., July 30.—By keeping in step with the changing world and business developments, the American farmer can hold his own in the future, Louis J. Taber, Columbus, Ohio, master of the National Grange, declared in an address on "Agriculture's New Day" at the Farmers Short Course at Texas A. & M. College Thursday.

Listing steps necessary to lead agriculture toward permanency and stability, Mr. Taber cited the maintenance and increase of social and spiritual factors. Fun must have a larger place in the rural life of tomorrow and moral and spiritual values are not out of date, he said. "We must seek to revitalize the rural church and dedicate it to the best things in our modern rural civilization," he continued. "Obedience to law requires first place in this new day. America must remain American. Gangsters, highwaymen, bootleggers and dope peddlers have neither right nor place on American soil. Like snailpox and leprosy, they should be cured by vaccination, segregation and deportation."

America today is passing through what is almost an agricultural revolution, resulting from increased efficiency in production, improved me-

chanical equipment, enlarged scientific and educational facilities, as well as changed and dislocated local and world market conditions resulting from the world war and other factors, the speaker went on to say. Before analyzing rural difficulties correctly, it is necessary to study the effect of the change in appetite, chain merchandising, chain financing, mass production and mass distribution on the whole agricultural picture, he said.

While there is no easy road to a satisfying rural welfare, if agriculture will organize sufficiently to obtain legislative equality and to protect the industry, certain well defined steps will lead the industry toward permanency and stability, Mr. Taber said. These steps he cited as educational that will acquaint the farmer with his problems and their solution, a sound land utilization program, efficient production and better marketing, development of waterways to bring about lower transportation costs, tax adjustment and reduction and greater development of the social and spiritual factors.

ISSUES CALL FOR LOCAL WAR ON INSECT PESTS

An appeal to the residents of Perryton to take up the cudgels of war against the fly and other insect pests, is made by Dr. O. F. Hedenburg, nationally known authority on insecticides, in a message to the Ochiltree County Herald.

As a fellow of Mellon Institute of Industrial Research of Pittsburgh, Pa., Dr. Hedenburg has devoted sixteen years to the study of insects and the development of effective chemical compounds to combat them, especially in the home.

Since the severe outbreak of 1912, Dr. Hedenburg states, the public has grown rather lax in keeping down the number of insects. The warm, moist weather prevailing in many sections also has favored the widespread increase of flies, mosquitoes and other pests. He urges the immediate inauguration of an intensive local campaign not alone

for the greater physical comfort this would bring, but also as a precautionary measure against hordes of insects infesting the locality next year.

Flies annually kill around 75,000 persons in the United States through infecting food and spreading deadly disease germs, Dr. Hadenburg estimates.

"Too many of us are inclined to think of flies in terms of physical discomfort and inconvenience," according to Dr. Hedenburg. "There are probably no other carriers of disease that spread so much sickness as flies. They are known to carry the germs of at least 30 different diseases. Their yearly toll of human life almost equals the total number of American fatalities during the world war and one-third more than are killed yearly by automobiles. With three to six million germs on their hairy bodies and spongy feet, they find their way into houses and they touch and contaminate everything they touch. These germs have only to find a satisfactory lodging place or a weakened human constitution to give rise to malignant diseases."

With the development of special non-smelling, non-staining chemicals harmless to man and animals, but fatal to flies and other insect pests, Dr. Hedenburg thinks it is excusable for anyone to invite trouble by tolerating insects. He discounts fly-paper and insect powders as ineffective and finds the old-fashioned method of swatting the fly unsatisfactory in that while it kills the fly, the germs carried by the fly remain alive and further capable of contaminating food and the human body.

"Since flies breed on filth, even a single fly is a source of danger," he states. "Exhaustive research has shown that the chance of catching the last fly in a room with sticky and poisonous flypapers, powders or swatters is very small. Most effective for destroying flies in an insecticide distributed with a hand sprayer directing the spray toward the edge where walls and ceiling meet. This disturbs the flies into

activity and sends them flying through the spray. Some droplets drawn into their breathing pores paralyze them rapidly and cause their death."

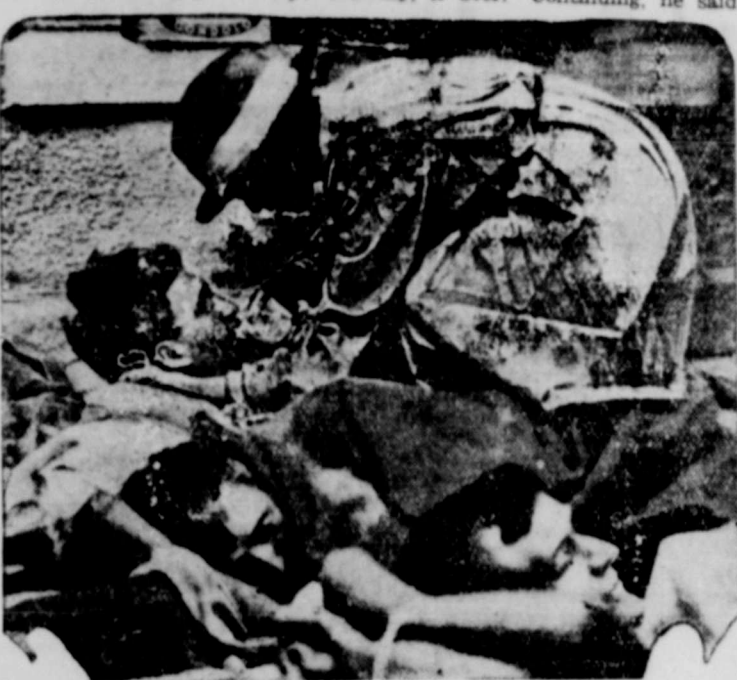

the Twenty-sixth, Forty-second, Second. (The First had already been sent to an active front near Amiens.) The regiments of the Thirty-second will be ready by May 1.

Pershing—I do not think they can be used before May 5, but the more we put into the line the better it will be. Your Seventy-seventh division has arrived. I see. What about the Third and Fifth?

Pershing—The Infantry of the Third has arrived, and that of the Fifth will soon follow.

Foch—What we need now is infantry, especially the British, on account of the present crisis. That is why the supreme war council at Versailles recommended that all tonnage be devoted to that purpose for the time being. I hope that

America may send over as much infantry as possible during the next three months. The other arms to complete your divisions can come afterward. What do you think of that plan?

Pershing—I cannot commit myself to such a proposition. If nothing but infantry and machine gunners are brought over to the total of 360,000, it will be October or November before the artillery and auxiliary troops could arrive, and we could not force the formation of an American army until next spring.

Foch—I think your calculation is rather pessimistic, for we could begin bringing your other troops in August, but without considering that point we can furnish you with artillery and its personnel and you can have your divisions reconstituted beginning with October. What would you propose in this connection?

Pershing—I think we should limit the transportation of infantry to May, and that the artillery and auxiliary troops should come in June. They should not arrive more than a month later than the infantry. Under what conditions would you employ the American infantry units?

Foch—A final decision cannot be made on that subject. That will evidently depend upon the degree of instruction of the units. In the crisis that actually confronts the allied armies it is effective that we lack. The method of employing these units is a question to be handled in due course and according to their efficiency.

Pershing—I would like to have the conditions under which these units are to be employed determined now, and to fix the time during which the regiments and brigades will be used separately.

Foch—Make your proposition on that subject.

I then explained the details of the system that was being followed where our divisions were in training with the French and the plan agreed upon with the British. I added that it was fully understood that if an emergency should arise while our troops were in training they would go into battle as part of the divisions with which they were serving.

Pershing Refuses to Consent
General Foch then said:

"I do not doubt the excellence of the method, but in the crisis through which we are passing I return to the decision of the supreme war council, and I ask you to transport during May, June and July only infantry and machine-gun units. Will you consent?"

Pershing—No. I do not consent. I propose for one month to ship nothing but infantry and machine-gun units, and after that the other arms and service of the rear troops to correspond.

Foch—If you adopt the plan I propose you would have by July 31 360,000 more American infantry.

Pershing—You said just now that you would furnish the artillery, and even artillerymen, which would be joined with our infantry to complete our divisions. Then why not consent to transport our artillery personnel along with our infantry?

Foch—I repeat that it is the infantry of which we have the greatest need at this time. I would like to have General Bliss tell us the considerations which led to the decision taken by the supreme war council at Versailles.

Bliss—The collective not recommended to the United States to send only infantry until the supreme war council should give instructions to the contrary. The government of the United States, in conformity with this note and with the recommendation of Secretary Baker, consented to this plan. As far as the employment of the units on the front is concerned, the question should be decided by General Pershing according to agreement with the commander in chief to whose army they may be attached.

Foch Fears Disaster
Pershing—I have been discussing this question of training our units for the last eight months, first with General Petain and then with Marshal Haig. The method agreed upon leads naturally to the formation of constituted American divisions.

General Foch said he wished to see American divisions constituted and an American army formed as large as possible, but the policy he was then advocating would have made it impossible to form an American army without serious delay, if ever. Continuing, he said:

focus of a German raid covering a three-kilometer front extending west from the Bois de Remieres. It came during a heavy fog and was a complete surprise to our troops, who were considerably outnumbered. Seicheprey was taken by the enemy, but co-operation was re-established throughout the division and the original front was recaptured on the following day.

In this affair we lost one officer, 80 enlisted men, killed; 11 officers, 176 enlisted men, wounded; 30 officers, 211 enlisted men, gassed, and five officers, 182 enlisted men, missing and prisoners.

CHAPTER XXXVIII
The question of the shipment of American troops and particularly their allotment to the allied armies, had assumed very great importance in the minds of the allied leaders.

Accordingly a session of the supreme war council was called at Abbeville May 1, 1918, and Premier Clemenceau opened the meeting by referring forthwith to the previous recommendation of the council's military representatives as to the disposition of American troops.

"The military representatives," he began, "expressed the opinion in their joint note No. 18 that only infantry and machine-gun units should be sent to France for the present. Since then the agreement between Lord Milner and General Pershing, signed at London April 24, 1918, has intervened. This agreement makes a change.

"It had been understood at Versailles that America would send 120,000 men per month, which the French and English armies would share equally. Under the Milner-Pershing agreement it appears none go to France. The French might suppose that in compensation the American troops arriving in June would be given to France. But it now appears they are also to join the British. I wish to protest that this is not satisfactory.

"I am not discussing the figure of 120,000 men; I am prepared to accept that these men go to the British in May. I am asking to receive the same number of troops in June. There are close to 400,000 Americans in France at present, but
