THERE is a rumor that the Houston Union is to be revived.

He lives in Boston. He is the correspondent from the Hub for the Hartford *Courant*. He writes to that journal: "I observe that several of the newspaper journals of the country connect the Southern trip of the Vice President with aspirations for the Presidency. They are incorrect in this. Why any one but an idiot should write such stale news as this is beyond ordinary comprehension. Every man, woman and child in the country knows that Mr. Wilson's trip is solely one of pleasure. Eating strawberries and cream with Mrs. Jeff Davis and trying to catch fish from the St. Louis bridge are the prominent incidents of his journey, which go to prove the absence of political aspirations."

THE Prismatic Railroad has been very generally noticed by the editors in Texas who were here at the Editorial Convention, and had an opportunity to examine the character of the road and study the system, and it has met with remarkable favor. The building of the road from Hockley to Montgomery, for which there is a charter, and the successful running of the road when built, will secure for those who are interested an immense amount of road building. The fact that the *Scientific American* gave its sanction to the system, and it has been successfully tested elsewhere, give promise that in Texas this cheap and easily constructed road may come into very general use. *Houston Telegraph*.

Gov. Davis and Peace.

In another place will be found the speech made by Gov. Davis upon accepting the chairmanship of the Republican State Executive Committee.

We commend it to the careful, deliberate, unprejudiced consideration of every honest man in the State no matter what he calls himself. No such words have been spoken since the war; and they come from an honest patriot, who has thrown his life and fortune into the balance to bring peace and prosperity to Texas.

No matter what demagogues, or unscrupulous partisans may say, the words spoken by Gov. Davis at Hempstead will cement the bonds of citizenship and go far toward making Texas a State in which the people are united in friendship even if they differ in politics, religion, color, race and occupation.

THE Supreme Court of Indiana recently gave some interesting decisions in relation to the use of the streets of cities by railroad companies. In one case the court held that, under the statutes of the State relating to making and recording town lots, the laying out and designating of a street on a plat does not pass from the proprietor the fee simple in the soil of the street, and a deed, conveying by its number and proper description a lot on a street, in the absence of an express statement to the contrary, conveys the fee to the centre of the street, and the occupancy of the street by a steam railroad company with its track constitutes a new appropriation of such a character as to authorize the owners of adjoining lots to recover damages. The court held this to be an additional service, a use outside of and at variance with the design contemplated in the dedication of streets to the use of the public. The supporting facts on which these decisions rest are that running a railroad along a street damages the value of abutting property by jarring and cracking the plastering and walls, by the smoke, sparks, dust and noise, and by other inconveniences consequent upon the use of steam as a motive power. At the same time, the principle was enunciated that running street cars by horse power, not steam, is not such a variance from the proper use of the streets, in view of their dedication as to entitle owners to damages. This is a question which is agitated in all cities the streets of which are occupied and used by railroad companies, and hence the action of the Supreme Court of Indiana upon the matter is clothed with more than ordinary interest. Surrounding the highways of a large and densely populated city to the occupancy and use of railroad companies is a matter of grave public import, and that and question auxiliary to the same cannot be considered in too profound a manner.

Remarks of Gov. Davis on accepting the position of Chairman of the Republican State Executive Committee.

"Mr. Chairman and gentlemen of the convention. I need not attempt to conceal the deep satisfaction given me by this evidence of your unabated confidence. It is also pleasant in another point of view. It shows that though overwhelmed you are not conquered or dismayed, but yet bear aloft the banner of the party which represents purity of Government and equal rights."

The differences among us must and will be healed. What has occurred to-day, of this nature, will be with me as if it had never happened, and I shall strive to unite in good fellowship all whose sentiments draw them naturally to us. My life's experience has not failed to teach me that nothing compensates for the loss of a friend where that friend might have been retained by a little patience and forbearance. Let this then be our understanding."

Now, a word on a subject apart from party affairs. We have incorporated among resolutions adopted to-day, one recommending that partisan selection of delegates to the Constitutional Convention be not made, but inviting conservative citizens to cooperate with us, if a convention should be called, in making a non-partisan constitution."

In this connection I have to say that for the first time since the war, I now see a sort of silver lining to the cloud of prejudice which has heretofore overshadowed that large section of our fellow citizens who term themselves Democrats. This is the disposition shown by some of them to avoid party lines, in choosing delegates to that convention, or rather to select men who will make a constitution for the whole people, and not one representing alone the political views of a faction."

I am decidedly in favor of our meeting such men half way. There is really no reason why a State constitution should reflect local or factional views of public policy, any more than should the articles of a commercial partnership or the charter and by-laws of a private corporation. If several merchants of different politics or religion combine for joint business, or a number of citizens take stock in a corporation, they would treat as ridiculous a suggestion that their rules for government should express Democratic or Republican ideas, or shades of religious disagreement. Now, after all, our State is just a larger joint stock concern into which we have entered for mutual protection and improvement. If then, we must have a new constitution let us try to secure one that we can all live under. Not one conceived in the prejudices of the day but suitable for all time. If the proposed new constitution be framed in harmony with the constitution and laws of the U. S. and in careful respect of the rights of all classes of our citizens; secures a good system of public education—commensurate with our means and condition—and adequate protection of life, liberty, and property, I see no reason why we should object to it though in some details it might not suit our fancy."

For fifteen years I have been at war with the great majority of our white fellow citizens of the State about these matters of public policy. I did not commence that war, in fact it was forced on me very much against my will. I was opposed to it then, am tired of it now—indeed have always been tired of it—and am willing to put an end to the strife."

Let us then accept, as offered in good faith, the invitation of those who, though differing with us are willing to forego that difference in the interest of the common benefit of our great State."

He remembers that his name is Jasper Holm, and sometimes he was called Jasper Thompson, the latter being the name of his step-father. Methodist District Conference.

The annual meeting of the San Antonio District Conference, which was in session at Selma last week, adjourned Saturday afternoon at 4 o'clock, to meet at Oak Island, at such time in the summer of 1876 as the Presiding Elder may appoint.

On Friday the Conference appointed committee as follows:

On Spiritual State of the Church.—Rev. J. W. Devillbiss, H. Beadle, M. Marchison.

On Finance.—Rev. T. G. Woods, Chas. Goodloe, Simon Harris.

On Missions.—Rev. A. J. Potter, S. W. Higway, S. N. Randall.

On Sunday Schools and Education.—Rev. H. G. Horton, Ichabod Kingsbury, M. M. Sany.

On Books and Periodicals.—Dr. C. E. Fisher, I. Kingsbury, M. M. Knox.

On Church Discipline and Conference.—Rev. J. W. Devillbiss, Rev. T. G. Woods, M. Marchison.

Rev. Bro. Woods was also added to the Committee on Missions.

After the appointment of the above committees, Conference adjourned until 9 A. M., Saturday.

Rev. H. Beadle preached a plain, practical sermon at 11 A. M., and the afternoon was occupied by the committees preparing their reports. In the evening Rev. H. G. Horton preached an able sermon, taking for a text the 27th verse of the 19th chapter of St. Matthew.

Conference met Saturday morning at 9 A. M., and the following persons were elected delegates to attend the annual session of the West Texas Conference, which meets in this city October 20th.

Col. J. T. Thornton, San Antonio; Chas. Goodloe, Cibola Circuit; M. Marchison, Cibola Circuit; I. Kingsbury, Uvalde Circuit.

Reserve Delegates.—Dr. C. E. Fisher, San Antonio; Simon Harris, Cibola.

The Committee on Sunday Schools presented an elaborate report through the chairman, Bro. Horton, and a special report on the subject of education.

In this latter the committee called the attention of the Conference to the flourishing condition of the Catholic schools in San Antonio, and the perfectly helpless condition of the Protestant children, as regards the obtaining of an education outside of the Romanish church. Since the disestablishment of the free schools, Protestant children have almost necessarily been placed under Catholic instruction.

Bro. Horton strongly urged the establishing at San Antonio of a Methodist High School, to fill the void now existing, and the Conference adopted the report unanimously. In this move Bro. Horton has taken a step in the right direction, one, too, for which he will receive the thanks of every Protestant family through out the San Antonio District. The subject will come up for action at the October session of the Annual Conference.

The Committee on Books and Periodicals reported, reviewing the different advocates published by the Methodist Church, and calling special attention to the "New Standard Hymn and Tune Book," published by the order of the last General Conference. This is the Hymn Book used by the Methodist choir in this city.

The Committee on Missions advocated the forming of a mission in the suburbs of San Antonio, and urged the appointment of a supply to the Fort Clark Mission.

Other reports were offered of no special interest to the general reader.

Before adjourning, the Conference returned a sincere and heartfelt vote of thanks to the good people of Selma for their hospitalities so freely extended, none was a body more kindly treated than the San Antonio District Conference at their late meeting at Selma. COLON

Mc Mahan, formerly of Stephenson, Ala., was killed day before yesterday by lightning, in Coryell county, ten miles northwest of Gatesville, while gathering a herd of cattle. He had on a silver watch which was damaged by the stroke and stopped running, and which indicates that the terrible disaster occurred at eight minutes past seven o'clock A. Proceedings of the City Council.

Tuesday, June 1, 1875.

Present, the Mayor, Aldermen all present except Messrs. Teel and Degener.

CONTRACT AWARDED. Contract for constructing drain on Acquia street awarded to Miller & Riordan.

MILITARY DEPT. The Special Committee appointed to secure property for the site of the Military Depot, reported that they have purchased fourteen lots at a price of \$5000.00 and recommended an ordinance requiring the Mayor to make deed of the property to the United States. Adopted.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE appointed to take into consideration the matter of assessment of property for street improvement was read. They recommend the strict enforcement of the provisions of the charter, and in view of the fact that these provisions had been disregarded in the past, the Legislature should be petitioned to legalize the bonds issued for the improvements made, and to repeal sections as unpracticable. Laid on table by motion of Ald. Sweeney.

WHITE WASH. The committee appointed to investigate charges against city engineer reported in substance that the city council having stultified itself in the matter, there was nothing to be done but to give Mr. Freisleben a dab of white wash.

P. Kallieser drug bill for \$775 for drugs for January and February allowed.

EXTRAS. The account of Miller & Riordan for extra work on Laredo street was recommended. (This is one of Freisleben's misadventures.)

The petition of Mrs. Garcia for remission of taxes was granted. Ed. Braden presented an account for extra work on Houston street.

ALFRED DITCH. The following resolution: That the Alameda ditch be, and is hereby declared completed and accepted by the city, that the thirty days allowed by ordinance, for parties to object, to pay their assessments, shall date from and after the passage of this resolution. Adopted.

CHICKEN PIE. The following resolution was adopted: Resolved, That from and after this date all ordinances, resolutions, or notices, required by law or authority of the council to be published, be printed in the German language in the tri-weekly Preis Press, provided the charge for the same shall not exceed the price paid the official journal for the publication of the same.

PUBLIC SCHOOL COMMITTEE. Be it resolved that a committee of four Aldermen be appointed, one from each ward, to take all necessary steps to carry into effect the late amendment to the Public School Law, authorizing the city to assume control of the city public schools. Also to prepare rules and regulations for the government of the same, and report at the next regular meeting.

ROCK QUARRIES FOR MILITARY DEPOT. The following resolution was adopted: That the Mayor be, and is hereby authorized to permit the U. S. authorities, to quarry and use all necessary rock from the city quarries, to be used in erecting the Quartermaster's Depot, and all buildings connected therewith, free of charge, provided, said authorities shall not select more than two of said quarries, which two shall be from those not already leased by the city.

CARRYING ARMS. Resolution passed requiring all officers permitted to carry arms, visiting our city from other counties, to report to the mayor who shall examine their papers and give them permission to carry same in our city.

DISORDERLY HOUSES. Alderman Sweeney introduced a resolution requiring Mayor to enforce ordinance against disorderly houses. Adopted.

MACADAMIZING CROCKETT STREET. Petition of P. J. Biesebach and others asking that Crockett and Blum streets be macadamized, was referred.

SIDEWALK IN FRONT BAKER HOUSE. Petition of J. W. Baker to have sidewalk widened in front of Baker House, granted with proviso that the city does not lose right to the property used to widen property.

GAS LAMPS. The committee on re-distribution of gas lamps reported in favor of discontinuing lamps at the following points: One in front of Casino, one of lamps on Houston street, one on Houston street between St. Mary's and Navarro streets, one in rear of story's stable, one in rear of Mr. Girard's residence, one at Van Derlip residence on Acquia street, among Nacodoches street fronting Peter Gallagher's residence, one on Alamo str. at Brian's store, one on north-west corner of Houston and Acquia streets and one at the County Courthouse. And that lamps be established at the following points: S. W. corner of military Plaza and Flores street, N. W. corner of Houston and Jefferson streets, N. W. corner of Travis and Jefferson streets, N. W. corner of Bonham and Blum streets, S. E. corner of Crockett and Lozoya streets, S. W. corner of Jefferson and Pecos streets, S. W. corner of Obraya and Flores streets, S. E. corner Salinas and North Flores street, corner South Flores and East str., S. E. corner Presidio and East street, S. W. corner of Alameda and Rusk street, S. E. corner of South Alamo street, S. W. corner of Nueva and Alamo street.

BEHIND ON TENTH STREET. Resolution of Alderman Prescott that the city engineer be required to furnish estimate of cost of bridge on Tenth street, in 3d Ward. Carried.

ANIMAL ORDINANCE REPEALED. The amendment to the animal ordinance extending its life, was repealed by motion of Alderman Mensch.

FIRE LIMITS COMMITTEE. On motion of Alderman Prescott, a standing committee of three was appointed on Fire and Fire Limits.

ORDINANCES TO BE READ. Resolution of Alderman Prescott that all ordinances shall be read their several meetings, was adopted.

THE COMMITTEE TO MEET. Resolution of Alderman Dashiell that all committees meet at least once every two weeks to attend to business. Adopted.

RESOLUTION OF ALDERMAN DASHIELL in relation to animal ordinance laid over under resolution previously adopted.

There is a rumor that the Houston Union is to be revived.

They are incorrect in this. Why any one but an idiot should write such state news as this is beyond ordinary comprehension. Every man, woman and child in the country knows that Mr. Wilson's trip is solely one of pleasure. Rating starberies and cream with Mrs. Jeff Davis and trying to catch fish from the St. Louis bridge are the prominent incidents of his journey, which go to prove the absence of political aspirations."

THE Prismatic Railroad has been very generally noticed by the editors in Texas who were here at the Editorial Convention, and had an opportunity to examine the character of the road and study the system, and it has met with remarkable favor. The building of the road from Hockley to Montgomery, for which there is a charter, and the successful running of the road when built, will secure for those who are interested an immense amount of road building. The fact that the *Scientific American* gave its sanction to the system, and it has been successfully tested elsewhere, give promise that in Texas this cheap and easily constructed road may come into very general use.—*Houston Telegraph*.

Gov. Davis and Peace.

In another place will be found the speech made by Gov. Davis upon accepting the chairmanship of the Republican State Executive Committee.

We commend it to the careful, deliberate, unprejudiced consideration of every honest man in the State no matter what he calls himself. No such words have been spoken since the war; and they come from an honest patriot, who has thrown his life and fortune into the balance to bring peace and prosperity to Texas.

No matter what demagogues, or unscrupulous partisans may say, the words spoken by Gov. Davis at Hempstead will cement the bonds of citizenship and go far toward making Texas a State in which the people are united in friendship even if they differ in politics, religion, color, race and occupation.

THE Supreme Court of Indiana recently gave some interesting decisions in relation to the use of the streets of cities by railroad companies. In one case the court held that, under the statutes of the State relating to making and recording town lots, the laying out and designating of a street on a plat does not pass from the proprietor the fee simple in the soil of the street, and a deed, conveying by its number and proper description an express statement to the contrary, conveys the fee to the center of the street, and the occupancy of the street by a steam railroad company with its track constitutes a new appropriation of such a character as to authorize the owners of adjoining lots to recover damages. The court held this to be an additional service, a use outside of and at variance with the design contemplated in the dedication of streets to the use of the public. The supporting facts on which these decisions rest are that running a railroad along a street damages the value of abutting property by jarring and cracking the plastering and walls, by the smoke, sparks, dust and noise, and by other inconveniences consequent upon the use of steam as a motive power. At the same time, the principle was enunciated that running street cars by horse power, not steam, is not such a variance from the proper use of the streets, in view of their dedication as to entitle owners to damages. This is a question which is agitated in all cities the streets of which are occupied and used by railroad companies, and hence the action of the Supreme Court of Indiana upon the matter is clothed with more than ordinary interest. Surrounding the highways of a large and densely populated city to the occupancy and use of railroad companies is a matter of grave public import, and that and question auxiliary to the same cannot be considered in too profound a manner.

Remarks of Gov. Davis on accepting the position of Chairman of the Republican State Executive Committee.

"Mr. Chairman and gentlemen of the convention: I need not attempt to conceal the deep satisfaction given me by this evidence of your unabated confidence. It is also pleasant in another point of view. It shows that though overwhelmed you are not conquered or dismayed, but yet bear aloft the banner of the party which represents purity of Government and equal rights."

The differences among us must and will be healed. What has occurred to-day, of this nature, will be with me as if it had never happened, and I shall strive to unite in good fellowship all whose sentiments draw them naturally to us. My life's experience has not failed to teach me that nothing compensates for the loss of a friend where that friend might have been retained by a little patience and forbearance. Let this then be our understanding.

Now, a word on a subject apart from party affairs. We have incorporated among resolutions adopted to-day, one recommending that partisan selection of delegates to the Constitutional Convention be not made, but inviting conservative citizens to cooperate with us, if a convention should be called, in making a non-partisan constitution.

In this connection I have to say that for the first time since the war, I now see a sign of silver lining to the cloud of prejudice which has heretofore overshadowed that large section of our fellow citizens who term themselves Democrats. This is the disposition shown by some of them to avoid party lines in choosing delegates to that convention, or rather to select men who will make a constitution for the whole people, and not one representing alone the political views of a faction.

I am decidedly in favor of our meeting such men half way. There is really no reason why a State constitution should reflect local or sectional views of public policy, any more than should the articles of a commercial partnership or the charter and by-laws of a private corporation. If several merchants of different politics or religion combine for joint business, or a number of citizens take stock in a corporation, they would treat as ridiculous a suggestion that their rules for government should express Democratic or Republican ideas, or shades of religious disagreement. Now, after all, our State is just a larger joint stock concern into which we have entered for mutual protection and improvement. If then, we must have a new constitution let us try to secure one that we can all live under. Not one conceived in the prejudices of the day but suitable for all time. If the proposed new constitution be framed in harmony with the constitution and laws of the U. S. and in careful respect of the rights of all classes of our citizens; secures a good system of public education—commensurate with our means and condition—and adequate protection of life, liberty, and property, I see no reason why we should object to it though in some details it might not suit our fancy.

For fifteen years I have been at war with the great majority of our white fellow citizens of the State about these matters of public policy. I did not commence that war, in fact it was forced on me very much against my will. I was opposed to it then, am tired of it now—indeed have always been tired of it—and am willing to put an end to the strife.

Let us then accept, as offered in good faith, the invitation of those who, though differing with us are willing to forego that difference in the interest of the common benefit of our great State.

Rev. Bro. Woolle was also added to the Committee on Missions.

After the appointment of the above committees, Conference adjourned until 9 A. M., Saturday.

Rev. H. Beadle preached a plain, practical sermon at 11 A. M., and the afternoon was occupied by the committees preparing their reports. In the evening Rev. H. G. Horton preached an able sermon, taking for a text the 27th verse of the 19th chapter of St. Matthew.

Conference met Saturday morning at 9 A. M., and the following persons were elected delegates to attend the annual session of the West Texas Conference, which meets in this city October 20th.

The Committee on Sunday Schools presented an elaborate report through the chairman, Bro. Horton, and a special report on the subject of education.

In this latter the committee called the attention of the Conference to the flourishing condition of the Catholic schools in San Antonio, and the perfectly helpless condition of the Protestant children, as regards the obtaining of an education outside of the Roman church. Since the discontinuance of the free schools, Protestant children have almost necessarily been placed under Catholic instruction.

Bro. Horton strongly urged the establishing at San Antonio of a Methodist High School, to fill the void now existing, and the Conference adopted the report unanimously. In this move Bro. Horton has taken a step in the right direction—one, too, for which he will receive the thanks of every Protestant family throughout the San Antonio District. The subject will come up for action at the October session of the Annual Conference.

The Committee on Books and Periodicals reported, reviewing the different advocates published by the Methodist Church, and calling special attention to the "New Standard Hymn and Tune Book," published by the order of the last General Conference. This is the Hymn Book used by the Methodist choir in this city.

The Committee on Missions advocated the forming of a mission in the suburbs of San Antonio, and urged the appointment of a supply to the Fort Clark Mission.

Other reports were offered of no special interest to the general reader.

Before adjourning, the Conference returned a sincere and heartfelt vote of thanks to the good people of Selma for their hospitalities so freely extended, never was a body more kindly treated than the San Antonio District Conference at their late meeting at Selma. CLOSURE.

Proceedings of the City Council.

TUESDAY, JUNE 1, 1875.

Present, the Mayor, Aldermen all present except Messrs. Teel and Degeuer.

CONTRACT for constructing drain on Acquia street awarded to Miller & Riordan.

MILITARY DEPOT.

The Special Committee appointed to secure property for the city of the Military Depot, reported that they have purchased fourteen lots at a price of \$6000.00 and recommended an ordinance requiring the Mayor to make deed of the property to the United States. Adopted.

AMENDMENT OF PROPERTY FOR STREET IMPROVEMENT.

Report of Special Committee appointed to take into consideration the matter of amending of property for street improvement, report was read. They recommended the strict enforcement of the provisions of the charter, and in view of the fact that the provisions had been disregarded in the past, the Legislature should be petitioned to legalize the bonds issued for the improvement made, and to repeal sections as unpracticable. Laid on table by motion of Ald. Sweeney.

WHITE WASH.

The committee appointed to investigate charges against city engineer reported in substance that the city council having satisfied itself in the matter, there was nothing to be done but to give Mr. Fritz Johnson a job of white wash.

F. KATZ drew off the fire for drugs for January and February allowed.

EXTRAS.

The account of Miller & Riordan for extra work on Laredo street was recommended. (This is one of Freidrich's misstatements.)

The petition of Mrs. Garcia for remission of taxes was granted.

Ed. Braden presented an account for extra work on Houston street.

ALEXAN. DITCH.

The following resolution:

That the Alexan. ditch be, and is hereby declared completed and accepted by the city, for the thirty days allowed by ordinance, for parties benefited, to pay their assessments, shall date from and after the passage of this resolution. Adopted.

CHICKEN PIE.

Resolved, That from and after this date all ordinances, resolutions, or notices, required by law or authority of the council to be published, be printed in the German language in the tri-weekly Free Press, provided the charge for the same shall not exceed the price paid the official journal for the publication of the same.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS COMMITTEE.

Be it resolved, that a committee of four Aldermen be appointed, one from each ward, to take all necessary steps to carry into effect the late amendment to the Public School Law, authorizing the city to assume control of the city public schools. Also to prepare rules and regulations for the government of the same, and report at the next regular meeting.

ROCK QUARRIES FOR MILITARY DEPOT.

The following resolution was adopted: That the Mayor be, and is hereby authorized to permit the U. S. authorities, to quarry and use all necessary rock from the city quarries, to be used in erecting the Quartermaster's Depot, and all buildings connected therewith, free of charge, provided, said authorities shall not select more than two of said quarries, which two shall be from those not already leased by the city.

CARRYING ARMS.

Resolution passed requiring all officers permitted to carry arms, visiting our city from other counties, to report to the mayor who shall examine their papers and give them permission to carry same in our city.

DISORDERLY HOUSES.

Alderman Sweeney introduced a resolution requiring Mayor to enforce ordinance against disorderly houses. Adopted.

MAGAZINING CROCKET STREET.

Petition of J. J. Bieschbach and others asking that Crockett and Blum streets be macadamized was referred.

SIDEWALK IN FRONT BAKERHOUSE.

Petition of J. W. Baker to have sidewalk widened in front of Baker House, granted with proviso that the city does not lose right to the property used to widen property.

GAS LAMPS.

The committee on re-distribution of gas lamps reported in favor of discontinuing lamps at the following points: One in front Casino, one on Houston street between St. Mary's and Navarro streets, one in rear of story's stable, one in rear of Mr. Girard's residence, one at Van Dorp residence on Acquia street, one on Nacodoches street fronting Peter Gallagher's residence, one on Alamo street, one on Brim's store, one on northwest corner of Houston and Acquia streets and one at the County Courthouse. And that lamps be established at the following points: S. W. corner of military Plaza and Flores street, N. W. corner of Houston and Jefferson streets, N. W. corner of Bonham and Blum streets, S. E. corner of Crockett and Losoya streets, S. W. corner of Jefferson and Pecos streets, S. E. corner of Salinas and North Flores street, corner South Flores and East street, S. W. corner of South and East street, S. E. corner of Alameda and East street, S. E. corner of Santa and Alamo street.

The number of lamps have been increased from 78 to 92.

BRIDGE ON TENTH STREET.

Resolution of Alderman Prescott that the city engineer be required to furnish estimate of cost of bridge on Tenth street, in 34 Ward. Carried.

ANIMAL ORDINANCE REPEALED.

The amendment to the old animal ordinance extending its life, was repealed by motion of Alderman Masen.

FIRE LAMPS COMMITTEE.

On motion of Alderman Prescott, a standing committee of three was appointed on Fire and Fire Limits.

ORDINANCES TO BE READ.

Resolution of Alderman Prescott that all ordinances read at their several meetings, was adopted.

THE COMMITTEE TO MEET.

Resolution of Alderman Dashiell that all committees meet at least once every two weeks to attend to business. Adopted.

REPEALED.

Resolution of Alderman Dashiell in regard to animal ordinance laid over until resolution previously adopted.

ADJOURNED.
