Cecil Bird Cables Family HE IS IN MANILA

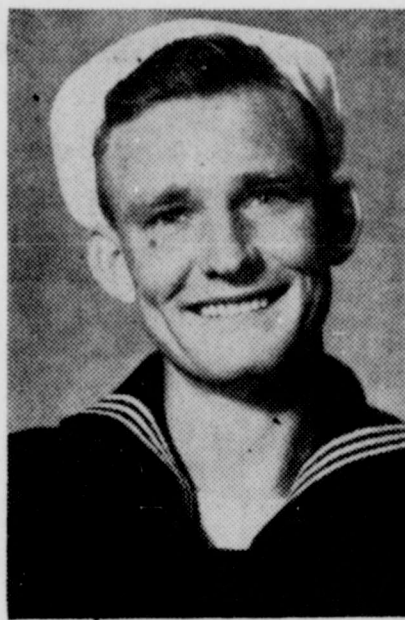

Garner Brothers Are in Army, Navy

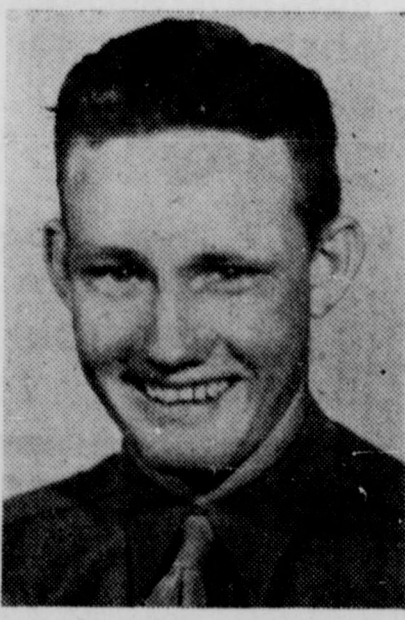

Dear Mr. D: How are you, chum, on this V-J Day? Sunday here now, Saturday there. Guess you will celebrate. Wish I could. Can't tell this war is over here. Living in a tent on the outskirts of Manila, Luzon, Philippines. Just doing construction work on camp. No radio yet. Hot and humid here, mosquitos at night. Nothing is left undamaged in Manila, all wrecked, dead Japs still around Intramuros. May go up in the mountains to Baguio soon. Many teams sent here have been broken up.

Boys here won't use V-Mail, say it takes too long, use air mail instead. We have a radio and can hear Tokyo V-J sets describing scene. Would like to tell you many interesting things about Manila but I have hard time finding time to write. Stationery very scarce. Left wrist is weak, also. Same trouble I've always had. Would enjoy this if I weren't waiting to see my wife. Send me a few papers, will you—yours, TSgt. Robert Ershel Lroy, 40025 Sig. Serv. Grp., 5th Plat., Det. 1, APO 75, 5 P. M., San Francisco, Calif.

Dear Buford: I will drop you a few lines to tell you hello and to tell you to hold up the paper until you hear from me again. I am on this base waiting to be shipped out, or to be given advanced training, and I don't have an address... Say, Buford, how long is the paper going to be sent to the G. I.'s now that the war is over? If you'll let me know, and if it's going to stop, I'll send you the money for a year's subscription... While I'm stationed on this base I'm working in the printing shop, where all printing for the base is done. It is a lot of fun, and also I'm learning a little about printing. At the present, I'm writing this letter on an electric typewriter which belongs to the shop here... Well, I've just about run out of anything to say, so I will close for this time and write again

when I get an address. As ever, Henry Gean Nunn, S2/c, USN Receiving Station, Terminal Island, San Pedro, Calif., Sept. 15.

Dear Buford: Just a few lines to tell you how much I appreciate the papers. It's really swell to read about the old gang and all that's going on at home. Sure boosts a guy's morale... This is really a critical time to be in training. This camp is just changing from combat to peace time schedules. Part of it has already stopped training. We're just in our 7th week, so guess we'll get half and half training. This is really a pushover compared to what the other guys have had, I guess. There is no kick coming from here.
