Mr. and Mrs. C. O. Neff and Nell are re-opening the cafe near the post office as Neff's Cafe. The establishment will open for business tomorrow, Friday, and on Saturday between the hours of 2:00 and 5:00 they invite everyone to come in for free coffee, in order to get acquainted.

John Connally will be inaugurated governor of the state of Texas in January to succeed Price Daniel, as result of the election held over Texas and the nation Tuesday.

By 10:30 or 11:00 o'clock Tuesday night, the Texas Election Bureau announced that Democratic nominee John Connally had gained an apparently insurmountable lead over his Republican challenger, Jack Cox, to become the next Governor of Texas.

Wednesday, Connally's lead had grown to over a hundred thousand votes out of the million-plus cast by Texans, in a voter turnout which was considered well above average for an off-year contest coming between Presidential years.

Here in Schleicher county, the voters bucked the state trend by giving Jack Cox 374 votes to Connally's 339. Otherwise, local voters went along with the rest of Texas in giving majorities to Preston Smith for Lieutenant Governor, Waggoner Carr for Attorney General, and Joe Pool for Congressman-At-Large. A number of other Democratic candidates were unopposed and still others won handily over their Republican challengers.

Democrats kept general control of Texas political offices, although the Republicans scored some slight gains.

Here in the 21st Congressional District, incumbent Democrat O. C. Fisher won decisively over his Republican challenger, E. S. Mayer Jr., but in the 16th district west of us, J. T. Rutherford was defeated by Republican Ed Foreman.

The most localized race for Schleicher voters was that of Representative of the 66th district, in which incumbent Jim Nugent was challenged by Republican Bill Stack. Both candidates are from Kerrville.

Local voters gave Nugent 492 votes to Stacy's 237. District-wide, Nugent won by a similar margin.

The hodge-podge of 14 proposed amendments were confusing to many voters and Schleicherites voted down all but the second one, to increase state funds for needy, aged, needy blind, and needy children.

## Eagles to Ozona Tomorrow Nite After 49-8 Win Over Sanderson

The Eldorado Eagles journey to Ozona tomorrow night to participate in one of the "sugar games" of District 8A. The Eagles are still undefeated in conference play and they lay their current tie with Big Lake for first honors on the line with the Lions who are in undisputed second place.

Eldorado's Coach Earl Barnett said this week that Ozona's Pete Montgomery was probably the best breakaway back Eldorado will confront all season; and that Captain Dennis Jurecek and his "Stonewall Squad" would be put to their stern-

est test to date not only in containing Montgomery but in stopping the Lions' recently converted Fullback Barnabe Villareal a stocky powerful runner who takes much pressure off Montgomery with the Lions' versatile attack.

Coach Barnett continued that Ozona employed an unbalanced line with a widely split end which formation should be called a T-Wing formation. The Lions will shift their strong side either right or left as occasion requires. Coach Barnett added that No. 70, Robert Cox; No. 73, Penn Baggett; No. 72, DeHoyas; and No. 30, Richard Var-

gas made up the strong Ozona offensive line and they would nose a distinct challenge to Captain Jurecek, Clyde Thackerson, Ellis Loden, and associates in the Eldorado line.

Coach Barnett concluded that his teams had not succeeded in defeating Ozona in Ozona since his being in Eldorado but that he felt that his lads stood an excellent chance this year although admittedly the Lions were always double-tough in Ozona.

Their record for the year is four wins against three losses and one tie. The Eagles have a season's record of six wins and two ties.

### Sanderson Downed 49-8

Both Eldorado and Ozona took wins the night of November 2, Ozona devastating Rankin 52-13 while Eldorado hammered Sanderson 49-8. Both teams came out unscathed as far as injuries go.

Eldorado's fine breakaway back, Captain Lynn Meador's fellow Eagles gave him opportunity to thrill Eagle fans with brilliant runs of 15 yards, 60 yards, 55 yards, and 35 yards. These scores blasted the Sanderson defense after a scoreless first quarter.

Then irrepresible Ray Ballew took a pass-run guided missile from Captain John McGregor and escorted the ball the rest of the way for a total yardage of 55 yards for another Eagle marker.

At this point, Senior Jim O'Harrow substituted "Mauling Mack" McAngus, Eagle workhorse fullback and demonstrated that he had come of age so to speak, as he went driving into the Sanderson line on a plunge and kept brawling on down for 20 yards and another Eagle score.

At this point, Coach Barnett sent in his "splinter brigade"—the boys

off the bench and left them for the entire final period. The "kids" had a fine time, completely styming Sanderson's offense and going on to score in spite of acute attacks of offside and various troubles of inexperience. They repeatedly shook loose promising halfbacks Sam Henderson and Ronnie Griffin until finally Griffin fired up and shrugged off some half-dozen Sanderson tacklers and drove round his own right end 20 yards for the final score. But the lads with splinters in their pants failed to make the extra point and the score remained 49-8.

Sanderson's score came on a Captain Meador-Ballew bobble with a punt in the third quarter. The ball took a bad bounce and struck one of the Eagles but a Sanderson lad covered the ball on Eldorado's 20-yard line. Sanderson's workhorse Fullback John Robbins called on a final burst of energy and bulled the ball over and did it again even with a five-yard penalty for the two extra points. This was all for Sanderson and they left the

## TYPE I ORAL POLIO VACCINE TO BE ADMINISTERED TUESDAY

Eldorado and Schleicher county are joining with West Texas and Southeast New Mexico in a giant Sabin oral polio drive slated for this coming Tuesday, Nov. 13. The vaccine will be given at the High School gymnasium between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m.

All county residents are urged to go by during those hours for the vaccine.

Dr. E. L. Dyer, county health officer, will have charge of the drive and he will be assisted by Dr. John D. Blackburn, the nurses from the Eldorado Clinic, and by

Mrs. W. H. Hale, school nurse. The polio vaccine which will be given Tuesday is easy to take. You just eat a cube of sugar.

A charge of 25 cents per person for the oral vaccine will be made, but families who cannot afford the charge are to come anyway. The vaccine will be provided free to those who cannot afford it.

Dr. Dyer, as medical coordinator for Schleicher's Sabin Polio Vaccination program, today asked all residents of this area to clip the registration form and keep it until November 13.

Every adult who goes through the line and receives the Sabin vaccine on a lump of sugar must have filled out and signed a registration form. It was pointed out that no person under the age of 21 will be allowed to take the vaccine unless a parent or guardian has signed the form.

In addition to the form printed in this Success issue, other copies will be sent home with school children, and still others will be available at the gym where the vaccine is administered.

Each family should fill out a form in advance to avoid delay at the gym on Nov. 13.

Only a moment's time is required to put the sugar cube in one's mouth and let it dissolve, and the "shot" tastes like the lump of sugar it is.

All persons in the county from six-weeks-old infants up should receive the vaccine, said Dr. Dyer, including children and adults who have had polio shots and boosters previously. Second and third doses of Sabin oral vaccine will be given later on. Each dose is believed to provide immunization for life from a specific type of polio.

Further information on the Sabin vaccine is provided elsewhere in this issue of the Success. Readers are urged to inform themselves fully and then make plans to participate in the immunization program Tuesday.

On The Screen . . .

**'The Spiral Road' Has Setting In Jungle**

Rock Hudson is asked to register an extraordinary variety of intimate emotions in "The Spiral Road," which is having its second and final showing tonight at the Eagle Drive-In Theatre. For his final ordeal in a steaming hot jungle, during which he discovers God, Mr. Hudson sprouts a beard of scriptural length and density. It makes the episode infinitely more convincing. "The Spiral Road" is in Eastman color.

Hudson is a scrubbed and sartorially correct Dutch physician when he comes to the East Indies to learn about leprosy. He is not only the picture of health but also the figure of intolerant and intolerable priggishness.

The picture is adapted from a Jan De Hartog novel, and apparently sets out to prove that the East Indies will get you sooner or later. It takes two hours and 25 minutes to bring Rock Hudson to his knees.

Over such footage and with such obvious expenditure in cast, settings and a junket to Malaya, some diverting sequences will result. For one thing, Burl Ives, with his unactorish mannerisms, is an amusing head doctor, grumpily good with natives, kings, officials, and leprosy.

Edgar Stehli as a positively futile sultan, is a joyful sneak until the disease finally exiles his court to the "colony."

For Hudson, Gena Rowlands provides a believable love affair. She also is on the receiving end of his cruel diatribe against God, man and wives, and somehow survives it.

Hudson is "broken" or "saved" by an isolated tour in an outpost haunted by rains, distant native drums, mysterious gin bottles. Scared to death he fires all his ammunition at the silent forest. When it is gone, he is reduced to tears and prayers.

**Why Oral Vaccine?**

A day-long program is planned for this coming Tuesday, November 13, in which attempt will be made to have all Schleicher county citizens take Type 1 oral Sabin vaccine, as a step toward providing immunity to polio.

What is the story behind all this? Why an oral polio vaccine instead of the one administered by injection, the one with which most children and adults are familiar?

That story is tied up with the story of Dr. Albert B. Sabin and the scientists who worked with him in developing the vaccine so that it can be produced in quantity and thus be made available to everybody.

For many people the fact that a polio vaccine can be taken by mouth is a source of surprise. The fact that the Sabin vaccine is a "live" vaccine is also a surprise.

One of the reasons the new vaccine is given by mouth lies in the fact that the mouth is the normal point of entry for the disease.

The polio virus is one of a large group of viruses that live in the intestinal tract. The new Sabin live vaccine tends to induce a local defense in that area as well as give protection in the circulatory system.

It was not until 1944, when Dr. Sabin, at that time professor of research pediatrics at the Cincinnati College of Medicine, developed the theory upon which the strains of vaccine to be used in this county are based.

In the past, reasoned Dr. Sabin, if people lived long enough they obtained their "live" oral vaccine free in the form of stray or "wild" virus as it occurred in nature, and except for an unfortunate few they developed an immunization in this way.

The unlucky ones, those who paid in suffering, illness, invalidism, or death, were those who were attacked by "wild" virus strong enough to invade the nervous tissue and to penetrate into the central nervous system.

Reduced to the simplest terms, the Sabin vaccine puts into the

system a weakened live virus that immunizes against the wild virus. Made by Wyeth Laboratories at Marieta, Pa., the vaccine has been used to immunize more than 10 million Americans.

Made with weak, distant cousins

of polio-causing virus, the vaccine will not cause polio but fools the body's defense mechanism into making antibodies that will ward off future infections by the real thing.

The vaccine to be used in Sch-

leicher county is being produced as a liquid, which may be taken in this form or administered on a cube of sugar. For infants, it will be fed by dropper. It will be administered to every resident of the county on Tuesday, Nov. 13.



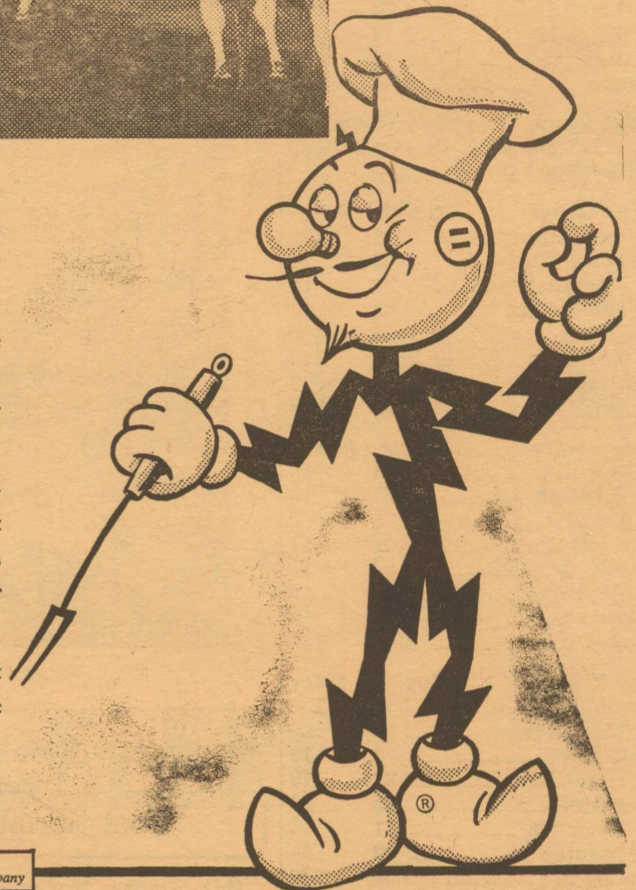

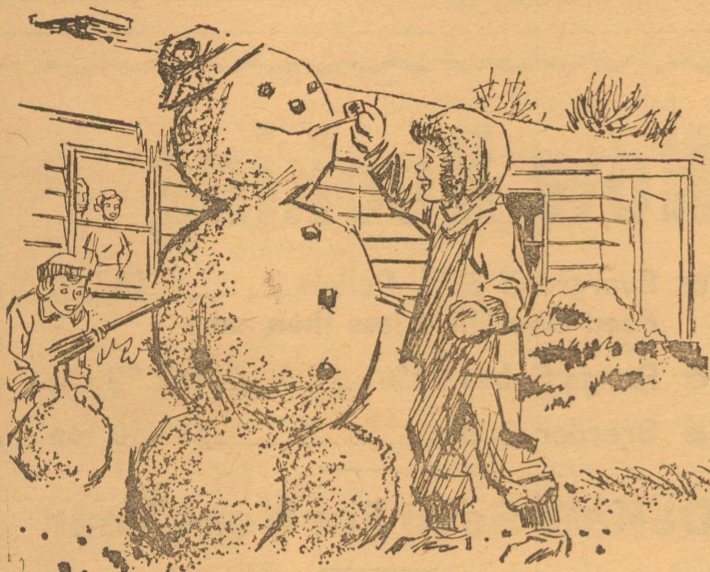

**Livestock Survey To Be Conducted by Post Office**

Rural mail carriers from the Eldorado Post Office will leave some livestock survey cards along their routes beginning Nov. 16. "Information reported on these cards is used to set the yearly inventory of livestock and poultry on Texas farms," Postmaster Carr explained. Rural carriers distribute the cards at random in boxes along their routes. "This means that not every box will get a card," Mr. Carr said. "For this reason, it's important for everyone who gets a card to return it filled out so that USDA can get

a true sample of the state's livestock holdings." Carrier assisting with the survey is Billy Frank Blaylock. Facts and figures in this survey are the basis for the Texas and national pig crop report and inventories of livestock and poultry on farms as of the first of the year. Stockmen and many others use this information in making business decisions. Survey results will be widely distributed through Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service releases, newspapers, farm magazines, radio, and television.

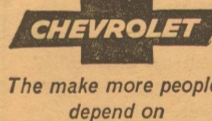

### Questions And Answers About Oral Polio Vaccine

Many persons have been asking questions pertaining to the polio vaccine coming up Tuesday. Here are the major questions and answers:

Q.—Who should take this vaccine?

A.—All persons residing in this community. This includes everyone from babies to senior citizens.

Q.—How will the vaccine be given?

A.—Each person will be given a dose of Type 1 Sabin polio vaccine—two drops of vaccine on a sugar lump.

Q.—What will this cost?

A.—A donation of 25 cents to help defray the cost of the program is being requested for each of the three doses of oral vaccine. Goal is to have everyone immunized whether he contributes or not.

Q.—I have had the Salk polio injections. Should I take this too?

A.—By all means! While the Salk vaccine was a very important step, this vaccine provides more complete protection for a longer period of time. Sabin vaccine also prevents you from being a carrier of the dread disease. This means protection for the whole community because the virus can be eliminated from the area.

Q.—Is there any danger in taking this vaccine?

A.—Type 1 vaccine has been given to millions of people here in the US as well as millions elsewhere in the world. There have been no reactions in all these people.

Q.—What about pregnant women?

A.—They should take the vaccine. It will protect them, without causing any trouble, and it may give temporary protection to the newborn.

Q.—If I am sick, should I take the vaccine?

A.—If you are troubled with vomiting or diarrhea or have a fever, it would be better for you to take your vaccine at a later date. Also if you have had your tonsils removed in the previous two weeks you should not take the vaccine.

Q.—I am a diabetic. Should I take the vaccine? What about the sugar lump?

A.—Diabetics, like all others, should take the vaccine. The sugar lump contains 9 calories, so it will not upset the diabetic. If you wish, the dose can be given to you directly from the dropper.

Q.—Does it taste bad?

A.—There is no taste to it.

Q.—Why can't my family doctor give the vaccine?

A.—He can. However from the community standpoint it is more advantageous to give the vaccine to everyone at the same time.

Q.—Are there any reactions or side affects after taking the vaccine?

A.—No.

Q.—Can persons allergic to penicillin take the vaccine?

A.—Yes. The vaccine does not contain penicillin or any other substance to which people are commonly allergic.

Q.—Will this one dose give me complete protection?

A.—This dose will give protection to Type 1 only. Type 2 will be administered about a month later, and Type 3 at a still later time.

Austin.—A statewide drive is under way to raise \$950,000 for a "Cerama Star" shrine at Washington-on-the-Brazos, where the Republic of Texas was born.

Campaign was announced by Gov. Price Daniel after meeting with Mrs. Mary Moody Northen of Galveston, Robert L. Thornton of Dallas and Gus S. Wortham of Houston, who co-chaired the project.

"Cerama Star," as visualized by designer Clyde E. Gray of Woodville, will be a star-shaped concrete building covering five acres of ground at the historical site near Brenham.

It will contain more than 6,000 square feet of ceramics, tracing Texas history.

Shrine is to perpetuate the memory of the 59 courageous early Texans who met at Old Washington on March 2, 1836 and declared their independence from a tyrannical Mexican government. They set in motion a course of events which saw, within 50 days, the fall of the Alamo, the massacre at Goliad, and the decisive victory at San Jacinto which secured the freedom of Texas.

Back in 1956 the Texas Press Association joined with the Texas Independence Day Organization to

encourage construction of such a memorial.

Building is to be shaped like the Lone Star, with a tower rising from the center, topped by a powerful searchlight known as the "Light of Texas Freedom."

An elevator will take passengers to the top.

### Subterranean Center

Texas Department of Public Safety plans to go underground to handle disaster relief operations.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr. reports that ground has been broken for a \$630,000 underground state emergency operating center.

Garrison said the present disaster communications center, located in the basement of the department's headquarters, lacked facilities to handle major disasters — such as Hurricane Carla — at peak efficiency. The new 12,000-foot center will facilitate uninterrupted operation for 30 days.

Designed to withstand the effects of air blast, thermal radiation, residual radiation (including fallout) and chemical and biological agents of warfare, the safety center will be manned around the clock from the time it's completed. It will accommodate about 120 persons, and be equipped with an independent water supply, fuel supply and auxiliary utility power.

### Draft Status

In times of crisis, men worry about their draft status.

President Kennedy's arms quarantine on Cuba has brought a flood of calls to State Selective Service headquarters, in Austin, from men concerned about their

"obligation."

If you were born before August 30, 1922, you don't have any, says SSS headquarters.

If you were born after August 30, 1922, you legally are required to be registered unless you are not yet 18 years old.

Any man past 35 is no longer liable for military service. But he still is obligated to inform his

local draft board of any change of address.

### World's Fair Committee

Governor Daniel has picked a 25 member advisory committee to consider a Texas exhibit for the 1964 World's Fair in New York City. He has asked the committee to prepare a recommendation by January, for Legislative approval.
