No Cases Of Rabies Are Reported In Mitchell County For the 1981-82 Period

According to the quarterly rabies report from the bureau of veterinary public health, part of the Texas Department of Health, 138 cases or rabies were reported in Texas from January 1 through March 31, with skunks accounting for 112 of the cases.

However, in Mitchell County, no cases or rabies were reported, as was the case in 188 other Texas counties. But county residents should be wary, since the peak of the animal rabies season has been April and May for the last three years, according to Dr. Jerome Greenberg, associate commissioner for preventable diseases for the Texas Department of Health.

"It has to do with warmer weather, since the animals are foraging and ranging farther," Greenberg said. Greenberg also said there should be a dropoff in rabies cases in June, July and August. In September and October, there should be another upturn in rabies cases, but nothing like April and May, Greenberg said.

Mixed Drink Tax Is Up 21 Percent

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said collection of the state's 10 percent mixed drink tax during the first quarter of 1982 was up 21 percent over the same period last year.

Bullock said the state received \$34.5 million in taxes on the sale of mixed drinks during the first three months of this year.

He said his office is sending checks totaling \$10 million to 216 counties and 404 cities as their share of the gross receipts tax on mixed drinks for the first quarter.

The state's general revenue fund will receive the balance, \$24.5 million, of the tax money collected.

Texas cities and counties reach receive a 15 percent rebate of the tax collected on mixed drinks sold within their boundaries under the law that legalized the sale of mixed drinks in the state.

The mixed drink tax is collected by the Alcoholic Beverage Commission and the city-county rebates are sent out quarterly by the Comptroller's office.

Bullock said first quarter tax collections represent the sale of more than \$345 million worth of mixed drinks.

Mitchell County received \$444.44, 15 percent of the total \$2,960.92.

Scurry County received \$3,899.77 of their total \$25,998 and Nolan County received \$2,896 of their \$19,311. Howard County's 15 percent totalled \$6,090 of their \$40,604.

Persons wishing to order seafood and help with their tax deductible orders, may fill out an order blank that is available at the Playhouse, City National Bank or from Bill or Gloria Erwin.

Seafood available include such delicacies as Alaska salmon, halibut, cod, rainbow trout, Alaska

crab legs, lobster tail and scallops. Mrs. Erwin stated that she feels that these delectable foods being offered were prices quiet reasonable.

Deadline to place an order is May 21 and all orders taken in advance, means more money for the Playhouse, added Mrs. Erwin.

She said that persons can take an order blank, fill it in and either mail it to the address on the order form or bring it in.

YOU AUTO KNOW

Q. With a rare feeling of competence, I started to replace my own shock absorbers one day. The old ones are still on the car. I gave up when I couldn't budge the blasted things.
A. First of all, get yourself a can of penetrating oil and apply it, very generously, to the bolts. Then, go take a nap or watch a ball game. When you come back, the penetrating oil should have done its thing. Shock fasteners are among the most difficult objects to move you'll find on a car, but it can be done. Next, get the wheels up off the ground with axle blocks to release pressure on shocks. Remove the lower fastener, then the top one. On the rear shocks, work from inside the engine compartment. In re-installing, just do the reverse: Top fastener first, then bottom. If the fasteners still give you trouble, apply more penetrating oil and 40 more winks.

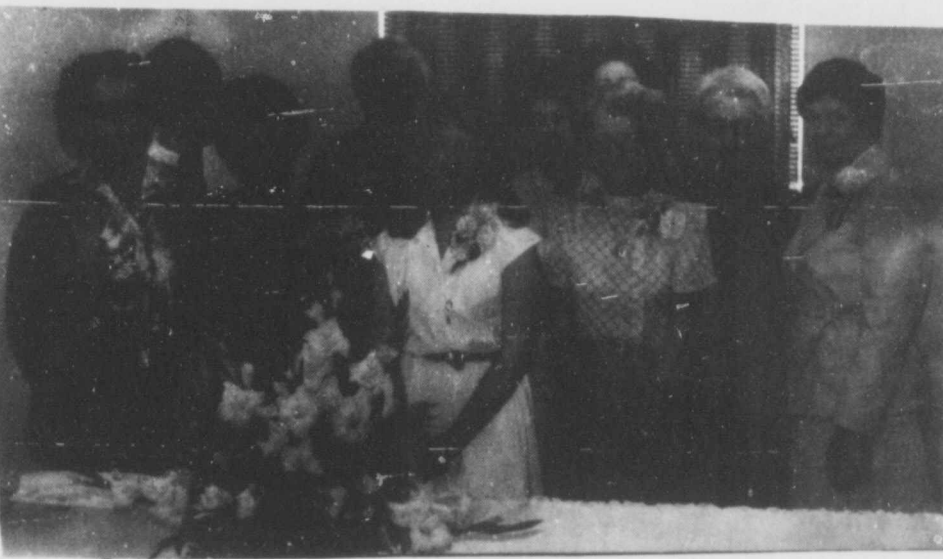

Trifling, yet true, John Philip Sousa might have been a baker fiddling with bread and cakes instead of acclaimed the "March King" but for a "conspiracy" to make baking particularly hard work.

The incident which almost sidetracked Sousa in his last year at the Conservatory of Music in Washington, D. C. was started over a spat with his professor. On this day in particular, his professor was more irritable than ever. However the youth played his violin, the professor met it with displeasure. Finally, in great vexation, the professor screamed for young Sousa to get out.

On arrival home, Sousa's father was curious. When the boy told

him what happened, he wanted to know what other profession or work Philip would like to do, now that he didn't want to be a musician.

Immediately Philip said, "a baker." Not disturbed, Mr. Sousa went to a friend in the neighborhood who operated a bake shop. It was agreed that young Philip would report for work that night. The youth would attend public school during the day.

"Then you'd better make up with your professor. That is, if you wish to start music again."

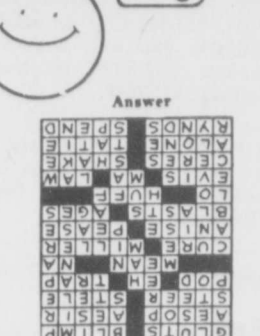
John Philip Sousa never broke with his music again. He went on to gather laurels from kings, governments, and presidents, and won the distinction of "March King" of all times.

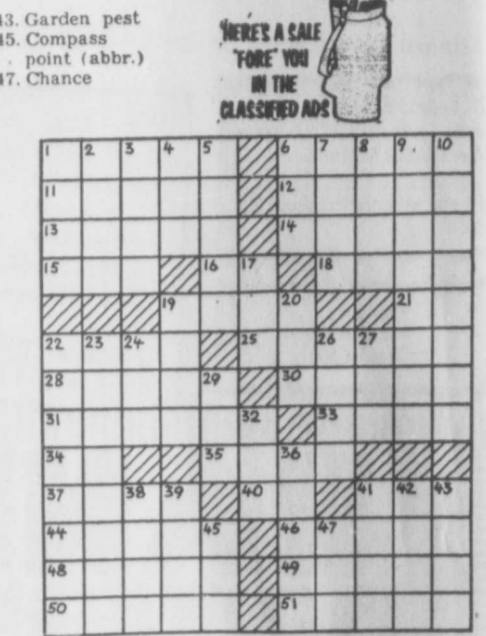
