Appointed as farm census takers for the county are Mrs. Bruce Byrne, Mrs. Raymond Watlington, Mrs. Buddy Logsdon and T. J. Geiger. Enumerators are key workers in the agricultural census. It is the enumerator's responsibility to locate every farm within an enumeration district assigned to him (or her), determine if the operator of the farm has answered all questions on a questionnaire that will be mailed to the farmer by the Census Bureau, help the farmer complete any unanswered questions on the form, check answers for accuracy, and deliver the form to the Census Bureau.

The new courtesy boxes were installed Friday. One for out-of-town mail, the other is plainly marked for local mail. Pickup time for Sundays and holidays will be 5:15 p. m. Mail will be dispatched by truck to the Abilene sectional office for next day delivery.

Mail delivery on Sunday-holiday will be delivered at the Spring Meadows and all points in the Stamford, Big Spring and Abilene districts. Under the old schedule, Mrs. Morris pointed out, mail to Snyder and letters going west, mailed on Sunday, could not reach the addressee before Tuesday.

## \$15,500 For Equalization, Re-evaluation

Colorado Independent School District Board of Education has approved a contract with Pritchard and Abbott, Evaluating Engineering firm of Ft. Worth.

Contract calls for expenditure of \$15,500 with the equalization engineering firm for the purpose of a complete tax equalization study and report. The amount is payable over a three year period if the board sees fit to pay in installment.

Property subject to taxation in the Colorado Independent School District will be re-evaluated and brought up to date, according to a statement issued by the office of C. N. (Nick) Farrar, school tax assessor-collector.

"The service is not intended to raise or to lower any values of any individual company or corporation," the statement said.

"The Board of Education proposes, rather, to bring about as near as may be, equality and uniformity of taxation as is required by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Texas," the statement added.

Last professional tax survey for equalization purposes in Colorado Independent School District was done in 1949. At that time values for taxable purposes were based on 1942-43 values which have now become obsolete, the statement concluded.

Re-evaluation decision comes after a detailed and considerable study by school officials here.

School Board, in fact, asked the City Council here to join with the school board in financing a tax re-evaluation to be used by both city and school district. In their September meeting, members of the Colorado City Council voted "No" to the proposal. There was no public discussion in Council meeting of the pro and con of the matter.

School Board had invited city officials to bear half of the tax equalization report for a copy of the tax survey of that portion of the Colorado Independent District which lies within the town's city limits.

Original figure of the tax survey contract with Pritchard and Abbott was \$17,500. Of that total \$12,800 was to be for property, real estate etc. within the borders of city limits. The city was asked to defray half that amount, or \$6,400.

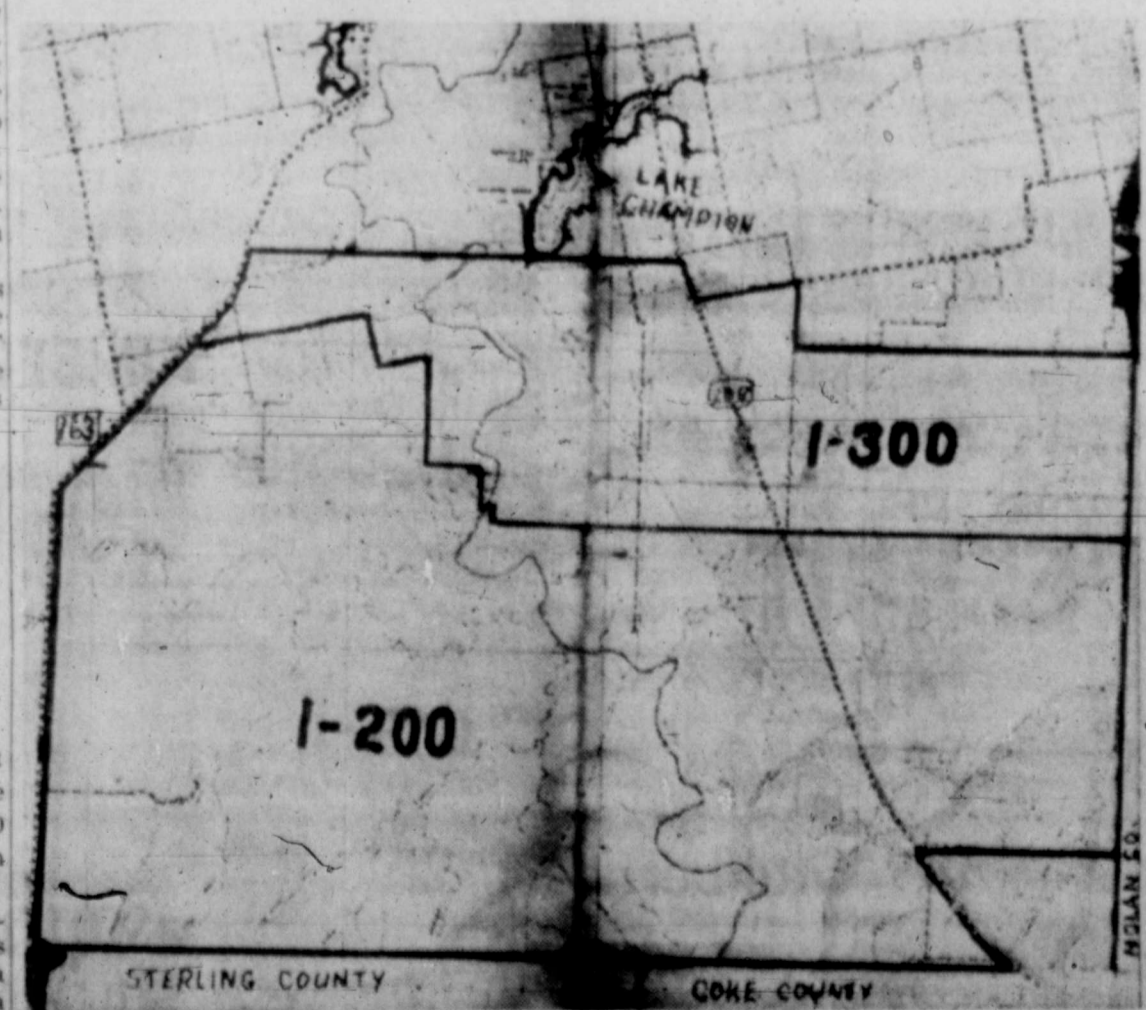
With the lowering of the "asking price" by Pritchard and Abbott in-city property tax survey figure was dropped to a total of \$11,090, Warren Costin, president of the school board said.

The tax study is to begin "almost immediately," Costin and Warren Anderson, member of the board, said.

Tax re-evaluation here may preclude a building program and school expansion.

School officials have been considering a program which would, if approved, add a cafeteria to the high school grounds, new quarters for vocational studies, a new wing on the gymnasium for additional classrooms, covered walkways between the various high school plant buildings and the building of a track at Wolf Stadium. All weather press box and concession stands have also come in for some consideration.

## Miss Idalia Wood Speaker For Zetagathian Meeting

A vivid account of the American woman's buying habits was told the Zetagathian Study Club by Miss Idalia Wood Mitchell County Home Demonstration Agent at their November meeting.

Miss Wood's subject was "What Makes Women Buy." Her talk was a detailed discussion of women's buying habits and what motivation factors contribute to her purchases.

The speaker was introduced by Mrs. Bob Carver in the home of Mrs. Warren Anderson, Nov. 5.

"Motivational research analysts are busily compiling statistics to help decide whether a certain product would sell; so the ideas, whims, habits, eccentricities and intuit-

on of woman take on an added importance to anyone selling products," Miss Wood said.

"Knowledge of how women spend their time and what they are doing is valuable, in selling, for it indicates to some extent woman's interests and helps in the timing of sales messages."

"Woman's role is becoming that of a manager rather than a worker; with the advent of automation; luxuries are becoming necessities; 99% of the houses are wired for electricity."

"Today's women are on the go, meetings, chauffeuring children and husband, visiting, vacations and an astounding 4% do full or part-time work outside the home. Many products are designed with a view

toward this woman on the go on the job."

"They are generally well-informed via reading, radio, television. They are adventurous, well-informed, discriminating and exacting in their choice of products and services."

"Woman's buying habits are characterized by brand consciousness, impulsiveness and boredom buying. Studies show that three of four people would be willing to pay more for a nationally known brand name. They wait until they get to the store to make their shopping decisions. With more time and money in their hands, they are likely to indulge in leisurely and sometimes unnecessary buying—boredom buying."

"Comprehensive figures on

impulse buying show that a bout 70% of supermarket buying is on the spur of the moment. This means that brand familiarity, outstanding trade marks and package designs are more important than ever before."

"Woman's interests have been thoroughly and specifically measured by businesses, psychologists and researchers of all types, and all of these studies add up to a set of natural interests for women, revolving around home, family and self. A key for sales advertising, since natural interests offer the first step in including you as a prospective customer," the speaker said.

"House and fixing them up, family recreation and entertainment are good topics for attracting women. Her interest in food is usually related to her interest in her family, their health and happiness; preparing good and attractive meals gives her the satisfaction of being a good mother," Miss Wood said.

"The reasons behind her interest in clothing are much the same as the motives creat-

ing a natural interest in personal appearance, that is, gaining attention, being acceptable. An outfit that looks well on her suits her face, figure and personality. She wants to be up-to-date; in fashion, like by others," according to the speaker.

"Color has a great deal of value as an attention getter with a woman whether in advertising, packaging and display or a part of the product. In products, color has been used to create new interest in automobiles, household light bulbs and soap. Color is especially important with women for their color tastes are generally more sophisticated than men's," said the speaker.

Miss Woods concluded with the advice of a noted theologian who said "that the most difficult thing in the world is to know thyself."

"Make it your business to know yourself, which is the most difficult—and the most valuable—lesson in the world. And you will be a more aware, a more alert and more efficient consumer."

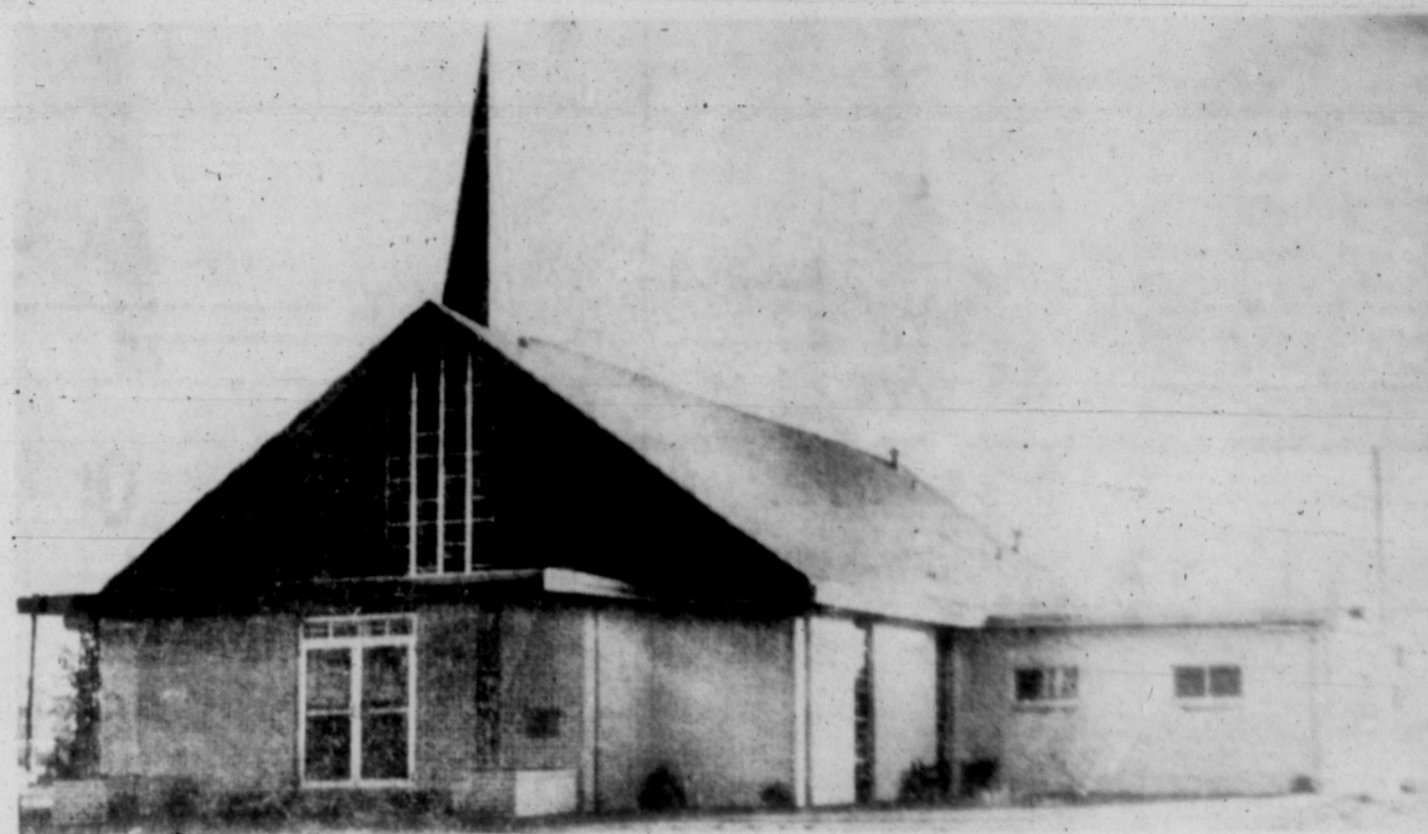
