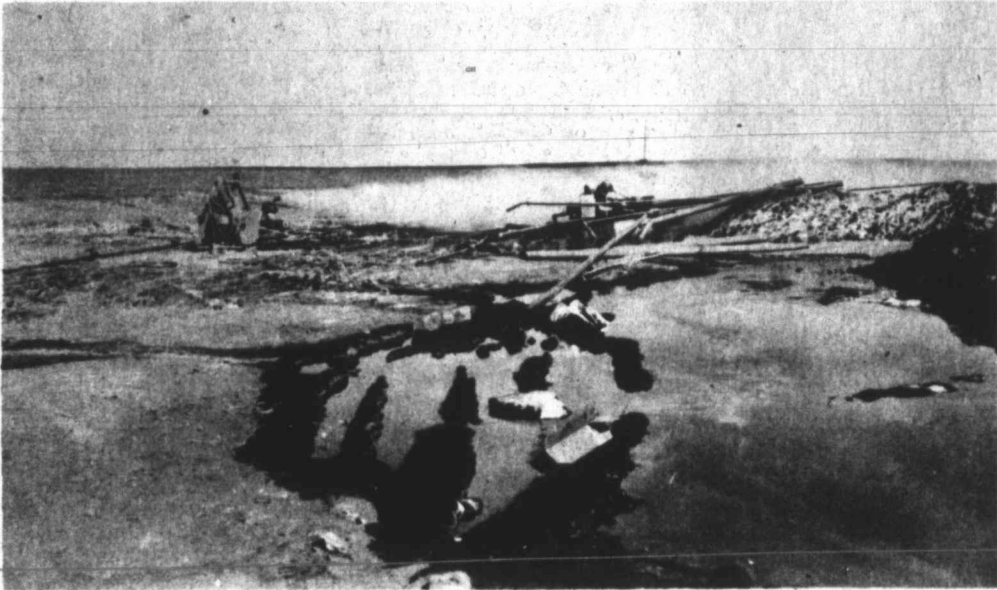

Drilling Halted

He had been shot once in the chest with a .25-caliber automatic pistol which investigating officers said was found beside the body.

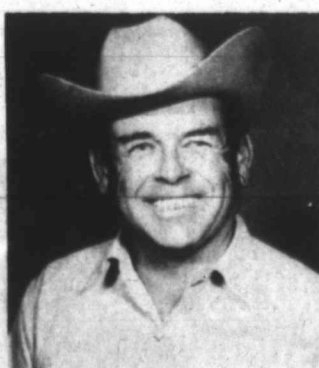
A ruling by Scurry County Justice of the Peace T. E. Shelburne of Hermleigh was being withheld pending investigation. The shooting was being investigated by Scurry County officers because the Fuller home is located just inside Scurry County.

Fuller was found by a stepdaughter.

Shelburne said he had probably been dead for several hours.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Wednesday in the Kiker-Seale Funeral Chapel in Colorado City. Officiating was the Rev. Cadlo Matthews, pastor of Plainview Baptist Church, assisted by Rev. Glenn Rosenfeld, pastor of First Baptist Church.

Burial was in Hamlin Cemetery. Pallbearers were Ben Young, Vernon Middleton, James Gisttrap, Arlis Cotton, Watt Cotton and Ed Deaton.

If there is a weakness this year I believe it is in pitching. Not that there are not good pitchers in the league, because there certainly are, boys such as Gene Carter, Chuck Claxton and two ten year olds Mitch Williams, and Victor Jackson. Wise To Be Named Pct.1 Justice Of Peace

County Commissioners will hold a special called meeting at 10 a.m. today (Thursday) and at that time are expected to appoint M. O. (Odie) Wise as Justice of the Peace for Precinct 1.

Wise will take office June 1, provided the commissioners make the appointment as is expected.

The appointment was made necessary by the recent resignation of Leonard Henderson who had held the job of Precinct 1 JP for almost eight years.

Henderson won re-election in the May 4 Democratic Primary but notified commissioners May 14 that he was resigning June 1. Henderson told the Record that

he would soon be 73 and wanted to relax.

Henderson in winning re-election defeated a strong challenge from Wise. Henderson received 344 votes to 270 for Wise.

Wise will serve until Jan. 1 as the appointee in the job and then whoever is placed on the ballot in the general election will take over the job Jan. 1.

The county Democratic Executive Committee is to meet June 3 to canvass votes cast in the June 1 Democratic Primary runoff election and at that time is expected to set up a precinct committee and a meeting time for that committee to consider anyone who wants to have their name placed on the November general election ballot, according to County Democratic Chairman Tom Rees.

The Precinct 1 Committee will select the person whose name will go on the ballot and

the person who most likely will win the position and take the job Jan. 1.

Wise will be appointed to fill Henderson's unexpired term because he expressed a desire to have the job by seeking election and the commissioners court believes he is a good man

and will do a good job, said County Judge Bill Carter. Wise, 61, is a veteran of World War II and has lived in Mitchell County for more than half his life. He is a Baptist and is an active member of the Masonic Lodge and the local Veterans of Foreign Wars Post.

Arson Suspected In Fuller House Fire

Colorado City police are investigating the possibility of arson in the fire Friday night that destroyed the home of Col-

orado City police officer Pat Fuller.

Fuller was on duty at the time of the fire and his wife was away from the home, bicycling with friends.

Police Chief Jesse Browning told the Record that police found one screen that had been pried off a window of the house.

The fire started in the area

of the kitchen and den, according to Fire Chief Dale Mathis.

Damage was estimated to be about \$30,000.

Fuller and his wife were only recently married and everything in the house was destroyed including all of their wedding gifts.

The home was located north of Interstate 20, northwest of the Ranchito Restaurant.

Jury Brings 15 Indictments

The grand jury met Tuesday in the Mitchell County Courthouse and returned 15 indictments, but three of the persons mentioned in indictments have not been apprehended yet, so their names or offenses will not be mentioned until they have been arrested.

Two separate indictments were brought against Mamel Del Real for cattle theft, one offense for 12 cattle stolen from Waddell Strain and one for five cattle stolen from Harold Hester.

An indictment was brought against three men, William Emerson, Tommy Emerson and Jack Samuels, for theft from the Loyd Frame home in Loraine. The three are presently serving sentences in an Oklahoma penitentiary.

An indictment for possession of marijuana over four ounces with intent to distribute was returned against Lupe Galvan Jr. of Loraine.

Other indictments include: Jimmy Harold Smith, robbery

by assault; Kenneth Ray Green, two counts, assault with a deadly weapon and attempted murder of George Edward Miles; John Ridge Jr., operating a gambling establishment; Ben Garcia, driving while intoxicated, subsequent offense; Riley Austin Jr., DWI, subsequent; Randy Sanders, aggravated assault on Hubert Earl Green; Billy Jack Gaines, DWI, subsequent; James Bender, aggravated assault; and the three others not yet arrested.

Club Board Raises Dues

Colorado Country Club board of directors met Tuesday night for a special called meeting to discuss dues and memberships.

Dues were raised from an across-the-board \$17.50 per month to \$22.50 for stockholding members and \$27.50 for associate members.

In further action, the board voted to take no more associate memberships in the future and to allow associate members the opportunity to purchase stock by paying in an additional \$150.

The board called in all stock, with the idea of issuing new stock when certificates are available. Lovess Curlee, club permanent secretary, will handle the stock for the club.

Directors also agreed to do additional work on the swimming pool area and to purchase a riding greens mower.

Subject to the board's approval will be the hiring of Rhonda J. Steele for high school journalism, sponsor of the yearbook and Wolverines sponsor, and Mrs. Fredalyn Everett, Title I reading at junior high.

Miss Steele holds a B.S. degree from East Texas State University at Commerce, major in journalism and major in English. She is now teaching English and speech at Bonham High School in Bonham. A native of Longview, she graduated from White Oak High School and from Kilgore Junior College. She has one year teaching experience and sponsored the high school yearbook at Bonham.

Mrs. Everett holds a B.S. degree from Hardin Simmons in Elementary Education with minors in English and psychology. She has 13 years teaching experience, teaching at Abilene, San Antonio, Irving and Colorado City.

Positions still open include speech therapist and earth science at junior high.

Rabies Shots Important

The city of Colorado City recommends that all dogs and cats be vaccinated for rabies, not only to comply with the city's ordinance, but also because the summer high-rabies season is beginning.

Dogs over three months old are required by the city ordinance to be vaccinated for rabies by a licensed veterinarian and should have a certificate in proof of vaccination for each year. The cost of vaccination is \$2. Dog tags cannot be issued by the city unless a certificate of vaccination is offered as proof of vaccination. The dog tag license also costs \$2.

The city also recommends that cat owners have their pets vaccinated against rabies.

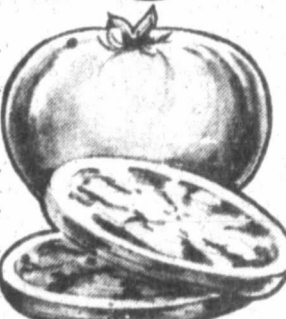

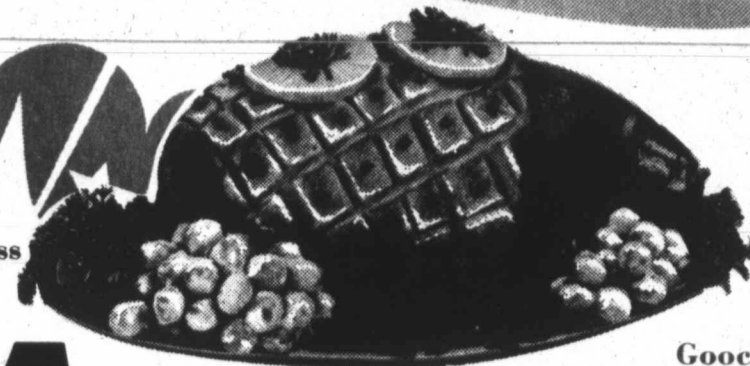
