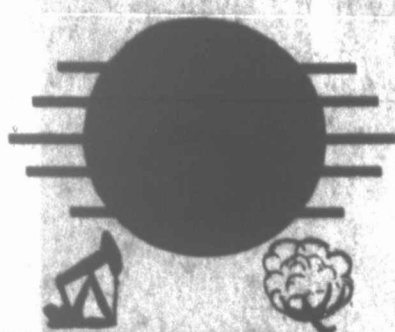

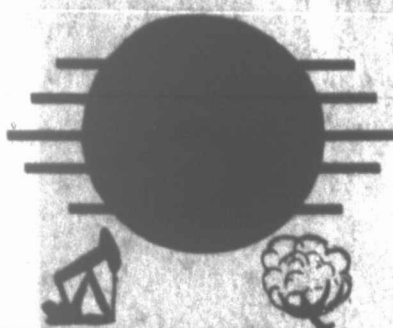
The Amarillo scouts call themselves the Kwahadi Dancers and their stop in Colorado City is part of a

Appraisal district buys computer

The Mitchell County Appraisal District board of directors Thursday accepted a bid on a new computer, but delayed action on software until district employees and Colorado Independent School District personnel observe one bidder's software packages.

The computer bid was awarded to IBM for a total of \$58,854. The only other bidder was Business Records Corp. whose bid was slightly higher. Both companies submitted bids on an IBM-36 computer.

Two bids also were opened for business records and collection software. Business Records bid \$17,000 plus \$1,500 installation while Davis-Kinard bid \$20,000 plus installation. Earlier Thursday, the Mitchell County Commissioners purchased its software package from Davis-Kinard.

The school district will open bids on software later this month.

Chief Appraiser Mike Burt said the Davis-Kinard system had been demonstrated to him and his staff, but he hasn't seen the Business Records proposed package. He and CISD Business Manager Geneva Findley will travel to Midland to see the Business Records package before any decision is made.

In other business, the board approved a proposed budget for 1987 which must be approved by taxing entities in the county.

 Back in the early 1980's one of my contact lens patients was a young Big Spring School athlete named Richard (Dick) Ebling. Dick is now a successful Optometrist in Houston, Texas specializing in the fitting of contact lenses. Last week I read an article that Dick had written for the Texas Optometry Journal and it was particularly interesting to me because I have documented cases in my own office exactly like those Dick wrote about. In the article Dick says that three times in the last two years he has been able to relate severe ocular irritation to Jalapeno peppers and soft contact lenses. He says that the patients were in extreme pain (lasting for up to 48 hours) although their corneas checked out clear. The discomfort began after eating Mexican food and Jalapeno peppers before removing their contact lenses. My cases were exactly the same and although we can't say for sure that Jalapenos were guilty, it's better to be safe than sorry. So, the next time Jalapenos appear on your menu please be EXTREMELY careful about cleaning your hands before removing your contacts. You know what that hot stuff feels like in your mouth so you can imagine how it would feel in your eyes.

Program on universe showing at San Angelo

Busy men can be good fathers

On this Father's Day, let's take a look at what an important role fathers play in family relationships. Because of job demands, many fathers spend a great deal of time away from home. So comes the question, "Can busy fathers be good fathers?"

The answer is quite simply, "Yes." Despite great demands a man's work makes on his time and energy, it is still possible for a busy father to be a good father.

Many psychologists feel that the quality of time spent with children is not as important as the quality of the relationship with them. The real key to sharing time with children is to find activities that are fun for

both father and children. For some this is sports, for others craft work, and for still others, a quiet hobby. When pleasure is not part of what you do together, the child will sense that you are forcing yourself and the value of the companionship will be lost.

In interviews with college students about their fathers, it was the little things their fathers had done with them that were recalled most often. What was remembered with pleasure were the quiet walks of a father and daughter, the hot cocoa and cinnamon toast a father made for his son when he was ill, the stories a father told about his mischief-making childhood days. These ways of showing your youngster that you care about him and enjoy his com-

pany are what matter most to the child now and in later years.

Activities you do with your child are very important, but equally important to a close father-child relationship is the way you treat the child and his ideas. Closely related to respect for a child is the recognition of his individuality. Every child in a family is different in personality, interests, and talents from his parents and his brothers, and sisters.

The love, companionship, guidance, and discipline a father gives his children, even though his after work hours are limited, play an important role in the kind of adults they will become. The time a father spends with his children is a value the child may not realize until he is older.

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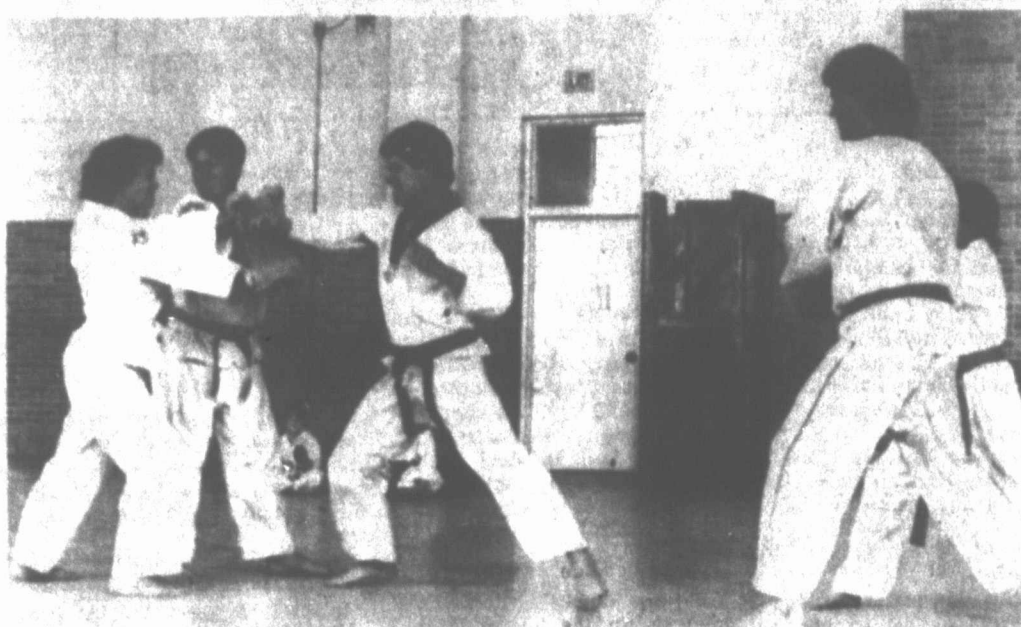

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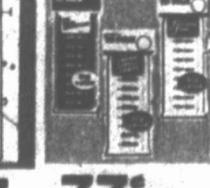

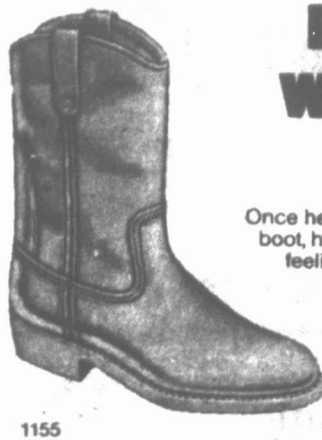
Scott Dyer came in to relieve Mann and struck out the next two to retire the side but the Pirates scored five more the next and fifth inning.

County Oil News

Mitchell County's Dockrey Field gained a new producer when Wayne Dodson completed the No. 1 O. B. Trulock three miles southwest of Westbrook.

The well indicated ability to pump at the rate of 46 barrels of oil per day. It was taken to a 3,400-ft. bottom and will produce from a set of perforations in the Clear Fork Formation, 2,932 to 3,337 feet into the wellbore. The operation is in an 80-acre lease in the T&P Survey.

Mrs. W. M. Keck Jr. of Lafayette, La., has revealed plans to drill five 1,000-ft. developmental wells in the Sharon Ridge Field. The operator has 160 acres leased, with drillsites in Mitchell County's H&TC Survey. Drillsites are about three miles northeast of Cuthbert. The ventures have been designated as the Nos. 7, 10, 14 and 15 Coleman Ranch and the No. 9 Coleman Ranch "A".

Chevron USA is preparing to conduct a re-entry operation at the No. 1306 North Westbrook Unit, formerly known as the No. 6 E. T. Strain "D". Location is seven miles north of Westbrook in Mitchell County's Westbrook Field.

The well originally was drilled in 1955 with Paul DeCleva as the operator. With a total depth of 3,061 feet, it produced 87 barrels of oil per day.

An undisclosed production interval has been perforated at the No. 2 Ellwood "C" at a wildcat location in Mitchell County about 25 miles southeast of Colorado City.

Carrying permit for 7,400-ft. TD, the well is bottomed at a depth of 7,340 feet. Perforations were made in the Strawn Sand. Tutill and Barbee Inc. is the operator.

Chevron U.S.A. has bottomed its No. 96 W. L. Foster at a depth of 3,054 feet in Mitchell County's part of the East Howard-Istan Field. Location is about ten
