The 1932 series of the Dawson County Baseball League closed with a fine baseball exposition Monday at the Lamesa Ball Park when the Ackery team, headed by the veteran pitcher Munn, carried off the big end of a 7-2 score from the Arvana aggregation.

Sunday Crowd Sets Record
Attendance record for the entire series was set with a crowd of 1500 persons Sunday who were gathered at the park to witness the games of the semi-finals. Fans from every corner of the county were present to see the battles, and state their guess as to the outcome of the game on the following day.

The grand stand was filled to capacity, as were the bleachers on the west end of the park, and the largest number of cars of the week, lined the interior of the high-board square. The crowd on Monday while smaller than that of the preceding day, was large, and it is conservatively estimated by those in charge that there were over 1000 people who witnessed the last game of the two weeks' series.

Good Game Monday
With no exception, the game played by the two leading teams, Ackerly and Arvana, on Monday was the best game of the entire series, and it is felt that the two strongest teams participated in that game.

The game was marked by excellent pitching, good fielding, and hard hitting. In the pitcher's box for Ackerly was the steady "old head" Munn, who has entertained crowds over the entire United States with his pitching, while Coffee did the receiving behind the bat. The batteries for Arvana were: Hambright, pitcher and Peterson catcher. Hambright was relieved in the sixth by "Lefty" Davis who had been holding down the center field position, and Hambright went to that place in the trade.

The game was anybody's "old game" until the first half of the sixth when the Ackerly team got to Hambright for five hits and five runs. Until that inning the game was close with Arvana scoring the first run in the third period. Ackerly retallied with one in the fourth and then sewed up the game in the sixth.

GOVERNOR STERLING BREAKS TO LARGE CROWD HERE SATURDAY

Several hundred people greeted Governor Ross S. Sterling here last Saturday afternoon when he spoke in the interest of his candidacy for re-nomination at the run-off primary.

The speaking took place on the court house lawn, the band stand being used as a platform. Carl Rountree introduced R. A. Stuart, Fort Worth, former senator who is traveling with Governor Sterling. Mr. Stuart spoke briefly and then introduced Frank Oglive also of Ft. Worth, who then introduced the Governor.

Governor Sterling reviewed his administration as governor and as highway commission chairman.

Loud speakers were used to carry the message to the crowd which packed the northwest corner of the square. Those who have heard the governor before in the campaign, declared this was one of the best talks he has given. Before and following the talk Governor Sterling was greeted by large crowds of Dawson county citizens.

From here the party went to San Angelo where they made another address Saturday night.

Everyone is cordially invited to hear him.

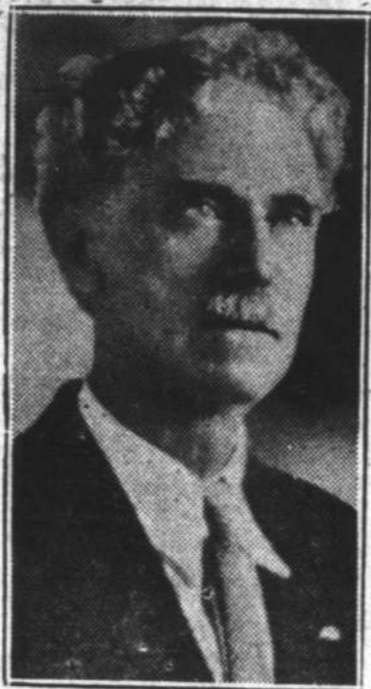

CAPTAIN MACDONALD HAS BEEN IN ALL BUT TWO CONTINENTS

Captain H. W. Macdonald, traveler, and noted explorer, who has visited all but two continents of the earth, has been in Lamesa a week delivering lectures on his travels and Missionary work in foreign lands.

He has made addresses at the Methodist church (colored) the First Methodist Church, the Luncheon Club, The Lions Club, a meeting of the Welfare Association, and will deliver an address at the Methodist church at 4:00 o'clock Friday afternoon and at the Presbyterian Church next Sunday evening. The town and community are invited to hear him.

World brotherhood is more than a pretty phrase to Capt. Macdonald, Missionary, world traveler, and philosopher. To him, after some 35 years of almost continuous travel, in nearly every land on the globe, among all but a very few of the peoples of the earth, he has not only a spiritual belief but a scientific proof that all men are brothers.

When dining with royalty at their command or when sitting, naked, among 250 naked men and women in the fast blackness of darkest Africa he has seen not one but many nearly invisible links that bind men into a common brotherhood.

So firm is his belief in that creed that he has for years traveled hither he will armed with a smile, friendliness, his only currency and knowledge his only aim and objective.

To understand a life like his it is necessary to go back to his birth. The son of a southern lady and a Scotch sea captain, he was shipwrecked at the entrance to Long Island Sound. The crew was lost, his mother and sister drowned and only one sailor and his father saved. During the black night as his father clung to bits of wreckage there came across the water to him a plaintive cry and daylight revealed the 11-months-old infant rocking safely in the waves in his crude but staunch wooden cradle.

"There I was" says Captain Macdonald, "Master of my own ship at 11 months." There indeed was a premonition of his later life, greatful father, then and there dedicated the life of his motherless son to the work of God, and though not in the conventional channels that life has been given more or less to the advancement of God's kingdom.

At the age of twelve every book in the Sunday school library had been absorbed by his mind. At that same age he was ready to seek further knowledge and his world travels began.

This is only an introductory to this staunch world traveler who is now in Lamesa. Make it a point to hear him and learn from him first hand the many things that you have been interested in concerning foreign lands. At every address this traveling Scotchman gives exhibits of various souvenirs, which are peculiar to the race about which he speaks.

TRADES DAY PLANS GOING FORWARD

The next Trades Day at Lamesa will be September the Fifth. Merchants are getting ready to announce bargain day prices on this date and the Courier is planning another one of its popular contests for women that will result in entertainment and valuable prizes and money in gold for the winners.

It will be an old time horse shoe pitching contest for all women who come to the trades day and enter this event. Judges will be on hand to conduct the contest and all women who enter will be asked to register at the Courier office before appearing to pitch.

Ladies get ready and practice up a bit. Horse shoes will be furnished by the Courier for the event, but they will be regulation horse shoes so any lady who desires to practice may obtain any regulation horse shoe and begin practicing at once. Two metal stobs will be placed in the ground fifteen feet apart and six in, above the top of the ground. The lady will stand back of one stob and pitch two regulation horse shoes at the other stob. A ringer counts five points. One shoe on the other kills the pitch.

The closest shoe counts one point. Pitching will be in groups the winner of each group being allowed to contest winners of other groups as so directed by the judges.

Here is the way to enter the contest, ladies. Come to Lamesa on Monday, September 5th, and register at the Courier Office on that day. You can trade one horse shoe for a year's subscription to the Courier. If you are already getting the paper, you can send it to some friend in the county.

LUNCHEON CLUB HEARS INTERESTING SPEAKER AT MEETING TUESDAY

The business men's luncheon club met in regular session Tuesday at noon at the Williams Hotel with Cecil Westerman in charge of the program.

Miss Margaret Morris sang a solo accompanied at the piano by Mrs. A. G. Barnard. Captain H. W. McDonald, world traveler for thirty-five years who is in our town this week giving lectures, made a very interesting talk. Captain McDonald displayed an idol brought back from the Orient, and also a Chinese shoe, given him by a Chinese Princess, whose life he saved. He also displayed the Buddhist mode of prayer. At the last of the luncheon the usual line of hokum about Clarksville was heard.

The Board of Trustees of the Lamesa Independent School District and a few tax-payers of the district met for the budget hearing on Monday night. The school board held a short business session after the meeting on the budget at which the date for the opening of the ensuing nine months school term was set for September 12, 1932.

In his preliminary remarks, W. B. Collins, budget officer of the district, by virtue of his position as president of the board, stated that the budget was expected to provide for a nine months term of school of standard or above quality at a minimum of local and other cost. He also stated that the budget was proposed after long and serious thought, the school board being guided by previous experience in budget making, the desire for a standard school in the community, a desire to maintain the integrity of the district's credit, and consideration for the tax paying public.

The receipts anticipated for the district amount to \$57,300.47 from all sources. The amount expected from local 1932 taxes is \$27,349.72. The remainder is expected from the State per capita apportionment, from transfer accounts, delinquent taxes, tuition for pupils attending the local schools from outside the district and home economics subsidy from the State and Federal governments.

In the matter of disbursements the budget discloses that the total to be expended for teachers' salaries including all such employees is \$30,778.50. The remainder of the expense account will be expended for items incident to the maintenance of schools and for operation of the school buildings for school purposes.

The following items call for the largest portions of such expense. Interest on outstanding bonds, sinking funds for the retirement of bonds, insurance for the protection of the district's investment in school properties, fuel, lights, water, and sewerage, janitorial services and supplies, the business administration of the district's affairs as tax assessments and collections bookkeeping, county administration assessment, printing, and postage, repairs to buildings and upkeep of grounds, interest on short time loans and purchase of materials incident to instruction of all which total \$25,791.45. The total expenditures are expected to amount to \$56,569.95.

The hearing was most cordial. Those who spoke expressed appreciation of the administration of the schools and quality of the local schools and a desire that the efficiency of the schools be unimpaired.

The schools which are to open on September 12, are to be conducted by a faculty which numbers 30 teachers. This number is four fewer than were used last year. The average size of classes will be increased somewhat by the decreases in faculty. The number of children on the school district's census list is 1156. The transfers are 113. The entire enrollment cannot be forecast at this time because there are other pupils who may come to the local high school, because the higher grades are not offered in their district.

The courses offered during the coming term will be the same as in previous years with the exception of public speaking in the high school grades. This subject will be combined with and made a part of the high school courses in English.

The minimum age for free school pupils is six years on or before September first. The requirement for pupils to be vaccinated against small pox is still effective.

Further announcements concerning the opening of the schools will be made later.

Captain Macdonald has lived in India many years, in the home of the high and low, from the Palace of Maharajah to the hut of the Ryot and untouchables. He will have many objects of interest and explain them, and answer all questions. There will be no charges, but a voluntary offering will be taken to pay his expenses.

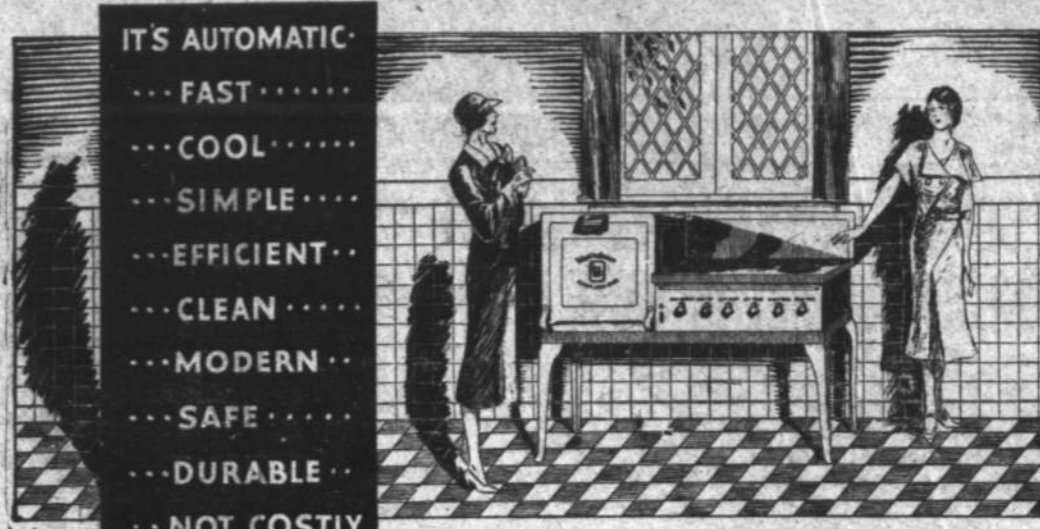

H. J. R. No. 1. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 1 of Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas should be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 1. The following classes of persons shall not be allowed to vote in this State, to-wit:

First: Persons under twenty-one (21) years of age.

Second: Idiots and lunatics.

Third: All paupers supported by any county.

Fourth: All persons convicted of any felony, subject to such exception as the Legislature may make.

Fifth: All soldiers, marines and seamen, employed in the service of the Army or Navy of the United States.

Sec. 2. That Section 33 of Article 16, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person, for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard Reserve, the National Guard Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps."

Sec. 3. That Section 40 of Article 16, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 40. No person shall hold or exercise, at the same time, more than one Civil Office of emolument, except that of Justice of Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, Officer of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, from holding in conjunction with such office any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, or from voting at any Election; General, Special or Primary, in this State when otherwise qualified."

Sec. 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next General Election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.

H. J. R. No. 5. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 7, of Article 11, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Article 11, Section 7. All counties and cities bordering on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico are hereby authorized upon a vote of a two-thirds majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon at an election called for such purpose to levy and collect such tax for construction of sea walls, breakwaters, or sanitary purposes, as may now or may hereafter be authorized by law, and may create a debt for such works and issue bonds in evidence thereof. But no debt for any purpose shall ever be incurred in any manner by any city or county unless provision is made, at the time of creating the same, for levying and collecting a sufficient tax to pay the interest thereon and provide at least two per cent (2%) as a sinking fund; and the condemnation of the right of way for the erection of such works shall be fully provided for."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 8th day of November, A. D. 1932.

H. J. R. No. 26. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 3a, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 3a. When an election is held by any county, or any number of counties, or any political sub-division of the State, or any political sub-division of a county, or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State and which may or may not include towns, villages or municipal corporations, or any city, town or village, for the purpose of issuing bonds or otherwise lending credit, or expending money or assuming any debt, only qualified electors who own taxable property in the State, county, political sub-division, district, city, town or village where such election is held, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote and all electors shall vote in the election precinct of their residence."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.

H. J. R. No. 6. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 1-a be added to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to read as follows:

Article VIII—Section 1-a: Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by law shall be exempt from all taxation for State purposes; nothing herein shall apply within those counties or other political subdivision now receiving any remission of State taxes, but upon the expiration of such period of remission this Section shall become applicable within such counties and political subdivisions.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.

H. J. R. No. 21. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 14 of Article 8 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 14. There shall be elected by the qualified electors of each county at the same time and under the same law regulating the election of State and County officers, an Assessor and Collector of Taxes, who shall hold his office, for two (2) years and until his successor is elected and qualified; and such Assessor and Collector of Taxes shall perform all the duties with respect to assessing property for the purpose of taxation and of collecting taxes as may be prescribed by the Legislature."

Sec. 2. That Section 16, of Article 8, of the Constitution of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 16. The sheriff of each county in addition to his other duties shall be the Assessor and Collector of Taxes therefor; but, in counties having ten thousand (10,000) or more inhabitants, to be determined by the last preceding census of the United States, an Assessor and Collector of Taxes shall be elected to hold office for two (2) years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified."

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State on the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.

S. J. R. No. 28. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas, Article 16, be amended by adding thereto another Section, Section 60, which shall read as follows:

"Section 60. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to authorize a Texas Centennial, commemorating the heroic period of early Texas history, and celebrating a century of our independence and progress, to be held at such times, places and in such manner as may be designated by the Legislature of Texas."

That the Legislature of Texas be authorized to make appropriation for the support and maintenance thereof; provided, that this authorization shall not be construed to make appropriations for any other future exposition or celebration of any kind or character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next general election to be held on the Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1932.

S. J. R. No. 28. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 11, of Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended by a vote of the people by virtue of Senate Joint Resolution No. 7, passed at the Regular Session of the 41st Legislature, be, and the same is hereby amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 11. In order to enable the Legislature to perform the duties set forth in the foregoing Section, it is hereby declared all lands and other property heretofore set apart and appropriated for the establishment and maintenance of the University of Texas, together with all the proceeds of sales of the same, heretofore made or hereafter to be made, and all grants, donations and appropriations that may hereafter be made by the State of Texas, or from any other source, except donations limited to specific purposes, shall constitute and become a Permanent University Fund. And the same as realized and received into the Treasury of the State (together with such sums belonging to the Fund, as may now be in the Treasury), shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties of said State, or in School Bonds of municipalities, or in bonds issued under and by virtue of the Federal Farm Loan Act approved by the President of the United States, July 17, 1916, and amendments thereto; and the interest accruing thereon shall be subject to appropriation by the Legislature to accomplish the purpose declared in the foregoing Section; provided, that the one-tenth of the alternate Section of the lands granted to railroads, reserved by the State, which were set apart and appropriated to the establishment of the University of Texas, by an Act of the Legislature of February 11, 1888, entitled, 'An Act to establish the University of Texas,' shall not be included in, or constitute a part of, the Permanent University Fund."

Sec. 2. Said proposed amendment shall be voted on by the electors of this State qualified to vote on Constitutional amendments at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.

H. J. R. No. 24. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 13 of Article 8 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Sec. 13. Provision shall be made by the first Legislature for the speedy sale, without the necessity of a suit in Court, of a sufficient portion of all lands and other property for the taxes due thereon, and every year thereafter for the sale in like manner of all lands and other property upon which the taxes have not been paid; and the deed of conveyance to the purchaser for all lands and other property thus sold shall be held to vest a good and perfect title in the purchaser thereof, subject to be impeached only for actual fraud; provided, that the former owner shall within two years from date of the filing for record of the Purchaser's Deed have the right to redeem the land on the following basis:

(1) Within the first year of the redemption period upon the payment of the amount of money paid for the land, including One (\$1.00) Dollar Tax Deed Recording Fee and all taxes, penalties, interest and costs paid plus not exceeding twenty-five (25%) per cent of the aggregate total;

(2) Within the last year of the redemption period upon the payment of the amount of money paid for the land, including One (\$1.00) Dollar Tax Deed Recording Fee and all taxes, penalties, interest and costs paid plus not exceeding fifty (50%) per cent of the aggregate total."

Sec. 2. That the foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1932.

H. J. R. No. 12. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 55, Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 55. The Legislature shall have no power to release or extinguish, or to authorize the releasing or extinguishing, in whole or in part, the indebtedness, liability or obligation of any corporation or individual, to this State or to any county or defined subdivision thereof, or other municipal corporation therein, except delinquent taxes, which have been due for a period of at least ten years."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State qualified to vote on Constitutional Amendments at the General Election in 1932.

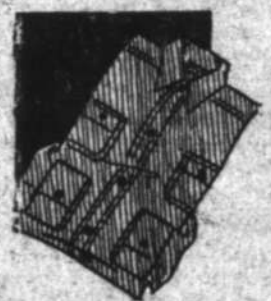
